11 January, from Ku-ring-gai command: Police are seeking the identity of the below male who they believe may be able to assist them with enquiries in relation to an assault that occurred on the train at Gordon Train Station on Wednesday the 18th of December 2024.

The male is described to have a dark olive complexion, about 20 years of age with short bleached hair wearing all black clothing and black shoes.

10 January, from Ku-ring-gai command: There is an increase in the number of scams reported in Australia in regard to the 'Chinese blessing scam', or 'ghost scam'.

The financial scam is based on psychological manipulation where the scammer preys on the victim's superstitions. This video has been released in relation to this scam with a message from the Commander of Auburn Police Area Command.




10 January, from Ku-ring-gai command: About 9.30pm on the 3rd of January 2025, officers attached to Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command responded to calls received by the public, in response to a man attempting to break into a property with a crow bar in Killara.

Police attended the scene and located a man in a vehicle nearby attempting to leave the scene. The driver was subsequently stopped and searched where police found a crowbar, a chisel, a black surgical mask, black gloves and a hydraulic separator tool. Police also found an Australian Disability Parking permit and Mobility Scheme card in the name of an unknown person. The man was arrested, charged with break & enter dwelling-house, possess housebreaking implements, goods in custody suspected being stolen, and was refused bail. The man will face Hornsby Local Court later this month.



14 January, from NSW Road Safety: If you know the rules around merging, please eMerge for this question... which car must give way?



Answer: The correct answer is that Car B (yellow) must give way to vehicle A (white) When you're travelling on a road where the number of lanes or lines of traffic is reduced and there are no longer any road markings, you must give way to the vehicle that's ahead of you. This is called a zipper merge

Make sure you know the rules here.

14 January, from ACCC Product Safety: If your kids are playing with ferrite magnetic fidget stones from The Aussie Magnet Co, stop use immediately: they have been recalled.

Small high powered magnets are banned. If swallowed by kids, they can cause serious internal injuries or death. Magnets can stick together in the child's intestine or digestive tissue.

12 January, from NSW Road Safety: ⁵ Let's bust the myth that you only need to give way to vehicles on your right at the roundabout

The rule is actually that you need to give way to any vehicle already in the roundabout, whether they're entering on your right, left or directly opposite you entering to know this and be aware of all vehicles in the roundabout before entering to avoid a crash

11 January, from Hornsby Shire Council: 4 Yesterday at North Epping our contractor's waste truck caught fire whilst collecting bulky waste.

Thanks to swift action by the driver, the truck was unloaded on the street at North Epping, Fire and Rescue NSW attended to extinguish the fire. Fortunately, nobody was injured. Thank you to local firefighters for prompt handling of the situation. It is believed that the fire was sparked by a battery disposed of incorrectly in a bulky waste collection. Household batteries, particularly lithium ion or low-quality batteries, pose a serious fire risk when placed in household kerbside bins or bulky waste. Unfortunately, this is not an isolated incident, with used batteries causing three fires every week in waste and recycling collection trucks.

We need our community's help to create a safe and clean environment by disposing of batteries correctly. Make sure that you are recycling your batteries at an accredited B-cycle drop off point, including the Thornleigh Community Recycling Centre (CRC) and many major retailers.

Pool Safety Alert: With drowning incidents peaking in summer, it's crucial to stay vigilant around pools. Portable pools, including pet pools, may look innocent, but they can pose serious drowning risks. If your pool is over 30cm deep, make sure to fence it off.

Most importantly, adult supervision is essential! Keep your eyes peeled while everyone is splashing about.



From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Frequently Asked Questions #26: WHAT IS A 'BITUMEN BANDIT'?


'Bitumen bandits' are bogus tradespeople who rip-off unsuspecting and vulnerable consumers, by peddling bitumen-laying services for a supposed "substantial discount". They use misleading and deceptive conduct. The scam starts when someone knocks on your door and tells you they have asphalt or bitumen leftover from a "nearby job" and offer to sell it to you at "a heavily reduced cost". Consumers are forced to comply because if the work isn't finished, they're unable to use their driveway. Regardless of how solid the offer seems, itinerant bitumen layers often leave consumers out of pocket:

• they may ask for a deposit and simply never return to do the work, or

- they do such a substandard job with watered down bitumen, it may cost you a lot more money to fix the job, or
- they do (more) damage, or
- they may initially quote a low cost, but then a much higher payment is demanded during the work for it to be completed...
