07 December, from Crime Stoppers: TIPS FOR ASSISTING EMERGENCY VEHICLES…

Too often it seems that motorists are unsure of what is expected of them when an

emergency vehicle is behind them with lights and sirens.

- * Do not panic
- * Slow down (but do not brake rapidly)
- * Use your indicators
- * Be aware of other motorists; drivers should not play music at such a volume they cannot hear outside noises
- * Do not move suddenly or move into the path of the emergency vehicle
- * Move as far to the left of the road as you can and come to a stop
- *If you cannot move out of the path safely, keep moving forward until it's safe to move over
- * Remember, you are required to abide by road rules at all times

An obstructed journey can be the difference between life and death.

03 December, from Penrith command: CONFUSED ABOUT PARKING?

Here are some General parking rules from the Roads & Maritime Services website.

You must **NOT** stop your vehicle (that is, bring it to a stop and either stay with the vehicle or leave it parked) in the following circumstances:

- *Double parked (that is in the road alongside a car that is parked)
- *On or across a driveway (unless dropping off or picking up passengers for no longer than 2 minutes)
- *On or across a footpath

- *On a median strip or traffic island
- *On motorways
- *In a clearway
- *On footpaths and nature strips
- *At a BUS STOP or within 20m before and 10m after a BUS STOP or between a BUS ZONE, TAXI STAND or TAXI ZONE signs
- *In a safety zone or within 10 metres before or after a safety zone Within an intersection
- *In a slip lane
- *On or within 20m (before) or 10m (after) a pedestrian crossing, marked foot crossing or children's crossing (unless a sign allows you to park there)
- *Within 20m of an intersecting road at an intersection with traffic lights unless a sign allows you to park there
- *Within one metre of another vehicle parked in front or behind (does not apply when angle parking)
- *Within 10m of an intersecting road at an intersection without traffic lights unless a sign allows you to park there.

02 December, from North Shore command: Your Choice is a NSW Police Force alcohol diversion program aimed at persons under the age of 18 years.

Rather than pursuing formal legal processes for incidents involving intoxication and/or the illegal possession or consumption of alcohol, police can issue the young person with a referral to the Your Choice program. The Your Choice program seeks to challenge perceptions about underage drinking and excessive consumption of alcohol and to educate young people about the health, legal and social consequences of drinking. It also aims to enhance the capacity of parents/guardians to influence their child's behaviour and attitudes towards drinking.

Your Choice is a prevention strategy with the long-term objective of assisting young people to take responsibility for their inappropriate and harmful consumption of alcohol leading, ultimately, to a reduction in the incidence and extent of heavy episodic drinking and associated harmful behaviours.

The program operates as a two hour face to face education seminar, which the young person attends with their parent or guardian. The Your Choice education sessions are designed and run by police, with the assistance of expert drug and alcohol workers. The program provides young people and their parents/guardians with strategies to avoid risks and keep safe by developing better attitudes and behaviours around alcohol. It is also available as a 30 minute online education program. Parents are encouraged to visit the website to increase their awareness of underage drinking risks and the role they play in minimising those risks.

01 December, from Northern Beaches command: Two more dirt bikes were stolen last week from a home at Terrey Hills.

The off-road motorcycles with a combined worth of about \$12,000 were stolen from a locked storage shed within a garage at a property in Nambucca Rd at Terrey Hills. The theft took place between 9.30pm on Wednesday and 6.30am on Thursday. The bikes stolen were an orange KTM dirt bike worth \$8000 and a lime green Kawasaki dirt bike worth \$4000. Police believe the thieves obtained the address of the owners after seeing the bikes at a dirt bike meeting or racetrack, of which there are many around Sydney. Northern Beaches crime manager Inspector Craig Wonders said thieves often identified dirt bikes they want to steal and either

followed the owner home from a race or club meeting or traced their address through other means. He said this could include social media sites, where dirt bike owners post photos of their machines and sometimes include information that thieves can use to trace the identity of the owner and the location where the bike is stored.

The Law Handbook - Contact Points contd:

An Employee's Guide to Unfair Dismissal -

This topic has information about making an unfair dismissal application to the Fair Work Commission (the Commission). It can help you if:

- you are covered by national unfair dismissal laws
- you were dismissed and the dismissal was unfair
- you want to make an unfair dismissal application against your employerâ€c
- you want your job back (reinstatement) or compensation.

If you want to make an unfair dismissal application to the Commission, you must do so within 21 days of the date you were dismissed.

Sexual Assault Services

Help for victims of sexual assault. Sexual assault is a crime. Its impact can be devastating. However, recovery is possible and there is help available to assist you. If you are a victim of sexual assault there are many services you can contact, depending on your needs, to report the crime or to seek counselling and support. This includes the **Victims Access Line (1800 633 063)** which provides information, referral and support to victims of crime.

In an emergency phone **000** or your local police station.

