
22 February, Orange & Cabonne Road Safety updated their cover photo


22 February, Ku-ring-gai Command added a temporary profile picture

28 February, from Neighbourhood Watch Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: At a recent community event, we were asked advice about stalking.

A woman has been followed into shops and around a shopping centre on several occasions. What can she do?

We confirmed the following with our local Crime Prevention Officer, Cst Gemma Walker.

- Report it to the shopping centre security.
- Get shopping centre security to confront the person ie don't confront the stalker yourself and make yourself vulnerable.
- If not in the centre, consider asking a male friend to confront the stalker.
- Report to the local police, in order to regularly record each occurrence and create the bigger picture of what is happening.
- If you can be discreet, take a photo.



Please note this information and report any suspicious activity.

Two High School students reported that they were approached this morning (27/2/23) outside Gordon East Public School at the bus stop directly across the road from our school at around 8:10am by an unknown person in a car. The person inside the car offered the students a lift to Gordon railway station.

The students are safe.

The description is a white Toyota Yaris car with a male driver. The matter has been reported to Police along with licence plate number.

Please take the time to remind your children of stranger danger and what to do should they feel unsafe. Staff are on duty inside our school from 8:40am in the morning and outside the school until all children are collected of an afternoon at both Kulgoa Road and Rosedale Road.


All this attention is flattering and a bit overwhelming, but this is how true love should feel right? Could you have found "the one" or is this person just too good to be true?



26 February, from Crime Stoppers NSW: Are my details known if I call Crime Stoppers?



When you contact Crime Stoppers you don't have to leave your personal details and the call isn't recorded, traced or identified, so you can have peace of mind that you'll remain completely confidential. When completing an online report, you have the option of remaining completely confidential or providing contact details, so either Crime Stoppers staff or a police investigator can follow up on any of the information you have provided. 25 February, from Crime Stoppers NSW: Crossing the Road



If you are a pedestrian, you should take responsibility for your own safety by using crossings, obeying road rules and being aware of your surroundings. As a pedestrian you should:

- A Obey signals at crossings (penalty applies for failure to do so)
- Always cross at a pedestrian crossing if one is available (penalty applies for failure to do so)
- Never assume a driver has seen you or intends to stop
- Rever cross a road while using headphones or mobile phones
- Always hold the hands of children when crossing the road.

25 February, from Crime Stoppers NSW: SHOPLIFTING is STEALING and accounts for up to 40% of reported shop losses each year



Shoplifters come from all walks of life and from all socio-economic backgrounds, but generally they fall into one of two groups, amateurs and professionals. Amateur shoplifters usually steal on impulse. Juveniles (aged 10 to 18 years, usually teenagers) who steal to impress friends form a big part of this group. Professional shoplifters are more likely to work in pairs or groups, although they will work alone. They often steal to obtain a false refund for the items and have often 'cased out' a store before stealing. Some are highly skilled thieves. 23 February, from Hornsby Rural Fire Brigade



This morning at 1:17AM we were paged with NSW RFS Ku-ring-gai Brigade to a flooded basement carpark in an apartment block in Warrawee. Unfortunately the truck pump could not reach the water and so instead multiple smaller portable pumps had to be used inside the carpark.

Due to the potential for toxic fumes from the portable pumps to build up inside the enclosed carpark, firefighters were breathing apparatus to setup and monitor the pumping operations. Additional portable pumps, breathing apparatus sets and firefighters were provided by Cherrybrook Rural Fire Brigade, Belrose Rural Fire Brigade and NSW RFS - Terrey Hills Brigade. Fire and Rescue NSW Station 075 Berowra were also in attendance.

22 February, from 9news.com.au: New beverage coasters, covers introduced in NSW in bid to combat drink spiking.



New beverage coasters and covers that aim to protect patrons from having their drink spiked have been introduced in New South Wales in a bid to increase safety in bars. Announcing the new protections today, NSW Police said the coasters - which are still under trial - will be a "conversation starter" and will expand on the force's existing "Drink Safe" campaign. The covers will be distributed "with priority" to venues around Sydney's WorldPride precinct, and work using a single-use self-adhesive lid to protect the top of a person's drink from any unknown substances entering it.

Tip #7. DO REGULAR STOCK TAKES, EVEN HOURLY, IN ORDER TO NARROW THE TIME FRAME OF A THEFT. This enables CCTV to be checked more effectively.

Tip #8. ENSURE ALL EMPLOYEES KNOW ALL PHONE NUMBERS & CONTACT DETAILS FOR EVERY KIND OF EMERGENCY. All office phones should have emergency/important phone numbers as speed dial.

Tip #11. REVIEW THE ENVIRONMENTAL LAYOUT OF THE WHOLE SITE & MAKE CHANGES WHERE THERE IS CONCEALMENT OR A SECURITY RISK IDENTIFIED. The Crime Prevention Officer at Hornsby Police station can assist with a free Security Audit. Phone: 9476 9799.

Tip #15. ALL COMPUTER ACCESS TO BE MONITORED & PASSWORDS CHANGED REGULARLY.
