25 November, from NSW Police Force

The 16 Days of Activism against gender-based violence is an annual campaign held from 25 November (International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women) until 10 December (Human Rights Day).

The theme for 2025 is 'Every young person should feel safe from domestic and family violence.'

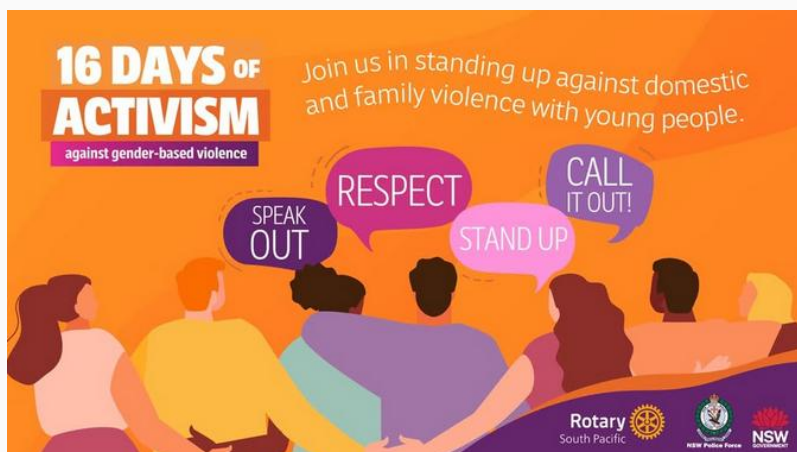
The NSW Police Force promotes the 16 Days of Activism in partnership with Rotary to encourage the community to take a stand against domestic and family violence by participating in local events.

Minister for Police and Counter-terrorism, Yasmin Catley said police were doing everything they could to address domestic and family violence.

"Last year, police responded to more than 150,000 domestic and family violence-related calls for assistance – that's one every three and a half minutes," Minister Catley said.

"Police are doing outstanding work, but we cannot arrest our way out of this. Prevention, early intervention and cultural change are essential.

"If you see something, hear something or suspect something, please speak up. You could save a life."

● TEEN ARRESTED FOLLOWING FATAL STABBING (THE HILLS LGA)

- 9:05PM, Monday 24th November

A teenage boy has been arrested following a stabbing in Beaumont Hills this afternoon.

About 4.20pm (Monday 24 November 2025), emergency services were called to a reserve on Caballo Street, Beaumont Hills, following reports of a stabbing.

Officers attached to The Hills Police Area Command arrived to find a 17-year-old boy with a stab wound to his leg.

He was treated by NSW Ambulance paramedics; however, he died at the scene.

Police established a crime scene, and detectives from The Hills – with assistance from State Crime Command's Homicide Squad – commenced an investigation into the incident.

About 7.30pm a 15-year-old boy was arrested after attending a police station in Sydney's north-west.

Inquiries into the incident are continuing.

Warning to dog owners after attack on Springdale Rd

This post is to raise awareness of an incident that happened last night (Wed 19 Nov) at around 7.30pm. My Labradoodle was attacked on Springdale Road, not far from Karranga Ave in Killara.

I was walking my dog on her lead when an unmuzzled German Shepherd, with a male owner walking at least ten metres behind us, slipped his/her lead and attacked my dog

in an unprovoked manner. The owner had been distracted by his phone which led the dog to break free from his control and chase my dog down.

Unfortunately, due to the stress of the incident, no details were provided by the owner of the German Shepherd. However, there was a witness who suggested I report it to the council.

Just wanted to warn others that may walk their dog in that area. Thankfully my dog seems okay apart from being bitten on the neck. It could have been worse and I would hate to think other dog walkers/dogs/small kids in that area could face the same traumatic event.

