14 February, form Westleigh Rural Fire Brigade: b If you have the Fires Near Me NSW app on your phone you may notice a change.

It's now called Hazards Near Me NSW and shows information and warnings about bush fires and floods.

- Lipdate your App or search for Hazards Near Me NSW in the App Store.
- Set up a user profile to use across all your devices.

Hazards Near Me NSW is your official and trusted source of emergency information, showing information and warnings directly from our emergency services.



14 February, from Neighbourhood Watch Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: Last week we connected with many organisations at the 'Everything for Seniors' day organised by Ku-ring-gai Council.

We tried to find an overlap between Neighbourhood Watch and other not-for-profits, possibly around the subjects of safety and security, rules and regulations, that affect our community. One such organisation was Sydney Wildlife Rescue, who pointed us to various resources on their website, such as this article here, 'What Should I do if I Find an Injured Animal?'

Neighbourhood Watch has various <u>Frequently Asked Questions</u>, including **FAQ #12 What Should I do if I Have a Collision with an Animal?** It will be updated in due course to include the contact information for Sydney Wildlife Rescue.



13 February, from Neighbourhood Watch Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: At the weekend Neighbourhood Watch volunteers helped with 'cocooning' letterbox drops in Gordon, Hornsby, Pymble and Mt Colah.

Cocooning is the idea of warning residents around where an incident has occurred. Our Crime Prevention Officer at Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command, Constable Gemma Walker, without identifying the actual residence for privacy reasons, identifies letterboxes around the area where community alerts can be delivered. Gemma prints off different community alerts depending on the type of offence. Hopefully the warning will prompt neighbours to be more vigilant, careful and less likely to become a victim. Thank you to Gemma, volunteers, Mick, Julia, Bruce and a local resident in Alma Street.

13 February, from Crime Stoppers NSW: Your safety comes first!

Always be aware of your surroundings. If you feel you are in danger, go to a place where there are plenty of people, like a shop or services station.

Things to remember:

- Always keep enough money for a taxi or telephone call
- Have your keys ready before you get to your home or car
- Carry a personal alarm or whistle if you have reason to feel unsafe
- Where possible, park your car in a busy, well lit area
- If someone in a car threatens you, run in the opposite direction the car is facing
- If attacked, shout as loudly as you can

If we stop one person from committing a crime, there is a good chance we will prevent them carrying out further crimes. We need you to provide us with any information you have on a crime even if you cannot identify the offender.



13 February, from Crime Stoppers NSW: NSW Crime Stoppers is asking the community for two things:

- b Education: Be fire aware, throwing cigarette butts from a moving car, leaving a fire unattended or lighting a fire during a high fire danger zone can easily cause a bushfire and are all criminal offences.
- Reporting: If you see someone throw a cigarette butt, light a fire during a high fire
 danger zone or carelessly leave fires unattended, report it to Crime Stoppers. The
 community can report a licence plate associated with throwing cigarette butts from a
 car window or details of someone who has left a fire unattended or deliberately lit a fire
 during a high fire danger zone.

Any piece of information, anything you have seen or heard, may be crucial in preventing or solving a crime. We don't want to know who you are; we just want to know what you know. Call or click **Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000/ crimestoppers.com.au**.



13 February, from Crime Stoppers NSW: Children often beg to sit in the front seat of the car – but what are the requirements for child seats in vehicles in Australia?

Read below:

- ■0-6 MONTHS:
- Children up to the age of six months must be secured in an approved rearward facing restraint
- ■6 MONTHS 4 YEARS
- Children aged from 6 months old, but under 4 years old, must be secured in either a

- rear or forward facing approved child restraint with an inbuilt harness.
- Children under 4 years old cannot travel in the front seat of a vehicle with 2 or more rows.
- □4 YEARS 7 YEARS
- Children aged from 4 years old but under 7 years old must be secured in a forward facing approved child restraint with an inbuilt harness or approved booster seat.
- Children aged from 4 to 7 cannot travel in the front seat of a vehicle with two or more rows – unless all other back seats are occupied by children younger than 7 years in an approved child restraint or booster seat.
- **27** YEARS +
- Children aged from 7 years old but under 16 years old who are too small to be restrained by a seatbelt property adjusted and fastened are strongly recommended to use an approved booster seat.
- Children in booster seats must be restrained by a suitable lap and sash type approved seatbelt that is property adjusted and fastened, or by a suitable approved child safety harness that is properly adjusted and fastened.

Please note:

- If your child is too small for the child restraint specified by their age, they should be kept in their current child restraint until it is safe for them to move on to the next level.
- If your child is too large for the child restraint specified for their age, they may move on to the next level of child restraint.
- ALWAYS follow the manufacturers instructions when fitting child car seats.



13 February, from NSW Rural Fire Service: Needing to leave your house as a consequence of a bushfire or other emergency?

Prepare for the unexpected by putting together your bushfire emergency kit. Make sure to include essential items such as mobile chargers or battery banks, medications or scripts, pet supplies, and enough clothing for a number of days. Also, don't forget to keep important documents like insurance papers, birth certificates, and passports within reach. Be ready to evacuate at short notice by knowing your neighbourhood's designated safer place. Stay safe and be prepared!

This kit should include the essential items you need to keep your family comfortable and safe while you evacuate and until it's safe to return.

Emergency evacuation kit list:

- Important/legal documents.
- Valuable items (photos, jewellery, medals, etc).
- Clothing for everyone.
- First aid kit.
- Drinking water and food for the trip.
- Personal hygiene items.
- Items to grab when leaving:
- Wallet/ purse.
- Medications/ life support equipment.
- Phone, laptop and chargers.
- House and car keys.
- Pet supplies (food, bowl, cage, leash, etc).

fundraiser ahead of the 2023 NSW State election may constitute a political donation?


Political parties, politicians and candidates running for election often hold events to raise funds for their election campaigns.

This is a general road rule and signs do not need to be present for the rule to apply. One was sited and captured on a property in Kenthurst early this week. They are active early evening and onwards. They are a dangerous threat to our wildlife and domestic pets, as they secret venom through their glands when they feel threatened. In the event if you do come across one please alert authorities immediately!

All cane toad sightings of these animals should be reported to **NSW DPI on 1800 680 244** or take a photograph and fill out DPI's unusual animal form.

From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Seniors'

- **Tip #3.** Keep a torch & phone handy by the bed.
- **Tip #**6. Beware computer scams. Never open unsolicited attachments. Never follow links from within emails. Sign up for the Government's free 'stay smart online' service.
- **Tip #**10. Use a torch key-ring to avoid fumbling with keys. Consider attaching keys to an extendable key-ring that connects to your pocket/purse.
- **Tip #**11. Install a spy-hole.
- **Tip #**19. Buddy-up with a neighbour— use a signal to show you have arisen safely (e.g. a blind raised).
