28 October, from NSW Police: NSW Police have established a new highvisibility surge operation to proactively target offenders and prevent criminal behaviour, with 95 arrested and in excess of 200 charges laid during the first crackdown.

"This operation shows how we can proactively use each region's officers and resources to enhance our police response in a targeted way." Assistant Commissioner Gavin Wood said.

22 October, from Ryde command: BUSINESSES BEWARE!

Police are warning members of the public to be on alert after counterfeit cash has been reported being handed to businesses in the area.

Counterfeit \$50- and \$100-dollar notes have recently been handed to businesses in the area. Officers have seized the notes and inquiries are now underway.

Tips from NSW Police to spot a counterfeit note include:

- Feel the note. A genuine note is printed on special plastic polymer and is difficult to tear.
- Hold the note to the light and look for the Australian Coat of Arms. This
 is generally located to the left of the clear window, or denomination
 numeral when looking at the front of the note.
- Feel for slightly raised printing on the main design of the note.
- Look for the seven-pointed star inside a circle.
- Compare the background printing look for any distortions or less clearly defined patterns.
- Check that the note has a clear window and that it has a clear printed image: \$50 has the Southern Cross and the \$100 has the lyrebird.
- If possible, look under a UV light to locate the serial numbers.







25 October, from Hornsby Rural Fire Brigade: * Bush Fire - Emu Place, Hornsby Heights *

Last night at 11:55PM we responded both our trucks to a report of a bushfire in Emu Place, Hornsby Heights. We arrived first on scene and investigated along the Waninga fire trail. We discovered an approximate 50m x 10m bushfire burning 20 metres from the trail and below a cliff. Due to the cliff, access to the fire proved to be challenging and so crews from Hornsby Heights Rural_Fire Brigade, Berowra Rural Fire Brigade, Westleigh Rural Fire Brigade, Fire and Rescue NSW Station 075 Berowra and Fire and Rescue NSW Station 050 Hornsby were called upon to assist. The fire was declared fully extinguished just after 2:30AM.

It was also great to see some local residents were up and alert after receiving the notification of the fire on the Hazards Near Me app. Thanks to all brigades and members for their assistance! Crews will be out again today to patrol the fire.



24 October, from Hannah's Blue Butterflies Road Safety Awareness Inc: ARE STEERING WHEEL LOCKS EFFECTIVE?

Yes, steering wheel locks are effective in Australia as a deterrent to car theft, particularly for opportunistic thieves, because they are a visible, physical barrier that slows thieves down and makes a car a less easy target. While not foolproof and not as effective as modern immobilisers, a high-quality lock provides an extra layer of security and makes thieves think twice before attempting a theft, as it would require tools and make noise. To be effective, the lock must be used consistently every time the vehicle is parked.

How steering wheel locks deter thieves-

- Visual deterrent: The visible presence of a lock can make a thief look for an easier target that doesn't have a lock.
- Time and noise: Removing a quality lock requires tools and time, which attracts attention and increases the risk for a thief. They may opt for another vehicle to avoid this.
- Physical barrier: They physically prevent the steering wheel from being turned, making it impossible to drive the car.
- Additional security: They add an extra layer of security, especially for older vehicles that may lack modern electronic systems.

Tips for maximum effectiveness-

- Use it every time: A lock is only effective if it's used. Ensure you fit the lock to the steering wheel every time you park your car.
- Choose a quality lock: A high-quality lock with a strong, hard-to-pick key system is more effective. Some modern locks are more robust against cutting or grinding than older models.
- Combine with other security measures: Use a steering wheel lock in conjunction with other anti-theft devices, such as car alarms or immobilisers, for a more comprehensive security solution.



24 October, from Hornsby Shire Council: EDid you know we have our own fire truck?

It's already making a difference, helping us to deliver burns that reduce bush fire risk and support bushland regeneration. Over the past month our bush fire team has successfully completed four hazard reduction burns across the Shire. These important works help protect homes and bushland by reducing fuel loads and improving safety for more than 360 properties in areas including Hornsby, Cherrybrook, Mount Colah and Thornleigh.

With summer just around the corner it's more important than ever to be bush fire aware. A reminder that you should:

- Create a bush fire survival plan
- Prepare your property
- Stay informed
- Prepare an emergency kit

We're proud to be working alongside the NSW Rural Fire Service, Fire and Rescue NSW and local RFS volunteer brigades to keep our community safe.

- Repeat offender your licence can be cancelled. An authorised officer
 may seize and impound a PWC if it's used in an anti-social manner,
 such as being reckless or menacing.
- Lifejackets on always. You and your passengers, no exceptions
- Seep a safe speed stick to the limits, adjust to conditions
- End Know the distance rules to the shore, structures, other vessels and especially people in the water
- Be respectful of other waterway users

24 October, Shared with permission from the Thornleigh Westleigh and Normanhurst Community group: Fix the dangerous crossing on Buckingham Avenue

Hi Normo residents,

Many of us have long been concerned about the dangerous crossing at Buckingham Avenue and Denman Parade. A month ago, I submitted a Customer Service Request to Hornsby Shire Council about it, but I haven't received any response. I've now created a petition to rally community support and push for change. This intersection is especially hazardous during school hours, with children from the Normanhurst Schools navigating a chaotic layout where four roads meet at awkward angles. The current traffic island offers neither safe nor easy access for pedestrians.

