
#### 12 October, from Ku-ring-gai command: Do you own this bike or know who does?

#### 12 October, from Hornsby Hospital: WELCOME BACK VISITORS

We are really pleased to welcome back visitors to our hospital from today (Monday 11 October). We know how important visitors are for the wellbeing of our patients and how difficult it has been for them and their loved ones during this time. Two visitors are now allowed to visit a patient per day as long as a visitor:

- Is at least 12 years of age.
- Has had two doses of a TGA approved COVID-19 vaccine.
- Has evidence of their vaccination status when they enter the facility.
- Wears a surgical mask correctly on entry at the facility and for the duration of the visit.

To keep our patients and staff safe, it is so important for visitors to keep their masks on at all times during their visit. Please limit your movement, and continue to practice social distancing and hand hygiene. The new visitor rules only apply to non-COVID-19 wards and non-COVID-19 positive patients. Visitor restrictions still remain for those not vaccinated or partially vaccinated. Please speak to our staff at the entry and follow their instructions. Hospital staff will give careful and compassionate consideration to individual circumstances.

We thank you for your understanding and co-operation.



### TWO VISITORS ALLOWED PER PATIENT, PER DAY PROVIDED EACH VISITOR...

- · Is at least 12 years of age.



(Matter has been referred to RSPCA who are checking on the dog's welfare and pending the outcome, will determine what course of action they take)

11 October, from Traffic & Highway Patrol command: Provisional licence holder detected more than 50 kilometres per hour over his speed limit on M1 Motorway.

About 7:50 pm on Friday 8th October 2021 police from Northern Beaches Highway Patrol were conducting speed enforcement on M1 Motorway, Somersby. Police detected a black Holden Calais travelling in a Northerly direction at 157 kilometres per hour in the signposted 110 kilometre per hour zone. The male driver was stopped by police where he produced a current New South Wales P2 provisional licence, limiting him to a speed limit of 100 km/h. The male was displaying P plates inside the windows of the vehicle. When spoken to about his speed, the driver stated "I didn't think I was doing that, I wasn't looking". The male driver from Tuggerah was issued with a traffic Infringement Notice for the offence of "P2 licence holder exceed 100 km/h - over 45km/h" costing the driver \$2547 and six demerit points. The males drivers licence was immediately suspended for six months. Due to the location of the vehicle being unsafe for collection by a tow truck, Police implemented vehicle registration sanctions on the driver and he has until Monday the 11th October to surrender his number plates to his local RMS where they will remain for a period of three months.



#### 11 October, from The Hills command: STAGE 1 OPENING UP REQUIREMENTS

From this Monday 11th October you'll need to prove your vaccination status. If you are 16 years or older, you'll need to show proof of your vaccination or medical exemption when you check in to most businesses. Here's what's accepted:

#### **Proof of vaccination**

- COVID-19 digital certificate in the Express Plus Medicare app
- COVID-19 digital certificate in your smartphone wallet
- COVID-19 digital certificate on a Medicare online account through MyGov
- COVID-19 digital certificate printed
- Immunisation history statement shown on a Medicare online account through MyGov
- Immunisation history statement printed Medical exemption
- COVID-19 medical clearance notice shown as a digital pdf or printed copy
- COVID-19 medical exemption form shown as a printed copy. Must be signed by a doctor.

You will soon be able to add your proof of vaccination to the Service NSW app so you can easily show it at the same time as you are checking in.

## 08 October, from Traffic & Highway Patrol command: P-plater detected travelling at 173KM/H whilst using a mobile phone.

