19 May, from NSW Police Force

Police have charged 627 people with more than 1300 offences during a fourday statewide operation targeting domestic and family violence.

"There have been 160,000 reported incidents of domestic violence in the past 12 months, which is an average of about 438 per day. That is unacceptable and is not tolerated by police or our society. Our dedicated officers find, arrest and charge these offenders to prevent further incidents. We will continue to arrest and charge violent, repeat offenders who disregard their court orders," Assistant Commissioner Mckenna said.

Here are the weekend's news headlines:

- A man has been charged with a large number of offences relating to hate crimes committed in Sydney's Inner West.
- A man has been charged over the alleged unsecured load of metal fragments that dropped onto a major arterial road earlier this month on the Central Coast.
- Two men were arrested, a further two were taken to hospital, and two officers were allegedly assaulted during an NRL match at Campbelltown Sports Stadium.

- ◆A man has been charged over an alleged home invasion and a teenage boy has been charged with firearm, drug, and other offences in Sydney's south west.
- A woman has been critically injured after being hit while waiting at a bus stop in the state's Hunter region.
- A man has been arrested over the death of a man who was stabbed at Mudgee.
- A learner driver was allegedly caught 89km/h over the speed limit in the state's central tablelands.
- A man will face court charged following an alleged carjacking in the state's north west.

18 May, from Traffic and Highway Command - NSW Police Force

The driver of this Nissan Qashqai made the job easy for us in covering the registration plate details.

Shortly after coming into possession of copper piping, the occupants of this vehicle were intercepted by City East Highway Patrol on Parramatta Road, Stanmore. One of the first things grabbing the attention of officers was the registration plates folded inwards to cover up the identity of the vehicle. This then led onto the second, the car jammed packed full of copper piping off-cuts, to the point where the rear seat passenger was sitting down on top of the folded down rear seat backrest. Despite the inability for this passenger to fasten their seat belt, both the driver and passenger were adamant the seat belt was on. The front seat passenger was in no better position with copper piping poking everywhere past his head.

Various inconsistent stories were relayed to Police regarding the copper piping. The copper was removed from the vehicle and seized by Police, with further inquiries pending.

The driver provided a positive roadside drug test. He was issued with a court notice for possession of property suspected of being stolen, along with several fines for breaches detected during the traffic stop.

Both passengers were also issued with a notice to attend court for possession of property suspected of being stolen.

"They were able to change my email, passwords, they broke into my social media and they opened bank loans all within a matter of 24 hours," McLean said.

19 May, from Nepean Police Area Command: IS HAVING A VERBAL ARGUMENT AN OFFENCE?



Is having a verbal argument with your partner an offence under the domestic violence laws in NSW? Surely having an argument with someone in your family isn't an offence.

Whilst technically correct, that having an argument with a family member isn't an offence, the content of that verbal argument may push the argument towards a criminal offence being committed.

Examples of this are when an offender uses verbal arguments to intimidate, make threats, harass, manipulate, or degrade the person. This often leads to an emotional abuse of the victim.

Police haven't been to too many domestic violence assault jobs where the assault wasn't preceded by a verbal argument.

So, this is why we as police attend, investigate and record on our system all domestic related incidents brought to our attention, even if it is determined that the incident was a verbal argument only with no offences being reported or detected by police at the time.

19 May, from Rural Crime Prevention Team - NSW Police Force: Firearms and UNINHABITED DWELLINGS – what you need to know and do - now!



In recent times the <u>Rural Crime Prevention Team - NSW Police Force</u> have been investigating firearm thefts that could have been avoided if the legislation was followed by the licensed firearms holder.

These safe storage requirements are not optional.

The <u>Rural Crime Prevention Team - NSW Police Force</u> want to help you in preventing your guns from being stolen and in the hands of someone else. If you are a firearms license holder and store firearms at a property considered an UNINHABITED DWELLING, you MUST put in place additional safe storage.

What is an UNINHABITED DWELLING we hear you ask?

An UNINHABITED DWELLING is considered a structure that is not your primary residence, like a hobby farm, weekender or secondary farm.

It also includes a structure where you have your firearms stored that is OUT OF SIGHT of your house.

If so, you MUST take additional measures.

In order to be compliant, you MUST do the following to ensure you meet the safekeeping requirements:

SAFE

Must be an approved type.

Fitted with an alarm with off-site monitoring (including via 'smart' technology).

FIREARMS

Secured individually in the safe.

