06 April, from Traffic and Highway Patrol Police Command - NSW Police Force

Bankstown Highway Patrol have detected a P-plate driver putting lives at risk after he was caught doing 123km/h in a 70km/h zone!

About 11.30pm on the 26th of March 2025, Officers were conducting speed enforcement duties on the Hume Highway in Yagoona. At this point, Officers detected a young male driver, who was behind the wheel of a Volkswagen Tiguan R - a prohibited high-performance vehicle exceeding the speed limit by

more than 53km/h. Officers stopped this vehicle and it was established, the young male driver also wasn't displaying his P-plates.

As a result, the driver was issued with a speeding infringement for exceeding the speed limit by more than 45km/hr, failing to display P-plates and driving a prohibited vehicle contrary to licence conditions. His licence is now subject to an immediate 6-month suspension, and he will face significant penalties totalling \$3961 and 15 demerit points.

This reckless behaviour puts all road users in danger. Bankstown Highway Patrol reminds all drivers—especially young and inexperienced ones—that speeding and failing to comply with license restrictions can have devastating consequences.

Drive safely. Road safety is everyone's responsibility.

04 April, from Traffic and Highway Patrol Command - NSW Police Force

About 5:40am on Friday 4th April 2025, police attached to Manning Great Lakes Highway Patrol were conducting speed enforcement upon the Pacific Hwy, Nabiac. At this time, they checked the speed of a white Lexus sedan on Lidar at 194Km/h in the sign posted 100Km/h area.

The vehicle was promptly stopped and the driver, a 33 year old male from Maroubra, was spoken to. The only explanation offered to police was that 'I knew I was going too fast'.

He was subsequently issued a penalty notice for exceeding the speed limit by more than 45Km/h, carrying a fine just shy of \$3000 & 6 demerit points. His licence was confiscated on the spot and suspended for 6 months. The registration plates were not seized as he was not the registered owner.

Regional roads account for the majority of fatalities in NSW, and excessive speed on these roads will remain a focus for us to drive the road toll towards zero.



04 April, from NSW Police Force:

Police are investigating the theft of a historic solid silver and gold belt buckle, won 65 years ago at a rodeo in the United States by a Cootamundra man described as the world's oldest rodeo competitor.

Mr Bob Holder, now aged 94, won the belt and buckle prize in the Saddle Bronc riding event at Sidney, Iowa, USA, in 1959.

The belt buckle – which is inscribed with Mr Holder's name – is significant in Australian rodeo history as it's believed to be the first time an Australian cowboy had won a major award on the American rodeo circuit.

The belt buckle is described as being made of solid silver and gold, with gold inlets. The top of the belt buckle reads 'Sidney lowa' and '1959' is inscribed on each side with Mr Holder's name at the bottom and an image of a saddle bronc horse in the centre.

In the event of a crash, comfortable and appropriate footwear could also help to protect your feet 👣







04 April, from au.news.yahoo.com: Tight-knit Aussie town devastated after towering trees mysteriously die: 'Oh my god'

State authorities are investigating whether the trees formed part of a significant protected cluster of forest.

Residents living along a tight-knit Aussie street are "devastated" after a clump of extremely important trees that had towered over their suburb began to die mysteriously. The leaves began to brown and the branches withered just weeks after the elderly couple who had lived at the large Sydney block for decades sold it to developers.

"They were in absolute perfect health. They were beautiful. They weren't dropping leaves or big branches," local man Daryl told Yahoo News.

It was last month, while talking with a neighbour over the fence, that the 59-year-old noticed they were looking sick. "He looked to me and said, oh my god, what's wrong with those trees?" he said.

04 April, from police.nsw.gov.au: Second person charged in relation to Glenorie suspicious death - Strike Force Halderen

A woman has been charged in connection to the alleged murder of a man in Sydney's north-west last month.

Strike Force Halderen was established by The Hills Police Area Command and the State Crime Command's Homicide Squad, to investigate the circumstances surrounding the death of a 39-year-old man, whose body was found on the property on Gleness Place about midday on Friday 14 March 2025.

About 7.30am today (Thursday 3 April 2025), police arrested a 35-year-old woman at a property on Gleness Place, Glenorie.

She was taken to Castle Hill Police Station where she was charged with accessory after the fact to murder, and larceny – accessory before the fact to an offence.

She was refused bail to appear in Parramatta Local Court on Thursday 29 May 2025.

She is the second person to be charged in relation to the man's death. A 24-year-old man remains before the courts charged with murder.

02 April, from Nepean Police Area Command: Information from Service NSW

Starting from this month 🚚

NSW residents with an overseas driver licence must convert to a NSW Driver Licence if you're planning to stay on our roads.

Changes include:

if you arrived after 1 Jul 2023, you have 6 months to get an NSW Driver Licence.

TOURIST AND OVERSEAS VISITORS:

If you are a temporary overseas visitor, you can drive in NSW using your overseas licence for up to six (6) months as long as you:

- Remain a temporary overseas visitor.
- Have a current overseas licence.
- Have not been disqualified from driving in NSW or anywhere else.
- Have not had your licence suspended or cancelled, or your visiting privileges withdrawn.
- Carry your overseas driver's licence with you.

If your licence is not written in English, you must also carry an English translation, or an international Driving Permit.

INTERSTATE AND NEW ZEALAND LICENCE HOLDERS:

You can drive with your existing licence for up to THREE (3) MONTHS, as long as you:

- Have a current licence interstate or NZ licence.
- Have not been disqualified from driving in NSW or anywhere else.
- Have not had your licence suspended or cancelled, or your visiting driving privileges withdrawn.
- Carry your driver or rider licence with you.
- You can prove your genuine visitor status to police, if asked.

If you are staying in NSW longer than three (3) months, you must apply for a NSW licence if you wish to continue driving or riding on NSW roads.

How does an average speed camera work?

Motorists can have their speed measured in many ways. Here we look at how average speed cameras differ from fixed cameras and radar devices.



02 April, from Riverstone Police Area Command

A friendly reminder from Riverstone Police to slow down when driving near

schools and to be careful of where you park around school zones.



02 April, from Chifley Police District: Can you hold up traffic to reverse park? The answer is NO!

If you are the driver undertaking a parking maneuver, you do not have right of way. The oncoming traffic has right of way and a driver must wait until it's clear and safely reverse into a park.

It is ILLEGAL for a driver in NSW to obstruct traffic in that lane or line of traffic when they are reverse parking.

A driver must move to the far left side of that lane or line of traffic to prepare to park and NOT attempt to hog the lane and/or nose their vehicle into the center of the road to obstruct traffic in that lane.

A driver entering a marked lane, or a line of traffic, from the far left or right side of a road must give way to any vehicle travelling in the lane or line of traffic. give way means-

- (a) If the driver is stopped remain stationary until it is safe to proceed, or
- (b) In any other case slow down and, if necessary, stop to avoid a collision A driver must not unreasonably obstruct the path of another driver or a pedestrian.

If you're caught you will be subject to one or more of the following fines.

Enter marked lane not give way to vehicle in lane \$410 and 3 demerit points

Not reverse vehicle safely \$227 and 2 demerit points

Unreasonably obstruct the path of driver/pedestrian \$320


