# 30 January, from NSW Police Force: Mr Donald Earle has been found. Thank you to everyone involved, what a great outcome!

### Good news!

A man reported missing from St Ives has now been located. The 63-year-old man was last seen at a care facility on Kenthurst Road, St Ives, about 3pm on Saturday 28 January 2023. When he could not be located by staff, officers from Kuring Gai Police Area Command were notified and immediately commenced inquiries into his whereabouts. Following a multi-agency search of bushland near the St Ives Showground, the man was found safe and well on a track near Phantom Falls about 12pm today (Monday 30 January 2023). The man is with ambulance paramedics and SES personnel. Police would like to thank the public for their assistance.

29 January, from Ku-ring-gai command: The NSW Police Force has unveiled an enhanced online reporting option to allow victims of sexual assault to provide information without having to take part in a formal police investigation.

While police always encourage victims of any crime to make a formal report, it is acknowledged that for a number of reasons, victims of sexual assault often do not wish to speak about their experiences, nor speak with police and go through the legal process.

- The SARO is accessed through the online Community Portal and is available in 12 languages, making the reporting option more accessible to victims.
- This replaces the old process of printing and completing a 14-page document and emailing the State Crime Command's Sex Crimes Squad.
- The SARO questionnaire can be located on the NSW Police Force website <a href="here">here</a>.



26 January, from Ku-ring-gai command: Police are seeking the identity of the below male who they believe may be able to assist them with enquiries in relation to a break, enter and steal which occurred in Pymble on the 21st of January 2023.

The male is described as being dark in appearance, approximately 20-30 years of age, with a slim build wearing a white Yankees baseball hat, a white hoodie, grey pants, white shoes and black back-pack.

# **NEXT OF KIN PROGRAM**

Developed by NSW Police Force

Next of Kin is the person you would like police to contact in case of an emergency.

## WHAT IS THE NEXT OF KIN PROGRAM?

The Next of Kin Program helps people living alone to have the contact details of their nominated person recorded at a local police station.

The contact details of the Next of Kin, as well as the nominated doctor, dentist and any medical alerts that would help in an emergency situation will be entered onto a register. Any information provided will be securely stored and only accessed by NSW Police.

This information may assist the police and emergency services to contact a relative or other nominated person if needed in an emergency situation.

### **HOW DO I REGISTER?**

Contact your local police station and ask to speak with the Crime Prevention Officer about the Next of Kin Program.

The Next of Kin Program is a FREE to join.

- Regularly check and replace any powerboards that are showing signs of wear and tear or are more than a few years old.



# 24 January, from Nepean command: PREVENTING PARCEL THEFT

Five tips that may prevent you from becoming a victim

1. INSTALL A HOME SECURITY CCTV SYSTEM

#### **BENEFIT:**

Security cameras are a great deterrent and whilst a security camera system may not stop all parcel thefts, the images can go a long way in identifying the thief

2. SHIP TO A SECURE LOCATION OR CLICK AND COLLECT

### **BENEFIT:**

Have your parcel shipped to a secure location, such as your workplace address where there is always someone there to take delivery of your parcel

3. PARCEL DELIVERY BOXES

#### BENEFIT:

The package is delivered to a safe, lockable box near the front of your property (A great way to have parcels delivered – ideal for unit or townhouse complexes)

4. REQUEST PACKAGES BE PLACED IN A SECURE LOCATION

### **BENEFIT:**

Your parcel is delivered to a place nominated by you which is out of sight of passing pedestrians and traffic

5. REQUEST SIGNATURE CONFIRMATION OF DELIVERY


#### BENEFIT:

If no one is home to collect, then your parcel isn't left



24 January, from Crime Stoppers NSW: As kids return to school in the coming days, it is important to arm them with the right advice to help keep them safe.

- Walking with a friend or group of friends is safer and more fun.
- ■Always look left and right for traffic before crossing the road.
- Always use a pedestrian crossing.
- Variable Know the people in your community you can trust.
- These people could include teachers, doctors, nurses, shopkeepers, bus drivers and police.
- Find places you feel safe that you can go to when you feel unsafe or unsure. These
  places could include hospitals, schools, shops, neighbours, friend's houses and police
  stations.
- Never talk to strangers or get into strange cars.
- When on the train, travel in a crowded carriage or the guards compartment (it's the one with the blue light).
- Try to always walk where there are lots of people.
- ☑Don't take short cuts. Remember, it's okay to say NO if you feel unsafe or unsure.
- ✓Call 000 if you are scared or in danger.


Tip #2. DON'T RELY ON FLYSCREENS AS SECURITY DOORS.
