


30 August from Ku-ring-gai command: Are you unsure about what you can or cannot do during current restrictions?

NSW, excluding LGAs of concern: 5km from home (even if that means another LGA), or stay within your Local Government Area (can be over 5km from home)



27 August, from Ku-ring-gai command: TRENDING CRIME: Catalytic converter theft

Ku-ring-gai Police area Command has recently seen an increase in catalytic converter thefts. These thefts are occurring predominantly at commuter car parks, railway station car parks and car dealerships. The catalytic converter forms part of your car's exhaust system (see below image) and was fitted to all Australian vehicles from 1986 onwards as a means of pollution control. The main reason that catalytic converters are often stolen is due to them being valuable to scrap metal dealers. They contain precious metals, including rhodium, platinum, and palladium.

Preventative measures: Try and park your car in a well lit area and if near a railway station find a CCTV camera and park nearby.

27 August from Ku-ring-gai command: Greater Sydney restrictions - You must stay at home. Only leave your home if you have a reasonable excuse.

Just a reminder from the NSW Government in relation to the current stay at home orders specifically that "only one person per household may leave the home to obtain food or other goods and services each day (you may take a dependent person with you if that person cannot be left at home on their own". This should only occur once a day where possible in order to eliminate the risk of further community transmission.


A reasonable excuse is if you need to



- · obtain food or other goods and services
 - for the personal needs of the household or for other household purposes (including pets)
 - for vulnerable people
 - only one person per household may leave the home to obtain food or other goods and services each day (you may take a dependent person with you if that person cannot be left at home on their own)
 - the goods and services must be obtained within the local government area where you
 live, or within Skm of where you live, but not in an area of concern, unless the goods or
 services, or their equivalent, are not reasonably available within the local government
 area where you live, or within Skm of where you live.

26 August from NSW Police: When leaving your house for a reasonable excuse, it's important to stay 1.5 metres away from people you don't live with.

31 August, from Scamwatch: As COVID-19 restrictions start to ease for vaccinated people in some parts of Australia, beware of scams relating to vaccine passports.

These can look convincing but are a scam designed to steal your personal info.

30 August from NSWPF: Charges laid following drug supply investigation - Dural

Penrith RES investigators have charged two people following inquiries into the supply of prohibited drugs across Sydney's north-west. In June this year, investigators attached to Penrith Region Enforcement Squad (RES) commenced an investigation into the supply of prohibited drugs in the Dural

area.

Following extensive inquiries, officers arrested a 62-year-old man and 37-year-old woman during a vehicle stop at the intersection of Windsor Road and Olive Street at Baulkham Hills, about 12.45pm on Thursday 27 August 2021. In a subsequent search of the Ford Falcon, investigators seized cannabis, methylamphetamine (ice) and a mobile phone.

A short time later, police executed a search warrant at a unit at Stonelea Court, Dural. Investigators were assisted by North West Metropolitan Region Operations Support Groups (OSG) and the Dog Unit throughout the operation. During the search at Dural, police seized 12g of cannabis, six LSD (lysergic acid diethylamide) tabs, a baton and electronic devices. All items seized during the operation will undergo further examination.

The Dural man was taken to Castle Hill Police Station and charged with six counts of possess prohibited drug, supply prohibited drug, possess or use a prohibited weapon without permit and fail to comply requirement public health order - COVID-19.

He was granted strict conditional bail to appear at Parramatta Local Court on Wednesday 8 September 2021.

The Baulkham Hills woman was issued a Court Attendance Notice (CAN) for fail to comply requirement public health order - COVID-19. She will appear at court at a later date.

27 August from The Hills command: Now more than ever, is our Next of Kin program so important to elderly family members living alone [edited to include our local Police Area Command details] WHAT IS THE NEXT OF KIN PROGRAM?

The Next of Kin Program helps people living alone to have the contact details of their nominated person recorded at a local police station. The contact details of the Next of Kin, as well as the nominated doctor, dentist and any medical alerts that would help in an emergency situation will be entered onto a register. Any information provided will be securely stored and only accessed by NSW Police. This information may assist the police and emergency services to contact a relative or other nominated person if needed in an emergency situation.

HOW DO I REGISTER?

Contact your local police station and ask to speak with the Crime Prevention Officer about the Next of Kin Program.

27 August from The Hills command: Hills Police are part way through a 100% inspection of safe storage of all licenced firearm holders in the Hills Area

Whilst in Lockdown, to ensure you comply, the pictures below are an example of a gun safe with separate lockable ammunition storage which, when correctly mounted, would comply with the basic safe storage requirements for firearms under a Category A&B firearms licence. You don't have to get this particular safe, however you must comply with the standards listed below.

The receptacle should be mounted flush with the floor and/or wall and secured through the floor and/or rear by expanding anchor bolts (or similar).

Firearms Dealers and Major Hardware stores offer click and collect for Firearms Safes.

Anyone found not complying with safe storage regulations will have their firearms seized and licence suspended.

Local Dog Attacks Rise Amid Lockdown It's sad to say that amid our current lockdown, Ku-ring-gai Council has seen a substantial increase in local dog attacks since the beginning of the lockdown. Council staff recently compiled data showing a significant increase in dog attacks during the period of the last few months compared with the same monthly periods in 2019 and 2020. There have been 33 incidents in the 10-week period between 1st June – 6th August involving dogs showing aggressive behaviour or physically attacking other dogs and people in the Ku-ring-gai area. "It seems because people are working from home, many dogs are not used to having their owners around so much. When out walking some are displaying overly protective behaviour," notes Mayor Jennifer Anderson.
