06 May, from msn.com

Two primary school-aged boys are dead, and a woman is in custody, leaving the small NSW town of Coonabarabran reeling in the wake of a "terrible tragedy".

Officers were dispatched to the home in the Central West town just after 2pm on Monday, following "a concern for welfare", NSW Police said in a statement. The grandmother had contacted Department of Communities and Justice and told them the children were dead, police sources not permitted to speak publicly told the Herald.

Frontline responders, both NSW Police and ambulance officers, were met with a confronting scene.

"Upon arrival, police officers attached to Orana Mid-Western Police District located two boys – aged six and seven – deceased inside the home," NSW Police said.

Their ages were initially reported by police as eight and 10.

The children's grandmother, 66, was taken into custody and driven to a nearby hospital.

At this stage, she has not been charged with any offence and is "assisting police" with an investigation into the deaths.

She remains under police guard in hospital.

"What has occurred is terrible, and as a state we share in the community of Coonabarabran's grief at the loss of two young boys who had their entire futures ahead of them," NSW Premier Chris Minns told the Herald.

- A man has been charged after a pursuit throughout Wollongong and Sydney's south.




05 May, from Hannah's Blue Butterflies Road safety Awareness: What to do if your brakes fail in an automatic or manual car!


05 May, from NSW RFS - Berowra Waters Brigade

This morning, Berowra Waters and <u>Brooklyn Rural Fire Brigades</u> were responded to assist <u>NSW Ambulance</u>, with a patient extraction from Pumpkin Point on the Hawkesbury.

This incident highlighted two important features. Firstly, interagency cooperation is crucial in these isolated locations. Secondly, the need for a variety of vessels in our local waterways is essential. At low tide this location can at best, only be described as mud flats.

The patient, along with the ambulance crew, were safely transported aboard Brooklyn boat to Deerubbun boat ramp for further transfer via road.

From 4 May 2025, furniture suppliers are required to provide warnings to consumers about the dangers of toppling furniture. The best way to prevent furniture from toppling is to secure it to the wall or floor with an anchoring device.

- ☑Place furniture on a flat and stable surface
- Store your heaviest items at the bottom of drawers or shelves


I am saddened a d disappointed by this behaviour in our area!

If you are 16 years or older and do not want to speak directly with a police officer, but you want the police to know you have been sexually assaulted you can complete the online Sexual Assault Reporting Option (SARO) through the community portal. Information received via the SARO is treated with the utmost confidentiality and recorded on a secure and restricted NSW Police Force

database.

Respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) remains at a high level of activity. COVID-19 and influenza (flu) are at low levels of activity.

RSV can cause serious illness in young babies, but immunisation helps protect them from severe RSV and hospitalisation.

Pregnant women are recommended to receive the RSV vaccine (Abrysvo®) to help protect their baby from birth up to 6 months of age.

International experience indicates the possibility of a higher than usual flu activity season this year.

Getting a flu vaccine is quick, easy and recommended for everyone aged 6 months and over. Book your flu vaccine today at your doctor, local pharmacy or Aboriginal Medical Service (AMS) to protect yourself and others from flu.

Re-Introducing BluLink: Connecting Police & Community! Have you heard about BluLink? It's an amazing platform powered by GoodSAM that allows you to share crucial information with the NSW Police Force.

Whether it's your location, live streaming an incident, or sending digital media files, BluLink makes it easy and secure!

- **Main Features:**
- Live Video: Stream live video footage directly to police dispatchers.
- Location Sharing Share your GPS location if you're unsure of your exact whereabouts.
- Chat/Message: Have a text conversation if you can't speak, with messages translatable into over 100 languages.
- Mattachment Upload: Send photos or videos to assist with investigations.

Just last Saturday night, a gentleman in Kellyville used BluLink to live stream an incident to dispatchers after calling 000. This real-time footage was invaluable in helping the police respond swiftly and effectively.

No need to download anything beforehand! BluLink is accessible through a web portal, ensuring your information is secure and only shared with the police.

02 May, from Neighbourhood Watch: St Ives Area


Shared with permission from the St Ives Community Page and Surrounds group yesterday (Thursday):

01 May, from NSW Fair Trading

Oday Al Sahmarani has been convicted and sentenced for selling two used cars via online marketplaces with tampered odometers to unsuspecting consumers, selling them for inflated prices after misleading the buyers into believing the cars had travelled significantly less than their true mileage.

Mr Al Sahmarani was sentenced to an 18-month Community Corrections Order and ordered to pay \$30,400 in compensation after deceiving buyers about the condition of a 2011 Toyota Kluger and a 2008 Toyota Hilux.

The court heard Mr Al Sahmarani would arrange for the roll back of odometers by over 200,000 km on each vehicle and used a false logbook to support one of the sales.

NSW Fair Trading takes odometer tampering seriously – it's a deceptive practice that misleads buyers, undermines trust, and can create safety risks. You can check a vehicles past three odometer readings (if applicable) online for free here.

From NHW in Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby: "Our 20 Favourite Crime Prevention Tips for Personal Safety":

Tip #3. When out, stay alert, keep your mind on your surroundings, and be aware of what is

happening around you at all times. Don't be distracted. If listening to music, remove one ear bud, or set volume to low

Tip #10. Never leave keys in a hiding spot outside the home. Instead leave spare keys with a

trusted friend. Consider Fingerprint, Key Pad or Bio Locks

Tip #15. If walking, use, or pretend to use, a mobile phone. Consider using an App such as

Companion, Follow Me, Circle of 6, SafeZone, MyWitness, Get Home Safe (GHS), Glympse, etc.

Download the NSWPF emergency+ app now!

Tip #19. When driving, lock doors and windows and do not leave valuables in view, especially

on the front passenger seat. Where possible, park rear to the curb, giving you a better view of a situation.
