With hot weather occurring today and forecast over this next week, please don't leave your children or pets in a locked vehicle.

15 MINUTES IS ALL IT TAKES!!!

It can take a mere 15 minutes for the body temperature to reach a lethal state.

30.4 DEGREES TO 31.6 DEGREES IN 1.5 MINUTES

(Average outside temperature at 31.6 degrees)

30.4 DEGREES TO 40.5 DEGREES IN 8 MINUTES

(Heatstroke occurs when the body's temperature exceeds 40 degrees)

30.4 DEGREES TO 45 DEGREES IN 15 MINUTES

(Core body temperature of 41.7 degrees is considered lethal)

Some electric motorised bicycles known as 'e-bikes' are LEGAL to ride in public in NSW if they comply with certain CONDITIONS.



There are only two types of permitted e-bikes:

- · Power-assisted pedal cycles
- Electric power-assisted cycles

BUT they must be designed to be propelled primarily by the rider. They cannot be propelled exclusively by the motor and cannot exceed 25km/h.

Bicycles powered by electric motors are intended only to assist when riding uphill or into a headwind, NOT to be the primary source of propulsion.

Electric powered bicycles which don't comply with these conditions cannot be ridden on roads, or road related areas (such as footpaths shared paths and cycleways) in NSW, except on private land.

Anyone caught riding an illegal electric powered bicycle on a road or road-related area in NSW can face fines starting from \$723

There has been an increase in incidents relating to E-bikes committing offences within the command. It is an increasing issue across the state and a good opportunity for us to reiterate rules that relate. Incorrect use of E-bikes poses a safety risk to pedestrians, and the riders themselves. Please see the attached flyer for reference. In addition to the flyer, the normal rules for bicycle riders still apply for E-bikes.

The main issue we are seeing is the use of E-bikes on footpaths. It is an offence to ride any bike on footpaths unless you are under 16 years old, or you are supervising a child under 16 years who is also riding a bike.

25 November, from 9news.com.au: One-in-10 NSW drivers test positive for illegal drugs as calls for crackdown grow

One-in-10 drivers who were pulled over for a random drug test in <u>New South Wales</u> tested positive in the last 12 months, according to a new report by the NRMA.

The "Driving High" report calls on the state government to increase roadside drug testing to 200,000 tests a year - up from 160,000 in 2023.

The report also found that drug driving is now the second-leading cause of road deaths in NSW, above fatigue, drink driving, and not using seatbelts.

25 November, from NSW RFS Ku-ring-gai Brigade: ♣INCIDENT CALL - NORTH TURRAMURRA ♣

Yesterday evening after finishing up training for the day NSW RFS Ku-ring-gai Brigade along with Killara Rural Fire Brigade and Hornsby Rural Fire Brigade were called to assist a bushwalker who had become lost while walking near the Murrua and Gibberagong trails in North Turramurra with limited water, low phone battery, and nighfall approaching. Alongside Kuring Gai Police Area Command, NSW Ambulance, NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service, and with the the assistance of PolAir - NSW Police Force Aviation Command our crews successfully located the walker approximately 50m from the track in steep, dense bushland.

Thanks to the walkers use of the Emergency+ App they were able to provide an accurate location to 000 operators, and by remaining in a safe spot after becoming lost and not continuing to move the walker was safely back at their car within 90min of calling 000, avoiding what could have easily become a

multi-day search.



24 November, from NSW Health

NSW Health is warning of the danger of using drugs thought to be cocaine, which have resulted in five recent heroin overdoses.

Medical Director of the NSW Poisons Information Centre, Dr Darren Roberts, said all five people were hospitalised after the use of substances they thought to be cocaine, with two of the patients requiring treatment in an intensive care unit.

"A heroin overdose could quickly result from a single line," Dr Roberts said. "It is important that people recognise the signs of a heroin overdose early and know how to respond. Opioids such as heroin can cause pin-point pupils, drowsiness, loss of consciousness, slowed breathing/snoring and skin turning blue/grey and can be life-threatening.

"One of the dangers of illicit drug supply is the contents and strength of the substance you are getting is unknown and can be inconsistent.

"Opioids such as heroin can be sold as or found in cocaine, methamphetamine, and MDMA (ecstasy). You cannot always tell the difference between these drugs by appearance.

"In light of this detection, people who use drugs such as cocaine, methamphetamine, MDMA or opioids should carry naloxone."

If you witness someone experiencing any unexpected symptoms after using drugs, you should call Triple Zero (000) immediately or seek urgent medical attention. Naloxone should be given immediately if available.

Naloxone is an important life-saving medication that reverses the effects of opioids. It does not require a prescription and is free for anyone at risk of opioid overdose in NSW.

It is available as an easy to use nasal spray or injection from some pharmacies and other health services. 
24 November, from abc.net.au: Louise Manning's Facebook account was taken over by a scammer — and it all started with a simple text message



The NSW Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research (BOCSAR) has released the latest Coercive Control Monitoring Report. This report describes the operation of this legislative reform in its first three months from July to September 2024.