Otherwise you can phone your local sexual assault service. These services are free and confidential to any male or female victim of sexual assault, their friends and family. Not only are services available, there are also changes in laws which have improved the way victims of sexual assault are supported and treated in the court system in New South Wales, Australia. Victims of crime in New South Wales have a Charter of Victims Rights to protect and promote their rights.

From the Hornsby Advocate, 03 December:

Fare dodgers in \$10m worth of train journeys BUT NORTHERN LINE RANKS

AMONG MOST HONEST IN YEAR OF TRANSPORT COST RISES [edited]

FEWER train passengers evaded fares on the North Shore Line last year but it still bled more than \$7 million, as public transport became more expensive for NSW. The Northern Line lost about \$3 million to fare dodgers but was the second-most honest line behind the Eastern suburbs where more than 96 per cent of passengers paid the correct fare. Both the value and number of fines decreased by \$6.7 million and 33,226 respectively last year. More people were found travelling with no ticket on the Newcastle and Central Coast lines than in 2012 at an estimated cost of almost \$2.5 million.

Get your hand off it: The use of mobile telephones and tablets is strictly prohibited while you are driving. A study by Monash University found drivers were 2.8 times more likely to crash when dialling or handling a phone. If you are driving at the speed limit of 60kmph, you can travel 33 metres in two seconds, blind to what is in front of you. At 100kmph, if you have your eyes off the road for two seconds, you travel the length of an Olympic swimming pool. This is a substantial danger to other road users. Also, the demerit points are about to increase substantially when you are caught. Detective Inspector Jon Gross Ku-ring-gai Local Area command

NORMANHURST A female motorist has been charged with offences after a police pursuit on Pennant Hills Rd on Saturday afternoon. About 3.15pm, a black Hyundai Excel was seen to be driving erratically southbound on the M1, causing other vehicles to take evasive action to avoid it. Police attempted to stop the vehicle but it continued onto Pennant Hills Rd and then allegedly did a U-turn at traffic lights at Hinemoa Ave. A police officer was able to stop the Hyundai by approaching it and removing the keys when it was stationary at traffic lights. A 53-year-old Booral woman was charged with driving while her licence was suspended, resisting police, failure to stop, negligent driving and making a U-turn at traffic lights.

WAHROONGA Police conducting random registration checks in Redgrave Rd about 6am Monday noticed a strong smell of cannabis coming from a vehicle. A search of the vehicle allegedly uncovered a small amount of cannabis, a bong and other drug utensils. A 44year-old Long Jetty motorist was issued with a court attendance notice to attend Hornsby Local Court on December 15. A roadworthiness check of the vehicle revealed major defects and it was not permitted to be driven from the scene.

NORMANHURST A 35year-old motorist was taken to Hornsby Hospital with minor

injuries after a two-car accident at the intersection of Milson Parade and Hammond Ave about 7.45pm last Wednesday. As a result of the crash, the injured man's car hit a gutter and tipped onto its roof before landing on a fence. The other car, a red Fiat, stopped a short distance down the road but then drove off.

WESTLEIGH A 2013 white/blue Stacer runabout and red trailer, worth \$10,000, were stolen from a property in Eucalyptus Drive between 4pm Thursday and 1.30pm Saturday.

HORNSBY A teenage girl is to receive a youth caution after she allegedly attempted to steal two bottles of perfume, worth about \$200, from the David Jones store on Monday. The girl, 15, allegedly put the perfume under her jumper and in the front of her jeans and walked out of the store about 5.10pm. In a separate incident at the store, a youth, 18, was issued with a field court attendance notice after he allegedly attempted to steal a \$23 phone charger by putting it down his pants about 5.40pm Monday. He is to appear at Hornsby Local Court on January 6.

WAHROONGA Police are investigating a road rage incident in Billyard Ave about 3.15pm Monday, involving a 36-year-old truck driver and a 54-year-old female motorist.

NORMANHURST A young male was seen to be acting suspiciously in Malsbury Rd on Tuesday night. A resident reported sighting the male, believed to be aged about 16, about 8.30pm in his yard. When the resident walked towards the teenager he ran off. About 9.10pm, another resident observed a male in his front yard. When the resident approached the youth he jumped over the front fence and ran away. The dog squad was called in to do a search of the area but didn't locate the youth. Investigations are continuing.

HORNSBY A bottle of vodka was stolen from a display shelf at Dan Murphy's about 2.20pm last Thursday. The thief is described as a male, caucasian, aged about 35, of average build, with brown hair in a ponytail, a beard and wearing a dark suit. In a separate incident, another bottle of vodka was stolen from the store about 9.10am Tuesday.

TURRAMURRA The Police Transport Command is continuing to investigate an incident where a train guard's compartment was broken into on June 23 between Turramurra and Warrawee railway stations. About 4.15pm, four young males, aged 14-17, of caucasian appearance, broke into the compartment and

graffiti vandalised the inside window. Anyone with information is asked to phone **Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000**.
