Police have received reports of plants being stolen. In the latest report, three Bromeliads were stolen from the front garden of a Mt Colah home.

Plants that have been stolen recently are Bromeliads and Agave.

Please be vigilant during the day and night and keep an eye out for your neighbours' gardens as well as your own.

If you see someone taking the plants, call us immediately.

If you see or hear something suspicious, report it to us as quickly as possible. It is often the timeliness of a report to us that gives us the best chance of catching the offender.


Traffic is moving well when suddenly a vehicle merges into your lane between you and the driver ahead, cutting your safe distance in half.

10 November, Ku-ring-gai Command: What would you do?



You're so happy to be out of lockdown and you venture up to the shops. You're tasting freedom for the first time in months and Christmas is just around the corner.

The carpark is crowded, and available parking spaces are very limited. You see a car that came in after you and it drove straight into a spot (how frustrating!). The easiest/quickest option is to park in a disabled parking space.

What would you do?

1. Utilise the disabled space as anyone watching will assume you have a

permit.

- 2. Continue driving around looking for a suitable park?
- 3. Stalk a shopper as they exit from the shops until they lead you to their spot?
- 4. Double park until someone exits the shops and wait for someone to enter the area you're stopped in?
- 5. Leave the parking area and try elsewhere?

10 November, from NSW Police Force



Detectives are appealing for public assistance to locate high-performance and luxury vehicles stolen during recent aggravated break-ins at homes in Sydney's north.

As part of proactive targeting of members and associates of criminal networks across Sydney, Strike Force Hawk officers are conducting inquiries into activities and crimes suspected to be related to the preparation for public acts of violence.

Criminal Groups Squad Commander, Detective Superintendent Grant Taylor,

said the suppression of the use of stolen vehicles in organised criminal activity was a key strategy under Strike Force Hawk.

"We have previously seized more than 40 luxury stolen vehicles used in crimes across Greater Sydney – including vehicles used in an alleged murder attempt at North Sydney earlier this year and a double murder at Guildford last month," Det Supt Taylor said.

"A number of people are before the courts for their alleged roles in facilitating the use of these stolen vehicles, and investigators are now seeking further assistance from the public to locate additional cars stolen from Sydney's north in recent times."

The break-ins and thefts, which have occurred in Sydney's north since Monday 25 October 2021, include;

- Between 11.45pm on Monday 25 October 2021 and 6.15am on Tuesday 26
 October 2021, a blue 2019 Volkswagen Golf Highline with registration
 'EAQ55W' was stolen from Gladesville.
- Between 10pm on Thursday 28 October 2021 and 8.20am on Friday 29
 October 2021, a grey 2017 MINI Cooper with registration 'DLT21S' was stolen from a Warrawee home. A white 2017 BMW 530i sedan was also stolen from this property and has since been recovered.
- Between 11pm on Monday 1 November 2021 and 8am on Tuesday 2
 November 2021, unknown people gained entry to an Abbotsford home and stole a key for a 2014 grey Porsche Macan S with registration 'FP6666', before stealing the vehicle from the roadway outside the property.
- About 3am on Tuesday 2 November 2021, a white 2014 Mercedes A200 with registration plates 'CRY80M' was stolen from the garage of a Frenchs Forest home.

"Detectives have reason to believe these cars – particularly the Porsche and Mercedes – may be used to facilitate other serious crime and possibly contain cloned number plates of an identical make and model," Det Supt Taylor said. "We know these high-performance vehicles may be stored in areas or locations which are unusual for the type of car; therefore, we're urging anyone who may've seen something out of the ordinary, to come forward and contact

police."

Meanwhile, police are urging the community to take extra precautions in terms of securing their home and property to reduce the risk of becoming the target of thieves.

NSW Police Corporate Sponsor for Crime Prevention, Assistant Commissioner Gelina Talbot, said criminals are opportunists and usually seek out homes with poor security.

"People should be observant of any suspicious activity around their homes and ensure to record a description of any people or vehicles that appear out of place," Assistant Commissioner Talbot said.

"If you own a luxury car and park it in your driveway, you should take extra steps to ensure your home is adequately protected from any intruders. Store the vehicle's keys in a secure location – away from any doors or windows. "Make sure your home is fitted with quality security doors, locks, alarms, lighting, and warning signs, and that all windows, doors and garage doors are secured," Assistant Commissioner Talbot said.



14 November, from NSW Police Force



Police are renewing an appeal for information to locate Kathleen Riethmuller missing from Sydney's north since last month.

On Thursday 28 October 2021, the belongings of Kathleen Riethmuller – aged 28 – were located inside a backpack by a member of the public on Centennial Avenue at Lane Cove.

The backpack contained various items including Kathleen's identification documentation and bank cards.

Officers from North Shore Police Area Command were notified and commenced an investigation into her whereabouts.

Inquiries have revealed Kathleen attended a retail store on Reserve Road, Artarmon, about 11.40am on Thursday 28 October 2021, before she was sighted again at 2.30pm the same day in North Sydney, wearing a long sleeve denim dress and black flat shoes.

Police now believe Kathleen may have travelled to Melbourne for employment opportunities.

Kathleen is described as being of Caucasian appearance, about 165cm – 175cm tall, of thin build, with long dark hair.

Police and family hold serious concerns for her welfare as she is not able to be contacted and has not been seen.



13 November, from Crime Stoppers NSW: THE IMPORTANCE OF SECURITY LIGHTING



Criminals don't like to be seen. Security lighting can be installed around the perimeter of your property, including over entry ways, along your driveway and the back of the house, revealing any possible hiding places for thieves.

- The lighting should be checked regularly and maintained.
- Consider using light timers to turn these lights on/off when not at home.

10 November, from Neighbourhood Watch - Gordon - NSW



We have been contacted by Peter who wanted to warn the community about two men who trespassed and allegedly committed a Break & Enter at his premises on Darnley St, Gordon last Thursday (4 November) after 14:31pm. Two youngish men seen on the cctv image (deliberately blurred in case of future prosecution)? It is possible they were painters in a VW Kombi van.

Peter's neighbour saw them and informed Peter. The incident has been reported to the police, who will try and do extra patrols.

From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Garage Sales'

Tip #4. KEEP THE ITEMS inside the property boundary, ie not on your council strip. Despite the name 'garage sale', it is advisable to have the items on your lawn/driveway. Collect expensive items all in the one place nearest to you/ the intended checkout table. To avoid concealment opportunities, put large items around the outside of the area. Video the whole area outside your home as a simple inventory of items for sale AND any not for sale (see #6 below).

Tip #5. YOU CANNOT SELL dangerous goods, chemicals, faulty electrical items, or firearms.

Tip #6. AFTER THE GARAGE SALE, check that all home security systems are operable & have not been disabled to help facilitate later unauthorised entry. Conduct an inspection (using video inventory in #4 above) to identify any missing items. Please remember to remove all advertising after the event.

Tip #9. LOCK ALL DOORS INTO YOUR HOME, including any joining doors, garage doors, shed doors, yard gates, even if you plan to go in and out during the day. Remove keys. Don't be tempted to pop a door on the latch. Set your alarm system. Advise

neighbours to also lock their properties and be vigilant.

Tip #10. DO NOT ALLOW ACCESS to your property, eg to use your bathroom, or to try on clothes. Use an extension cord from your home/garage to test any

electrical items.

Tip #11. B E CAREFUL OF DISTRACTIONS, eg by a request for water, or to borrow your phone. Beware of criminals working as a team. One person may engage you chatting, whilst the other steals items, or enters your property (see #9 above!).
