20 February, from Police Transport command: Police are seeking assistance from the public to identify a male who may be able to assist police with their enquiries in relation to an assault which occurred at Wharf 3, Circular Quay around 11.25am on Sunday 21 January 2024.

The male allegedly punched another man to the face when challenged over pushing through a queue. He is described as Caucasian appearance, about 165 centimetres tall, thin build with a beard and moustache with brown, curly hair. At the time, he was shirtless and wearing a black cap and black shorts. Police are appealing for anyone who may have witnessed the incident or have knowledge of the identity of the person/s depicted to come forward.

19 February, from Police Transport command: Police are appealing for public assistance after a train guard was assaulted at St Leonards Railway Station.

At 7:49pm on Tuesday the 14th of November 2023, the train guard was spat on by a male. Officers attached to Police Transport Command North Central have commenced an investigation. As inquiries continue, police have released images of a male who may be able to assist with inquiries. This male is described as Caucasian appearance, approximately 25-35 years old, medium build, brown hair, white Under Armour shirt, Fluro orange vest and black backpack.

15 February, from NSW Police: Operation Amarok V enables us to address domestic and family violence with the seriousness it warrants.

It's about precision in targeting the most dangerous offenders; the ones who pose a significant threat to victims, to family members, to other members of the community. Throughout the four-day operation, almost 600 people with serious domestic violence offences. Police also conducted 131 Firearms Prohibition Order (FPO) compliance searches, and 5,493 Apprehended Domestic Violence Orders (ADVOs).

20 February, from Neighbourhood Watch (NHW) Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: DID YOU KNOW?

Neighbourhood Watch Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby has an ultraviolet pen set available to borrow.

Normally we recommend borrowing one of our engravers for marking expensive road bikes, electric tools, and other such items that can be easily onsold at a car boot/garage sale. We recommend the NSW Police-preferred method of marking with your driver's licence number prefixed with 'N' (for NSW) at the top right of your item.

However, for delicate items, such as mobile phones, musical instruments and laptop computers, we suggest the use of an ultra-violet (UV) pen. The ink used is only visible under UV light. The UV marking deteriorates with sunlight, so should be applied on the underside or inside of an item and be re-applied every 6 months. We also supply a blacklight torch to view the UV markings. [Included for completeness.] GPS trackers are another option: (Not available from NHW). Trackers can be used for a range of items from motorbikes, jetskis, musical instruments, to mobile homes. Products are such as AppleTag, Tile Mates, etc.





20 February, from the Australian Federal Police: Don't be a mule! Australian police warn university students about money muling.

A money mule is a person who receives money from a third party into their bank account, transfers it into another account and receives a payment for it. While being a money mule may seem like a low risk, high reward and victimless crime, it is a serious crime. Police are concerned about criminals targeting financially vulnerable university students, including through job ads offering quick and easy money for moving funds through their bank accounts. A month-long campaign is being rolled out nationally across 39 universities to educate students on what a money mule is, how to spot this cyber-enabled crime and what people should do if they think they've fallen victim to money muling.

14 February, from the Australian Federal Police (AFP): Authorities shutdown cybercrime warzone.

An alleged key figure in an international cybercrime network has been arrested by The Malta Police Force and a criminal network has been shut down following a joint operation by the AFP, Europol and FBI – Federal Bureau of Investigation. It will be alleged the man was a key promoter of a Remote

Access Trojan (RAT) known as Warzone. This software was used to target users in Australia and around the world.

The network distributed the Warzone software to other cyber criminals, allowing them to bypass security and remotely access computers without the victim's knowledge, browse files, record keystrokes, steal usernames and passwords and even access web cameras.

Warzone, which was available for a subscription starting from \$25 per month, also enabled other criminal activities such as ransomware attacks and harvesting of information that could lead to identify theft and phishing campaigns.

14 February, Shared with us by a resident: I live on Rosedale Road in Gordon, near the Gordon Recreation Ground.

There is a bit of foot traffic generally to and from the ground and to the station. On Saturday, 3 February, around 1030pm a young male came up our driveway and banged on the living room windows, shouting obscenities. Of course, when I reacted and went outside to address it, the coward ran off. I called the police and gave some vague information as that is all I had but at least was reported. Probably a teenager having some odd fun, however it is the brazenness that is concerning in someone seeing people peacefully in their homes and crossing the threshhold in entering the property, and then the unprovoked direct harrassment... There have been other incursions, such as our garden hose being snipped for bongs, and I found an earring on our trampoline that shows someone was on there. Result is I lock our gates now, have bought a security camera, and am installing fence spikes. Quite sad.

Due to the high rates of contamination in soft plastics from our recycling centre, our bags are being inspected currently. JFYI, post bags are not accepted when they have a paper address or barcode sticker on them. Try and cut them out beforehand.

From NHW: It's always a good idea to cut out address labels and destroy them before throwing postal items into the recycling, to avoid IDENTITY THEFT.

And in the comments:

Bakery plastic bags with stickers on them are the same deal. Cut them out before placing in recycling!

Ziplock bags with a hard plastic slider need it cut off.



13 February, from NSW Food Authority: Your reusable bags could be carrying more than just your groceries 🕰

If you're loading raw chicken one week and fresh produce the next – or using them for the kids' shoes or other items - it's best to give those bags a good wash.

14 February, from Australian Federal Police: Taylor fever has hit and the scammers are turning this season into a cruel summer.

The AFP is aware of instances where people's social media profiles have been hacked and used to sell Taylor Swift concert 'tickets' through Facebook Marketplace and Facebook Community Pages. You can imagine their surprise when their angry Swiftie neighbour or friend ask for concert tickets which they believe they purchased from them! Our partners at the National Anti-Scam Centre have received over 270 reports of people being scammed buying Taylor Swift 'The Eras Tour' tickets via social media since tickets went on sale in Australia in June 2023.

We know all too well (10 min version) the stress scams like this cause so to help stop this bad blood from happening to you - secure your Facebook account with a strong passphrase and setting up Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA) and only buy tickets through authorised sellers. Not sure how to set these up?

How to set up MFA on your Facebook account:

- 1. Go to Security and login settings.
- Scroll down to Use to-factor authentication and click Edit.
- 3. Choose the security method you want and follow the onscreen instructions.
- 4. You can choose security key, third party authentication app or SMS code to your mobile phone.

What is a passphrase you ask? Passphrases are made up of 4 or more random words making them longer than a traditional password – this makes them harder to crack but easy to remember. A good passphrase is unique, complex and easy for only you to remember.

These simple steps can protect you from becoming a victim of cybercrime and leaving a blank space in your bank account.

Frequently Asked Question (FAQ) #28: 'IS IT A LEGAL REQUIREMENT TO HAVE A VISIBLE HOUSE NUMBER ON MY HOUSE?'

YES. It is a legal requirement to display the correct house number (street number) on the building (house) OR fence fronting the street pursuant to Section 124 Para 8, Local Government Act 1993.

- Make sure that your house number is clearly visible from the street on a dark, wet night.
- Rather than simply one number, Neighbourhood Watch suggests all three numbers:
 - 1. A number displayed on the façade or fence of the property, and
 - o 2. In addition, a number displayed on the letterbox (optional) and
 - 3. In addition, a number on the kerb outside your property (optional).
- If your home is situated on a corner, the number should face the street named in your address.
- Property numbers must remain legible and be repaired or replaced as required.
- Reflective numbers are optional, although highly recommended by NHW.

- Bigger is better.
- Double-check for Homeowner's Association restrictions.
- A council may order a person to display a house number on premises.
 Failure to comply is an offence.


