Thank you to Neighbourhood Watch Victoria:

Is your spare house key really hidden from thieves?

If you think your spare key hiding place is sneaky, chances are so does a thief.

We breakdown the most common places people hide their spare keys and what you should do to secure your house from being broken into.

Breaking into houses is a largely opportunistic crime. Thieves may see something they want to steal and when they get the chance, they seize the opportunity and go for it.

One of the most effective ways of preventing this type of crime is to make it more difficult for thieves to take their chance at entering your home.

Where are people hiding their keys?

Some of the most common places people hide their spare house keys are:

Door mat

Pot plant

Grill/BBQ

Mailbox

Fake rocks

Ledge above the door

While these places may be convenient for family members or friends to use when they need to access your house, they are just as convenient for thieves to use.

So where should I hide my spare house key?

The most secure place you can hide your spare keys is with trusted neighbour, friend or family member close by. Keeping your keys away from your house takes away an opportunity for a thief to break into your house and can help protect your house from theft.

If this isn't an option, it might be time to get creative with hiding spots. One inventive way we have recently heard is to hide your key in a park that is 10 minutes away from your house! Although we don't recommend this to everyone, it shows how you might start thinking outside the box for your next hiding spot.

28 April, from 9now.nine.com.au: Widow loses \$760,000 after scammer impersonates bank staff



Jacomi Du Preez was relocating from Perth to Melbourne with her two teenage kids when her husband Zak drove separately to meet the family in their new hometown.

However, Mr Du Preez never made it to Melbourne after being involved in a fatal car accident, three hours out of Perth, on December 2 last year.

Mrs Du Preez received \$760,000 from his life insurance payout. While grieving, she wanted to do the right thing by her family and invest the money in a "2.5 per cent" term deposit for their future.

"I completed the online form with personal information like your name and contact details, and it gave me a notice to say Macquarie [Bank] will be in contact," Ms Du Preez said.

She thought she had found the best rate for a one-year deposit, with what appeared to be Macquarie Bank.

A man calling himself "Mark Dickinson" had called her mobile number.

"He sounded very sophisticated, (he had a) British accent, sounded like a banker. (He was) very polished in his talking ... explain(ed) exactly how the process works, sounded ... 100 per cent like what I would have heard at 10 other banks in the past," she said.

She Googled the name "Mark Dickinson" and found a legitimate LinkedIn profile for that name.

27 April, from NSW Police Force



Organised Crime Squad detectives probing a syndicate allegedly involved in money laundering and drug supply offences have arrested two men and seized nearly \$1.2 million cash and jewellery.

Earlier this year, detectives from the Organised Crime Squad's Anti Money Laundering Unit established Strike Force Aldred to investigate the activities of an alleged criminal syndicate involved in money laundering and drug supply offences.

As part of ongoing inquiries, detectives – assisted by Raptor Highway – stopped a Toyota Hilux on Kleins Road at Westmead about 12.30pm on Wednesday 24 March 2022.

During an initial search of the vehicle, police seized more than \$12,000 cash, numerous mobile phones and an amount of cocaine.

A further \$300,000 cash was then located within a hidden compartment in the Hilux.

Two men – aged 26 and 30 – were arrested and taken to Merrylands Police Station.

Later that day investigators – assisted by South West Metropolitan Operation Support Group (OSG) – executed numerous search warrants at homes at

Cabramatta and Kenthurst, and a business at Castle Hill.

During the search at the Castle Hill business, officers seized more than \$860,000 cash.

Both men have since been charged with knowingly deal with proceeds of crime and supply prohibited drug.

They were both granted strict conditional bail and are due to appear at Parramatta Local Court today (Wednesday 27 April 2022).

26 April, from NSW Police Force

NSW Police are reminding drivers about their responsibility to drive safely after four people lost their lives on the roads across the ANZAC Day long weekend. The ANZAC Day traffic operation commenced at 12.01am last Friday (22 April 2022) and concluded at 11.59pm yesterday (Monday 25 January 2022). Double demerit points were in force for the duration of the operation for speeding, mobile phone, seatbelt, and motorcycle helmet offences.

The Traffic and Highway Patrol Command, together with local police, patrolled roads across the state, targeting double demerit offences and the Fours Ds – drink, drug, dangerous and distracted driving – with the aim of preventing injury and death.

During the period, police saw a number of dangerous driving incidents, including excessive speed, drink-driving, and reckless driving.

Across the state, police issued 7,217 speed infringements, laid 236 drink-

driving charges, attended 267 major crashes, and conducted 114,477 breath tests.

Four people died in crashes over the weekend.

Traffic and Highway Patrol Commander, Assistant Commissioner Brett McFadden, said police will continue to run these operations in order to keep the community safe and target dangerous and irresponsible driving behaviour.

"During what has been a busy period on our roads with school holidays, Easter and the ANZAC long weekend, unfortunately police are still seeing risky driving behaviour."

"Those individuals who thought they could drink and drive without being caught have learnt the hard way this weekend. This is a timely reminder to have a plan B to make sure you return home safely."

"Whilst the ANZAC Day operation may have concluded, police will continue

From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for LetterBoxes'

Tip #1. DO KEEP YOUR LETTERBOX LOCKED. Remember, a lock is not a lock unless you use it. Consider using a 'Tubular Pin Tumbler Lock' which cannot be copied.

Tip #2. DO EMPTY YOUR LETTERBOX EACH DAY.

Tip #3. DO CONSIDER A POST OFFICE BOX (P.O. BOX) FOR SECURE ITEMS. For example, credit cards, cheque books.

Tip #8. ASK A FRIEND OR NEIGHBOUR TO CLEAR YOUR LETTERBOX WHILE YOU ARE AWAY ON HOLIDAY.

Tip #9. CONSIDER A 'HOLD' ON YOUR MAIL WHILST YOU ARE AWAY. (Also known as 'Stopping the mail'.)

Tip #10. SUPPORT YOUR LOCAL NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH GROUP.

(Don't know? Phone Hornsby Police Station and ask for the Crime Prevention Officer. Isn't one in your area? Maybe offer to organise something yourself?)