Fitted with trigger or barrel lock.

PREMISES

Intruder or duress alarm with back-to-base monitoring capabilities (including via 'smart' technology).

Our focus is on investigating these firearms thefts, charging those responsible and recovering the firearms.

However, if you don't have any of these conditions in place, you could be in breach of the legislation and action taken against you for not ensuring the safekeeping of your firearm. You are also at risk of your firearms being stolen, and your license suspended.

As a licensed firearms holder you are to ensure your firearms are not stolen, lost or come into the hands of another that is not authorised to possess the firearm.

Maximum penalty — \$5,500 penalty units or imprisonment for 2 years, or both, if the firearm stolen was a prohibited firearm or a pistol, or \$2,200 or imprisonment for 12 months, or both, in any other case.

Location-sharing apps linked to increased risk of digital coercive control, eSafety Commission research finds

Nearly one in five young adults believe tracking a partner's location is to be expected in a relationship, new research has found.

The eSafety Commission study has linked location-sharing apps with an increased risk of coercive control.


More than 13 per cent of the 2,000 adults surveyed said it was reasonable for a partner to monitor them using location-sharing apps like Life360 and Find My iPhone.

"It isn't an exaggeration to say preventing tech-based coercive control, and the attitudes that it condones can save lives," eSafety Commissioner Julie Inman Grant said.

"Young people have become so accustomed to certain levels of online tracking by family and friends ... that it no longer raises red flags in a relationship."

Tech-based coercive control is defined as a behaviour pattern that uses digital technology to control, manipulate and create fear in a current or former relationship.

18 May, from 9news.com.au: Truck driver charged after metal debris damages hundreds of cars on NSW motorway

A driver has been charged after a truck spilled about 840 kilograms of metal fragments on a major NSW road, which damaged the tyres of more than 300 cars.

Police allege the driver had an unsecured load when the debris tipped onto the M1 Pacific Motorway between Wyong Road and Mount White on Friday, May 2. The spill resulted in major traffic delays before the major road was reopened almost 10 hours later.


Many of the vehicles with tyre damage were stopped in the breakdown lane. There were no reports of any injuries.

Police said officers spoke with the driver of the vehicle, a heavy vehicle tipper towing a trailer, about the matter on the day of the incident.

Police will allege the secondary locking handles on the trailer were not properly engaged resulting in about 840 kilograms of metal spilling onto the roadway over about 30 kilometres.

The 46-year-old man was served with a future court attendance notice for driving a heavy vehicle not complying with loading requirements.

He is due to appear at Hornsby Local Court in July.


17 May, from City of Ryde: QDo you have this plant growing in your garden?

It is Spanish Moss — a slender, blue-grey air plant that hangs from branches in trees and shrubs. While not classified as a priority weed under the Greater Sydney Regional Strategic Weed Management Plan 2023–2027, Spanish Moss can spread easily via birds and wind, especially near bushland areas. If you live close to bushland, we encourage you to hand remove it from your garden to help prevent its spread.

Tip #13. Say 'No' to tele-marketers, 'cold-callers', or people on the phone requesting any personal details.

Tip #15. Clear your mailbox regularly. If needed, accept help from a trusted neighbour.

Tip #18. Be a good neighbour. 'Buddy-up' with a neighbour. Have a signal that you are ok, such as opening your curtains in the morning

A Sydney woman whose daughter's e-bike was stolen tracked it down to a house 45km away - but said police wouldn't do anything.

Shauna Anderson, the managing editor of <u>nine.com.au</u>, told Ben Fordham on 2GB radio the expensive bike was taken from her house on Sydney's north shore.

She was told by the police the thieves probably used a scanner to open her garage door before making off with the bike.

The bike had a GPS tracker in the form of an Apple AirTag hidden on it and Anderson was easily able to find it.

"The first thing I did was look at where the AirTag is on my phone, and it's 45km away from my house," she told Fordham.

She contacted police, who sent forensics to her house, and a police officer to the location of the bike.

Kmart has recalled a therapy product after some buyers were injured.

The Anko heated elbow pad was sold online and in Kmart and Target stores around the country, according to the recall notice.

It's a rechargeable heat pad for use on the elbow.

However, users have now been warned that the device can overheat if it is positioned incorrectly or wrapped too tightly.

There is a risk of burns injuries to the skin, with increased risk for heat-sensitive customers.

"Injuries have occurred," the <u>recall notice read</u>.
