
eNewsletter #587 - 10 January 2023

09 January, from NSW Police Force



Officers attached to the New South Wales Dog Unit, Mounted Unit and Tactical Operations Unit have formed a guard of honour to farewell serving Police Dog Dravec, who died late last year.

PD Dravec, a Belgian Malinois, commenced service with the Dog Unit in 2017. He was accredited as a General Purpose Dog on 24 April, 2018. During his service, he was also accredited as a Public Order Dog and as a Tactical Dog. Police Dog Dravec passed away while off-duty on Monday, 26 December 2022, aged five years.

PD Dravec spent the majority of his service working in the Wollongong/Illawarra/South Coast regions, but also worked alongside the Tactical Operations Unit on a wide range of tactical jobs across NSW. The cause of death is still being determined.

Our deepest sympathies are with PD Dravec's partner and the entire Police Dog Unit.

Naomi 'Juliet' Moore, aged 49, was last seen leaving a home on Britannia Street, Temora, on Tuesday 5 July 2022.

When she was unable to be contacted, officers attached to Riverina Police District were notified and commenced inquiries to locate her.

Naomi has not contacted family or friends since; however, it is believed she travelled via train from Cootamundra to Sydney on Thursday 7 July 2022.

Police and family hold concerns for Naomi's welfare as she has a medical condition.


Naomi is described as Caucasian in appearance, between 160cm- 170cm tall,

04 January, from Blue Mountains Police Rescue - NSW Police Force: Sergeant Stone Family Appeal.



On New Year's day, the Blue Mountains Police Rescue Squad lost one of their most respected rescue operators. Sgt Stone was killed rescuing his son from a rip on the state's far south coast.

Sergeant Stone was not only a much loved Rescue Operator with the squad but also a General Duties Sergeant with the Blue Mountains Police area Command. From coordinating large scale, multi-agency search and rescue operations to mentoring a junior staff member, he would give freely of his time even if he didn't have the time to give.

He leaves behind a wife and a young family. The NSW Police Legacy has set up a fundraising page to assist Sgt Stone's family.

All funds raised will be used to help ease the financial burden on the family during this difficult time, and provide ongoing support for their future.

If it'd been a petrol or diesel engine, or if it'd had a sound emitter fitted, we'd have heard it, but, apart from the sound of the tyres on the road, it was virtually silent.

I am a confident guide dog handler but I can honestly say that silent electric vehicles scare me. I fear that it will take serious injury to a blind person, or even worse, death, before any meaningful legislation is put into place. If it happens to me or someone that I care about, I'll be in court and I won't rest until we have justice.

So please, if you drive an electric vehicle, switch on your sound emitter. After all, you wouldn't drive at night without your lights on, it's the same thing. Many people will like this post but please don't. I ask anyone who would have hit the like button to please hit the share button instead and pass this far and wide. I fear for our lives and those of these two amazing dogs.


Domestic violence against men takes many of the same forms as it does against women.

08 January, from NSW Health:



NSW Health is advising the community to be aware of the signs and symptoms of rare but severe, invasive bacterial infections following recent increases in cases.

Executive Director of Health Protection NSW, Dr Richard Broome said there had been increases in both meningococcal disease (IMD) and invasive group A streptococcus (iGAS) infections in recent weeks.

Cases of IMD were above average in NSW towards the end of 2022, and cases of iGAS have increased in NSW, in other states, and overseas.

Dr Broome said it was important the community was aware while the infections are very rare, both can be very serious and can cause death or permanent disability.

"In their early stages, invasive bacterial infections including IMD or iGAS sometimes mimic symptoms of viral infections like COVID and influenza, and can also follow or occur at the same time as a viral infection," Dr Broome said. "Rapid intervention and effective treatment for invasive bacterial infections are available and can be lifesaving. We urge people to pay close attention to symptoms, trust their instincts, and seek urgent medical care if symptoms

worsen or if they or the people they care for appear very unwell.

"While notification data on iGAS has only recently become available in NSW, the number of people unwell with the condition has clearly increased here and across the world," Dr Broome said.

Between September and December of 2022, 137 cases of iGAS were notified in NSW.

There were 36 cases of meningococcal disease (IMD) reported in NSW in 2022.

Indicators of serious illness include fever, a fast heart rate, cold hands and feet or a mottled look to the skin, difficulty waking or increased lethargy or confusion. The person looks unwell and may also have nausea, vomiting or abdominal pain.

Symptoms to look out for in young children that may indicate severe illness include irritability, difficulty waking, high-pitched crying, refusal to eat/feed, fewer or no wet nappies or decreased urination, cold or mottled limbs, and difficulty breathing.

People with meningococcal disease may experience severe headache, neck stiffness, dislike of bright lights, or unexplained joint or limb pain. A non-blanching rash of red-purple spots or bruises may also occur but often presents later in the illness. Do not wait for a rash to occur.

iGAS can cause different symptoms. As well as the signs of serious illness, they may have muscle aches and pains. If they have a bruise or a skin infection this may become red, warm or very painful, including pain beyond the area that is obviously affected.

People with iGAS may develop a red, warm, painful, and rapidly spreading skin infection which may have pus or ulceration. Children may present with a sunburn-like rash. The rash and skin changes are not always present so do not wait for a rash to seek care if the person is very unwell.

Lower abdominal pain, bleeding, or bad-smelling discharge from the vagina can be symptoms of serious infection in women who are pregnant or who have recently given birth.

KNOW THE BUSH FIRE DANGER RATING: If you're hitting the road and travelling this summer, know the Bush Fire Danger Rating for the area you're travelling through or staying in. Also check for total fire bans in the area.

STAY UP TO DATE IF THERE'S A FIRE WHERE YOU ARE: Fires can move quickly and catch people off-guard. If you're travelling, you may not be familiar with the area or with roads.



From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for New Neighbours'

Tip #1: IDENTIFY YOUR 6 IMMEDIATE NEIGHBOURS — 2 TO YOUR LEFT, 2 TO YOUR RIGHT, ACROSS FROM AND BEHIND YOU. Make an effort to get to know them and swap contact details.

Tip #3: JOIN IN WITH NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH. They are your eyes and ears when you aren't at home. Contact your Crime Prevention Officer to find out about a group in your area. Maybe set up an 'eWatch' for your street or building?


Tip #7: LOOK AT YOUR HOME, GARDEN, SHED, & IMMEDIATE NEIGHBOURHOOD AS IF YOU WERE A BURGLAR. What gives you cover from being seen? Where is the quick getaway? Have you sensor lighting? Are your windows & doors secure? Invite a teenage relative to try and get into your home. Can they climb up to balconies? Fit through gaps? Request a FREE Security Audit from the CPO.

Tip #9: CONSIDER HAVING THE LOCKS CHANGED/UPDATED/RE-KEYED. RE-PROGRAMME NEW ALARM CODES FOR THE BURGLAR ALARM.
