11 July, from NSW Police: Police are appealing for public assistance to locate a man wanted on an outstanding warrant.

Michael Woods, aged 37, is wanted on an outstanding revocation of parole warrant, related to domestic violence offences. Michael is described as being of Caucasian appearance, olive complexion, about 175cm to 180cm tall, of thin build, with brown eyes, black hair and black beard. He is known to frequent Western Sydney, Sydney City and **North Shore areas**.

11 July, from NSW Police: Can you help police?

Police are appealing for information following an assault last month in Hunters Hill. About 5.40pm Saturday 10 June 2023, police were called to bus stop on Gladesville Road, Hunters Hill, following reports of an assault. Officers attached to Ryde Police Area Command arrived to find a 32-year-old woman with facial injuries. She was treated by NSW Ambulance paramedics before being taken to Royal North Shore hospital in a stable condition. Police

were told the woman had allegedly been assaulted by an unknown man before a bystander intervened; the man then left scene. Police established a crime scene and launched an investigation into the incident.

As inquires continue police are looking to speak with a man who may be able to assist police in their investigation. He is described as being of a Caucasian appearance, aged between 20 – 30 years old, 178cm tall and having short brown hair. At the time of the incident, he was seen wearing a green jacket, black pants and black shoes.

As inquiries continue, police are urging anyone with CCTV footage or information about the incident to contact **Ryde police 9808 7401** or **Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000**.





06 July, from NSW Police: Have you seen Poppy?

Poppy Doolan, aged 29, was seen in Brookvale on Tuesday 12 April 2023. When she could not be located or contacted after this, she was reported missing to officers from Northern Beaches Police Area Command on Thursday 29 June 2023, who have commenced extensive inquiries to locate her. Police and family hold serious concerns for her welfare. She is described as being of Aboriginal/Torres Strait Islander appearance, 175cm tall, of a thin build, brown hair and eyes. Poppy is known to frequent the Dee Why, Brookvale and Collaroy areas.

10 July, from Crime Stoppers NSW: Protect your child online

Safety for children and young people on the Internet is quite possibly the biggest issue facing Australia's youth. Parents are more concerned than ever about how they can actively protect their child in the online environment. Talking with your children and being upfront and honest with them about the risks can help them understand how to best secure their safety online.

Tell your kids to NEVER:

- Tell anyone your name, address, phone number or school
- Send a photo of yourself to anyone that you don't know
- Tell anyone your credit card or bank details
- Make plans to meet anyone you find online people you meet online aren't always who they claim they are
- Talk to anyone who is nasty or makes you feel uncomfortable

Tell your kids they should ALWAYS:

- Be careful who you talk to in chat rooms or on instant messenger
- Ask permission to use chat rooms
- Tell your parents or carer if someone says something to you in an email or chat room that makes you feel uncomfortable or unsafe
- Stay away from websites that are not meant for children
- Remember that people are not always as they seem online



09 July, from Crime Stoppers NSW: WHAT TO DO IF YOU FIND YOURSELF IN AN EMERGENCY?

- Mhat is an emergency?
- Is someone injured?
- Is your life or property being threatened?
- Bhave you just witnessed a serious accident or crime?

If you answered YES call **Triple Zero (000)**. Triple Zero calls are free. When you call Triple Zero (000) you will be asked by the initial operator if you require POLICE, FIRE OR AMBULANCE? You must tell the operator which service you require and what your area, town or suburb is. If you require Police and any other service, such as Police AND

Ambulance or Police AND Fire Brigade ask for "POLICE".

When you are transferred to POLICE operator;

- STAY FOCUSSED, STAY RELEVANT, STAY ON THE LINE and speak CLEARLY
- The operator will ask you for your LOCATION provide a street address if possible, or a street and nearest corner street AND suburb, or provide as much information about your location as possible.
- Try not to move onto any further details about what is happening until the operator has CONFIRMED your location with you. If the police operator does not know exactly where you are, or where the incident is occurring, they cannot send police on the way.
- Let the operator ask you for the information they require this will help police get to you faster.
- Operators do not ask you for unnecessary information, EVERYTHING they ask is information police require before attending the incident.

For non-emergencies, report online via the NSW Police Ford Community Portal at <u>portal.police.nsw.gov.au</u> or you may choose to call the **Police Assistance Line on 131 444** (24/7).

To report crime information call **Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000** (24/7).



- Is someone seriously injured or in need of urgent medical help?
- Is your life or property being threatened?
- Have you just witnessed a serious accident or crime?

If you answered YES Call Triple Zero (000).





09 July, from The Hills command: The NSW Road Rules 2014 require that:

The rider of a motorcycle must wear an approved motorcycle helmet securely fitted and fastened on the rider's head, The rider of a motorcycle must not ride with a passenger unless the passenger is wearing an approved motorcycle helmet.

NB Secured & worn properly - not like this.



06 July, from Wells Fargo: Can you spot a scam?

Five red flags to watch out for. When it comes to helping you and your family avoid scams, it starts with awareness. Here are a few consistent red flags you can watch for so you can stop a scammer in their tracks.

1. Unexpected contact

A person or company contacts you out of the blue by phone, text, or email about an invoice, order, delivery, or charge you didn't know about.

2. Everything is urgent

Scammers will create a false sense of urgency and use pressure tactics like rude or pushy language to get you to act immediately.

3. Very specific or unusual way to pay

Someone is asking you to pay or send money using gift cards, cryptocurrency, a payment app, or even an online wire — to pay for something, resolve an "issue," get sweepstakes "winnings," or secure a high return on your "investment."

4. Threatening language

Scammers may tell you that you owe money and then threaten to call the police if you don't pay immediately. They may also coach you on what to tell the bank to withdraw or transfer money, or ask you to keep a secret.

5. The romantic "emergency"

A new online love interest bombards you with "sweet talk" but doesn't seem to want to meet in person. Suddenly a hardship or emergency strikes and they want you to send them money.

What to do if you suspect a scam

- Slow down. Pause, take a breath, and think it through.
- Someone you don't know is asking you for your money. Remember, it's your right to confirm things no matter how urgent anyone says it is. You're in charge when it comes to your money.
- Contact the company they claim to be, call your bank, or call the police if it doesn't seem right.
- Consult with a friend or family member you trust.

From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Businesses:

- **Tip #1.** At the end of the day, remove all money from the cash register and display the empty drawer as a message to potential thieves.
- **Tip #5.** Install good quality security lights and/or sensor lights around the perimeter to provide more effective illumination at night.
- **Tip #10.** When setting the burglar alarm, look around and double-check no one can see the entered PIN.
- Tip #13. Photograph and record descriptions, model and serial number of all valuables. Consider etching a driver's licence number. UV pens can be used on more sensitive items your local Neighbourhood Watch group has an engraver/etching tool/UV pen that can be borrowed free of charge.
- **Tip #19.** Do you enjoy a 'POETS' day drink? Ensure employees have a designated driver, or alternative way to get home.
