10 December, from Ku-ring-gai command: What would you do?

Unfortunately nearly all the luxury cars were stolen in the past month because car doors were left unlocked, enabling access to the home to take the keys using the garage door remote.

UPDATE 2: The revised roadworks schedule below is current, as of 1.50pm Wednesday 8 December. Transport for NSW has rescheduled the work based on community feedback, with the full road closure now occurring predominantly during the weekdays, instead of the weekend.

ON THE ROAD A significant warning to anyone travelling along the Old Northern Road between Wisemans Ferry and Maroota to expect delays and road closures during the next two weeks. Transport for NSW will be repairing damage to a retaining wall from an accident on a switchback. The road will need to be partially or fully closed during the following times:

- ♣From 7am to 5pm on Thursday 9 December and Friday 10 December Is single lane closure
- ▲From 9pm Sunday 12 December to 6am Wednesday 15 December #full road closure
- △On Wednesday 15 December and Thursday 16 December from 6am to 9pm
- single lane closure, and from 9pm to 6am the following day, ≉full road closure
- ♣From 6am Friday 17 December to 9pm Sunday, 19 December single lane closure
- ▲From 9pm, Sunday 19 December to 6am Monday 20 December **#**full road closure
- ⚠On Monday 20 December and Tuesday 21 December from 6am to 9pm single lane closure, and from 9pm to 6am the following day, full road closure Please follow daily updates on the variable message boards in the area, call 132 701, or visit livetraffic.com

The works will involve setting up a crane, removing crash debris, rebuilding the heritage-listed dry stone retaining wall, replacing the guard rail barrier and resurfacing the damaged road.

During the full road closures, local access will be maintained for residents and businesses located on Old Northern Road between the worksite and Wisemans Ferry Road under traffic management on either side of the work area.

Road access to the north of the work area will be via the alternate route pictured. Please note this route may take approximately 2 hours and 20 minutes of additional travel time, so please plan accordingly.

A reminder of some of the penalties regarding seatbelt offences:

Driver not wear seatbelt properly adjusted/fastened \$352 3pts

Passenger not occupy seat with seatbelt (16 yrs or older) \$352

Drive with 2 unrestrained passengers (16 yrs or older) \$704 6 pts

Drive with passenger 6 mths or older but less than 4 yrs old not restrained as prescribed \$352 3 pts.

The passengers who were not restrained are very lucky on this occasion they were not killed.



09 December, Sydney Local Health District

UPDATE: We've now had 46 people diagnosed with COVID-19 related to a trivia night at a pub in Petersham.

All were fully vaccinated.

If you were at the Oxford Tavern, 1 New Canterbury Rd, between 4pm and 10.30pm on Tuesday, November 30, you're considered a close contact. You must get tested immediately and self-isolate.

If you are fully vaccinated, you can come out of isolation if you've had a negative test on or after December 6, but please have another test on December 12.

If you have not been fully vaccinated, please remain in isolation until December 12, and have another test on this date.

Homicide Squad detectives have released CCTV as they appeal for public assistance to identify the movements of two vehicles used in the lead-up to the CBD murder of 34-year-old Bilal Hamze, and an alleged murder attempt of another man in Sydney's north earlier this year.

Just before 10.30pm on Thursday 17 June 2021, emergency services were called to the intersection of Bridge and Pitt Streets, Sydney, following reports a man had been shot by an unknown person in a black Audi.

The man – who has since been identified as 34-year-old, Bilal Hamze – was treated at the scene before being taken to St Vincent's Hospital, where he later died.

A short time later, police located a burnt-out Audi at Fleming Street, Northwood, and crime scenes were established at both locations, which underwent forensic examinations.

Detectives from the State Crime Command's Homicide Squad established Strike Force Englorie to investigate the circumstances surrounding the incident. Separately, on Saturday 14 August 2021, officers from Traffic and Highway Patrol Command attempted to stop a Mercedes on Walker Street, North Sydney.

The driver failed to stop and following a short pursuit, the Mercedes was located abandoned on Miller Street, Cammeray, and seized for forensic examination. It's alleged the occupants – described as two men in dark-coloured clothing – approached a nearby Toyota Camry and threatened the 76-year-old male driver with a firearm, before fleeing the area in the man's vehicle.

In September (2021), detectives from the State Crime Command's Criminal Groups Squad charged two men – aged 31 and 19 – for their alleged roles in that incident. They remain before the courts.

Since that time, an extensive canvass of CCTV has identified that the Mercedes used in the alleged murder attempt was captured travelling with the Audi used in the shooting murder of Bilal Hamze, in the weeks before his death (June 2021).

Homicide Squad Commander, Detective Superintendent Danny Doherty, said investigators believe the same individual may be responsible for the cloned number plates which were found to be in use on both vehicles.

"We're appealing to anyone who may have seen these vehicles travelling or being stored together – in any part of Metropolitan Sydney – to come forward and contact police," Det Supt Doherty said.

"Of note, both vehicles are depicted traveling westbound in the M4 East Tunnel about 15 minutes apart on Thursday 27 May 2021 and have been identified on traffic cameras across the Sydney metropolitan area after that time.

"Additionally, the Audi has been captured on CCTV using the Sydney Harbour Bridge both before and immediately after the murder of Bilal Hamze earlier this year.

"Both the murder of Bilal and the alleged murder attempt at North Sydney have obvious familial and organised crime related links, with this CCTV revealing a further link to the possible acquisition and storage of the vehicles.

"We know these stolen luxury cars are kept in garages and unit blocks across Sydney until they are later used to facilitate deadly public place shootings and other violent crimes.

"We're particularly interested in anyone who may have seen these cars travelling around Sydney in May and June this year, or who was perhaps approached through social media or other means to store one of these cars on their property," Det Supt Doherty said.

08 December, from Australian Financial Security Authority: Check before you buy

From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Pedestrians'

Tip #3. PUT AWAY YOUR PHONE. Unplug your earphones. Give all senses to

the job of keeping you safe. Concentrate whilst you are on that road. Pause any involved conversations with those near you. 100% concentration please!

Tip #4. NOTICE THE CAR SLOWING before you consider stepping onto the road/crossing. Do NOT assume that a vehicle is doing the displayed speed limit and that you "should have enough time to cross". Even cyclists can break the speed limit and it's very difficult to assess their speed from straight on. Rain and wet roads make stopping distances a lot further.

Tip #5. ALWAYS USE PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS where possible. Avoid crossing between parked cars or at the front or back of buses or large vehicles. Do not 'Jay walk'. Use a crossing, or cross at an intersection if it is close by.

Tip #8. WAIT FOR THE WALK SIGNAL at traffic lights and pedestrian crossings. Do not enter the road if the red 'Don't walk' signal shows, flashing or otherwise. Beware adjacent crossings having similar 'Walk' sounds – you may start to cross prematurely, by mistakenly hearing the other crossing's 'Walk' signal – easily done!

Tip #9. BE A ROLE MODEL FOR CHILDREN. Don't run across the road. Walk at a determined pace. This helps to avoid a trip or fall, and also gives time for a driver to predict your path.

Tip #20. CHOOSE A WELL-LIT, WELL-POPULATED ROUTE to walk. If possible, go with others.

Check transport time-tables to minimise waiting times. Consider using a mobile phone App so others can track your progress (See: https://watchout.org.au/personal/).
