
eNewsletter # 233 - 28 March 2016

Cyber criminals are scraping personal information from thousands of Australians' social media profiles and using it to trap victims with ransomware â€" a type of malware that freezes computer files and demands money to unlock them.

The ransomware â€" appropriately titled 'Locky' â€" is spreading quickly round the web in various guises, but security experts have found it in yet another AustraliaPost email scam.

23 March, THE TOP FIVE DRIVER DISTRACTIONS



Distracted drivers can cause traffic problems and road crashes. Here are the the Top 5, as listed by the NSW Roads and Maritime Services 'Geared' magazine:

1. Mobile phones (talking and texting)

Using a mobile while driving can increase the risk of a collision by four times, according to several studies. Sending a text message is even worse.

2. Adjusting vehicle settings

This is the most common bad driving habit because many people don't realise it's dangerous to fiddle with the radio, air-conditioning or windows while driving.

3. Passengers

Young drivers have a greater risk of crashing when they have friends in the car.

4. Eating, drinking and smoking

An American study has found that eating a cheeseburger can be more distracting than talking on a mobile. And the risk of causing a crash is just one more reason not to smoke!

5. External distractions

As if there wasn't enough happening inside the car, there are lots of distractions outside too. Make sure you look out for other drivers and pedestrians, while trying to block out the roadside billboards, shops and all sorts of unexpected or interesting things going on in the streets.

From the Hornsby Advocate, 24 March:

HORNSBY

An 80-year-old female pedestrian was hit by a car on Burdett St in Hornsby about 11.35am on Tuesday. The driver, a man in his 70s, was taken to Hornsby Hospital for blood and urine testing. The elderly woman was taken to Royal North Shore Hospital in a critical condition.

HORNSBY

Police were called to Hornsby Westfield on Sunday morning where a body was found outside. The coroner is investigating but it is understood there were no suspicious circumstances.

WAHROONGA

Burglars ransacked a home on Cleveland St while a family slept upstairs sometime between 10pm on Tuesday and 12.20am on Wednesday.

THORNLEIGH

A man, 52, who had not held a drivers licence for 35 years was allegedly speeding on The Comenarra Parkway in a Hyundai Getz about 7.15am on Sunday. The Normanhurst driver was clocked at 80km/h in a 60km/h zone and will face Hornsby court on April 21.

WAHROONGA

Credit cards, car keys and a handbag were stolen from a unit on Munderah St between 11pm on Monday and 9.15am Tuesday. The burglar entered via an open sliding door and stole a handbag which the victim found in the morning in the unit block's yard. The bag was missing her keys and cards.

BROOKLYN

\$3300 worth of tools including a drop saw, a concrete drill and an impact driver were taken from a Mitsubishi express panel van after the lock was forced on the driver's side at McKell Park between 10pm on Monday and 7am on Tuesday.

TURRAMURRA

Opportunistic thieves rummaged through five unlocked cars parked in Fairlorn Ave. Bobbin Head Rd and Banks Ave sometime between 10pm on Monday and 7am on Tuesday. A VW Golf had coins stolen from it on Fairlorn Ave. A Subaru was left with all its doors and the boot open after the console and glove box were rummaged through and items put on the seat also in Fairlorn Ave. A \$20 note was taken from an unlocked Lexus sedan parked in the same street. A Mazda cx9 was rummaged through on Bobbin Head Rd but nothing was taken and on Banks Ave a Toyota Prius was searched but nothing stolen.

WAHROONGA

A 2003 Mazda B2600 table top ute was stolen on Burns Rd between 7.45am and 7.50am on Monday. The owner had left the doors unlocked and the keys in the ignition. The victim's mobile phone was also left unattended in the car. The ute had power tools in it worth thousands of dollars. About 10am on the same day staff at the SAN hospital told the victim his phone had been dropped off by a delivery driver. The ute is still missing.

BROOKLYN

The dashboard of a Commodore was ripped apart to get a stereo and an amplifier taken from the boot of the car parked at McKell Park between 10pm on Monday and 7am on Tuesday.

WARRAWEE

An e-tag and coins were stolen from an unlocked Holden Captiva in Hastings Rd between 10pm on Monday and 7am on Tuesday.

CCTV IMAGE HELP

POLICE SEEK MAN OVER ASSAULT



Police believe the man (pictured) can assist with their investigation into an indecent assault last Thursday in Chatswood. About midnight a woman, 22, left her boyfriend to head home and was grabbed as she walked up the steps to her front door on Edgar St. The woman screamed as she was pushed to the ground. The assailant let her go and was last seen heading east on Western Way toward Jenkins St.

The man is described as being of Asian appearance, in his early 20s, about 170cm tall with brown hair. He is shown to be wearing a white long sleeve shirt and black knee length shorts. Information to Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

GORDON

A 53-year-old woman was hit by a car while crossing the road at Park Ave on Monday morning. About 6am the driver of a VW Golf entered the crossing and struck the woman. Ambulance officers treated the woman at the scene before she was taken to Royal North Shore Hospital. The driver allegedly made some admissions to being at fault but police will wait for the final results of the woman's injuries before taking any action.

EAST KILLARA

A man has been charged with high-range drink driving and had his licence suspended after crashing his car last Friday. The driver from East Killara was travelling along Talavera Rd, Macquarie Park, about 3.10am when he crashed. Police arrested the 23-year-old after he returned a positive breath test and took him to Ryde Police station for a further breath analysis, which returned a reading of 0.198. He is due to appear before Burwood Local Court on April 19.

PYMBLE

More than \$2000 worth of gardening equipment and motor bike helmets have been stolen from a storage garage in a unit complex on the Pacific Highway. Sometime between last Sunday 5pm and Monday 7am a lawnmower and several motor bike helmets were stolen from the garage totalling more than \$2300. If anyone saw anything they are urged to call Crime Stoppers.

From the draft "Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Car Owners":

Tips for Car Owners #1:

WHEN YOU LEAVE YOUR CAR UNATTENDED (even short periods), CLOSE ALL WINDOWS, REMOVE KEY FROM IGNITION &

LOCK ALL DOORS. Remember, it's an offence under the Aussie Road Rules to leave your car unlocked

Tips for Car Owners #7:

STAY ALERT WHILE APPROACHING YOUR CAR. GET YOUR KEYS OUT OF YOUR BAG READY. DON'T CLICK THE REMOTE CONTROL UNTIL YOU ARE CLOSE TO THE VEHICLE. LOOK AROUND & INSIDE THE CAR BEFORE GETTING IN.

Tips for Car Owners #10:

DON'T LEAVE PERSONAL PAPERS SUCH AS LICENCE OR REGISTRATION IN YOUR MOTOR VEHICLE. They may be used to dispose of the vehicle. However, do keep with you a note of your vehicle registration & information number (VIN).

Tips for Car Owners #14:

REMEMBER TO TAKE YOUR PARKING TICKET WITH YOU. This makes it

difficult for the thief to steal your car.

Tips for Car Owners #18:

KEEP YOUR CAR KEYS BY YOUR BED AT NIGHT. The remote control can be used as a panic button in an emergency, setting off the car alarm. DON'T BE TEMPTED TO LEAVE KEYS ON THE TABLE BY THE FRONT DOOR
