Neighbourhood Watch Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby had representatives at the recent Community Safety Precinct Committee (CSPC) meeting held last week. Thank you to [Kuring Gai Police Area Command](#) for hosting this quarterly meeting at the the Hornsby police station.

Crime stats and other topics were discussed, including increasingly sophisticated fraud, targeting of alcohol shops, parcel thefts at unit blocks, stolen precious metals from car exhausts, and graffiti that is happening regularly in the St Ives area.

The use of [VandalTrak Pty Ltd](#) was mentioned, and we have a case study (see attached flyer) to share with you outlining VandalTrak's use in the Redlands Council area.

This is Neighbourhood Watch Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby's advice regarding graffiti: If graffiti occurs on your own property or a property you are responsible for, you should report the incident to the NSW Police Assistance Line (PAL) on 131 444 or via their online Community Portal [here](#).

You can only report the graffiti if you are the victim, ie its on your property. It is the responsibility of owners to remove graffiti from their private property. Your local Rotary Club may be able to assist you. Police recommend the rapid removal of graffiti - it takes away the glory!


We can also assist with advice, warning stickers and/or letterbox drops to surrounding residences.

There are several ways to report graffiti that is not on a private residence. Graffiti can be reported via [VandalTrak](#) who notify councils and public assets, and include photos to maintain the Graffiti Register [here](#). The NSW Graffiti hotline also records graffiti and lets the public assets know 1800 707 125 between 7am and 7pm Monday to Friday. More info [here](#).

You can also directly inform public assets, eg railways, electricity companies, post boxes, or by using the Snap Send Solve App <https://www.snapendsolve.com/> .

RESPONDING TO GRAFFITI - A COMMUNITY ISSUE

Graffiti crime impacts the community through visual eyesores, distracting police resources, and burdening rate payers with the cost of identification and removal.

Graffiti and other forms of vandalism costs the Australian community a staggering \$2.7 billion a year¹. Apart from the clean-up costs, there are other economic and social impacts; people and businesses avoid these areas and real estate prices suffer. Graffiti related offences are considered a gateway crime towards more serious criminal activities. Research published in the *Police Journal*² found that nearly three-quarters of graffiti offenders stopped reoffending after their first or second contact with police. Traditionally, graffiti removal efforts rely on council teams identifying affected areas or responding to resident complaints. For many councils, this represents significant burden on their already overstretched maintenance resources and budgets.

Redland City Council had a vision to proactively reduce the incidents of graffiti vandalism in its community. It had previously prototyped a graffiti management software system, however, the supporting functions deteriorated over time as Council platform upgrades occurred. Furthermore, Council software firewalls, an integral part of their privacy and security safeguards, made it difficult to share information with the Queensland Police Service.

Redland conducted an extensive search for a better solution. After an extensive search/ender etc for a better solution, Redland City Council selected VandalTrak as its new technology partner in June 2013. VandalTrak provided a cost effective, cloud-based solution with ongoing support and maintenance. This removed the burden on Council staff allowing them to focus on working with the community, police and contractors to identify and remove graffiti quickly, and to aid in the identification and prosecution of offenders.

"We've lived in The Redlands area for 33 years. It's a great place to live and a safe environment to raise a family. To be honest, I had no idea what Council does behind the scenes to stop graffiti from happening. We don't see much, if any graffiti at all and as locals we take pride in our community. THE VANDALTRAK SOLUTION - A VIRTUAL NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

VandalTrak's graffiti hotline is cloud-based and its members of the community can download for free and use to report and report incidents of graffiti crimes in their local area and query where it with Council officers. Once reported, Council can quickly share information with police and graffiti removal contractors to ensure the fastest response to graffiti crimes.

Each report to the app includes a photo and GPS location. Multiple community reports of a graffiti incident can be shared to Council to ensure rapid response to individual offenders. Once no officers are required and it is shared with Council to clear completed work.

