The NSW Police Force is supporting a multi-agency operation, Operation Trident in an effort to jointly detect and investigate the illegal harvesting of oysters.

- * Only buy from a reputable supplier.


Members of the public are being encouraged to report person/s selling black market oysters and oyster theft.

Please ensure that oyster theft is reported to police and ask the attending police for a COPS Event number.

The Rural Crime Prevention Team take oyster theft seriously. Fines of up to \$275,000 and/or imprisonment apply.

10 January, from NSW Health: Have you tested positive for COVID-19 on a rapid antigen or PCR test?



You must:

- Self-isolate at home for 7 days from the date you got tested, even if you are fully vaccinated
- Tell the people you live with, any social contacts, and your workplace or school that you have tested positive

Your household contacts must also self-isolate for 7 days and have a rapid antigen test as soon as possible and again on day 6.

If you are under 65 years of age, have had two doses of COVID-19 vaccine, do not suffer from any chronic health conditions and are not pregnant, you can safely manage COVID-19 at home.

If you develop severe symptoms call Triple Zero (000) and tell the ambulance staff that you have been diagnosed with COVID-19.

You can only leave self-isolation after 7 days if you do not have a sore throat, runny nose, cough or shortness of breath. You do not need to have a negative test to exit isolation.

You will receive an SMS from NSW Health after 7 days, but you do not have to wait for this SMS to leave self-isolation if it has been 7 days since you were tested.

NSW Ambulance is currently experiencing unprecedented Triple Zero demand on our call takers, dispatchers and paramedics.

Every non-emergency call we take keeps us from taking a call that may help save a life.

Please save 000 for medical emergencies.

For those managing COVID-19 at home who aren't experiencing a medical emergency and don't need a lights and siren response, NSW Health's COVID-19 Care at Home Support Line is also available on 1800 960 933.

For minor illnesses and injuries consider self-care, attending a pharmacy or contacting your usual healthcare provider such as your General Practitioner for advice.


05 January, from Ku-ring-gai command: Comment on wait times or issues in comments below. Please check link <u>here</u> prior to leaving home for testing locations and times.



The newest definition of close contact will be officially released today, however until then, only line up if you:

- Have COVID-19 symptoms or a positive rapid antigen test
- Are a household contact with a confirmed COVID-19 positive case
- Have been in a venue where there has been high transmission such as a club
- Have been in a setting with vulnerable people, such as an aged care facility, which is experiencing a current outbreak

09 January, from abc.net.au: Omicron has arrived, here's how to prepare for a COVID-19 case in the home

This time two years ago, many Australians were organising their bushfire gobag; a kit of emergency items set aside to ensure families were able to evacuate safely at a moments notice.

We're now facing a different disaster: a growing COVID-19 outbreak that has seen cases around the country skyrocket to previously unfathomable numbers.

And like bushfires, it can <u>pay to be prepared</u> — especially if you live in a sharehouse or multigenerational household. Only this time the preparation will not be for an evacuation but quite the opposite: being isolated at home if someone in the household tests positive.

07 January, from NSW Police Force: Police are appealing for public assistance to locate a man wanted on an outstanding arrest warrant.



Kevin Smith, aged 37, is wanted by virtue of an outstanding arrest warrant for murder.

Officers from Newcastle City Police District and specialist units have commenced inquiries into his whereabouts.

He is described as being of Caucasian appearance, between 180cm to 185cm tall, of thin build, with green eyes, brown hair, a beard and a moustache. He has a distinctive tattoo on the right side of his face.

He is known to frequent the Newcastle area, but has ties to several locations including Sydney and Northern NSW.

Anyone who may have seen Mr Smith is urged not to approach him and to call Triple Zero (000) immediately.

HELP! Has anyone seen or heard trucks moving around early this morning on Montview Pde? Could anyone advise what time they arrived? The truck has badly hit our car that was parked next to our house at 7 Montview Pde, just across the Montview oval and did not leave any message or so. All I heard was a very bad squeaky sound and very loud noise of the truck, I did not realise that our car was hit by the truck, I thought it made a very bad turn:((If someone has seen or heard anything, please reply! If anyone knows or saw the name of the company to which the trucks belong, I would really appreciate this information. The cabin of the car is damaged. The boot of our little Mazda lorry was badly damaged and could not close so that when my husband was trying to close the boot, it fell on him and injured his head.

Note: An update from me: thanks everyone for taking care and helping us with the investigation, we finally found the driver who hit our car. It was the truck that was delivering the pool, not the company with the crane, apparently, there were two separate companies involved in pool installation. The driver admitted his responsibility. Tip #3. JOIN IN WITH NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH. They are your eyes and ears when you aren't at home. Contact your Crime Prevention Officer to find out about a group in your area. Maybe set up an 'eWatch' for your street or building

Tip #8. BEWARE DOOR-TO-DOOR OFFERS OF WORK FROM ROGUE TRADESMEN. Only use tradies recommended to you, or that you have researched. Register for your FREE Welcome Basket to see local businesses & services: www.welcomebasket.com.au.

Tip #14. UPDATE YOUR HOUSE INSURANCE. WALK ROUND THE HOUSE WITH A VIDEO CAMERA, RECORDING OBJECTS & CONTENTS IN EACH ROOM, OPENING ALL DRAWERS & CUPBOARDS. Include the shed, garage, garden ornaments, roof space,

cellar, etc. Store this video safely off-site (eg at work or with a trusted relative).

Tip #17. NOTE WHERE YOUR ELECTRICITY MAINS SWITCH IS AND THE

WATER & GAS SUPPLY SHUT-OFFS FOR YOUR PROPERTY. Consider an ETSA padlock on the meter cupboard (a special lock available from locksmiths).
