19 September, from Crime Stoppers NSW: Report Unsafe Driving Practices

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If you have a genuine concern about a person's medical fitness or competency to safely drive a motor vehicle, you can confidentially report them by completing an Unsafe Driving Report. The report can be submitted at a service centre. If you've witnessed unsafe driving and the driver is unknown to you, you need to raise the matter with the NSW Police Force.

What you need

the PDF form – 'Unsafe and/or Medically Unfit for Driving Report' the name, contact and other relevant details of the licensee you're reporting your details your proof of identity.

How to report

Download and complete the Unsafe and/or Medically Unfit for Driving Report – PDF <u>here</u>

Make sure you have the required information.

Visit a Service NSW centre and submit your report.

19 September, from mynrma.com.au:Stay up to date with when Double Demerits are in force



We advise motorists that double demerits are in place for five days in NSW from Wednesday, 21 September until Sunday, 25 September inclusive and for four days from Friday 30 September to Monday 3 October inclusive in NSW and the ACT.

Please also be advised that students will be at school on Wednesday 21 and Friday 23 September 2022 and school zones will be in operation. Be mindful that additional penalties can apply for certain offences committed in school zones.

Double demerit periods typically fall during holiday periods or over long weekends. They run from midnight on the start date to midnight on the finish date and are enforced by police. Please drive safely and take extra care on the roads to protect yourself, your loved ones and all road users.





From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Homes'

Tip #4. Natural ladders are a risk. Don't provide easy access to upper level balconies and windows, eg. wheelie bins, lattice, trees, nearby fences.

Tip #6. Get a strong letterbox and lock it with a strong lock, preferably keyed with a non-copy-able round keyed mailbox security lock. Clear your mailbox daily. If you are away, ask a neighbour to assist. Or put a hold on your mail at the Post Office. Know when important documents/statements are arriving in the post and report immediately if they don't arrive.

Tip #8. Lock all garages, sheds and under-house access points. Lock away all tools and ladders to prevent them being used to gain access to your home. Roller, tilt & panel-lift doors can be secured with additional hasp & staple lock sets and/or padlocks. Anchor all sheds, sculptures, outside ornaments & table & chair sets.

Tip #10. Leave a spare key with a trusted friend or neighbour, never hidden outside. Keys should not be left in view. Keys should not be left in locks when you are absent. Car keys should NOT be kept. by the front door or on the kitchen counter. Keep car keys by the bed – be aware they can include a panic alarm. Consider Fingerprint, Key Pad or Bio Locks.
