## 09 October, from Ku-ring-gai command: Toll Ambulance crews often land in confined areas, like here on the M1 Motorway.

Before making the approach, they wait for emergency services to secure the scene and ensure the area is safe from traffic. Identifying and maintaining a safe clearance from all obstacles is crucial, while also being mindful of rotor wash, which can dislodge rocks and debris. The road's gradient must be within the aircraft's slope limits to prevent the risk of rolling, and comprehensive wire reconnaissance is completed well in advance of the landing. 

# 10 October, from Northern Beaches command: Another reminder to lock your cars and homes at night.

Thieves continue to come to the Beaches while we're sleeping, scouting our streets, driveways and homes for unlocked cars and doors.

- If you're car's not locked they'll rifle through the glove box and console to steal anything of value phones, wallets, cash, etc.
- If the back door of your home's not locked they'll sneak in, again taking anything of value.
- On the way out they'll grab keys to your car, which most of us leave near the front door, and take that, too.
- Checking each night that our cars and homes are locked can be a simple going-to-bed routine.

## 15 October, from Hornsby Shire Council: Temporary closure of the Parsley Bay boat ramp, Brooklyn.

The Australian Government High Speed Rail Authority will temporarily close Parsley Bay boat ramp to set up for marine geotechnical investigations in Hawkesbury River on:

- 22 and 23 October 2024, 7am 6pm
- 24 November 2024, 7am 6pm

During this time, please use the alternate boat ramp at Deerubbun Reserve, Mooney Mooney.

Other information to note: Some parking will be temporarily removed on George Street during work hours. Alternative parking is available in the boat ramp carpark. Pedestrian access is

still available for public bathrooms, Parsley Bay wharf and moorings. The public walkway around Lookout Bay will be temporarily closed at Parsley Bay boat ramp. Traffic control will be in place for the safety of workers, road users and pedestrians.

15 October, from NSW Fair Trading: Beware! Online clothing retailers are popping up with Australian locations in their name, leading consumers to believe they are purchasing from an Australian company, but they are based overseas.

Consumers are finding it difficult to return products back to these businesses and getting a resolution when issues come up. Here are our tips:

- Be thorough before making a purchase check the website for references to overseas locations and which countries laws the business adheres too. Note that this may be in their terms and conditions, or other policies on their website.
- Check their returns and refunds policies where and how do you send products back?
- Have a look at online reviews see what other customers have experienced.
- Be aware that if you purchase from an overseas business there may be difficulties in receiving a refund, replacement, repair or receiving the benefits of a warranty.
- If you're unsure, don't buy. Play it safe and shop elsewhere.

In late July, a 2m high bronze honour roll commemorating local WW1 veterans was stolen

from the entrance gate to Turramurra Memorial Park. Unfortunately, the stolen honour roll has not been recovered.

Council has commissioned a replacement and today representatives of Council's contracted sign company will be spending time at the entrance gate, including closely examining, and potentially temporarily removing elements of, the remaining right side honour roll. By doing this, the sign company will be able to closely replicate the existing honour roll, when preparing the new honour roll.

We will continue to keep the community up-to-date on progress preparing this new honour roll.

#### 09 October, from NSW Fair Trading: Sudden death risk

Babies that sleep in a position that is inclined, propped, curved, or restrained could be at risk. New product standards have been introduced for all infant sleep products and inclined non-sleep products to keep your baby safe. The standards aim to reduce the risk of suffocation and strangulation and apply to the design, construction, performance, and testing of products like rockers, bassinets and cots.




