



12 May, from NRMA: TEST TIME: In what order do the vehicles go?

Vehicle B then A Vehicle A then B



ANSWER: Vehicle B goes first then vehicle A. Vehicles A is turning right from the terminating road at a T-intersection; a driver turning from the terminating road at a T-intersection must give way to all vehicles on the continuing road (except those performing a U-turn). Vehicle A must give way to vehicle B.



10 May: Traffic and Highway Patrol Command Officers working alongside Roads and Maritime Services officers have intercepted 13806 trucks and trailers in the first week of Operation StateTrans.

As a result, 1609 defects have been applied to trucks and trailers for issues such as braking, fuel and oil leaks, steering, and other mechanical issues. Officers have also issued 888 infringements and 317 breaches for a range of licence, registration, fatigue, loading, and other offences.

Random notes from the NSW Police Kuring Gai Local Area Command's Community Safety & Precinct Committee meeting, Wednesday 20 April 2016. Neighbourhood Watch are represented at this meeting.

- We have a temporary Police Commander in place since the transfer of Supt David Jones - Detective Acting Superintendent Damian Henry.
- A reminder to record information on all items, including power tools the serial number & model number. Consider engraving*. Record your phone's IMIE**. If an item is pawned, serial numbers are recorded on a computer system that the police can access.

- The community is encouraged to report everything. Use Crime Stoppers 1800 333 000 for anything suspicious. It's your information that helps to solve crime.
- A compliment for the handling by police of the Hornsby murder. 15 hours to record the crime scene! Unfortunately the viral activity due to people recording with their mobile phones made certain that the incident continued for much longer than that.
- 'Steal from Dwelling' is different to 'Break & Enter' because no seal is broken; eg an open garage, bike on balcony, party.
- Mail theft is for the purpose of Identity Theft and fraud. Warning: New Driver's Licences are now sent in the mail.
- Tradie tools are being targeted. Consider a robust cage for on the back of a ute. Often cheap ineffective ones are used to store expensive tools.
- There is currently a significant spike in 'Steal from Motor Vehicle' incidents.
 Always lock your vehicle. Leave nothing. Consider leaving the console and glove box open to show they are empty. All 'Steal from Motor Vehicle' incidents are currently being fingerprinted.
- Have CCTV put in. Or request CCTV to be put in. Facial recognition systems these days can help identify a suspect.
- Domestic Violence is still under-reported.
- A Retirement Village in Turramurra had an incident that needs to be shared as a warning. Purses and wallets are targeted. The thief will then phone the victim posing as the bank, stating the cards have been handed in and the ID <u>and PIN</u> numbers need confirming by the victim. Never give out your PIN number.
- * Gordon Neighbourhood Watch donated 8 engravers which are available to borrow FREE of charge from the Crime Prevention Officer at Hornsby Police Station 9476 9799.
- ** A phone's International Mobile Equipment Identity (IMIE) Number can be accessed by typing *#06# into your device (like you would make a call), press send and the IMIE will appear.




On Sunday 22 and 29 May 2016 there are Safety when Fishing & Swimming workshops for the Chinese and Korean communities to be held from 10 til



This guide has been developed by The National Roads and Motorists' Association (NRMA) and Alzheimer's Australia NSW for people with dementia, carers, family and friends and health professionals. It provides a summary of the key issues surrounding driving and dementia and describes other mobility options that exist for people who can no longer drive.

FREE Australian Police Child ID Safety App Available Now

The Australian Police Child ID App is a smartphone application which has been developed to help Australian parents provide information to police in an attempt to locate their children if they go missing. The Australian Police Child ID App was adapted from the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) Child ID App in the United States. This collaborative effort has seen the Australian Federal Police (AFP) create a tool that will help parents and guardians more easily collect and send important information about their child/children to authorities in the event of a disappearance or abduction. The application allows families to store photographs and vital information about their children on their mobile phone. In the devastating event that a child goes missing, this information can be immediately provided to authorities.

WARNING: Despite last week's warning of the targeting of 'Steal from Motor Vehicles' in the West Pymble area, the local police say this week there have been many more reported.

Here are a few tips from "Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Car Owners":

Tip#1. WHEN YOU LEAVE YOUR CAR UNATTENDED (even short periods), CLOSE ALL WINDOWS, REMOVE KEY FROM IGNITION & LOCK ALL DOORS. Remember, it's an offence under the Aussie Road Rules to leave your car unlocked.

Tip#2. DON'T HIDE SPARE KEYS ON YOUR VEHICLE. Don't kid yourselfâ€"thieves know ALL the best hiding places!

Tip#3. ENSURE YOU HAVE REMOVED ALL PROPERTY FROM VIEW [mobile phone, sunglasses, CDs (burn copies?), bag, wallet, loose change, clothing, laptop, ipod]. EITHER TAKE IT WITH YOU, OR LOCK IT IN THE BOOT. REMOVE ALL SIGNS THAT PROPERTY MAY BE IN THE CAR. eg no blankets covering tempting lumps on the back seat, no carrier bags.

Tip#6. PARK IN WELL-LIT, HIGH PEDESTRIAN AREAS, PREFERABLY WITH CCTV. AVOID CAR PARKS WITH A HISTORY OF BREAK-INS.

