30 September, from Ku-ring-gai command: About 7.26pm the 26th of September 2025, Police were patrolling the Old Pacific Highway, Cowan when a vehicle of interest passed them at excessive speed.

Police attempted to pull the vehicle over where the driver appeared to ignore warning lights and sirens. Police initiated a pursuit where it is believed the vehicle was travelling at a speed of approximately 150kph in a 70kph zone. The vehicle eventually pulled over and was inspected. The vehicle was found to have modifications which requires the vehicle to have a compliance sticker to which the driver did not have. Due to the speed the vehicle was travelling, police confiscated the vehicle's number plates for a period of 3 months. The driver, a 27-year-old male was issued with a field court attendance notice for the following offences:

- Police pursuit not stop drive at speed 1st offence
- Drive at speed dangerous 1st offence class A
- Exceed speed over 45kmph class A estimated

• Use modified vehicle on road without compliance certificate

The driver is required attend Hornsby Local Court later next month for those offences.

On return along the pathway a teenager had left a fishing hook with a prawn attached right in the middle of the walk way & within a split second our beautiful little pup had eaten it. Well the hook got stuck at the back of her tongue she went ballistic I instantly held her mouth open as hubby tried to unhook the fishing hook. So flipping stressful. Of course our pup was frantic so we had a second break then opened her mouth again & she'd swallowed the hook.

I admonished the young boy. Actually I really gave him a piece of my mind. So did my husband. He was apologetic, but to me how stupid is leaving a fishing

hook in the middle of a popular walking track where kids & dogs visit regularly? Long story short we rushed her to emergency vet at Terry Hills. She was sedated & had an x-ray and we saw the hook had gone into her stomach, which was better then hooked in organs on the way down. They decided to use an endoscope to see if they could very cautiously remove said hook safely, otherwise if that didn't work, it would be abdominal surgery.

happen to others. And fishing people please keep your hooks & fishing gear in the tackle bag, not in the middle of a very popular walking track where kids also frequent. Yes \$3500.00 but there is no price we wouldn't pay for the love & loyalty of our beautiful puppy dog.

28 September, Shared with permission from the St Ives Community Page and Surrounds group, Sunday 21 September: Hi everyone.

My husband, son and I were travelling south down the Pacific Highway today and at 12:03-ish. We had stopped just before the right hand slip road that allows you to turn down Bridge Street, Pymble (next to Gordon Fire Station). A red P plater (young male) in a mid-late 90s dark green Toyota Landcruiser mounted the median strip to move into the slip lane next to us (which he absolutely couldn't fit into) and scraped the rear of our car as he did so (so he will have damage on his passenger side) before winding down his window and saying I had no spatial awareness (after hitting a stationary vehicle and mounting a median strip...) He then kept going, speeding towards the light and turning right. Such a long shot, but if anyone happens to have seen the accident or has dashcam footage that would be amazing (and miraculous, but we have to try as we couldn't get the details and now have a repair bill). 27 September, from Turramurra High School: On Wednesday Yr 7, 8 and 9 attended a safety presentation where Senior Constable Lynda Hart, Youth Engagement Officer from the NSW Police Youth Command spoke in collaboration with Sydney Transport in relation to train surfing.

The presentation focused on risk taking behaviour on public transport. One of the aims of the presentation was to enhance students decision making skills and foster greater independence when travelling within the community.



27 September, from Ausgrid: Check out Ausgrid's bushfire power pole wraps, featured on NBN news last night.

Ahead of summer we're working on ways to make our electricity network more resilient to bushfires and reduce power outages caused by fire damage. Collaborating with the NSW Rural Fire Service, we're installing bushfire mesh wraps on 3,000 timber poles across the area's most at risk in the Central Coast and Hunter regions. The wraps are made from a fire-responsive mesh covering that expands when exposed to fire, shielding the poles from damage and helping to keep the power on for local communities. With Bushfire season starting 1 October, preparation is key and now is a great time for everyone to start thinking about how they can get ready.


26 September, from Australian Signals Directorate: Do you know what CAPTCHA stands for?

Completely Automated Public Turing test to tell Computers and Humans Apart. CAPTCHAs tell real users and bots apart by asking them to solve challenges that are hard for computers, but easier for humans. For example, identifying distorted letters and numbers, or selecting specific images.

Cybercriminals use fake CAPTCHAs to trick users into running malicious code on their computer. A real CAPTCHA will never ask you to copy or paste text, download a file, or run a program.

To avoid getting tricked by a fake CAPTCHA:

- v only use trusted websites
- only solve CAPTCHAs that ask you to select images or type letters and numbers

26 September, from Transport for NSW: Is it really true you only need to give way to vehicles on your right at a roundabout?

The rule is actually that you need to give way to any vehicle already in the roundabout, whether they're entering on your right, left or directly opposite you $\overline{\mathbf{v}}$

So be aware of all vehicles in the roundabout before entering to avoid a crash •••

26 September from The Hills command: 3 Yes, You Can Cross Double Lines to Pass a Cyclist — But Only If It's Safe!


Did you know? In NSW, drivers are legally allowed to cross single or double white lines to overtake a bicycle rider — but only when:

- You have a clear view of approaching traffic
- It is safe to do so

This rule helps ensure drivers can maintain the minimum passing distance:

- 1 metre when the speed limit is 60km/h or less
- 1.5 metres when the speed limit is over 60km/h


Cyclists are vulnerable road users. Giving them space saves lives. Let's keep our roads safe and respectful for everyone.



26 September, from Australian Communications & Media Authority (ACMA): We've taken action against telco provider Buroserv Australia for failing to follow critical phone scam rules.

Buroserv failed to report over 4 million suspected scam calls, many impersonating trusted organisations including the Department of Immigration and Commonwealth Bank. The telco also failed to report how many scam calls it blocked from July 2022 to June 2024, which is a key requirement under antiscam rules. We've issued a direction to comply, the strongest enforcement action for a first breach. Future breaches could result in penalties of up to \$250,000.

If you think you've been scammed, contact your bank immediately, notify your telco and report it to ScamWatch. Find out how to protect yourself from phone and SMS scams here.

26 September, from The Hills command: SCAM ALERT: Members of the Indian Community are being targeted by scammers impersonating International Police, Military and Courier Services.





Your dashcam, doorbell cam, CCTV or mobile phone could hold the clue we need to solve the crime.



25 September, from the AFP: This is Spot, the AFP's robotic dog!

Unlike its real-life canine counterparts, Spot's greatest sense isn't smell - it's sight. Equipped with LiDAR (Light Detection and Ranging) technology, it uses laser light to capture high-resolution 3D scans of locations. This lets the AFP assess real-world environments during tactical response operations and training, or collect evidence when a member can't enter a location due to size or safety. The robot is operated through a remote control by the AFP's Forensic Search and Imagery Team.



24 September, from The Hills command: & Give Space, Stay Safe! ##
When overtaking cyclists, it's not just courteous — it's the law.

- I metre clearance if you're driving at 60km/h or less
- ✓ 1.5 metres clearance if you're driving over 60km/h

This space helps protect vulnerable road users and prevents serious accidents. Whether you're on a quiet street or a busy road, always check, slow down, and pass safely.

Let's share the road responsibly.



24 September, from the ACMA: Some gambling websites may appear legitimate, but if they're not licensed to operate in Australia, they pose risks because you won't have important consumer protections.

People who've used illegal gambling websites have reported:

- Winnings that were never paid
- Unauthorised charges on their accounts

Don't get caught out. Always check if a gambling site is licensed to operate in Australia.

To protect Australians, we actively investigate illegal gambling operators and work with internet service providers to restrict access.
