
08 January, from NSW Police: Police are appealing for public assistance to locate a man wanted on outstanding warrants, as a part of Operation Persistence.

Jeb SAMEUL, aged 35, is wanted by virtue of two outstanding warrants relating to property offences.

He is described as being of Caucasian appearance, about 175cm tall, of thin build, with brown eyes and brown hair.

08 January, from The Hills command: PayID is a safe way to send and receive money, however, there have been a number of reports of PayID scams targeting people selling things on online marketplaces like Facebook Marketplace and Gumtree.

The best way to protect yourself against scams is to familiarise yourself with the tricks scammers use. Be on the lookout for buyers who offer to pay for an item using PayID but claim to have a problem with the transaction, especially when they offer to send a friend or relative to pick up the item on their behalf.

Remember these tips:

- Never send money first to receive a payment via PayID.
- PayID is free so you will never be asked to pay for an upgrade to a business or premium account before you can receive any payments on PayID.
- PayID is managed by your bank, so you will never receive communications direct from PayID. Ignore any text messages, calls or emails claiming to be from PayID.
- Never rely on confirmation emails showing a buyer has overpaid you.
 The buyer will put pressure on you to repay the amount, however, the email is fake, and no money ever appears in your account.

To protect yourself against scams on online marketplaces, read our tips on how you can avoid Gumtree scams and stay safe on Facebook.

If you think you have been the victim of a scam, it's important to act right away:

- Contact your bank immediately to ask them to stop any further transactions.
- Contact IDCARE, a free support service for people impacted by scams and identity theft, to build a response plan. Visit IDCARE or call 1800 595 160.
- Report the scam to Scamwatch to warn others.

Being scammed can be emotionally and financially stressful, so get support for yourself. Reach out to family or friends, or speak to Lifeline and Beyond Blue for a confidential chat.


08 January, from NSW Police: Police are appealing for public assistance to locate a man wanted on outstanding warrants, as a part of Operation Persistence.


06 January, from Sutherland Shire command: Lock your vehicle and remove all items of value

08 January, from Neighbourhood Watch Australasia: Are you planning a road trip this Christmas?

Nothing spoils a holiday more than having valuables stolen from your car, caravan or RV.

Follow these tips to keep your valuables safe while you're on the move:

- Install anti-theft screws on all the number plates on your car, caravan RV or trailer.
- Consider installing a safe in your car boot or inside the caravan to keep phones, wallets and other small valuable items safely locked away.
- If you're leaving the caravan for any length of time, consider securing it with a key-operated wheel lock or tow ball coupling lock.
- As part of your pre-departure preparations record the VIN number of your caravan and the model/serial number of other valuables you'll be taking with you.
- Make sure any bicycles, kayaks, surfboards, fishing rods etc, are locked securely to the car or caravan/RV.

And our advice: Consider installing a GPS tracker in your vehicle.

08 January, from Neighbourhood Watch Ryde District Inc. NSW: How to reduce the risk of having your vehicle stolen

Preventing car keys from being taken and reducing the risk of vehicle theft in your local area involves a combination of security measures and responsible habits. Here are some steps you can take:

1. **Secure Your Home:**

- Install strong exterior doors and windows with reliable locks.
- Consider installing a security system with surveillance cameras.
- Use motion sensor lights to illuminate the area around your home at night.

2. **Secure Your Car:**

- Always lock your car doors and close windows when not in use.
- Park your car in well-lit and populated areas.
- If possible, park your car in a garage or a secure parking facility.
- Install a steering wheel lock or a car alarm system for added security.
- Never leave keys/fobs in the vehicle when not in use.

3. **Keep Keys Secure:**

- Avoid leaving car keys in easily accessible areas, such as near doors or windows.
- Keep car keys out of sight and away from doors and windows, especially overnight.
- Consider using a key holder or a lockbox for spare keys, placed in a discreet location.

4. **Be Mindful of Key Placement:**

- Avoid leaving keys on hooks or tables near windows or doors.
- Do not leave car keys in visible or easily accessible places within your home.
- · Where practical place your car keys within a cupboard or drawer

5. **Use Technology:**

- Consider installing a smart home security system that includes features like door/window sensors, motion detectors, and smartphone alerts.
- Make sure that the security system monitors shared and private areas where possible.
- Review monitors on a regular basis and keep in a well maintained condition.
- Some car models offer keyless entry and ignition systems. Be aware of potential vulnerabilities and follow manufacturer recommendations for securing these systems.

6. **Community Awareness:**

- Stay informed about local crime trends and share information with your neighbours.
- Ask a trusted friend, or neighbour, to keep an eye out on your property when you are on holiday.
- Join or establish a street neighbourhood watch program to collectively address security concerns.

7. **Educate Family Members:**

 Teach family members, especially younger ones, about responsible key handling and the importance of vehicle security.

8. **Routine Check:**

- Regularly check that all doors and windows are locked before leaving your home.
- Verify that your car is securely locked when parked.
- Always double check that you observe that the vehicle indicators reflect when it is locked.

9. **Invest in a GPS Tracker:**

 Consider installing a GPS tracker in your vehicle. This can aid in recovery if your car is stolen.

10. **Report Suspicious Activity:**

 Be vigilant and report any suspicious individuals or activities to local law enforcement.

Remember, preventing car theft is about creating layers of security. By combining these measures, you can significantly reduce the risk of car theft in your local area.