Tip#8. CONSIDER INSTALLING A HIGH QUALITY ALARM, TRACKING/SECURITY SYSTEM and/or LOCKING DEVICES ON THE STEERING WHEEL OR TRANSMISSION SHIFTâ€"all good deterrents. The most effective car alarms are switched-on people!

Tip#11. LOCK VEHICLES IN FRONT OF HOME, ON THE DRIVEWAY, IN THE GARAGE - easily forgotten if you're in the garden.

Tip#20. IF YOU LEAVE A KEY WITH A VALET ATTENDANT OR MECHANIC, LEAVE ONLY THE IGNITION KEY.

GRAFFITI REPORTING

In Ku-ring-gai:

- On Council property VandalTrak is a free phone app that enables you to report graffiti on Council premises and equipment. Alternatively, contact Council directly on 9424 0000 or go to vandaltrak.com.au.
- On public property not owned by Council Council does not have the authority to remove graffiti on property that does not belong to Council.

- Report directly to the NSW Graffiti Hotline on free call 1800 707 125.
- On private property If graffiti occurs on your own property or a property
 you are responsible for, you should report the incident to the Police
 Assistance Line (PAL) on 131 444. It is the responsibility of owners to
 remove graffiti from their private property. Your local Rotary Club may be
 able to assist you. Police recommend the rapid removal of graffiti it takes
 away the glory!

GRAFFITI REMOVAL (Thanks to Rotary Club of Turramurra Graffiti Removal Project Team)

- Porous surfaces, eg brickwork
 - apply appropriate graffiti solution onto surface with a small brush
 - o wait 10-20 minutes, then use a water-blaster
- Painted surfaces
 - Using a brush or roller, apply PrepLock to the graffiti area
 - Using a brush or roller, apply colour-matched paint
- Non-porous surfaces, eg metalwork, plastic, etc.
 - Apply appropriate graffiti removal solution with a rag or pad, then rub using light pressure.

From the Hornsby Advocate, 12 May [This StreetWatch news is included for the benefit of those in the command who receive the North Shore Times, not the Hornsby Advocate. The NST StreetWatch usually only includes news from the North Shore command based at Chatswood Police Station.]:

WAHROONGA

A MAN who had allegedly robbed a shop, was hit by a car after running directly into traffic. At 9.30pm on Friday, May 6, officers from Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command were called to the Pacific Hwy at Wahroonga, near the corner of Redleaf Ave. Witnesses told officers that a man had run onto the highway and into the path of a car. It is alleged the man had robbed a convenience store nearby and was stopped by a member of the public, who he then assaulted. It is claimed he ran through a car park and onto the road after the altercation. Members of the public stopped him from leaving after the accident and detained him until officers arrived. A 30year-old man was treated by paramedics for minor injuries before being taken to Royal North Shore Hospital under police guard. He was charged with stealing and assault, and will appear before Hornsby Local Court on Wednesday, June 8.

HORNSBY

Hornsby Police officers arrested a 19-year-old Blackett man at Hornsby Railway station at 11.50am on Tuesday, May 10. It is alleged he failed to appear at Mt Druitt Court on malicious damage charges. The man will appear at Mt Druitt Court next week

HORNSBY

A 21-year-old Hornsby man had a short joy-ride when the stolen car he'd been driving was pulled over by Hornsby police officers just 45 minutes after the vehicle had been reported missing. The car had been taken from a Hornsby address at 10.30pm on Monday, May 9. and was stopped by officers in Telegraph Rd, Pymble at 11.15pm. Although the man gave a Hornsby address, it was later found he was of no fixed abode. He was charged with stealing the car and appeared at Hornsby Court on Tuesday, May 10, where he was fined.

BEROWRA

Hornsby Police officers carrying out an RBT stop at Berowra arrested a 24-year-old man from Asquith at 9.40pm on Saturday, May 7. He was charged with mid-range drink driving after he failed a breath test. He has been bailed to appear at Hornsby Court on June 16.

SHIRE-WIDE

Hornsby Local Area Command officers are focusing on drink and drug drivers over the next few weeks, as well as standard traffic infringements. Detective Inspector Neil Higgins stressed that officers had access not only to drink driving test equipment but also drug testing equipment. "We have a daily focus on these issues," DI Higgins said, "But it is equally important to remind motorists that they need a Plan B. Don't take drugs and only drive if you haven't had a drink."

PYMBLE

A young homeless man found camping in the bush at Pymble has been charged with 26 offences, including stealing from parked cars, fraud, and entering buildings with the intention to steal. Hornsby Police had been investigating thefts from vehicles in the area and made the arrest on Wednesday, May 4 after finding several of the reported stolen items in the man's possession. The 19-year-old appeared at Hornsby Court for the charges to be laid and will be appearing again on June 16.

PLEA FOR WITNESSES TO STEP UP

WITNESSES are being sought to an accident which brought down power lines and destroyed a power pole in the early hours of this morning.

Just after midnight police were called to the northbound lanes of the Pacific Highway at Warrawee, near the corner of Fox Valley Rd, and found a seriously damaged telegraph pole which they believe had been hit by a car.

The accident had brought down power

lines across the road.

Police closed the northbound lanes and established a contra-flow. One of the lanes remained closed as Ausgrid employees conducted repairs.

Ku-ring-gal police are appealing for any witnesses to the incident to come forward and believe it would have involved a heavy vehicle.