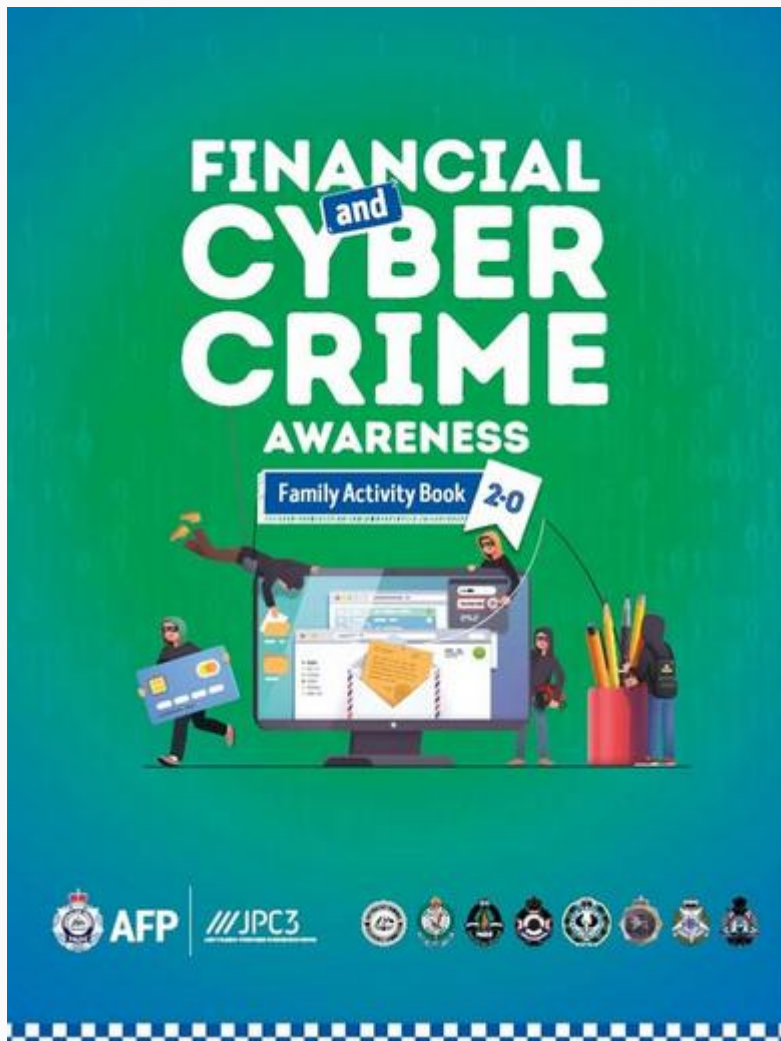
The booklet has a lot of fun activities such as colouring-in, word search, puzzles, dot-to-dot, quizzes, etc.

Suggestions to help protect your child on the internet

- Maintain direct and open communication with your child
- Where possible keep all internet-capable devices in common family areas
- Know how to disable location services on your child's smart device
- Check privacy settings on your child's social media accounts
- Be aware of the social media sites on your child's device
- Check your child's online profiles and ensure the content is appropriate
- Consider password protected settings for installation of age appropriate applications on smart devices and computers
- Consider installing filtering and/or blocking software on computers
- Know how to save copies of your child's instant messaging chat logs
- Monitor your child's phone plans and credit for unusual activity - - Consider what device you provide your child

- Children should be able to tell you the name of their online friends
- Ensure you have access to your child's accounts in order to monitor them
- Consider appropriate phone and data plans for your child
- Consider syncing smart devices to family account

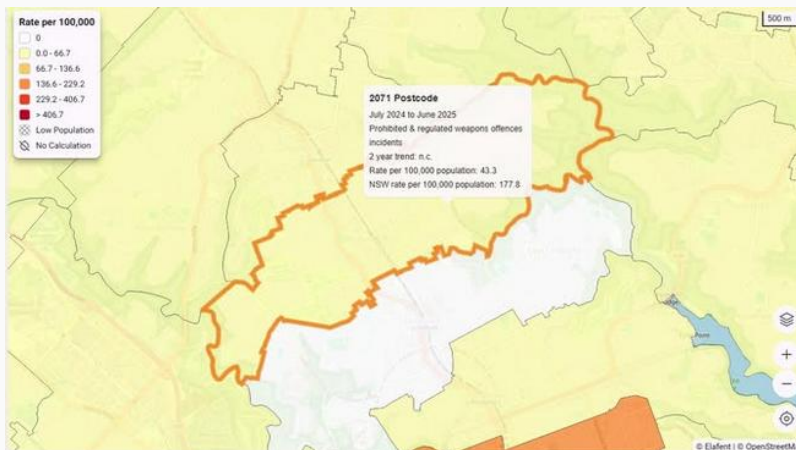

A Swedish startup called Corvid Cleaning has found a clever way to fight litter using wild crows. According to The Guardian, the company developed a device that rewards crows with food when they drop cigarette butts into it. The machine uses a simple system of operant conditioning, and the crows quickly learned how to trade trash for treats.

The pilot project took place in Södertälje, Sweden, where cigarette butts make up nearly half of the city's street litter. This approach could save the city millions in cleanup costs while reducing environmental harm. According to CNN, the device is still in the testing phase, but early results are promising.

The crows have shown remarkable intelligence and adaptability, and the startup hopes to expand the program to other cities. By turning one of nature's smartest birds into a cleanup partner, Corvid Cleaning is showing how innovation and animal behavior can work together to solve real-world problems.