- Improved reporting and insight into the frequency, size and location of incidents
- Standardisation of response and removal practices and procedures

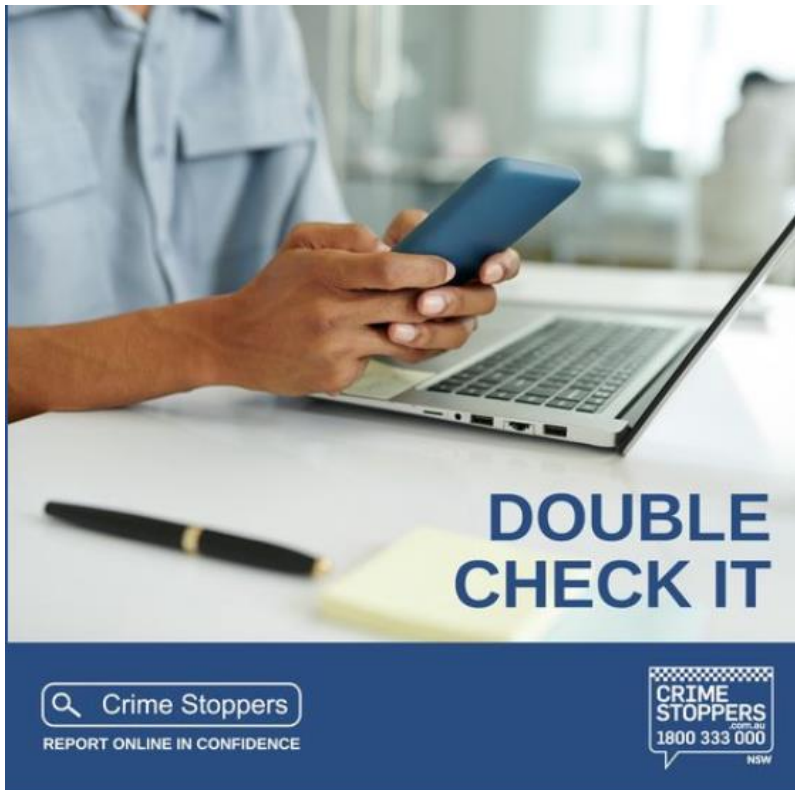

Your Bulky Waste Collection

Can't donate, reuse or recycle your large household items?
Take advantage of Council's bulky waste collection service.

HORNSBY SHIRE COUNCIL

Your two scheduled bulky waste collection dates for 2023/24 are:

19/11/23 **26/05/24**

How to present your bulky waste for collection

- **Place items on the kerbside** – the weekend before your scheduled collection week, or the day before your booked on-call collection date.
- There is a strict maximum permitted volume for bulky waste. **Three (3) cubic metres.**
- Excess quantities will not be collected from scheduled collections. Illegal dumping fines may apply.
- Additional charges apply for excess quantities presented for booked collections from houses. Suspensions apply for unpaid charges.
- Items must be stacked in a neat and tidy pile not blocking foot paths, roads or driveways.
- Items must be able to be easily lifted by two people.
- Maximum **two metre length** for any item.
- Box or bag any loose items.
- Small items should be placed in your available bins.

3 cubic metres – Houses



Accepted:

- Large household items.
- Furniture, mattresses.
- Rugs and carpet scraps. Pieces must be less than 2m in length.
- Toys and bicycles, bagged and boxed items (small items should go into your red lid bin).
- White goods (with all doors removed), household appliances.

DO NOT put oils, paints, batteries or chemicals out for bulky waste collection.

NOT Accepted:

- E-waste including TVs and computers.
- Paints, batteries, chemicals, fire extinguishers and gas bottles.
- Building material, renovation waste, dirt and rocks.
- Tyres, car parts, household hazardous waste.
- Glass and mirrors.
- Garden waste including tree trunks and stumps, vegetation.
- Bagged waste and food scraps, recycling.
- Items that are too heavy to lift for two people or longer than 2m.

The Community Recycling Centre at Thornleigh will take some of these items.

19 May, from NSW Health

NSW Health is warning the public of high-dose MDMA tablets (ecstasy) in circulation across NSW, found to contain around twice the average dose of other MDMA tablets.

The purple-grey tablets have a 'Punisher' skull design on the front.

Medical Director of the NSW Poisons Information Centre, Dr Darren Roberts, said consuming high doses of MDMA has been linked to cases of serious illness and death in NSW.

