

09 September, from NSW Health: NSW Health is providing a broad health warning to the community about the danger of using drugs thought to be cocaine, following a recent increase in opioid overdoses in the Sydney and Northern NSW regions.

Ten people across NSW were hospitalised in August with a suspected opioid overdose after using substances they thought to be cocaine, with three requiring treatment in an intensive care unit.

This is a marked increase on the number of people normally seen in this period. Only two of the cases are thought to have been linked. In cases where blood or urine was tested, results show that heroin was present with cocaine.

Medical Director of the NSW Poisons Information Centre, Dr Darren Roberts, said it is important people recognise the signs of an opioid overdose early and know how to respond.

"Opioids such as heroin can cause pin-point pupils, drowsiness, loss of consciousness, slowed breathing/snoring and skin turning blue/grey and can be life-threatening," Dr Roberts said.

"One of the dangers of illicit drug supply is the contents and strength of the substance you are getting is uncertain and can be inconsistent. An opioid overdose could quickly result from a single line".

"Opioids such as heroin can be sold as or found in cocaine, methamphetamine, and MDMA (ecstasy). You cannot always tell the difference between these drugs by appearance.

"In light of this detection, people who use drugs such as cocaine,

methamphetamine, MDMA or opioids should carry naloxone."

If you witness someone experiencing any unexpected symptoms after using drugs, you should call **Triple Zero (000)** immediately or seek urgent medical attention. Naloxone should be given immediately if available.

Naloxone is an important life-saving medication that reverses the effects of opioids. It does not require a prescription and is free for anyone at risk of opioid overdose in NSW. It is available as an easy to use nasal spray or injection from some pharmacies and other health services. For more information on the takehome naloxone program visit <u>here</u>.

NUAA can mail you naloxone in a discreet package. Order via their online shop (https://shop.nuaa.org.au/) or call (02) 9171 6650. You won't get into trouble for seeking medical care. If you feel unwell, or if your friend feels unwell, do something about it.



NSW Recorded Crime Statistics June 2025

The NSW Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research (BOCSAR) has released the latest NSW Recorded Crime Statistics report showing data to June 2025. The latest statistics reveal significant increases in two major offence categories, sexual assault and retail theft, over the two years to June 2025.

- Sexual assault reports in NSW have increased by 8.8% over the past two years, continuing a decade-long trend of annual growth averaging 10%. Since 2015/16, reports have more than doubled (up 136%), driven primarily by increased reporting from adult victims (47%), historic child sexual assault cases (42%), and contemporary child sexual assault (11%). Reports via the Sexual Assault Reporting Option (SARO) accounted for 39% of the rise, while direct reports to police made up 45%.
- Retail theft incidents rose 5.1% over the past two years, up from 28,114 in 2023/24 to 29,552 in 2024/25. Over the past decade, recorded retail theft incidents increased by nearly 30%, growing at an average rate of 2.9% per year.

Four offences saw significant declines:

- break and enter-dwelling down 10.2%
- break and enter non-dwelling down 3.1%
- steal from motor vehicle down 11.3%,
- malicious damage to property down 6.1%

The other seven offences remained stable.

16 September, from 9News.com.au: Grooming-accused teacher messaged child on dating app

A former boarding school teacher accused of grooming a child on a dating app was not sure he was messaging with a real person, his lawyer says.

William Roberto Gulson taught at Knox Grammar School in Sydney's north before he was charged over his messaging with a 15-year-old girl, posing as a boy, in August 2024.

The 28-year-old faced a contested hearing today after pleading not guilty to procuring a child under 16 for unlawful sexual activity.



14 September, from Neighbourhood Watch Ku-ring-gai & Hornsby (NHW K&H): We often get asked about driving, police random drug tests and prescription medicines.

The police drug tests only pick up the illegal drugs. If you are using prescription

medications, it is up to you and your doctor to ensure you are safe to drive.

This document on the subject is available for you to read from the NSW Ministry of Health website here.

There is also information about getting a medical assessment for Fitness to Drive here.



Driving Safety and Medicines

Did you know that some over-the-counter and prescription medicines can affect the way you drive?

Medicines can affect people in different ways.

Ask your doctor or pharmacist for more information.

What types of medicines can affect my driving?

