
eNewsletter #612 - 04 July 2023

04 July, from Service NSW

Have a temporary visa and currently driving in NSW on an overseas driver licence? From 1 July 2023, temporary visa holders who take up residency in NSW for more than six months, must convert to a NSW driver licence to drive legally.

The rule applies to anyone who takes up residence in NSW on or after 1 July 2023. Some temporary visa holders will need a computer-based knowledge test and on-road driving test as part of the licence conversion. We encourage you to book a test at one of Service NSW's service centres or our dedicated St Marys Driver Testing Centre in Sydney's west. The centre offers about 450 driving tests and 1000 computer-based examinations each week. For information about the regulation changes, visit site here.

04 July, from The NepanPolice Area Command: TRAFFIC TUESDAY



Did you know that you MUST carry your driver's licence when driving in NSW? "No, I don't have my licence on me officer, but I am licenced. I even know my licence number".

The question is not so much as to whether you have a driver's licence but, 'can you produce it' or show it to a police officer when asked to do so. Are you carrying it with you?

The offence if you don't have it on you is:

Drive motor vehicle not carry licence \$120

As the days and nights get colder, keep your family safe. Never use BBQs and outdoor heaters inside your home.

They make carbon monoxide, a poisonous gas you can't see, taste or smell. This gas can kill quickly without warning.

Leave outdoor heaters, barbeques, and charcoal OUTSIDE.

If you think you may have carbon monoxide poisoning, call the Poisons Information Centre on 13 11 26. In an emergency, dial triple zero (000) for an ambulance.

04 July, from the Hills Police Area Command: We're changing our boundaries..... this will occur from the 4th of July 2023



The Hills PAC will no longer cover parts of Parramatta LGA - such as Northmead, Oatlands, and parts of North Rocks, so officers will be better able to focus their efforts on their more immediate surroundings in Castle Hill, Dural, Pennant Hills and Cherrybrook which had previously been covered by Ryde PAC.

Since its inception, NSWPF has undergone several boundary changes and we will continue to evaluate our organisational structure and overall performance to ensure we deliver/provide the best services to our communities.

Why it's happening:

By realigning the service areas under these four Police Area Commands (PACS), we will better fit the needs of residents in the Greater Sydney area.

Local police will be dealing with local problems. Where officers are better connected with their communities and know and understand their communities, they are better able to work with and serve those communities.

This move will allow us to engage more efficiently in areas of greatest need, with partners to better understand local issues and better align resources and better enhance officers' response to crime. We're confident that this is a long-term solution that will benefit everyone. How this geographical realignment affects you/public:

The police service you receive will not change and our Police Commands will continue to be accessible to all. Staffing aligns with resource needs so communities continue to receive a prompt police response.

02 July, from amp-abc-net-au.cdn.ampproject.org: Federal government launches new investment scam taskforce with help from ASIC, ACCC

Investment scams will be the first target of the government's new National Anti-Scam Centre, and regulators have called on banks to do more to protect customers from falling victim.

Australians have been losing more and more money to scams each year, with total losses exceeding an estimated \$3 billion last year.

Investment scams were the main way people lost their money, accounting for about \$1.5 billion in losses.

Financial Services Minister Stephen Jones said scammers were becoming increasingly sophisticated and the government's existing cyber security strategy needed to change.

"A cyber attack is when somebody breaks into your house and tries to steal your stuff. A scam is when somebody opens the front door and lets that person in," he said.

"You've got to use a different approach and a different set of strategies."



30 June, from 7news.com.au: Kmart lamps urgently recalled over electrocution fears; Customers are urged to disconnect the item from the power and cut the cord safely.



Lamps sold at Kmart stores nationally and online have been urgently recalled over electrocution fears.

Reports of electric shocks related to the defect have already been reported, the Australian Competition & Consumer Commission confirmed.

Marmo Table Lamps with inline switches have been recalled after a defect exposing live wires was discovered.

From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Apartments:

- **Tip #2.** Be aware of wi-fi security, and items such as baby monitors. Password protect your wi-fi, router, computer, laptops, mobiles, everything!
- **Tip #5.** Know when important documents/statements are arriving in the post and report immediately if they don't arrive. Arrange for your next credit card to be collected at the branch.
- **Tip #9**. Reduce the chances of 'tailgating' by waiting until the doors/gates to your carpark close completely after you, before moving further within.
- Tip #15. When moving in, consider installing new locks. You don't know if the unit has been burgled before. For extra security it's a good idea to get locks changed and rekeyed. This includes the mailbox. Request our 20 Tips for MAILBOXES.
- Tip#20. Natural ladders are a risk. Don't provide easy access to upper level balconies,
 eg. wheelie bins, lattice, trees, nearby fences.