“MDMA can cause severe agitation, raised body temperature, seizures or fits, irregular heart rhythm and death,” Dr Roberts said.

“Other risks include taking MDMA in combination with other stimulants, such as amphetamines or cocaine.

“The amount of MDMA in a tablet or capsule can vary a lot, even within the same batch. The health risks from MDMA are greatly increased if high amounts (including multiple doses) are consumed over a short period.

“It is very important to remember, if you or a friend has taken drugs and feel unwell, you won't get into trouble for seeking medical care. If you or a friend feels unwell, please seek help immediately by calling Triple Zero.”

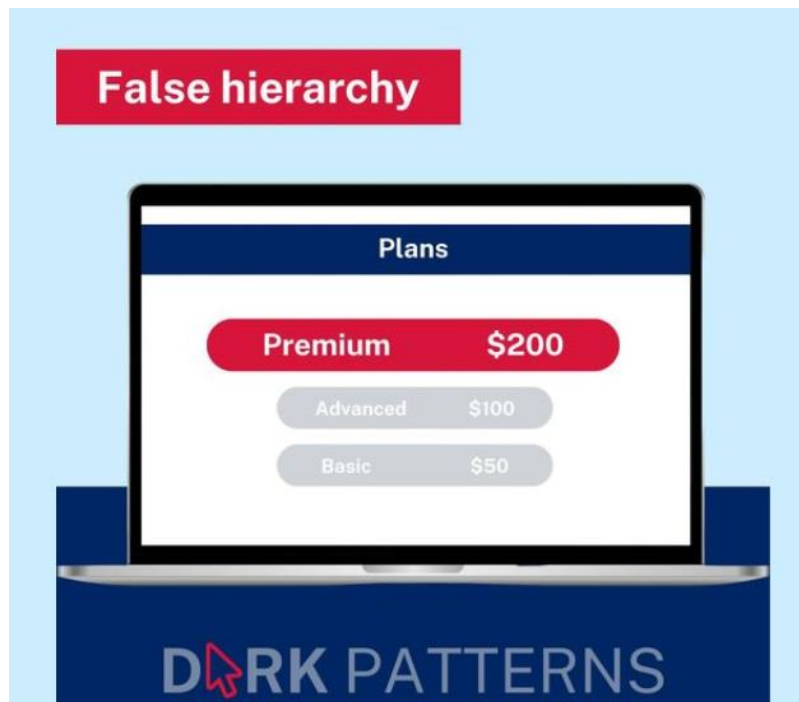

18 May, from 9news.com.au: Several products recalled from same baby brand over serious safety concerns



Several products from a baby toy and accessories brand have been recalled due to serious safety concerns.

A selection of toys and accessories from Romper & Co have been recalled, all of which were sold nationally through various sellers, and online through their website directly.

The toys that have been recalled by the Australia Competition & Consumer Commission are as follows; the wooden barbell rattle, acorn rattan rattle, wooden egg shakers, 360 teether and Wooden toy maracas.

The toys do not meet the standard size, shape and safety requirements for children up to 36 months, outlined by the ACCC.

If a part of the object becomes dislodged in a child's mouth, it can cause choking, suffocation or death, the ACCC said.

The full list of traders who sold the listed toys can be found on the ACCC's website.

Anyone who purchased the items should keep them out of children's reach and contact the brand to arrange a refund.

Romper & Co's children's bamboo pyjama set has also been recalled by the ACCC.

