


06 June, from Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command: XXXSCAM AWARENESSXXX

Please remember, never click on links sent to you via messages. If you are expecting a delivery, exit out of the message and check your app or legitimate website via your search engine.

Recently the Hornsby Ku-ring-gai Local Emergency Management Committee conducted Exercise Exodus, a multi-agency emergency training exercise held on Milson Island and the Hawkesbury River.

With boat-only access and remote conditions, Milson Island provided a unique and challenging location to test emergency response capabilities.

New Police Wanding Laws Now in Effect Across NSW

To help tackle knife crime and keep our communities safe, NSW Police now have the power to use handheld metal-detecting 'wands' **without a warrant** in designated public areas.

- Officers can now stop and scan individuals at:
- Public transport stations and nearby areas
- On buses, trains, and trams within two stops of a designated station
- Shopping precincts
- Certain sporting venues
- Other public places and special events as designated by regulation

These reforms are part of a broader strategy to reduce knife-related crime, including:

- ◆ Doubling the penalty for selling a knife to a child under 16 now up to **\$11,000** and **12 months jail**
- New offence for selling knives to 16–17-year-olds without a valid reason
- Increased penalties for knife-related offences
- ◆ Support for high-impact police operations like **Operation Foil**, which has already removed nearly **4,000 knives** from public places in the past year
- These new laws are a key part of the NSW Government's plan to make our streets safer and protect lives.

World Elder Abuse Awareness Day, launched by the United Nations in 2011, is a global opportunity to put the spotlight on abuse, neglect and exploitation of older people, and promote dignity, respect and justice.

Elder abuse can be physical, psychological, sexual, financial, or neglect – and it often goes unseen.

"An estimated 1 in 6 older Australians experience some form of abuse. Two thirds of older people don't seek help when they are abused (61%). Every older person deserves to live with dignity, respect and safety, free from harm and neglect. Everyone has a role to play to prevent elder abuse, including families, caregivers, professionals and communities.


A West Australian man has been charged with allegedly carrying a foldable pistol in his luggage.

Perth Airport security officers allegedly identified the firearm during an X-ray screening of the passenger's luggage.

Police searched his backpack and allegedly found an unlicensed foldable single-shot pistol weighing less than 1kg. No ammunition was found in the luggage or in the man's possession.

TIME AND LOCATION: In an emergency, knowing your exact location is critical. The Emergency Plus App is a powerful tool that will help you call Triple Zero (000) quickly, while enabling you to provide accurate details of your location to emergency services.

When you are unsure of your location, this is when the Emergency Plus App can make a difference – it uses your phone's GPS to pinpoint your position accurately, potentially saving valuable minutes.

Ensuring your location is clearly provided can help paramedics find you quickly – if it is safe to do so, have someone wait outside to signal the approaching ambulance.

Food Recall Alert - IKEA Pty Limited - SLAGVERK breaded wheat-based pieces 500g



Tip #11. Improve your home's security by arranging a FREE 'Safety Audit' visit from your Crime

Prevention Officer. They can recommend changes to make you feel safer.

Tip #14. Don't tell burglars you live alone. Leave an answering machine greeting that says "

We can't come to the phone right now... ", even if you live alone. If someone is at the door,

call out loudly to your imaginary room-mate that you will answer it, "Don't worry—I'll get it!" Don't list your first name on the apartment directory, or name plate.

Tip #17. Do not open the door to strangers! If they require your help in an emergency, offer to

phone on their behalf.

Tip #20. Keep emergency numbers (see table below) as easy dial/memory on your phone. Keep

the phone by the bed, along with a torch for emergencies. Report anything suspicious.

05 June, from Transport for NSW: Ever wondered what you'd do if you left your phone on the train? Here's a run down

The best starting point is to notify station staff, like Caroline. She'll ask for details about the phone, where you were sitting etc

She'll call the phone to see if another passenger answers. If they do, she'll kindly ask them if they'd be willing to hand it into staff at the next station or wherever they're departing.

If they don't answer, she'll call ahead to the next station with ability to help without interfering with train operations. Then they will look for the phone when the train arrives and call her back if it's found.

She'll then tell the passenger it's been found and offer for them to retrieve it themselves from the other station or come back later in the day after it's been returned to their current spot



05 June, from NSW Fair Trading

Changes to strata laws are starting 1 July 2025, making it easier for owners to:

- obtain minor renovation approvals
- install accessibility infrastructure
- provide evidence that an animal is an assistance animal.

The reforms will also protect strata schemes from unfair contract terms, introduce stricter rules on developers and encourage sustainability.

The New South Wales prison population is at its highest since the COVID-19 pandemic.

New data from the NSW Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research revealed the adult prison population in the state had risen to 13,103 since March 2025, the highest level since the pandemic began in March 2020.

Car accidents can happen to anyone – no matter how good a driver you are. Whether it's a minor ding or a more serious crash, knowing what to do in a car accident is critical – not only for car insurance purposes, but also to help ensure the safety of everyone involved.

In 2021-22, 19,049 car occupants were hospitalised and 736 lost their lives as a result of transport-related injuries on Australian roads.1 Thankfully not every car accident results in injury, but even the smallest incident can be stressful.