We're calling on the council to reposition the traffic island to align with pedestrian pathways better, installing pedestrian-activated traffic lights, or creating a zebra crossing that gives precedence to pedestrians. Our kids deserve a safe route to school. Let's unite as a community and demand the safety upgrades we need.

23 October, from Hornsby Shire Council: A business in Harris Park was fined after bags of rubbish and furniture items were dumped in bushland in Galston and Arcadia.

Two "Provision of Information Notices" were issued by Council's Illegal Dumping Officer, but the business failed to comply with the notices. This resulted in an obstruction of Council's investigation and delayed the clean-up of this waste.

The matter was taken to court where the offenders were fined a total of \$13,500 under a key piece of NSW State Government legislation (Protection of the Environment Operations Act 1997), before they cleaned up their waste.

22 October, from NHWK&H: Today we were involved with the 'Cyber Safety for Seniors' Forum at the Thornleigh Hillcrest Uniting Church.

A great turn out, great speakers and great questions. Thank you to all the agencies that made it possible and to the church for providing the facilities and yummy home-made catering.

Senior Constable Gemma Stokes, Crime Prevention Officer at Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command asked everyone to take home this - "Don't click on any suspicious links!"

Here are a few of the interesting Q&As discussed by the panel:

Q: You mentioned the use of a Virtual Private Network (VPN), antivirus software and password manager. How can we find a good one?

A: We are not allowed to recommend products. Read the reviews. Look for both good and bad reviews - more legit if both are there.

Q: Have you advice for those with eyesight, hearing, or cognitive decline?

A: Learn new technology every day. Try your local college, or council. "I may be old but I'm not stupid". The government's 'Be connected' website has a lot of self-training you can do at home. Services NSW has 'Digital coaching', eg how to create a myGov account.

For those with failing eyesight or hearing, a nominee can act on your behalf at Services NSW. If you aren't able to do things online, you can do things face-to-face or over the phone.

Request the hearing loop/national relay. Translation services are available. You can nominate a trusted person to act on your behalf. The government's ID Support website has a translate option.

Q: What should we do if we're hit with ransomware?

A: Do not pay. Disconnect the device and report to the police. Use the police community portal or phone the Police Assistance Line 131 444. ID Support can offer advice for the future.

Q: Must I scan my driver's licence to enter an RSL Club?

A: You have the option to enter your details manually. You can also get an Identity Card from Services NSW and offer that instead.

Q: How do I know if my device is compromised?

A: It runs slow and/or is overheating. (Means that something is running in the background.) Suspicious pop-ups are a sign of malware. A browser going to an odd webpage. However, these days malware doesn't want to be found and is more sophisticated. Look for unexplained account activity, eg changes to your account settings. Clean your device with antivirus software.

Q: How can I manage incoming calls?

A: Block unknown numbers. Many phone providers identify probable spam or suspected scam messages. The iPhone has a "call screening" setting, which asks unknown number callers why they are calling.

Q: Are QR codes safe?

A: Yes. Common now in public places such as cafe menus. Other places, look for spelling errors and stickers placed on top of the original QR code. Don't trust a random QR code on a post in the street. Check the preview web address (URL) before you click.

Thornleigh Hillcrest Uniting Church is hosting another forum in April with the help of the police. It is for parents and youths, and addresses youth cyber security, cyber bullying and the use of Al. It is provisionally planned for 5pm onwards, including a bbq. More details will follow nearer the time. Thank you to Gay and Julia, also Peter (Volunteer in Policing).



22 October, from the Australian Federal Police: Locked, loaded and seized. \$\frac{1}{2}\$

A targeted crackdown on illicit firearms has resulted in more than 1,000 firearms and parts being seized and 184 arrests, as part of a week of action involving border, law enforcement, and intelligence agencies across the country. There was a particular focus on privately manufactured firearms and 3D printed parts. Authorities seized 281 3D printed firearms, and privately manufactured parts – including a printer which was in the process of manufacturing a firearm part at the time of the warrant. Imported firearm parts can be constructed with other privately manufactured parts, creating dangerous and untraceable weapons filtering onto our streets.

The ABF will continue to work closely with our partner agencies to disrupt criminals seeking to obtain illegal firearms and firearm parts which can potentially harm the Australian community.

22 October, from 9News.com.au: Australians using certain Samsung phones have been told to urgently update or replace their devices because they may not be able to make triple zero calls.

22 October, from NHW Victoria: Retail theft often goes unreported but every report helps protect your business and community [edited].

Here is a guide for you.

If you experience or witness theft:

- Employers: Support your staff to report incidents safely and record details.
- Employees: Don't confront offenders report to police and Crime Stoppers (1800 333 000).

As a retail employer,

- Zero-tolerance policy → Clearly display "abuse of staff will not be tolerated" signage.
- Staff training → Teach de-escalation strategies and when to disengage for safety.
- Buddy system → Never leave new or younger staff to close the store alone.
- Incident reporting → Keep a log of abusive customers and report repeat behaviour to police/security.
- Support network → Encourage staff to speak up and provide access to counselling or support services if needed.





As a retail employee,

- Trust your instincts → If someone is aggressive, don't try to "win" — step back and stay safe.
- Use calm language → Lower your voice, stay respectful, and don't escalate.
- Know your rights → Your workplace should have a zero-tolerance policy for abuse.
- Ask for backup → Call a co-worker or manager if you feel threatened.
- Aftercare matters → Report the incident, and if shaken, seek support from your manager or services like Lifeline 13 11 14 or 1800 RESPECT