About 5:40pm on Monday 4 October 2021, Police from North Shore HWP were conducting speed enforcement for Northbound traffic on the M1 Motorway, Berowra. At this time, Police detected a white Toyota Hilux utility travelling north in lane 3 of 3 at a speed of 173KM/H. The M1 Motorway has a signposted speed limit of 110KM/H. Police caught up to the vehicle and caused it to stop. When spoken to, the 19yo male driver produced a NSW P2 provisional licence which is restricted to a maximum speed of 100KM/H. At the time, there were no 'P' plates displayed on the vehicle. When advised that Police would be confiscating and suspending his drivers licence on the spot, the

driver took out his mobile phone to call a friend to come and pick him up. As the driver unlocked his phone, Police observed a video to be playing, which depicted the driver filming himself one-handed with his mobile phone, whilst driving at high speed, immediately prior to being stopped by Police. Subsequent enquiries revealed that the driver resides in the Canterbury-Bankstown LGA and was breaching the Public Health Orders as he was absent from his home address without a reasonable excuse. The male was issued penalty notices totaling \$4174 & 13 demerit points for the following offences: Exceed speed limit over 45KM/H (\$2547 & 6 demerits), P2 licence holder use mobile phone whilst driving (\$352 & 5 demerits), Not display 'P' plates (\$275 & 2 demerits) and Breach Public Health Order (\$1000 & 0 demerits). In addition, the male had his drivers licence suspended on the spot for a period of 6 months. He will also be subject to a further demerit point licence suspension by the RMS at a later date. Police were unable to apply vehicle sanctions to the Toyota Hilux as the driver was not the registered owner of the vehicle.



#### 07 October, from NSW Health: Mr CHANGES TO THE NSW REOPENING ROADMAP

NSW will take its first steps towards reopening as the State passes the 70 per cent double vaccination target.

With the first vaccination milestone being reached, the NSW Government is also easing a number of restrictions as part of the Reopening NSW roadmap, which will allow fully vaccinated adults to enjoy more freedoms from next Monday, October 11.

The changes to the 70 per cent roadmap from 11 October include:

- Up to 10 fully vaccinated visitors (not counting children 12 and under) to a home (previously five)
- Up to 30 fully vaccinated people will be able to attend outdoor gatherings (previously 20)
- Increasing the cap for weddings and funerals to 100 people (previously 50).
- Indoor pools will also be re-opened for swimming lessons, squad training, lap swimming, and rehab activities

On the Monday after the State clears the 80 per cent double vaccination hurdle further restrictions will be relaxed:

- Up to 20 visitors (excluding children 12 and under) to a home (previously 10)
- Up to 50 people will be allowed to gather outdoors (previously 20)
- Up to 3,000 people will be allowed to attend controlled and ticketed outdoor events (previously 500)
- Nightclubs will be permitted to reopen for seated drinking only (no dancing), and masks will no longer be required in office buildings

All roadmap freedoms at 70 and 80 per cent will continue to be for fully vaccinated people only.

- →All school students will also now return to on site learning with a range of COVID-safe measures in place by October 25, with the second and third stages of the return to school plan now combined. Kindergarten, Year 1 and Year 12 students will still return to face-to-face learning on October 18, with all other years now returning one week later on October 25.
- ✓ Workers in regional areas who have received one vaccination dose will be permitted to return to their workplace from October 11 and will be given a grace period until November 1 to receive their second dose. Regional areas are those outside Greater Sydney, the

Blue Mountains, Wollongong, Shellharbour and the Central Coast.

Note also that as the stay-at-home orders will be lifted next Monday and replaced by the roadmap settings, the list of Local Government Areas of concern will cease to exist.

## 11 October, from Crime Stoppers NSW: PROTECTING YOUR CHILD FROM UNWANTED CONTACT Series: 1 of 4

Unwanted contact is any type of online communication your child finds unpleasant or confronting, or that leads them into a situation where they might do something they regret. Unwanted contact is not limited to 'strangers' — it can happen even if your child initially welcomed the contact. It can also be online 'friends' your child has not met face-to-face, or from someone they actually know.

At worst, it can involve 'grooming' a child — building a relationship with a child online in order to sexually abuse them.

This abuse can happen in a physical meeting, but it increasingly occurs online when young people are tricked or persuaded into sexual activity on webcams or into sending sexual images.

#### 09 October, from Marine Area Command: Update on Boating rules for NSW

On Monday 11th October 2021 the rules around recreational boating will change. All of NSW will be considered a "General Area". In a "General Area" Recreational Boating (in any form paddle/sail/power) is allowed.