09 October, from NSW Road Safety: MR Quiz time!

The correct answer is A) for motorcyclists on their full licence Unrestricted riders can lane filter between vehicles in traffic stopped side by side at intersections when it is safe to do so and the speed travelled by the motorcycle is 30km/h or less

### 09 October, from NSW Maritime: F Calling all parents!

Are your kids using a PWC (Personal Watercraft)? A few things to remind them this boating season. If they are under 16 and have a PWC licence, they must not:

- Sprive faster than 20 knots
- Solution Drive faster than 10 knots unless there's a person aged 16 or over on board
- who has a PWC licence
- Solution
   Drive faster than 10 knots while towing a person
- Solution
   Drive at night (between sunset and sunrise) this rule applies to PWC drivers of all ages

09 October, from Riverstone command: How far can you legally drive in reverse?



**Answer:** only as far as is reasonable in the circumstances. **NSW Road User Handbook (click here):** "When reversing -

Pedestrians, particularly children, are at greater risk when vehicles are reversing. This is because the driver cannot see them as well. Take extra care when you're reversing, particularly when you're entering or leaving a driveway. Only reverse for the distance that's necessary."

09 October, from The Hills command: At 2pm on Monday, 7th October 2024, The Hills Highway Patrol were conducting a northbound patrol on Old Northern Road, Dural, near Wyoming Road.

Officers observed a silver Mitsubishi Mirage, closely following their fully marked highway patrol vehicle.

Despite police activating their lights and sirens and veering to the left, the driver continued north on Old Northern Road. Police followed the vehicle, eventually causing it to stop on Old Northern Road, Dural.

Upon approaching the vehicle, police identified the driver, a 32-year-old woman, as the sole occupant. A roadside breath test returned a VERY positive result. An open bottle of white wine was found in the passenger footwell.

The driver was arrested and transported to Castle Hill Police Station for a breath analysis. The driver allegedly exhibited signs of intoxication. The driver failed to provide a sufficient breath sample for analysis after three attempts. Her licence was immediately suspended, and she was issued a Court Attendance Notice to appear at Parramatta Local Court on 21st November 2024 for the offence of failing to submit to a breath analysis.

At Law - fail to submit to breath analysis is deemed to be the same as High Range Drink Driving.

### 1 October, from Ku-ring-gai Council: \$100,000 grant program to fight violence against women

Ku-ring-gai community organisations have been invited to apply for part of \$100,000 in new funding to help tackle the rising problem of domestic and family violence against women.

Ku-ring-gai Council has set aside this grant funding as part of its Prevention of Violence Against Women Action Plan, which was endorsed at Council's August 2024 meeting.

Statistics show that violence against women is increasing with:

- 15 adult women across NSW tragically murdered through domestic violence in 2023/24, up from 13 in 2022/23
- Recorded domestic violence assaults across NSW increasing by 6.5 per cent in 2023/24, compared to 2022/23
- The number of recorded domestic violence-related assault incidents in the Ku-ring-gai council area rising from 79 in 2014/15 to 146 in 2023/24, a jump of 85 per cent
- One in four Australian women (27 per cent) estimated to have experienced violence by an intimate partner or family member since the age of 15 years

From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Pedestrians' (Traditional Chinese):

**Tip #5.** 盡可能使用行人跨越道。避免從停放的汽車之間,公車或大型車輛的前後方穿越。不要任意穿越馬路,如果要穿越十字路口,請用跨越道或十字路口。

**Tip #9.** 作為孩童的榜樣,不要任意穿過馬路。保持行走的速度,助於避免絆倒或摔倒,並且這還可以讓駕駛者預測你的行走路線。

**Tip #13.** 尊重孩童穿越號誌,有時義工導護爸爸或媽媽會舉此號誌。特別注意車後的小腳(孩童的腳)在汽車下面、滾動的球、背過重且不平衡的背包等。孩童難以看清,並無法預測。8 歲以下孩童穿越道路或在停車場時,應抓緊父母的手。另見http://www.kidsafensw.org/road-safety/pedestrian-safety/

Tip #14. 如果行人圍欄用於疏導行人路線,請不要攀越行人圍欄。

Tip #16. 直接跨過路口,而不是斜著走。直線更短更快,並且能讓駕駛者預測你跨越的路線。
