29 August, from The Hills command: COMMUNITY CARE IN ACTION

Recently, neighbours in one of our Hills communities noticed something wasn't quite right — their elderly neighbour hadn't brought the bin in, wasn't answering calls, and didn't respond to knocks at the door. They trusted their instincts and called police. Hills Police and Fire & Rescue NSW attended and forced entry, finding the senior citizen in a dreadful state after a fall. They were rushed to hospital and are now in a serious but stable condition. This could have ended very differently — and it's a powerful reminder that "good neighbours save lives". We're all busy, but if something feels off, go with your gut. We'd rather knock on 100 doors and find nothing wrong than break in to discover a tragedy that could've been avoided.

If you're concerned and unable to raise someone, call "131 444" to request a police dispatch.

27 August, from The Hills command: ## Involved in a crash?

Know your legal obligations! Under Australian road rules legislation, if you're a driver involved in a crash, you must stop and:

☑Provide your required particulars:

- Your name and address
- - The name and address of the vehicle's owner
- - Your vehicle's registration number
- - Any other info needed to identify the vehicle

You must give these details:

- - To other drivers or their representatives
- - To injured persons or their representatives
- To the owners of damaged property (including vehicles)

▲ Failure to comply? If you don't exchange details and can't provide a reasonable excuse, you could be fined \$387 and receive 3 demerit points.

▼ Tip: Always take photos, gather witness info, and report the crash if required.

It protects you and others.

29 August, from Hannah's Blue Butterflies Road Safety Awareness: HOW DO I REPORT SOMEONE THROWING RUBBISH FROM THE CAR? [edited for NSW]

To report someone throwing rubbish from a car window in Australia, you need to use your state's specific reporting mechanism. This typically involves an

online form on the relevant Environment Protection Authority (EPA) website, where you'll provide vehicle registration, location, and incident details, or a phone number for a hotline. Ensure you have the vehicle's registration number, make, model, and colour, along with the date, time, and exact location. You must have personally witnessed the incident and submit your report within a specified timeframe, usually within 7 to 14 days of the event.

NSW

Online: Use the Report Littering website for the NSW EPA here.

What you need: The vehicle's registration number, make, model, and colour, as well as the date, time, and location of the incident.

Timeframe: You must report the incident within 14 days of it occurring.

General Advice

- Safety first: Do not take risks to report the incident. Wait until you have come to a complete stop to make your report.
- Evidence: Take photos of the vehicle, the waste, and the location, if it is safe to do so.
- Verification: You may need to register to submit a report online, and you
 might be contacted for more information or to provide witness testimony
 in court.

QR codes seem to be everywhere now, from local clubs and product packaging to bus stops and billboards, they're regularly used to provide us with instant access to information. It's why the 'QR' in QR codes stands for 'quick response'.

Despite being praised for their convenience, it can sometimes be a struggle to scan QR codes, especially if you have an older phone. So, in this guide we look at how to scan a QR code and what to do when it doesn't work. We've also included a few tips to help you stay safe when being directed to websites via QR codes.

Tips for Using QR Codes Safely

- Only scan QR codes from trusted sources. Some malicious QR codes
 can be placed over legitimate ones at places such as parking stations or
 restaurants, so if you're ever in doubt, play it safe and skip the scan.
- Don't provide personal or financial details unless it's a trusted website. If
 the website is asking for your login details, play it safe and sign in by
 entering the organisation's URL in a trusted browser or visit their official
 app.
- Read any associated permissions carefully. Is the website asking you to save your credit card details or sign up to receive marketing information?
 Be cautious of any unnecessary requests.
- Keep your smartphone's operating system software up to date to ensure you have the latest security updates.