#### For Fully Vaccinated adults (anyone 16yrs & above)

- The only limit to the number of people on a vessel is the allowable capacity on the vessels Australian Builders Plate.

#### For non-vaccinated adults (anyone 16yrs & above)

- Are limited to one person or more if ALL from the same household.

There are no distance rules, other than you must have a reasonable excuse to leave or enter the Greater Sydney Area. Boating is not a reasonable excuse. The Marine Area Command looks forward to seeing you out on our waterways across the state. Before heading out, please take the time to check your vessel and ensure you have the required safety equipment and that it is up to date.

# 08 October: COVID-19 UPDATE | We've been advised tonight that a staff member who has visited the Community Recycling Centre (CRC) at Thornleigh has tested positive for COVID-19.

As a precautionary measure, the CRC will be closed tomorrow (Saturday), while we ensure the facility is prepared for service next week.

We have robust COVIDSafe plans in place in line with NSW Health guidelines, and there is a very low risk to any member of the community that has been to the CRC. If you have any concerns, please see NSW Health guidelines <u>here</u> for when you need to get tested.

#### 08 October, from The Hills command: LOCATED 10.55am - alive.

Police are appealing for public assistance to locate a man missing from Sydney's upper north shore. XXX, aged 69, was last seen leaving a care facility on Hillmont Avenue, Thornleigh, about 8pm last night (Thursday 7 October 2021) heading west towards Pennant Hills Road.

Officers from Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command were contacted and commenced an investigation into Thomas's whereabouts. Police hold concerns for his welfare due to him

living with dementia and him having a number of medical conditions. He is known to frequent the Thornleigh and Westleigh areas. He is described as being of Caucasian appearance, about 180cm tall, medium build and balding. He was wearing a white and blue jumper with horizontal stripes, navy-coloured blue pants and blue shoes with white edging.

#### 07 October, from NSW Police: 4 SCAM ALERT 4

Be alert of scammers impersonating internet providers. They claim that your internet has been corrupted and ask you to enter the code 'EVENTVWR'. Doing so allows your device to be accessed remotely, therefore giving scammers the ability to install malicious software or steal personal and financial details from your computer. If a "support agent" is prompting you to enter the code, hang up the call. If you've already entered it, disconnect the remote session immediately.

06 October, from Crime Stoppers NSW: One of the best things about the warmer weather is camping and soon restrictions will ease and allow us to get back out to nature.

Below are some tips to keep safe whilst camping this year.

- Designated camping areas in NSW national parks vary from park to park make sure you have checked this before you arrive.
- Camping is usually restricted to the boundaries of a campground. This is for conservation purposes, your safety and the enjoyment of our parks for all visitors
- Drinking water is not always available at all parks, check before you arrive.
- Avoid camping directly under large trees. When pitching a tent, remember to look up to ensure there aren't any loose, dead or overhanging tree limbs.
- bFollow all fire safety information during total fire bans
- Only light fires in designated fireplaces and extinguish fires before going to sleep
- Campfires should not be used as a rubbish incinerator
- SNEVER use gas stoves or fuel burners to heat your tent
- Never use generators in fire bans
- Only operate generators in well ventilated areas outside of tents and sleeping areas
- Please don't feed native animals.

## From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Apartments'

**Tip #1:** Only 'buzz in' those people you know, even if they seem trustworthy. Ensure the door shuts behind you.

**Tip #3:** Secure your storage cage with a good padlock. Triple hinge the cage, with triple locking points. Have a qualified trades person inspect it and advise how best to improve the security.

**Tip #7:** Consider re-locating expensive items from your storage cage to inside your apartment. eg high-end bikes, surfboards, expensive accessories, alcohol.

**Tip #8:** Ask your Body Corporate to request a Security Audit of all the building (including storage cages) from your Crime Prevention Officer at **Hornsby Police Station: 9476**

**Tip #9:** Reduce the chances of 'tailgating' by waiting until the doors/gates to your carpark close completely after you, before moving further within.
