12 August, from Ku-ring-gai command: Police are appealing for public assistance of the depicted two males as they may be able to assistance with police investigations into an incident that occurred at Hornsby CBD between 12:40 am and 1am on Sunday the 10th of July 2022.

11 August, from Ku-ring-gai command: \$\frac{1}{4}\$\$ Two men arrested over multiple Break and Enters \$\frac{1}{4}\$\$\$\$

Ryde Pro Active Crime Team and the North West Metropolitan Regional Enforcement Squad arrest two males after an extensive investigation into Break and Enters. Strike Force NANINA was created to investigate over 45 break and enter offences within the Ryde, North Shore and Kuring-Gai with similar offences. On the 5th August 2022, investigators stopped a motor vehicle on Parramatta Road, Auburn. The two occupants of the vehicle a 32 Year old male from Bankstown and a 31 year old male from Macquarie Fields were arrested. The vehicle was searched and proceeds from a recent Break and Enter were recovered. Investigators

charged the males with over 35 break and enter offences with further offences anticipated. The 32 year old male and the 31 year old male are both bail refused and will appear before Hornsby local court on the 5th October 2022.



11 August, from KU-ring-gai command: Police are seeking the assistance of the depicted persons as they may be able to assistance with police investigations into an incident that occurred at Waitara Train Station 12:48 am on Sunday the 3rd of July 2022.

HOW SHOULD I REPORT HOONS?



How Should I Report Hoons?

- If you hear a car being driven in a reckless manner and are able to see the incident, it is helpful if you can obtain any details at all.
- AT THE TIME OF THE INCIDENT, call triple zero '000', or the Palice Assistance Line (PAL), or report it to the local police station and ask for advice – see phane numbers below.
- 3. Record all incidents and those details listed below,
- 4. Possibly take a photo or make video if this can be done safely never place yourself in danger or at risk when trying to gother evidence.
- Consider installing quality CCTV at your residence and/or dash cam in your vehicle for recordings that can act as proof.
- Talk with your neighbours. See if you can band together, help get the boon details, support one another.
- Phone Crime Stoppers NSW 1800 333 000 with all collated information. All calls are treated confidentially.

What to report?

- . Description of behaviour, eg: speeding, drag racing, barnouts, etc.
- Description of driver
- . Description of other occupants
- . Usual day and time of behaviour (approximate time will suffice)
- · Usual location of behaviour
- Vehicle registration
- · Vehicle make, model (if you can recognise it, or similar types)
- Vehicle description any notable accessories (eg spoller, LED lights), damage or paint patches may also assist.
- · Vehicle colour
- · Vehicle registration

FOR EMERGENCIES (Including anyone on your property)
TO REPORT ANYTHING SUSPICIOUS (Crime Stoppers)
TO REPORT NOW-EMERGENCY CRIME (Police Assistance Line)
IF YOU'RE NOT SURE (Homsby Police Station)
TTY—To ask for Police, type PPP
SPEAK AND LISTEN

Related information:

'Hoans' are also known as 'boy riscer', 'hooligan' and 'lout', "especially a young man who drives recklessly or dangerously". Hooning is anti-social and dangerous driving behaviour, ranging from doing burnouts and doughnuts, to more serious offences such as street-racing and evading police by speeding in excess of the speed limit. It is generally undertaken in order to provoke a reaction from anisokers. It is also an offence to organise or promote (includes taking photos or film of) hooning/street-racing.

Anti-Hoon Laws:

Australian police have been given increased powers to investigate hooning, known as 'Hoon Laws', In order to eliminate hoon behaviour and improve safety on the roads for others, legislation has been changed to include offences related to hoon behaviour and to allow for impounding/confiscation of vehicles involved. The Car Hoons Act allows for impounded cars to be used for car cash testing.

Remember

The only way a hoon may be convicted, if police don't witness the incident, is for you to attend Court. If you are not willing to attend Court, in some cases your information may help to establish a pattern of behaviour that could lead to later apprehension, and conviction, so your information is still appreciated.

15 August, from Berowra Rural Fire Brigade: You may have noticed that our Fire Danger Rating Sign has changed. As of 1 September 2022, the nationwide Australian Fire Danger Rating System will come into place.

In Australia, formal fire danger ratings were first produced in the 1950s and 1960s by A. G. McArthur. The McArthur system was used for many decades and has undergone various modifications. In 2022 it was replaced by the Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS) marking a generational change to how fire danger is calculated and communicated. Fire danger ratings describe the potential level of danger should a bushfire start. They are essential because they provide people with information so that they can take action to protect themselves and others from the potentially dangerous impacts of bushfires. The AFDRS will also introduce 'off' for those days when no proactive action is required by the community. These days, you will still need to abide by local seasonal laws and regulations, but there is little or no risk of a fire that starts spreading in a dangerous or

life-threatening way.

Galston Rural Fire Brigade was called to assist Middle Dural Rural Fire Brigade at a private property this afternoon (Friday 12 August) with reports of power lines arcing. On arrival crews found power lines arcing from the consumer mains up the pole causing the pole, cable and conduits to burn. Due to recent rains and with it being so damp, there was no direct threat of fire spreading to bushland or property. Crews continued to monitor the scene until the power authority could isolate and make safe.



13 August, from Crime Stoppers NSW: TOP 10 MISUNDERSTOOD ROAD RULES – U-TURNS

MAKING A U-TURN:

When making a U-turn a driver must:


- have a clear view of any approaching traffic
- be able to make the turn without unreasonably obstructing the free movement of traffic
- give way to all vehicles and pedestrians.

Drivers are not allowed to make a U-turn:

- at an intersection without traffic lights, where a 'no U-turn' sign is displayed
- at a break in a driving strip where a 'no U-turn' sign is displayed
- across any of the following:
 - – a single continuous dividing line
 - o − a single continuous dividing line to the left of a broken line
 - two parallel continuous dividing lines.

At traffic lights:

Drivers are not permitted to make a U-turn at traffic lights unless there is a U-Turn Permitted sign displayed.

12 August, from Hornsby Shire Council: [Thornleigh] YOUR SAY ♥ □ | We are proposing to extend the existing "No Stopping" restrictions along the northern side of Sefton Road, near the roundabout/intersection with Kooringal Avenue.

The extended 50 metre long section of Sefton Road has no formal kerb and gutter due to the presence of significant trees. Cars parking between the trees at this location is leading to erosion of the roadside verge and has a negative impact on traffic and road safety by narrowing the roadway to a single lane at times.

From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Apartments'

Tip #4. Clear your mailbox daily. If you are away, ask a neighbour to assist. Or put a hold on your mail at the Post Office.

Tip #7. Consider re-locating expensive items from your storage cage to inside your apartment. eg high-end bikes, surfboards, expensive accessories, alcohol.

Tip #8. Ask your Body Corporate to request a Security Audit of all the building (including storage cages) from your Crime Prevention Officer at Hornsby Police Station: **9476 9799**.

Tip #9. Reduce the chances of 'tailgating' by waiting until the doors/gates to your carpark close completely after you, before moving further within.

Tip #13. Don't be complacent because you don't live on the ground floor. Secure balcony doors & windows. Break & Enters happen at 1st & 2nd floor units.
