27 February, from NSW Police Force



Cybercrime Squad detectives have charged three men following an

investigation into an SMS phishing scam, allegedly responsible for sending over 80 million fraudulent text messages.

Strike Force Kanbi was established by State Crime Command's Cybercrime Squad to investigate the use of Subscriber Identity Module (SIM) boxes, which are an electronic device used to send bulk text messages across the Australian telecommunications network containing fraudulent links.

The text messages typically pertain to be a legitimate institution containing a fraudulent link, directing the victim to an illegitimate website for the purpose of financial gain.

Through assistance from telecommunications network, strike force detectives were able to identify the location of NSW's most prolific SIM boxes, who police will allege was responsible for sending over 80 million messages in five months.

Following inquiries, about 6am on Thursday 15 February 2024, strike force detectives – with assistance from the Public Order & Riot Squad – executed two search warrants at a unit in Burwood.


Claims alleged murder victim awoke to shadowy figure in his home months before death.

The alleged double murder of TV presenter Jesse Baird and his partner Qantas flight attendant Luke Davies has rocked Australia and left a community in mourning.

Today we learned of several dramatic and chilling developments as the NSW Police Force desperately searches for their bodies.

That includes the frightening claim Baird told friends he woke one night last year to see a shadowy figure at the end of his bed. It's understood Baird did not report the incident to police.

NSW Police Force have been uninvited from marching at Saturday's #MardiGras parade.

The calls come after Senior Constable Beau Lamarre-Condon was charged with killing Jesse Baird and his current partner Luke Davies using a police-issued pistol on February 19.

Sydney Mardi Gras organisers issued a statement on Monday night saying LGBTQIA+ communities across the country are "devastated" by the couple's deaths and "need space to grieve the loss".

UNSAFE SAFETY SYSTEMS


Computer assistance in cars has its place and, as you point out in 'What happened to the autonomous car?' (September/October), it has saved dozens of lives. But are there any statistics on accidents caused by computer assistance technology?

My son's car has lane keeping assistance. As he weaves around potholes or obstacles, especially when on the highway, he must often go over the lane lines. The car wants to keep pulling him back into the lane and he has to fight to keep it where he needs to go.

He has also experienced times when he has moved too close to the lane lines and the car has tried to take him across the line into oncoming traffic, before 'realising' and whipping him back into the correct lane.

The local man, who has a long rap sheet and who A Current Affair has chosen not to name, is understood to have provided an alibi for the day the 51-year-old went missing.

While there is nothing to suggest he had anything to do with Murphy's disappearance, he is among several people spoken to by detectives in recent days – illustrating the wide net police have cast – and the fact they are exploring all possibilities.

21 February, from NSW DPI Fisheries: Do You Fish the Ferry Wharves?

Throwing a line from Sydney Harbour's ferry wharves is popular during summer and fishers may notice some new signage on their favourite wharf.

These signs are being installed by Transport for NSW to make it easy for fishers to understand the rules when fishing the wharves, noting the primary purpose of the wharves is to provide safe ferry access for commuters.

The signs summarise all the rules in one place. Some of the new rules to address congestion on the wharves and ensure safe access for commuters include: Fishers can only have up to 2 fishing rods per person; A maximum of 6 people can fish at any wharf at any one time; and Knives used for cutting bait must not be left out in the open or unattended.

When fishing wharves, please be aware of all the rules and ensure you fish responsibly and safely. Police are also continuing to conduct regular patrols to ensure fishers are following the rules and infringements will be issued for not doing the right thing. Also keep a lookout for Alex, our local DPI Recreational Fishing Education Officer, who is out and about on the wharves talking to fishers and providing advisory material. Tight lines!

Frequently Asked Question (FAQ) #29: 'IS IT A LEGAL REQUIREMENT TO HAVE A VISIBLE HOUSE NUMBER ON THE KERB?'

NO. There is no legal requirement for kerb numbers. It is optional. It is only a legal

requirement to display the correct house number (street number) on the building (house) OR

fence fronting the street [- see FAQ #28 IS IT A LEGAL REQUIREMENT TO HAVE A VISIBLE

HOUSE NUMBER ON MY HOUSE?].

- The kerb is chosen to enable emergency services to look to a common place, away from the physical structure of the house, to identify an address.
- The kerb number should be located about 60cm from your driveway entrance.
- You will need the kerb number to be visible, eg a white number on a black background.

Some councils dictate the height, font, colour and method of kerb numbering. Each Local

Government Area has its own Policy. Please check your council's regulations.

- Rather than simply one number, Neighbourhood Watch suggests all three numbers:
 - 1. A number displayed on the façade or fence of the property, and
 - 2. In addition, a number displayed on the letterbox (optional) and
 - 3. In addition, a number on the kerb outside your property (optional).
- If your home is situated on a corner, the number should face the street named in your address.

- Reflective numbers are optional, although highly recommended by NHW.
- Double-check for Homeowner's Association restrictions