Some examples include:

- Some cold remedies and allergy products (e.g. Codral Day and Night*, Phenergan*)
- Sleeping tablets and anxiety medicine (e.g. Antenex³/Valium³, Stilnox³)
- Pain and opioid medicines (e.g. Lyrica*, Panadeine Forte*, Endone*, Tramal*)
 Some antidepressant and antipsychotic medicines (e.g. Seroquel*, Lexapro*)
- Some medicines for epilepsy (e.g. Neurontin*)
 Opioid treatment medicines methadone and buprenorphine (e.g. Suboxone®,
- Prescribed cannabis medicines

Drinking alcohol or taking illicit drugs when taking medicines, taking more than the prescribed dose, or taking a combination of these substances can seriously affect your ability to drive safely.

How can these medicines affect my driving?

Some medicines can cause:

- Confusion/poor concentration
 Slower reaction time
 Drowsiness/tiredness
- · Dizziness/feeling faint
- · Blurred or double vision
- Muscle weakness
 Anxiety and mood changes
- Shakiness/unsteadiness

These symptoms can make it unsafe for you to drive, cycle or use machinery and can put you and other road users at risk of an accident.

If you are taking any medicine and feel any of the symptoms listed above or are unsure about driving

12 September, from The Hills command; ♣ E-Scooter Collision – West Pennant Hills ♣

At around midday on Tuesday 9 September, a collision occurred at the intersection of Victoria Road and Castle Hill Road, West Pennant Hills, involving an e-scooter and a vehicle. Two boys, who appeared to be around 14 years old and dressed in black, were riding an e-scooter at speed when they struck a stationary vehicle (Nissan X Trail) waiting to turn left. The impact caused both riders to fall to the ground, sustaining minor injuries. The driver of the vehicle immediately rendered assistance and contacted emergency services. However, before paramedics arrived, the boys left the scene. Police attended and conducted a search of the surrounding area, but were unable to locate the riders.

This incident is yet another example of why we continue to highlight the risks and legal issues surrounding e-scooters. These devices are not registerable vehicles in NSW and cannot be legally ridden on public roads. Their increasing use in public spaces poses safety concerns for both riders and other road users.

We urge parents and guardians to speak with young people about the dangers and legal implications of riding e-scooters in public areas.





10 September, from eSafety Commissioner: We've taken action against a tech company responsible for services that have been used to create explicit deepfake images of Australian school children.

A formal warning has been issued to a UK-based company for enabling the creation of child sexual exploitation material through the provision of its online 'nudify' services, in breach of an industry standard under the Online Safety Act. The company - which we've chosen not to name to avoid promoting it and its services - operates two of the world's most-visited online AI-generated nude image websites.

In Australia, these two services have been attracting about 100,000 visitors per month and are being used to generate explicit deepfake images of real students in Australian schools. Issuing a formal warning is the first step in our enforcement process. We will consider further action should the company continue to fail to comply. This enforcement action follows a recent spike in reports to our image-based abuse scheme about digitally altered images, including deepfakes, from children. Reports from children more than doubled in the past 18 months, compared to the total number of reports received in the seven years prior.


10 September, from Ryde command: MAN CHARGED WITH ALLEGEDLY FILMING WOMEN IN CHANGE ROOMS - MACQUARIE PARK

A man will face court today charged with allegedly secretly filming multiple women in a Macquarie Park shopping centre changeroom. About 4pm Sunday 10 August 2025, police were called to a shopping centre on Herring Road, Macquarie Park, following reports a man had filmed a woman changing without

her consent. Officers attached to Ryde Police Area Command arrived and were told a woman had confronted a 35-year-old man after she noticed him filming her while she was in a change room. Police searched the man and seized two mobile phones. Ryde detectives commenced an investigation, searching the phones which allegedly revealed several more intimate videos of unknown women filmed without their consent at the shopping centre and a university in the Macquarie Park area.

Following these investigations, detectives executed a search warrant about 2pm on Tuesday 12 August 2025, at a home on **Congham Road, West Pymble**. During the search, detectives allegedly located and seized multiple electronic devices including several hidden cameras. Following the search, a 35-year-old man was arrested and taken to Hornsby Police Station. He has been charged with intentionally record intimate image without consent, and film person's private parts without consent. The man was granted conditional bail to appear before Burwood Local Court today (Tuesday 9 September 2025).
