30 December, from Ku-ring-gai command: Police are seeking the identity of the below females who they believe may be able to assist them with enquiries in relation to a stealing incident at Hornsby Westfields on the 30th of November 2024.

Female 1 is described as Caucasian in appearance, approximately 30 years of age, slim build with long black hair, wearing a black long sleeve shirt and black tights. 31 December, from NSW Police: Heading in to the city for New Year's Eve? Here's what you need to know:

- With significant road closures and special event clearway parking restrictions in effect across the city, access to car parks and street parking is limited.

 Attendees should leave the car at home and catch public transport instead.
- From 3pm until midnight, trains will not stop at Circular Quay Station. Event goers heading to the harbour will need to catch transport to Wynyard, Town Hall or Martin Place and continue on foot.
- Metro stations in the city are located at Barangaroo, Martin Place, Gadigal (near Town Hall) and Central. Services will run every 10 minutes then every 4 minutes from midday through until 2am on New Year's Day then every 5-10 minutes.
- Thousands of extra buses will run on major routes from 3pm on New Year's Eve, with more services from 8pm and after midnight fireworks, running until 3am.

 Remember, buses will be affected by road closures so you may need to walk further than normal to reach your chosen vantage point.
- Ferries fill up fast, with some stopping early for events on Sydney Harbour. Limited services run after midnight, so have a backup transport plan ready.
- Demand for taxis will high be on New Year's Eve, so please be patient while in queues at taxi ranks. Taxi ranks within the road closure area around the harbour will not be accessible.
- There are no designated rideshare pick up or drop off points in the city. We strongly encourage all rideshare users to coordinate a pick up location well outside of the city road closures.

I have been a long time resident of East Lindfield and regularly walk the twin creeks track . Recently and for the very first time I saw a Lyrebird near the track . As you may know, the lyrebird is the symbol of East Lindfield primary school and the NPWS and was once

prolific in this area. The urbanisation of the area plus introduction of domestic animals and foxes have reduced their numbers to near extinction. The twin creeks track within the NP has numerous signs prohibiting dogs in the NP

Despite these signs it appears that people either through ignorance or sense of entitlement totally ignore these signs and walk their dogs in the park - mostly unleashed!! We live in a beautiful part of Sydney and it is a shame that our local wildlife is diminishing from the careless attitude of our residents

Signs prohibiting dogs in NPs are for a reason- domestic animals and wildlife are not compatible in NPs

I feel compelled to post these comments after reading a story in today's SMH about a lady called Julie Keating who has devoted her life to protection of bird life from domestic animals in Maianbar on the southern side of the Port Hacking river adjoining the royal NP - her attitude and work is something that the residents and visitors to the East Lindfield area should consider when enjoying our natural beauty and wildlife.

29 December, from Galston, Glenorie & Hills Rural Community: Hornsby Shire Council's newly elected Mayor, Warren Waddell, has issued a call to arms to Council and the community to tackle the problem of graffiti in the Shire's town centres, villages and transport routes.

In a special Mayoral Minute brought to his first Council meeting as Mayor, Mayor Waddell requested Council prepare a report outlining options for a Shire wide strategy with a strong focus on community involvement in preventing unwanted graffiti and its removal from private property. "Graffiti is becoming an increasingly pressing issue in almost every area of Hornsby, particularly along major roads, town centres, public spaces, and community facilities....

29 December, from Australian Signals Directorate: New device checklist:

- Turned it on
- Set it up
- X Secured it against cybercriminals?

These tips can help protect your information from common cyber security threats. How many can you tick off?

- Set a strong PIN, passhrase or biometrics to lock your device
- Set up automatic backups
- Check automatic updates are on and install updates as soon as possible
- · Check antivirus is installed and working
- Avoid using free or public Wi-Fi
- Only install reputable software
- Turn off Bluetooth and Wi-Fi when you are not using them
- Reset old devices before selling or getting rid of them

28 December, from Transport Accident Report - Australia Wide: We've all blocked a number after receiving an unwanted text or call, but if you see +61 444 444 444 pop up on your phone, it is important you do not block this one.

This phone number is linked to Emergency Alert, a national telephone warning system used by emergency services across the country to send voice messages to landlines and text messages to mobiles within a specific area to warn people about current emergencies. Emergency Alert is not used in all situations, so it's important to rely on more than just one source of emergency information.



26 December, from NHW Turramurra: We received a message today from a resident:

My beautiful Japanese Maple tree in a pot was stolen from my front yard in Konda Place, Turramurra between Christmas Eve night and early morning 26 December. I was too upset to go ask neighbours about cctv. Will ask tomorrow.

26 December, from Australian Federal Police: Don't let a fake deal knock you out this Boxing Day

The AFP are urging consumers to take the time to check their online safety shopping checklist.

Add this to your cart:

 Always use a secure payment platform which has customer protection, such as PayPal or credit cards;

- Avoid requests for direct bank transfers or payments through gift cards or cryptocurrency;
- Search directly for the official website of the organisation don't rely on ads or the top search results;
- Look for a website address that starts with 'https' and features a closed padlock symbol;
- Research the seller and look for customer reviews on independent websites;
- Avoid websites which don't have any terms and conditions, ABN or privacy policy; and
- Be cautious of emails or messages from retailers that ask you to click on links to verify your order. Legitimate companies will not request this.

If you believe you are the victim of a cybercrime, you should notify your financial institution and report it to police immediately via ReportCyber at www.cyber.gov.au.

Just an update - went by today on the off-chance my kayak had been returned (it hadn't so and noticed all watercraft now have a new sticker. So another month (23 Jan) before they are disposed of.

Council are clearing kayaks from the foreshore around Echo point park beach in Roseville

Chase. A notice was put up giving 8 weeks notice warning they would be confiscated. Council has not yet done so - the 8 weeks was yesterday.

To be fair, most look like they've been unused for years, but sadly my kayak, which I used regularly, I found had been stolen when I went to remove it today. It was there last week. No other kayaks have been removed. I appreciate this is a risk I took leaving it in a public place, but it's still disappointing someone would deliberately cut the lock and steal it. To give the benefit of the doubt, maybe they took it because they thought council was going to confiscate it anyway, so if you took it - I'd really love to have it back - to store at home. It's hard to miss - it's pink.

It is a pity there is no official kayak storage in the area, as the stairs make it impractical to carry a kayak down for a paddle. I would happily pay a fee. As a leash free area, it's a rare opportunity to be able to take my dog out with me as well.

From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Frequently Asked Questions #13 HOW SHOULD I REPORT HOONS?

- 1. If you hear a car being driven in a reckless manner and are able to see the incident, it is helpful if you can obtain any details at all.
- 2. AT THE TIME OF THE INCIDENT, call triple zero '000', or the Police Assistance Line (PAL), or report it to the local police station and ask for advice see phone numbers below.
- 3. Record all incidents and those details listed below.
- 4. Possibly take a photo or make video if this can be done safely never place yourself in danger or at risk when trying to gather evidence.
- 5. Consider installing quality CCTV at your residence and/or dash cam in your vehicle for recordings that can act as proof.
- 6. Talk with your neighbours. See if you can band together, help get the hoon details, support one another.
- 7. Phone Crime Stoppers NSW 1800 333 000 with all collated information. All calls are

treated confidentially.
