19 January, from Ku-ring-gai command: Can you help us find Gabriella?

18 January, from Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command:

We are continuing to see people become victims to scammers demanding payment via gift cards.

Just remember, NO legitimate company or government agency will ever ask you to make a payment with any sort of gift card. If a company does ask for payment using a gift card, IT IS A SCAM. Don't fall victim to these tricks. Common scam examples:

A scammer will pretend to be from a law enforcement agency or internet provided and will convince their victim they will help track an offender who has unlawfully accessed the victim's computer. The scammer will claim to do this by sending money via the victim's bank account or gift card serial numbers.

A scammer will pretend to be from the Australian Taxation Office and claim there is a warrant out for the victim's arrest. The scammer will ask the victim to

pay the 'fine' using gift cards or bitcoin and threaten police will arrest them if they don't pay the 'fine'

20 January, from Consumer Protection WA

LIDS MAY SHRINK: These Stanley stainless steel travel mugs are being recalled following injuries.

There's a risk of burns if the lid detaches while the cup contains hot liquid. Several incidents have occurred worldwide, including a number requiring medical attention.

20 January, from NSW Depart of Community and Justice

Anyone who has experienced a crime in NSW can contact Victims Services for free and confidential information, advice and referrals to support their recovery. The Victims Support Scheme can also assist people who have been injured by a violent crime or modern slavery in NSW. Support can include:

- Counselling to support recovery after the crime.
- Financial assistance to pay for urgent health and safety needs, and other expenses.
- A recognition payment to acknowledge what happened.

20 January, from The Hills Police Area Command: ***High-Speed Motorcycle Pursuit and Arrest in Kenthurst** **

At approximately 7:18 PM on Thursday, January 16th, 2025, Hills Highway Parol observed a red Honda CB1000RR motorcycle allegedly speeding on Kenthurst Rd, Dural. The rider, a 26-year-old male, was allegedly clocked at 105 km/h in a 70 km/h zone and subsequently fled from police, reaching speeds estimated at 160 km/h. The pursuit continued until the rider abandoned the motorcycle on Raym Rd, Kenthurst.

With the assistance of a police dog unit, the rider was located hiding in nearby bushland and was arrested. The rider, who was found to be disqualified from driving, provided negative results for both breath and drug tests. He has been charged with multiple offences including police pursuit and drive whilst disqualified. He was bail refused to Parramatta Local Court.

20 January, from NSW RFS Ku-ring-gai Brigade: Storm Damage

After kicking the year off with fires in Tamworth it was a quick pivot for our firefighters this week to storm damage tasking. Since the storm first hit on Wednesday night our crews have out been supporting our friends at NSW SES Ku-Ring-Gai Unit clear trees, branches, and debris from houses, roads and driveways.

If you have logged a job with the SES and no longer require assistance please let them know by calling back on 132 500 so that they can continue to prioritise help to those who still require it.

RFS crews had a reprive today (Monday 20th) as the majority of jobs required energy companies to make the area safe before crews could get to work but remain ready to assist later in the week should the SES require it.

Rember to treat all fallen powerlines as live and to stay at least 8m away

UPDATE @ 22:30 - Road closures completed. Immediate public safety risk managed.

PARTIAL ROAD CLOSURE ALERT - Pacific Highway, Killara

NSW SES received a report earlier this afternoon of a tree threatening to fall onto the Pacific Highway. Recon crews quickly attended and confirmed that the tree posed a direct threat to public safety.

SES crews are now on-site, supported by <u>Transport for NSW</u> and SES contractors, preparing to remove the tree. <u>Ausgrid</u> emergency crews are also in attendance, as power needs to be isolated to allow this work to be safely completed. This may result in a short interruption to power supplies in the area. To safely complete this work, lanes of Pacific Highway, on the southbound carriageway, may be closed to give our crews space to work.

Please avoid the area if possible, use alternate routes or delay your journey. If you are driving in the area, obey the directions of traffic controllers, drive slowly and be aware of emergency workers in the area.

The women, 70 and 54, were trapped by a section of the tree, which fell on the garden in Pymble today.

