



About 4:30pm on Thursday the 27th of February 2025, a white Toyota Corolla driven by a 67-year-old woman was travelling southbound on Yarrara Rd, crossing Stevens St, Pennant Hills. At the same time, a Harley Davidson motorcycle driven by a 59-year-old man was travelling northbound on Yarrara Rd, continuing straight past Stevens Rd. The motorcycle collided with the passenger side front and back door of the Toyota Corolla. Bystanders contacted emergency services, and paramedics, rescue, and police attended the scene. The motorcyclist sustained serious leg and pelvic injuries and was treated by paramedics before being taken to Royal North Shore Hospital. Investigations into the crash are continuing.

# **26 February, from Nepean command: WHEN NOISE ANNOYS** (Edited for K&H)

Noise from things like music, air conditioners, alarms, animals and parties is often the cause of neighbourhood disputes. There are laws that can be used to prevent people from creating 'offensive', although no legislation specifies an exact offensive noise level.





# Dealing with neighbourhood noise

Neighbourhood noise – such as noise from animals, power tools and parties – can be very annoying. Here's what you can do.

#### Talk with your neighbour

If your neighbour's noise is bothering you, first try to have a friendly talk with them. Often people don't realise they are disturbing others and are happy to stop or reduce their noise.

#### Next steps

If talking with your neighbour doesn't work you can complain to your local council, the police and other authorities. Tables 1 and 2 show who to contact for different types of noise. Table 1 also shows when each type of noise is not allowed.

#### Contact a Community Justice Centre

Community Justice Centres (CJCs) help neighbours settle differences through mediation (talking). You'll meet with the noisy neighbour and someone from the CJC to try to solve the problem. The process is free and has a high success rate. Contact details are at the end of this sheet.

#### Contact your council

If CJC mediation doesn't work, contact your local

### What the council can do

A council officer can serve notices on residents and businesspeople requiring them to control 'offensive noise'. (See the end of this fact sheet for what 'offensive noise' means.)

#### About notices

A prevention notice tells a person what they must do to prevent or stop noise.1

A noise control notice puts a limit on the amount of noise allowed from noisy equipment or a noisy activity. The notice may restrict noisy activities to certain times of the day or certain days.

If the person who gets the notice doesn't obey it the council can fine them or prosecute.

People who get a notice can appeal against it.

You can also seek a 'noise abatement order' from the local court. But it's usually better if the council does this because it has experience with preparing evidence for court.

#### Contact the police

For out-of-hours noise such as parties you can contact the police. Police can issue a warning or a noise abatement direction. A noise abatement direction:

- tells a person to stop making the noise
- can be issued at any time of day or night
- can stay in force for up to 28 days.

If people don't follow the direction, police can:

- fine them \$300 on the spot (\$600 for corporations)
- seize noise-making equipment such as a sound system.

Authorised officers of a local council can also do these things.

- Know who you're dealing with. If you've only ever met someone online or are unsure of the legitimacy of a business, take some time to do a bit more research. It is better to use online sites that you know and trust. Scammers will set up fake online stores or post goods for sale in buyswap-sell groups or online classified sites to trick people into buying items that don't exist.
- · For personal safety and ease, if possible, you should arrange to meet in a busy public place. Also, it's a good
- online transactions can be simple and convenient, please remember that face to face transactions are the best way to minimise the risk of fraudulent activity.
- When buying or selling an item online, always transact in person, in public, with cash or through payment methods with buyer protection, such as PayPal or Afterpay.

The "No Interest Loan" Scam Impersonating Our Much-Loved Charities
How low can criminals go? Taking advantage of low-income earners searching
for No Interest Loans by impersonating our reputable charities like Good
Shepherd and Salvos is a new low. IDCARE analysts have detected a spike in
these scams in January, with more than one report each day. In most cases,
the client saw an advertisement for the No Interest Loan that appeared to be

from a charity, advertised on Facebook. What's interesting about these cases is that criminals have used it to access their victims' myGov accounts – and that's where the damage is being done.

### **Our Tips:**

If you are looking for a No Interest Loan, visit the charity's website directly and don't go there through adverts on social platforms or links in emails and text messages. It is also important to protect your myGov account with a passkey, instead of a password. Here's a handy explainer on passkeys:

# The Lowercase 'l' and the Fake Cab Website: The Difference One Little Letter Can Make!

One of our Melbourne clients let us know about a fake website impersonating 13 Cabs. The website domain looked identical to the official website except for a small but crucial difference. The "1" in "13 Cabs" was actually the lowercase letter "L." The fake website was designed to steal a person's name, address, email, and financial details. The fake website was found when clients were Google searching for cabs, and it appeared near the top of the list as a sponsored option.

### **Our Tips:**

Remember that criminals can pay to have their fake websites appear at the top of a Google search too. Always check a website closely for errors.

# The Problem with 1800 Numbers: Microsoft Pop-ups Continue to Have a Devastating Financial Toll

Since July last year, IDCARE clients have reported losses of more than \$5.2 million to Microsoft pop-up scams, and this February has been the second-highest month for reports. In most cases, the client will be looking at an article when their computer appears to freeze, and a pop-up with a 1800 number for Microsoft appears on the screen. IDCARE consistently reports these 1800 numbers to the telecommunications authorities, but the criminals create new ones.

### **Our Tips:**

If you ever receive a pop-up while browsing your computer with a number for Microsoft, even if it is a 1800 number, it is a scam.




This malicious glass smashing at Auluba Oval basketball court happens at least once every quarter. I cleaned them up twice already but can't bring a blower every time.

# 26 February, from Nepean command: TRAFFIC TUESDAY

It's Friday night and you're almost home. The traffic is heavy, banked up past the broken lines of the left-hand turning lane. The lane on your left is a 'Bus Lane' with no traffic driving in this lane.

Am I permitted to merge safely into the 'Bus Lane' and drive past the stopped traffic before the broken lines begin, that allow me to turn left?



### **ANSWER:**

Yes, you are permitted to drive your car in a bus lane, but only up to 100 metres and only if you are avoiding an obstruction, are turning into or out of a street or are entering or leaving a property adjacent to the bus lane. The rule exists as it is to stop people from using a 'bus lane' as an alternate lane to prescribed driving lanes. And to everyone who gets upset when motorbike riders use a bus lane, yes, they are permitted to ride in a bus lane. No other vehicles other than buses are permitted to drive in a 'Bus Only Lane'.

**From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby:** "Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Cryptocurrency":

The cryptocurrency world is unfortunately rife with scammers. Everyone who reaches out to you with an investment opportunity via phone, email or messaging applications will be a scammer who hopes to lure you into sending them your crypto with promises of large returns. There are also many automated scams that lure you into claiming free tokens, but actually drain your crypto wallet. Never give anyone your seed phrase (typically 12 or 24 words) as they will steal your crypto. Assume everyone is a scammer!

**Tip #1:** Use only reputable cryptocurrency exchanges with strong security measures. Make sure the company or website is not named on the government's <u>moneysmart.gov.au/check-and-report-scams/investoralert-list</u> or on the <u>International Organization of Securities Commissions (IOSCO) investor</u> alerts portal, which has warnings from overseas regulators.

**Tip #9:** Encrypt sensitive files and data related to your cryptocurrency activities.

**Tip #14:** Scammers sometimes get you to install custom crypto broking software to supposedly track your crypto holdings. If you do, it could infect your

computer with viruses and other malicious code. The scammer may be able to search your computer for personal details, steal your ID, and access your finances.
