From 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Seniors':

- 1. INSTALL A SPY-HOLE.
- 2. INSTALL A SECURITY DOOR-CHAIN, or SECURITY DOOR BAR, or SECURITY DOOR, AND USE IT. [A door bar may be easier for elderly hands to manipulate.]
- 3. INSTALL SECURITY SENSOR LIGHTING. Consider connecting the sensor lighting to a socket unit that can †chirrup†or †bark†as a warning/ deterrent.
- 4. DO NOT OPEN THE DOOR TO STRANGERS. NEVER ALLOW STRANGERS INTO YOUR HOME. IF SOMEONE REQUIRES YOUR ASSISTANCE IN AN EMERGENCY, PHONE FOR HELP YOURSELF. BE WARY OF STRANGERS.
- 5. NEVER ACCEPT DOOR-TO-DOOR OFFERS OF WORK FROM TRADESMEN (eg tree-lopping, gutter maintenance) WITHOUT CONSULTATION WITH A TRUSTED FRIEND OR RELATIVE.
- 9. BUDDY-UP WITH A NEIGHBOUR— USE A SIGNAL TO SHOW YOU HAVE ARISEN SAFELY (eg a blind raised.)
- 12. LOCK YOUR DOORS WHEN IN THE HOME. REMEMBER TO REMOVE THE KEYS FROM THE LOCKS, IN CASE ACCESS IS NEEDED FROM OUTSIDE IN AN EMERGENCY.
- 13. KEEP A TORCH & PHONE HANDY BY THE BED.

14. KEEP YOUR CAR REMOTE CONTROL ON YOUR PERSON, OR BY THE BED. IT CAN BE USED AS A PANIC ALARM IN AN EMERGENCY.

17. INSTALL A MONITORED INTRUDER ALARM SYSTEM. MOST HAVE †HOME†AND †AWAY†SETTINGS, ALLOWING YOU TO SET IT WHEN AT HOME (especially when sleeping), AS WELL AS WHEN OUT.

18. LOCK OPEN WINDOWS 10cm MAX. [New security products include sensors for open windows, as well as for balcony areas.]

Taking these simple steps will help keep the environment healthy and your

suburb clean, while also giving us a chance to stop illegal dumping in Hornsby Shire.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTION #2: WHAT SHOULD I DO IF I HEAR AN INTRUDER IN MY HOME?

Best advice is to scream, run and hide. Try and keep a line of retreat open at all times. If possible, lock yourself in a room. Barricade yourself in a room if you have to. Do NOT confront the intruder. Phone 000. You might only have a few seconds to get the call in. State "I am at (give address) and there is person(s) on premises; I fear for the welfare of myself and family". Police will respond 'code red'. Only fight an intruder if you have no other choice. Just think, if you get killed or incapacitated then who is going to protect your partner/kids, let alone support them if you die? Possessions are not worth dying for. Keep a pre-programmed mobile phone by the

bed. And a large million candle power torch is recommended, as it has the added bonus of being able to blind an attacker. A flash (just a flash) of light in their eyes will rob them of their night vision, so they are going to be severely hindered if they try to run off in the dark, where as you have the advantage of knowing the layout of your place. If someone is prepared to enter a home knowing someone is in residence, it can be taken as a fact they would be prepared to confront anyone who challenges them.

Related Facts: Is the front gate to your property locked? If so, then you must provide a bell, buzzer or method for a person to alert you they are there. Otherwise they have a common law right to go to your front door. Even if that includes jumping the fence or gate.

From the Hornsby Advocate, 14 January:

Hornsby and Ku-ringgai drivers might be getting the message about not using their mobile phones while driving but there were still 59 motorists fined for this offence in the area last month. The same time last year police issued 89 fines for using a phone while driving, down from 139 in November 2010.

Assault on police ends in charges before bail A SCAFFOLDER from Pennant Hills who allegedly rammed a marked police vehicle twice and then assaulted two officers was granted bail last week. Ian Thomas Lambert, 31, left Burwood Local Court on January 6 accompanied by his mother, who paid \$5000 cash surety for his release. The incident happened on Pennant Hills Rd at 12.45am on Wednesday last week in torrential rain. Police were patrolling Pennant Hills Rd when they allegedly saw a Holden Barina make an illegal U-turn. They followed it to the intersection of Copeland Rd and Cardinal Ave when Lambert allegedly reversed twice into the police car. Lambert did not enter pleas to the seven charges, which include Skye's Law (trying to avoid arrest during a police chase) resisting arrest, two counts of assaulting police and refusing to submit to a breath analysis. The court heard when the two officers attempted to arrest him he allegedly grabbed one of them around the neck. The matter was adjourned to January 14.

Illegal unit parkers face fines [edited] DRIVERS who illegally park in visitor bays

of apartment blocks across the north shore could soon face fines up to \$550. The new fines will apply in areas where councils strike agreements with the owners corporations of unit blocks. The fines are a package of reforms introduced by the State Government late last year that included the controversial 75 per cent ownership rule. Under the new laws, drivers caught parking in visitor bays may be hit with hefty fines in accordance with schemes drawn up by councils and building owners corporations. The schemes will mean council parking rangers can enter private property to issue fines and erect signs if the council has a prior agreement with the owners' corporation.

Ku-ring-gai Council is yet to set up any agreements but will assess requests to "regulate― parking on a case-by-case basis. Visitor bay parking fines are part of more than 90 reforms to strata laws that come into effect in July 2016.

ROSEVILLE lewellery and cash were stolen from a William St house last Wednesday afternoon. Neighbours heard a house alarm go off and saw a man exit the home via the rear door about 12.15pm. Police were called and a search of the home revealed the man had entered the property via a window and ransacked the bedrooms. The man is described as being of African appearance, about 25-30 years old, 175cm tall and with very skinny legs. He was last seen wearing an orange Hi-Vis vest, striped board shorts, blue Ontisuka Tiger shoes and a grey beanie carrying a dark bag over his shoulder. From The Bush Telegraph, 21 January: STOP THE SUPPLY OF ALCOHOL TO MINORS

Parents are the most common source of alcohol for 12-17 year old students according to the 2011 Australian Secondary Students' Alcohol and Drug survey. This is closely followed by friends. You're a parent, not a mate, is one of the bold new messages to be used in a health campaign … STOP THE SUPPLY … to encourage the Hornsby and Ku-ring-gai community to take a stand against supplying alcohol to minors. The Stop the Supply campaign aims to make parents, coaches and young people stop and think about the consequences of supplying or buying alcohol for someone under 18 years. Stop The Supply delivers a clear message that secondary supply of alcohol to a person under 18 years is against the law (unless you are the parent or guardian) and results in a minimum on the spot fine of \$1,100 or fine up to \$11,000 and/or 12 months imprisonment (NSW Liquor Act 2007).
