27 October, from NSW Police: Emergency services are at the scene of a multi-vehicle crash in Wyong today.

Just after 1.30pm (Sunday 27 October 2024), emergency services were called to Pacific Motorway, Wyong, following reports a woman had been hit by a car in the northbound lanes. Shortly prior, four vehicles – a Mazda Cx5, Honda Odyssey, Hyundai Kona and a truck – collided in the southbound lanes. Officers from Tuggerah Lakes Police District attended and have established a crime scene.

The woman died at the scene. She is yet to be formally identified; however, her death is not being treated as suspicious. One woman – who was in one of the four vehicles which had collided in the southbound lanes – was taken to Gosford Hospital for treatment to minor injuries. The other drivers and passengers of the four vehicles were uninjured and treated at the scene for shock.

All northbound and southbound lanes of the Pacific Motorway remain closed and traffic diversions are in place. Motorists are urged to avoid the area and check www.livetraffic.com for updates. A report will be prepared for the Coroner.

27 October, from NSW Police: Reappeal to locate man missing from Tuggerah Lakes

Shane, aged 20, was last seen at a fast food restaurant in Tuggerah about 7pm on Tuesday 10 September 2024. Shane was last seen wearing a black hooded jumper and black pants. He is possibly wearing a nose ring. Shane could be driving a blue Mitsubishi Lancer sedan bearing NSW registration 'CN04WK'. He is known to frequent Wyong and Central Coast.

If you have genuine concerns for the safety and well-being of a person and are unsure of their whereabouts, you MUST attend your local Police Station to make a Missing Persons report.

29 October, from Nepean command: BICYCLES AND ROUNDABOUTS


Look out for bicycles on a roundabout. They are entitled to use a full lane. Bicycle riders must follow the same rules as other drivers on roundabouts. However, on a multi-lane roundabout, they can use the left lane to turn right. When turning, they must give way to vehicles leaving the roundabout. Look out for bicycles stopped in the left lane who are giving way to vehicles leaving the roundabout 🚲

Common Halloween products can pose serious safety risks. Here are our top 3 safety tricks for a happy Halloween.

🧛 **Button batteries are the hidden ghouls in Halloween gear**

Often used in jack-o-lanterns, cauldrons, fake candles, torches, wands and even some costumes, button batteries are a choking hazard and can cause internal burns or even death when ingested. Check battery compartments are secured with a screw and keep batteries out of reach.

GET READY FOR BUSH FIRE PREPARE YOUR PETS AND ANIMALS

Planning for pets and animals is an important part of your household's bush fire preparations. Safety for your pets and animals is your responsibility. Being prepared is essential to you and your animal's survival.

EMERGENCY SURVIVAL ITEMS

- ☐ **Food:** At least three days' worth of non-perishable food (canned or dried) in an airtight, waterproof container
- ☐ **Water:** At least three days' worth of water
- ☐ **Medicines:** Store in a waterproof container, as well as any special dietary needs or supplements
- ☐ **Veterinary/Medical Records:** Store copies of any medical and vaccination records in a watertight container including your vet's name and telephone number
- ☐ **First Aid Kit:** Store extra cotton bandage rolls, bandage tapes, scissors, tweezers and latex gloves in addition to those required for yourself
- ☐ **Blanket/Bedding:** Familiar items like a favourite blanket or toys can help reduce stress
- ☐ **Sanitation:** Useful items include newspapers, paper towels, plastic bags, gloves and household bleach (to dilute) to clean

IDENTIFICATION

- ☐ **Collar or tag:** Ensure that your animal's name, your name, phone number and, if there is room, your address are clearly visible
- ☐ **Register and microchip:** Ensure your animal is registered and their microchip details are current
- ☐ **Photograph:** Store a current photograph of your animal in a waterproof container, including notes on: distinguishing features, name, sex, age, colour and breed. Also include a photograph of you and your animal together as this helps prove ownership
- ☐ **Back up:** Save microchip details, medical and veterinary details, key contact details and all photographs electronically

EQUIPMENT

- ☐ **Sturdy lead, harness or muzzle:** plus any other equipment that will help control your animal

Evacuation Centres may not accept pets and larger animals inside due to health and safety regulations and consideration of other people. Guide and disability support dogs are accepted.

Plan to take your animals to a suitable friend or family member's house in a safer location.

- ☐ **Cages or carrier:** This is to transport your animal safely and ensure they cannot escape. Ensure it is large enough to enable them to stand, turn and lie down.

