

17 January, from NSW Police: Can you help police?

Police have released a COMFIT image and a photo of tattoos of a man who died in Sydney's Inner West 42 years ago, as they seek public assistance to help identify him.

About 4.50pm on Tuesday 14 April 1981 emergency services responded to reports of a man being fatally struck by a train in the rail corridor between Stanmore and Newtown Railway Stations. There were no suspicious circumstances relating to the death.

Despite extensive inquiries at the time the man was unable to be identified.

Following a review of cold cases in 2021 a fingerprint analyst identified the man as possibly Osvaldo Perez with a date of birth of 16 May 1955 residing in a

boarding house on Normanby Street, Fairfield East, and at the time was believed to be employed as either a labourer or boiler maker.

However, detailed investigations both here in Australia and - with the assistance of INTERPOL - abroad have failed to find any existence of this person and it is believed that this may have been an alias used by the man.


CRIME - Understanding & Reporting pdf

[Taken from the NSW Police website.] Hate Crime and hate incidents happen daily in NSW, but studies show they are under reported. This means that many people are experiencing hate alone. The NSW Police Force takes all crimes seriously including hate motivated crimes. The NSW Police Force has a dedicated Engagement & Hate Crime Unit who oversights and works with all Police Area Commands and Police Districts, to investigate hate motivated incidents.

Your report helps to paint a larger picture of what is happening in local areas and shows patterns of behaviour that we can address. All reports are vital for intelligence purposes. Your report may assist police in stopping the behaviour before it escalates and reduce future occurrences.






22 January, from PerthNow: Man on trial over 'reckless' bid for 143kg of heroin

Alone inside a northern Sydney storage unit, a man attempted to cut open industrial baking eMan on trial over 'reckless' bid for 143kg of heroinquipment believing it contained over 140kg in heroin imported from Malaysia, a jury has heard. Sounds allegedly those of power tools were captured by police surveillance devices after Wade Habkouk entered the Hornsby storage unit on February 11, 2021.

22 January, from the AFP: Ahead of Valentines Day, the AFP is issuing a warning about a manipulative and costly scam called 'pig butchering' or 'romance baiting', targeting Australians with the promise of friendship

and financial windfalls.

Traditional romance scams are often initiated on dating apps - but pig butchering often starts with cold texting individuals on messaging apps in order to initiate a connection. Offenders often spend months sometimes years gaining a victim's trust, before encouraging them to invest in the share market, cryptocurrency or foreign currency exchanges. For the first time, the AFP is releasing details from a seized pig butchering how-to manual to further inform the community what tactics conmen and women were using to target multicultural communities and the wider public. 
22 January, from the AFP: It's back to school time, and this usually means back to school photos.

If you're posting images of your child online, consider what information you're sharing.


Top tips:

- Don't share images that show personal information. This could be your child's name, age, school logo, street number or street name
- Choose strong privacy settings for your social media accounts
- Only share images of your child with people you know and trust
- Review your 'friends' or 'followers' on all social media accounts and remove anyone you don't know.

21 January, from the Australian Federal Police (AFP): Forced marriage happens in Australia, and often in plain sight

As part of our focus on disrupting human trafficking across Australia, we are asking school communities to learn the signs of forced marriage as students prepare to return to the classroom. You can find a list of the common signs in the comments. A forced marriage is when a person enters a marriage without freely and fully consenting, because they have been coerced, threatened, or deceived, or because they are incapable of understanding. Reports to the AFP continue to increase year-on-year, but it is an underreported crime. Forced marriage is not limited to any cultural group, religion or ethnicity. Anyone can be a victim, regardless of their age, gender or sexual orientation.

If you suspect you or another person is experiencing, or at risk of, forced marriage or human trafficking, call **131 AFP (237)** or use the AFP's human trafficking online information report <u>here</u>. If you have immediate concerns for safety, or there is an emergency, call Triple Zero (000).





Yes, Indicators are of prime importance. Use indicators while changing lanes, overtaking, taking turns, and for other denotations as they form an integral part of road safety and keep fellow road users informed about the driver's intents and thus, avoid accidents.

When to Use Your Car Indicators?

