

11 July, from Fire and Rescue NSW Station 037 Gordon: Suspicious Fire – Childcare Centre, Turramurra

At approximately 4:15am today, Gordon A Platoon was dispatched to a reported structure fire at a childcare centre on the Pacific Highway in Turramurra. Crews from Fire and Rescue NSW Station 050 Hornsby and Fire and Rescue NSW Station 058 Beecroft also responded to the incident. Upon arrival, firefighters discovered that the building's sprinkler system had successfully contained the blaze, resulting in minor damage. Fortunately, no injuries were reported.

Preliminary investigations suggest the fire may have been deliberately lit, with reports indicating that accelerant was used throughout the premises. NSW Police Force have established a crime scene, and the incident is under active investigation. We commend the swift response of all attending crews and the effectiveness of the building's fire safety systems.

11 July, from Tuggerah Lakes Police District: FAKE MONEY - REAL ARREST

Police arrested a 47-year-old male from Toukley following a police pursuit yesterday. About 2:24pm yesterday (10 July 2025), Police attached to Tuggerah Lakes Highway Patrol attempted to stop a black Harley Davidson on Evans Road Toukley. The cycle accelerated and failed to stop, engaging police in a pursuit. The pursuit continued through several streets of Toukley before stopping outside a residential address in Pearce Avenue. The 47-year-old male rider was detained and placed under arrest. Inquiries revealed he was disqualified from driving or riding until 2032. A subsequent search his bag located methylamphetamine, \$10,000 in counterfeit \$100 notes and an amount of counterfeit tobacco. The male was taken to Wyong Police Station where he was charged with five offences including Police pursuit - not stop - drive dangerously (2nd+ offence), drive motor vehicle during disqualification period (2nd+offence), possess tobacco products - reckless defraud revenue, possess counterfeit money, and possess drug. He was refused bail to appear before Wyong Local Court today, 11 July 2025. The motor cycle being ridden was also impounded for 3 months under S239(1)(a) of the Road Transport Act 2013.

11 July, from NSW Police: Qantas has reported a cyber incident affecting customer records.

A third-party platform may have exposed data of 5.7 million customers. No financial, passport, or login details were accessed, and airline operations remain unaffected. The Australian Federal Police are leading the investigation. Authorities are assisting the airline, and additional security measures are now in place.

Qantas has established a dedicated **customer support line** (1800 971 541 or +61 2 8028 0534) to provide the latest information to customers, who can also access information at gantas.com/au.

Impacted customers are urged to review available information and seek expert advice on potential required actions for their individual circumstances.

10 July, from Hannah's Blue Butterflies Road Safety Awareness Inc: CAN I BE FINED IF I DON'T HAVE MY DRIVERS LICENCE WITH ME?

Yes, in most Australian states and territories, you can be fined for not having your driver's licence with you while driving, even if you have a valid licence. While digital licences are increasingly accepted, failing to produce either a physical or digital licence when requested by a police officer can result in a fine.

State-by-State Breakdown

- New South Wales (NSW): It is illegal to drive without carrying your
 driver's licence and failing to produce it when requested can result in a
 fine. The NSW Digital Driver Licence is accepted, but you should still
 carry your plastic card as a backup.
- **Victoria:** While digital licenses are accepted, it's advisable to carry your physical card, especially for interstate travel or as a backup.

- Queensland: You are legally required to carry your driver's licence when driving and produce it upon request. If you fail to produce it, you may receive an infringement notice or be required to appear in court.
- **South Australia:** You must carry your licence when driving and show it to a police officer when asked.
- Western Australia: You are required to carry your driver's licence and produce it upon request.
- Tasmania, Northern Territory, Australian Capital Territory: Similar to other states, you are generally required to carry your licence when driving and present it when requested by a police officer.

Key Considerations.

- Digital Licences: While digital licences are increasingly accepted, it's recommended to carry your plastic card as a backup.
- Failure to Produce: Even if you have a valid licence, failing to produce it when requested can lead to a fine.
- Time to Produce: Some states may allow you a grace period to present your licence at a police station after being pulled over.
- Consequences: Penalties for not carrying your licence can vary by state and can include fines or other penalties.
- Whether you have a digital licence, it may be always advisable to carry your physical licence with you as a back-up.

09 July, from OneMusic Australia: Could your gym be at risk for unlicensed music use?

Keep the beats pumping and the reps rolling with a OneMusic licence!

If you play music protected by copyright out loud in a public place for a commercial purpose such as a gym, dojo, or Pilates studio you need permission or you need to purchase a music licence. Legally this music use is different to playing music at home or in your car. This is called **public performance** of music.

09 July, from NHW Australasia: Out and About this week?

Keep a close eye on your stuff. Whether you're at the shops, in a café, at the park, or just running errands, thieves look for easy targets.

Follow these tips to protect your belongings when you're away from home:

- Keep your bag zipped and close, not hanging off the back of a chair or left in a trolley.
- Don't leave your phone or wallet on the table, especially outdoors or near footpaths.
- Be mindful of distractions. A few seconds' distraction is all a thief needs to strike.

These are simple habits that make a big difference. Stay alert, stay safe and help keep your community crime-free.

09 July, from NSW Police: A reminder to always make sure your number plate is visible.

When displaying your P plate, do not obscure your number plate. Our Officers tried O, C and Q with no success before stopping the driver to discover the elusive letter was G. Both front and rear were similarly obscured.

Driving with an obscured number plate carries a fixed penalty of \$448 (in 2018)

and 3 demerit points.



09 July: We had Neighbourhood Watch Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby represented at the Community Safety Precinct Committee meeting held on 18 June 2025.

Mick Lewis from the Highway Patrol spoke about his activities. One item discussed was the displaying of L and P plates.

The Road Rules say: "You must not obscure them (registration plates), for example, with L plates or P plates." More info here.

And from Transport NSW: You must clearly display your L or P plates on the front and back of the outside of your vehicle – the letters must not be hidden. More info <u>here</u>.