A man in his 60s was also hurt.

Paramedics freed them all.

The older woman suffered a back injury and the younger woman had multiple injuries.

Both were in a serious but stable condition in hospital tonight.

Neighbours said it sounded like the tree might have been struck by lightning.

NSW Ambulance Inspector Carolyn Parish from said the trio were "very lucky" because of the way the tree fell.

While the weather improved on Sunday, Sydney has been smashed by wild storms since the middle of last week.

Tragically we lost 340 lives on NSW roads in 2024, the same as 2023. Things to remember:

- speeding is the main cause of road deaths slow down to save lives 🐌
- regional areas still have high fatalities, so drive extra carefully on regional roads
- fatigue and impaired driving are major crash factors, so make sure you're rested before driving, take breaks and have a Plan B if drinking 65
- motorcyclist deaths increased by 34%, so we're looking at changes to the licensing scheme for motorcyclists

We all have a part to play in making our roads safer and to reduce the road toll in 2025.

16 January, from Traffic and Highway Patrol Command

On Sunday, 12th January 2025, Police attached to Hawkesbury Highway Patrol attended Woodlands Industrial Estate, Wilberforce, after receiving complaints of cars and bikes are conducting burnouts.

Upon arrival Police could smell fresh rubber burning which was consistent with the recent burnouts being conducted. Immediately after, Police observed the Grey Coloured Utility approaching the Police direction whilst revving very loudly, large white smoke and sparks coming out of it.

An inspection was conducted on the vehicle where the rear wheel was completely burnout, and the rim metal was scarping the bitumen. Police stopped and spoke to the male driver, 17 years old, who was very apologetic of his actions. He was charged for Aggravated Burnout and the matter is before the court.



16 January, from Careflight

Shortly after 11am today the Mounties Care CareFlight Helicopter was tasked by NSW Ambulance to Mona Vale after a teenage boy was pulled from the surf unconscious.

On duty lifeguards performed CPR and the young male regained consciousness. With assistance from NSW Police, the CareFlight crew landed behind the Mona Vale Surf Club and upon arrival, CareFlight's specialist doctor and NSW Ambulance paramedics provided treatment at the scene before the patient was flown to the Sydney Children's Hospital, Randwick in a stable

condition.



16 January, from Ausgrid: This is what over 150,000 cloud to ground lightning strikes looks like. These strikes can have a big impact on the power network, leading to major power outages.



When lightning hits, it can damage poles, wires, and other critical equipment. Even nearby strikes can trigger power disruptions as safety systems automatically shut down parts of the network to protect the grid and the community.

Our crews have been working tirelessly to check the powerlines in the areas without power for faults and damage, and make repairs when needed. If you're

currently without power, rest assured we're doing everything we can to restore it as soon as possible.

■Remember to stay safe and report any fallen powerlines by calling 13 13 88.
Always assume they are live and stay at least 8 meters away.

From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: 'Frequently Asked Questions #27: 'HOW CAN I BE SAFE ON A FIRST DATE'?

First dates are supposed to be impression dates, where the admirer shows you they are

worthy of your interest. There are no rules when dating. Do things at the speed you feel

comfortable with and both agree to. Get to know the person first, before getting too close.

Arranging the date:

1. It is better to meet in a neutral public place, where there are plenty of people around.

Consider an activity such as simply having a coffee. A shorter first date is an easier one

to remove yourself from if you feel uncomfortable. Or perhaps at a bar/restaurant or an

activity including your friends, eg bowling?

2. If the first date is the first time you've met, then it is advised you don't go to their home

address, where they have control over the situation.

3. However, if you do decide to go to their address, check it out beforehand. Be aware of

transportation; you don't want to be stranded. You might want to ask them why they

want to meet at their home and let them know your concerns. If they aren't a bad person,

they probably won't mind the questions. Some people may assume that by agreeing to

go to their place it is a sign that you are willing to get intimate.

4. If you find yourself in a private place, such as a car, alleyway, or park, and you aren't

comfortable with having sex, make that known.