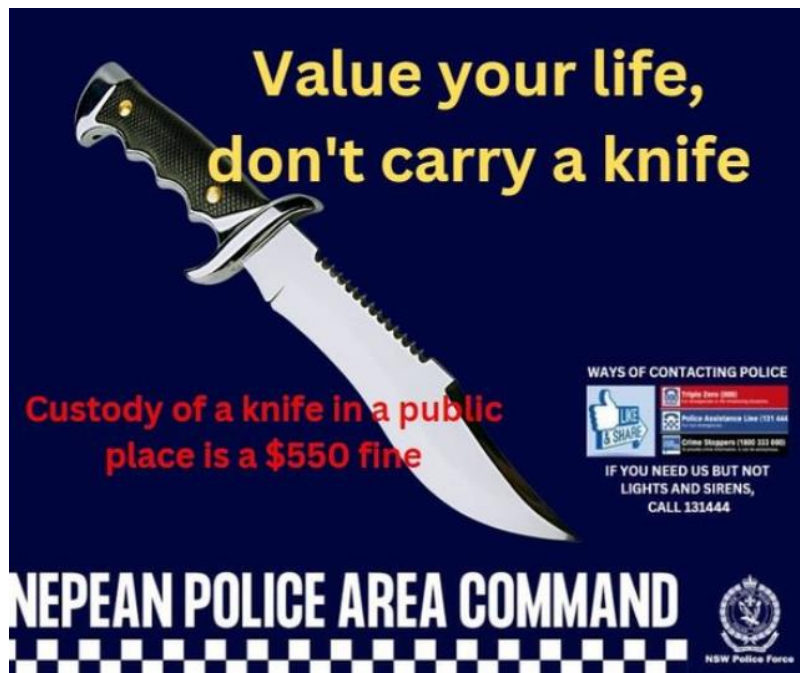

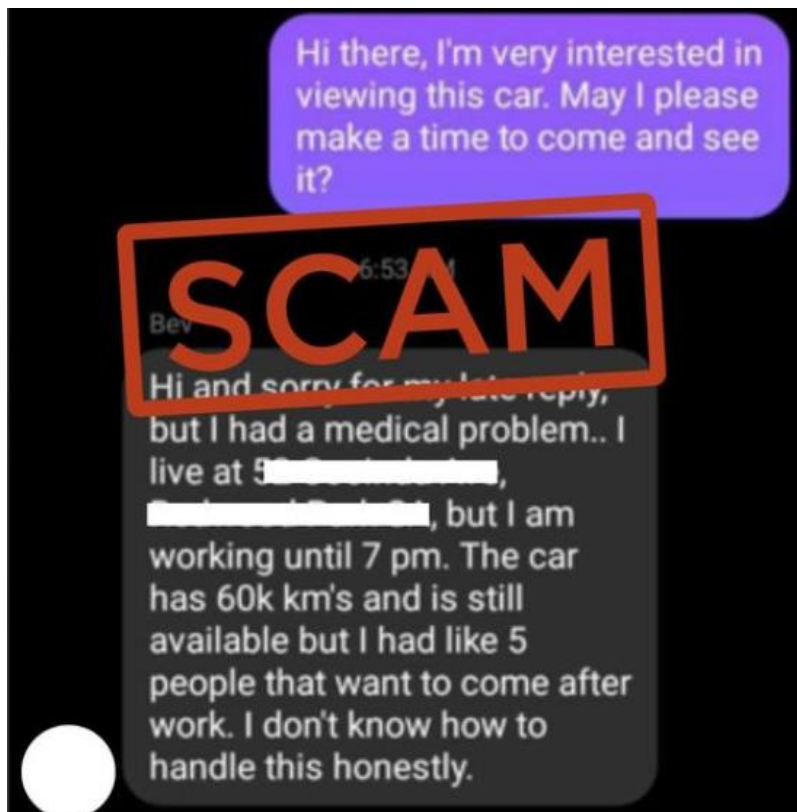

Scammers are using social media marketplaces to post fake car ads and steal deposit payments.

They create a sense of urgency by saying there's a lot of interest in the car.



They then use this to pressure you into paying a deposit to lock-in an inspection time.

Take your time and don't feel pressured to act quickly. Never transfer money before inspecting a car.

If you've transferred money or shared financial information, contact your bank immediately. Report the scam to the platform where you saw the listing.

 Scam alert  Have you received a text asking you to click on a link to stop your loyalty or reward points expiring? It's likely to be a scam. We're seeing a sharp rise in reports of shopping points and rewards-based SMS scams. These scams impersonate trusted brands that have well-known loyalty programs, including companies such as Coles, Woolworths, Optus, and Telstra. These scams try to create an urgent need for you to click on a link to redeem your points or rewards before they expire. The links then take to you a scam website that looks like the real thing and prompts you to provide your login or financial details, which the scammer then steals.

What should you do?

