24 March, from Transportnsw.info

The Bobbin Head Cycle Classic is taking place this weekend on Sunday the 30th of March 2025. There will be 4 available options for riders to take part in being the 27km ride, 57km ride, 80km ride and 104km ride.

22 March, from Traffic and Highway Patrol Command

Motorcycle riders face a much higher risk on our roads compared to other road users due to their reduced protection. In 2024, 67 motorcyclists lost their lives on NSW roads, 22 riders have already died in 2025, marking a significant increase from the same period last year.


Regardless of who is at fault—whether a motorcycle rider making poor decisions or a victim of another driver's dangerous actions—motorcyclists are often the ones left seriously injured or killed.

If you are a motorcycle rider, ride within the speed limit or according to conditions to give yourself time to take action and avoid a collision.

If you're driving a motor vehicle, be vigilant for motorcyclists and give them the time and space they need. We can all play a part in keeping each other safe on the road.



17 March, from NSW Police Force



The NSW Police has rolled out five new Lenco BearCat armoured vehicles, designed to keep officers safe in high-risk situations, from tactical operations to counter-terrorism and riot response.

For the first time in Australia, one of these vehicles features an extendable ramp, giving officers rapid access to multi-storey buildings and aircraft. While

this game-changing BearCat will be based in Sydney, the others will be strategically deployed across the state, ensuring faster response times and greater protection for communities across NSW.

25 March, from NSW Road Safety - NSW GOV and Transport for NSW

Anyone else grow up being told it was illegal to drive with the interior light on?



There's no specific road rule for this, but if it should be done is still up for debate



Road Rules require that drivers have proper control of a vehicle, and state the need for a clear view of the road and traffic...

If having the light on impacts your vision, view of the road or ability to control the vehicle, then THAT'S when it becomes unsafe and illegal.



24 March, from NSW Fair Trading: Rental water efficiency measures for toilets are now in place.

As of 23 March 2025, landlords must make sure their rental property also includes water efficient toilets if they want to continue to charge tenants for water usage.

Here's what you need to know:

Tenants - You are only required to pay for water usage if the separately metered property has all water efficiency measures in place, and you have been informed about them.

Landlords/Agents - To charge for water usage, ensure your property meets all water efficiency measures and pass on this information to your tenants. This includes having a dual flush toilet that has a minimum 3-star rating in line with the Water Efficiency Labelling and Standards (WELS) scheme.

24 March, from canberratimes.com.au: Is it illegal to brake-check someone who is tailgating you?

You may have done it to someone. You may have had it done to you. But did you know that to brake-check someone who is tailgating you could land you a big fine and possible demerit points? Or, worse – it could cost you your licence. Tapping your brake pedal to warn another road user not to tailgate is a chargeable offence

You could face fines in some jurisdictions, while others may impose stricter penalties

Some states could imprison you if your driving is considered that dangerous. Find out more here.

24 March, from National Emergency Management Agency

Mobile phones are useful tools when preparing for emergencies, with apps designed to help you plan for, and respond to emergencies.

The apps below can help you monitor your local area:

- The <u>Bureau of Meteorology</u> app will use your location details to alert you to severe weather events happening near you.
- The <u>ABC Australia</u> listen app allows you to listen to local programs and emergency broadcasts from any ABC Radio station around Australia.
- ▲The Emergency+ app helps you ring triple-0 and provides you with your GPS coordinates so you can tell an operator where you are.

If the power is out during an emergency, it can be useful to have a mobile phone charger on hand that doesn't rely on mains electricity, like a portable battery charger, power bank, or a car charger.

A mobile phone can be an invaluable way to help keep yourself safe during a disaster, but you should make sure you have other ways of receiving information in an emergency.

- improve your computer security with spam or advertising filters.



21 March, from Transport for NSW: This truck is TOO TALL for the tunnel it's heading towards... so here's how we stop it 🖐

Our sensors pick up the overheight truck and alert our operators of the danger. From there, they give warnings to the oncoming truck, flashing lights and programming the message board to say 'STOP'

And if needed, they even initiate the tunnel closure process, but thankfully this truck saw the warnings and stopped in time

21 March, from Mt Colah Neighbourhood Watch

We have been contacted by a resident who wished to warn the community about a person collecting returnable bottles/cans from yellow bins on other people's property in the West side of Mount Colah.

Our comments:

Don't put your bins out until the latest possible convenient time.

Store your bins out of sight if possible.

Secure your yard and property where possible.

If you don't want to reclaim the 10c deposits, then consider leaving these containers separate from your bin, for others to reclaim (eg local school children, or those collecting for charity).

Know that the bins aren't yours - they belong to council.

You are entitled to move/remove anything left on your property.

If any one is trespassing on your property and you fear for your safety, phone the police on 000.



20 March, from sgcarmart.com: Life saving tips - what you can do if the driver of the car you're in passes out at the wheel.



So, what should you do if you find yourself in the unlikely position? Here are several tips on what you can try to do when you face such a situation.

- 1. Do not turn off the engine!
- 2. Do not jump out of the car!
- 3. Alert other road users of your predicament.
- 4. Try to take over control of the vehicle.
- 5. Stop the car from gaining speed.
- 6. Try to slow the car down to a stop.

Of course, unless you are really flexible, or have a pair of really long legs, it is easier said than done.

Hence, you should also use the handbrake (if the car has one at the centre console area) to gradually slow the car down - don't yank at it, you might lock up the wheels and unsettle the car!

When you finally get the car to stop safely, you should engage the handbrake and turn the ignition off, to prevent any possibility of the car moving off again. With the car stopped, you can now contact emergency services.



From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: "Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Garage Sales":

Tip #5. You cannot sell dangerous goods, chemicals, faulty electrical items, or firearms.

Tip #6. After the garage sale, check that all home security systems are operable & have not

been disabled to help facilitate later unauthorised entry. Conduct an inspection (using video inventory in #4 above) to identify any missing items. Please remember to

remove all advertising after the event.

Tip #12. Never be alone—Ask for help running the garage sale, preferably 2 or more. Invite

friends to sell their items with yours and thus gain help. And remember water, sunscreen, hat, food, medicine, and how will you take a toilet break?

Tip #17. Charge your phone the night before & have it on you. Ensure emergency numbers

are in your phone (see below). If in doubt – phone! Alternatively, you could use your

home/ car's panic alarm. Consider a personal alarm.