You should use indicators whenever you intend to perform any one of the following actions:

1. Turn from the Main Road

When you don't find a traffic signal at an intersection or you are driving on the main road, use the indicators if you want to turn. It is better to signal your intentions before changing directions.

• 2. Roundabouts

Give an indication, if you intend to turn at any roundabout, and also signal before you exit it. Always give way to the vehicles that are already in the roundabout on your left. NB: this is for left-hand driving system.

• 3. Lane Change or Turn

Always use indicators for changing your lane even when there's nobody on the road; this helps the vehicles 'suddenly popping' from nearby apartments or streets. If you want to turn, use the correct indicator of the side you are going, well before the actual turn. Turn only when you are sure that the road is clear for you to take the turn.

• 4. U-Turn

Turn on your indicators before the point of U-turn and ensure from your mirrors that all cars following you are aware of your intention. Also, ensure that there is no vehicle coming from the front, before you take the turn.

• 5. Overtaking

To be on the safer side, signal well before you pull out into the other lane and get back into the same lane to indicate your intention of overtaking.

Always check your blind spot before applying your reason or intention for indicating.

21 January, from Neighbourhood Watch Queensland: Where is your Credit Card or Bank Card?

Most of us use some kind of card for our purchases, even for small items such as the morning coffee on the way to work or after dropping the kids at school. We head off to do the grocery shopping or to fill the fuel tank, often spending significant amounts of money in a single day. Carrying large amounts of cash isn't wise as we might be targeted by someone who has seen us taking notes out of our purse or wallet so we use our cards. Cash is being used less and less and there is even talk about a time when we will be a "cashless society".

18 January, from the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA): Telecommunications company Medion has paid a \$259,440 penalty for failing to comply with customer identification rules, resulting in a number of people falling victim to SIM-swap scams.

An ACMA investigation found Medion failed to complete a required customer authentication check for more than 1,600 SIM-swap requests and one password reset request. These compliance failures led to nine known cases of people having their SIMs swapped illegally, five of whom suffered financial losses totalling over \$160,000. SIM-swap scams occur when a scammer takes control of a person's mobile number by using the individual's personal details to request a new SIM. Under industry rules introduced in 2022, telcos are required to conduct a multi-factor identity authentication check before undertaking high-risk customer requests such as SIM-swaps, changes to accounts or disclosure of personal information.

18 January, from Australian Cyber Security Centre: Strong passphrases can be the only barrier between adversaries and your valuable information.

As we have increased our reliance on passwords, adversaries have developed increasingly sophisticated ways to crack them. Ensure your passphrases are long, unpredictable and unique. Follow as many of our principles as you can to create the most secure passphrase possible.

Frequently Asked Question (FAQ) #13 HOW SHOULD I REPORT HOONS?

How Should I Report Hoons?

- 1. If you hear a car being driven in a reckless manner and are able to see the incident, it is helpful if you can obtain any details at all.
- 2. AT THE TIME OF THE INCIDENT, call triple zero '000', or the Police Assistance Line (PAL), or report it to the local police station and ask for advice – see phone numbers below.
- 3. Record all incidents and those details listed below.
- 4. Possibly take a photo or make video if this can be done safely never place yourself in danger or at risk when trying to gather evidence.
- 5. Consider installing quality CCTV at your residence and/or dash cam in your vehicle for recordings that can act as proof.
- 6. Talk with your neighbours. See if you can band together, help get the hoon details, support one another.
- 7. Phone Crime Stoppers NSW 1800 333 000 with all collated information. All calls are treated confidentially.

From Ku-ring-gai Council: No right turn restrictions introduced in Roseville


Approved part-time 'No Right Turn' restrictions to be implemented from Monday 19 February. Starting from Monday 19 February 2024, turning restrictions will be implemented at the below locations:

- From Clanville Road into Archbold Road: No right turn 6am-10am and 3pm-7pm Monday to Friday
- From Dudley Avenue into Archbold Road: No right turn 6am-10am and 3pm-7pm Monday to Friday

Council has erected advanced notice signs on Clanville Road and Dudley Avenue, Roseville.

These restrictions have been approved by Council in late November 2023. Please note the enforcement will begin on Monday 19 February 2024.