- Stop before you act. Scammers will always try to create a sense of urgency.
- Never click on any links or provide any personal or financial details if the sender is unknown or suspicious.
- If you need to check a message is genuine, contact the business using details you confirm yourself – for example, via an official website, bill or app.

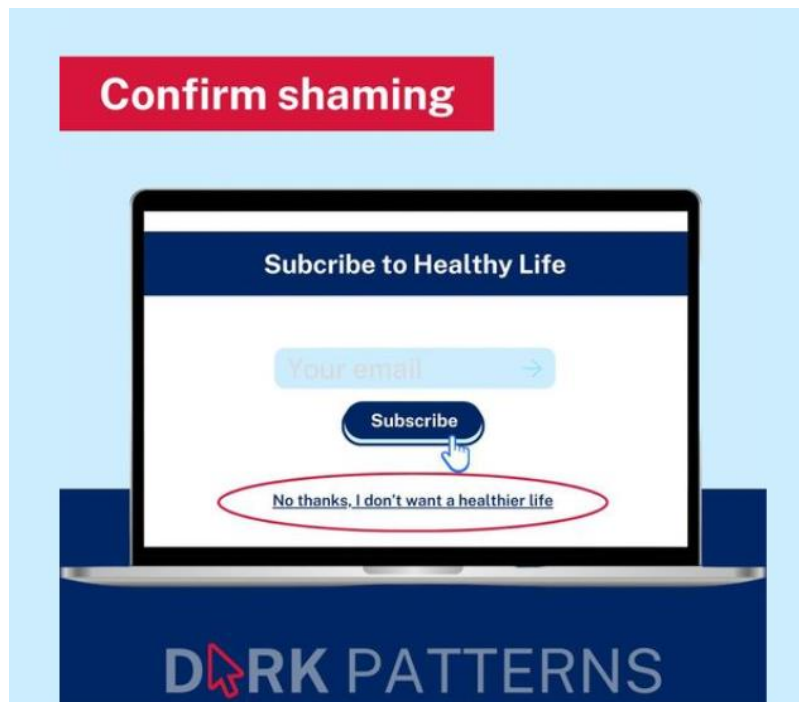

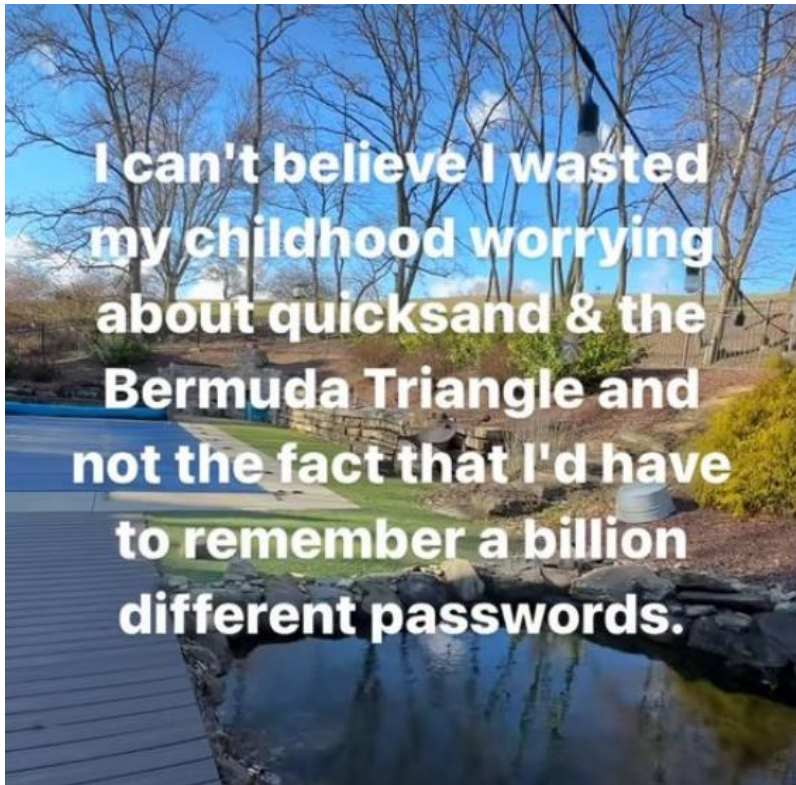