The quarterly report includes statistics on coercive control incidents recorded by NSW Police, including the nature of controlling behaviours, location of incidents, co-occurring offences and demographic information on the victims and alleged offenders. It also includes statistics on legal actions taken by NSW Police to date. The report shows that:

Between 1 July – 30 September 2024, 76 incidents of coercive control were recorded by NSW Police

Of these incidents, two had charges laid for coercive control, and further 28 had charges laid for other DFV offences, but not coercive control

Of the 76 coercive control incidents recorded, 70 (92%) involved a female victim and a male alleged offender.

21 November, from NSW Police Force

About 7.10pm yesterday (Wednesday 20 November 2024), officers from Mt Druitt Police Area Command were conducting a general patrol of the Bidwill area where it will be alleged they observed a male slumped over the steering wheel of a vehicle parked at the intersection of Chestnut Crescent and Luxford Road.

As officers approached the vehicle it drove from the location.

Police indicated for the vehicle to stop and when it failed to do so a pursuit was initiated.

The vehicle was pursued into the North Connex Tunnel, Wahroonga, where it was terminated for safety reasons.

With the assistance of PolAir the vehicle was tracked along the M1 where road spikes were successfully deployed about 500m south of Sparks Road,

Warnervale, causing the vehicle to come to a stop approximately one hour after the pursuit had commenced.

The 24-year-old male driver and sole occupant was arrested and taken to Wyong Police Station.

Police will allege that speeds of up to 160kph were reached.

The man has been refused bail to appear at Wyong Local Court later today (Thursday 21 November 2024).

21 November, from The Hills Police Area Command



Early this morning, 4am 20/11/24 Hills Police responded to a report of suspicious activity at a residence on Davey Rd, Dural. Officers arrived to find two vehicles with engines running and headlights on.

As police attempted to block the vehicles, one accelerated towards the police cars, narrowly avoiding a collision, and then sped away, followed by the second vehicle.

A pursuit ensued, during which one vehicle reversed into a police car before speeding off at high speed. The chase continued onto Derriwong Rd and then onto Old Northern Rd. For safety reasons, the pursuit was terminated on New Line Rd. Anyone with information about this incident is asked to Contact Crime Stoppers on 1800333000.

20 November, from Hornsby/Ku-ring-gai Rural Fire Service

Support Station is a giant workshop this week as Mobile Data Terminals (MDTs) are installed in every operational response vehicle across the District. MDTs allow incident alerts and response status, mapping and navigation, accessing pre-incident plans and incident data, reports and orders, and fireground management processes, to all take place instantly online. What previously required radio calls, provision of paper documents, and laborious manual processes should now become much faster and more streamlined. This will include vastly improved situational awareness for all crews at incidents as well as fireground managers, which has been proven to enhance efficiency and safety for firefighters. Training in MDT use for Brigades commenced last weekend.

Installations are already ahead of schedule, and will be completed next week, before the systems go live in early December. Thanks to all Brigades for ensuring that their vehicles are dropped off at allocated times, allowing the program to progress well.





Quick update and a lesson for us All

Firstly, we'd like to sincerely thank everyone for your kind wishes and support during this difficult time. A quick update: both our daughter and our little dog are undergoing surgery today for the injuries they sustained in the yesterdays dog attack at Helvetia Avenue. We are hoping for the best and are grateful for the care they are receiving.

We also wanted to share something important for the benefit of our community. During our discussion with Phil, the investigator from Hornsby Council, he asked us why we hadn't reported prior aggressive behavior we had observed in the attacking dog. It was a hard lesson for us to learn.

We realized that reporting aggressive dogs or incidents early can make a significant difference (hopefully). To prevent something like this from happening to others, we urge everyone to take action if they observe aggressive behavior in any dog or experience a dog-related incident.

You can report such concerns directly to the Hornsby Council by emailing dogs@hornsby.gov.au. Address your email to Phil, and provide as much detail as possible.

Let's work together to ensure the safety of our loved ones and pets. These situations are not easy to deal with, and prevention is always better than facing the aftermath.

20 November, from the Australian Signals Directorate: Don't fall for scams in two steps

First, check if it is a scam

Know what to look for. View common types of scams such as dating scams, investment scams, phishing emails and text, or invoice fraud:

Go direct to a source you can trust. Visit the official website, log in to your account, or call their phone number. Don't use the links or contact details in the message or given to you on the phone.

Check what the official source says about what details they might request from you. Often companies or government agencies will say what they will and will not ask you online or over the phone. For example, the bank may tell you that they will never ask for your password. If someone claiming to be from the bank then asks you for your password, you know it is likely a scam.

Then, if you still think it's a scam

Don't click on links, open any attachments or reply to requests. Scam messages may try and trick you into giving out your personal information. A

scammer might ask for your bank account details, passwords or credit card numbers. They may also ask you to download files, software, or allow remote access to your computer.

Contact your bank. Contact your financial institution if you think your credit cards or bank account may be at risk. They may be able to close your account or stop a transaction.