IF YOU ARE EVACUATED

Include animals in your planning and take early action to protect or relocate them to appropriate premises.

Helpful hints



Go online to watch our instructional videos showing how to build these two wildlife friendly structures, and more...

- Choose a smaller variety of fruit tree that is easy to protect, prune and harvest
- Use a supporting frame to protect the tree from the weight of the net, and prevent birds pecking fruit through the net
- Consider how you will access your fruit inside the net, Fruit Saver nets have an access flap for this
- The base of the net should be secured to the trunk of the tree or to the ground to prevent wildlife getting inside
- Remove nets promptly after fruiting to prevent damage to new growth
- Check your nets regularly. If an animal is caught visit www.fauna.org.au to find a wildlife carer in your area.



These densely woven nets protect your fruit and prevent entanglement of wildlife

Leading the way

Some hardware stores in Australia have taken the lead and stopped selling netting that is potentially harmful to wildlife. Ask your local supplier to stock only fruit tree netting that passes the 'finger test' - netting that you cannot poke your finger through.

Harvesting with no net loss

Fatal attraction

Native animals, increasingly displaced from their natural habitat by tree clearing and extreme weather, are resorting to flowering and fruiting trees in our gardens.

Tree netting is a popular way to protect fruit from wildlife, particularly in urban areas, but the wrong type of netting can be deadly. Hungry animals are easily caught in 'bird netting', which has a mesh size greater than 1cm square.

The rescue statistics show that most animals die with horrific injuries or require long term care before release.



This is the wrong type of netting - you can easily poke your finger through. It fails the 'finger test'.

Tragic tangles

Birds, bats, lizards, snakes and the occasional possum are the main victims of inappropriate netting. Animals become tangled in large mesh netting and cannot free themselves. While struggling to escape, the net cuts ever deeper into the animal.

Net disposal

Like ghostnets in the ocean, unwanted netting can continue to maim and kill. Ensure that discarded netting cannot become a hazard to wildlife.



Tree netting guide

2 ways to protect your backyard fruit and wildlife

1. Protecting individual fruit.

Search online for 'fruit protection bags', look for Green Harvest and The Native Shop for a range of bags and sleeves. Plastic garden pots can also be useful.

2. Protecting the whole tree.

We recommend a densely woven net that will not trap wildlife and doesn't need a frame, such as the Fruit Saver nets, Hail Guard or Vege Net. These nets are all white - the colour best seen by animals at night. Go to our website for videos about these nets and other ideas.

The right netting

Our 'finger test' - choose netting that you cannot poke your finger through.

For smaller trees up to 13m in circumference, we recommend Fruit Saver nets, available in 2 sizes.

For larger trees, buy Hail Guard off the roll from Fernland Agencies www.fernland.com.au and Vege Net in 2 sizes from www.greenharvest.com.au.

Fruit Saver Fruit Tree Nets

This fitted box-shaped net has a long skirt that gathers around the trunk of the tree.

The 2mm woven mesh excludes fruit fly and codling moth as well as birds, bats and possums. It has only a 15% shade factor and is currently best bought online at: www.fruitreenets.info

From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips to Protect your Identity' (Traditional Chinese): 20 個實用預防犯罪技巧：身分安全

Tip #1. 考慮使用第三方支付系統進行網路交易，例如 PayPal，以避免輸入信用卡信息。考慮用另一張信用 額度較低的信用卡，專門用於網路購買或海外使用。

Tip #2. 當你訂閱或線上註冊時，請使用虛擬出生日期。它是必須在固定的範圍，但它不是按照實際出生日期。例如，使用 01/ 01 /出生年份 - 保持年齡人口統計不變，但身份安全。

Tip #3. 在所有電子設備上，設定輸入強安全性的密碼 - （按強度順序）使用複雜密碼、PIN碼或圖形密碼。或考慮使用臉部或指紋識別（兩者都有很強的安全性）。請注意，最簡單的方法可能不是最安全的（讀取最懶惰的） - 你的手機包

含大量個人訊息，例如：家庭和電子郵件的敏感數據。考慮在電子設備或帳戶上使用「雙重身份驗證」。對於所有觸摸銀幕的設備，定期清潔銀幕上的指紋或標記。

Tip #17. 請注意，社群媒體可以設定上傳照片，標識拍攝地點的「地理位置」訊息，請考慮更改社群媒體設置，刪除此設定。並考慮是否要避免在社群媒體上進行「簽到」，讓不肖人士知道你去過哪裡，或喜歡去哪裡。