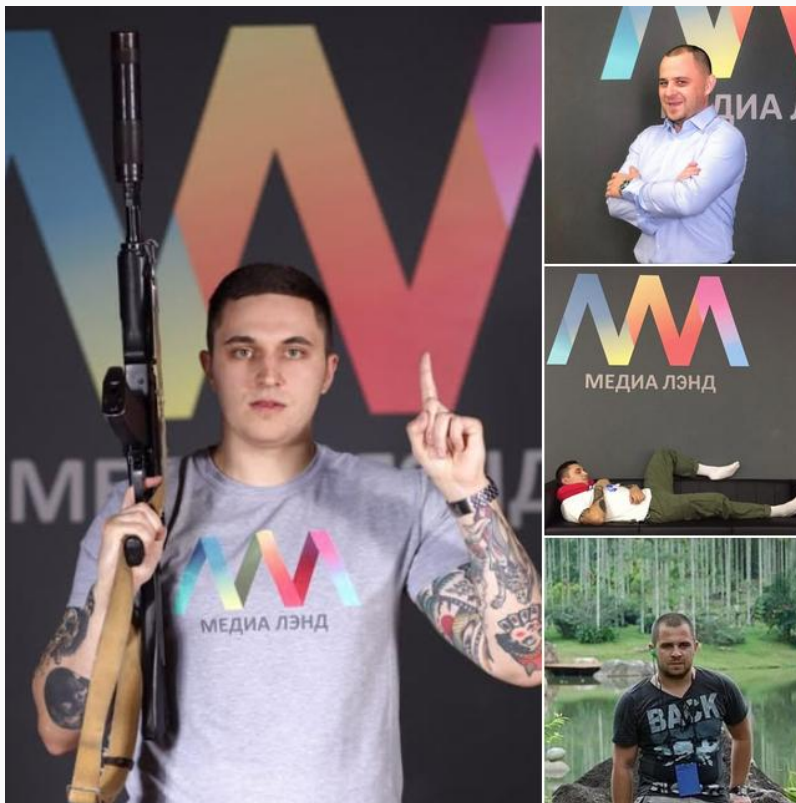
The Australian Government and allies in the United Kingdom and United States have today jointly sanctioned two Russian men and two companies after international investigations into cybercriminal networks responsible for cyber attacks against Australian and international businesses.

The sanctioned men – Aleksandr Alexandrovich Volosovik (aka Yalishanda) and Kirill Andreevich Zatolokin – operate two companies that provided services to cyber criminals on the dark web during a 10-year period.

The sanctioned companies – Media Land LLC and ML. Cloud LLC – provide a service known as ‘bulletproof hosting’, in which cyber criminals pay to use the companies’ digital infrastructure to commit sophisticated cybercrimes such as ransomware attacks, malware infections and scams.

These companies aid criminal activity by deliberately avoiding or ignoring requests from international law enforcement and governments to take down websites conducting illegal activity on their platforms.

Today's sanctions include financial penalties and travel bans to disrupt criminal activity, expose cybercriminals' identity, and impose costs and consequences on cybercriminals.



22 November, from Rural Crime Prevention Team: Firearms and UNINHABITED DWELLINGS – what you need to know and do - now!

In recent times the Rural Crime Prevention Team - NSW Police Force have been investigating firearm thefts that could have been avoided if the legislation was followed by the licensed firearms holder.

These safe storage requirements are not optional.

The Rural Crime Prevention Team - NSW Police Force want to help you in preventing your guns from being stolen and in the hands of someone else.

If you are a firearms license holder and store firearms at a property considered an UNINHABITED DWELLING, you MUST put in place additional safe storage.

What is an UNINHABITED DWELLING we hear you ask?

An UNINHABITED DWELLING is considered a structure that is not your primary residence, like a hobby farm, weekender or secondary farm.

It also includes a structure where you have your firearms stored that is OUT OF SIGHT of your house.

If so, you MUST take additional measures.

In order to be compliant, you MUST do the following to ensure you meet the safekeeping requirements:

SAFE

Must be an approved type.

Fitted with an alarm with off-site monitoring (including via 'smart' technology).

FIREARMS

Secured individually in the safe.

Fitted with trigger or barrel lock.

PREMISES

Intruder or duress alarm with back-to-base monitoring capabilities (including via 'smart' technology).

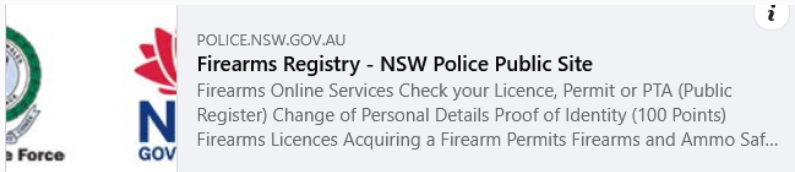
Our focus is on investigating these firearms thefts, charging those responsible and recovering the firearms.

However, if you don't have any of these conditions in place, you could be in breach of the legislation and action taken against you for not ensuring the safekeeping of your firearm. You are also at risk of your firearms being stolen, and your license suspended.

As a licensed firearms holder you are to ensure your firearms are not stolen, lost or come into the hands of another that is not authorised to possess the firearm.

Maximum penalty — \$5,500 penalty units or imprisonment for 2 years, or both, if the firearm stolen was a prohibited firearm or a pistol, or \$2,200 or imprisonment for 12 months, or both, in any other case.

A childcare worker whose "singular error" allegedly caused a horrific crash, killing a pregnant woman and her unborn child, has been granted release on bail.

Samanvidha Dhareshwar, 33, was walking with her husband and a child in northern Sydney when struck by a station wagon on November 14.

The crash in Hornsby was allegedly caused after the station wagon was itself struck by a luxury sedan driven by a 19-year-old P-plater.

- ✅ Knock on doors offering “urgent” work
- ✅ Pressure you into quick decisions or cash payments
- ✅ Leave jobs unfinished or of poor quality
- ✅ Often target the elderly

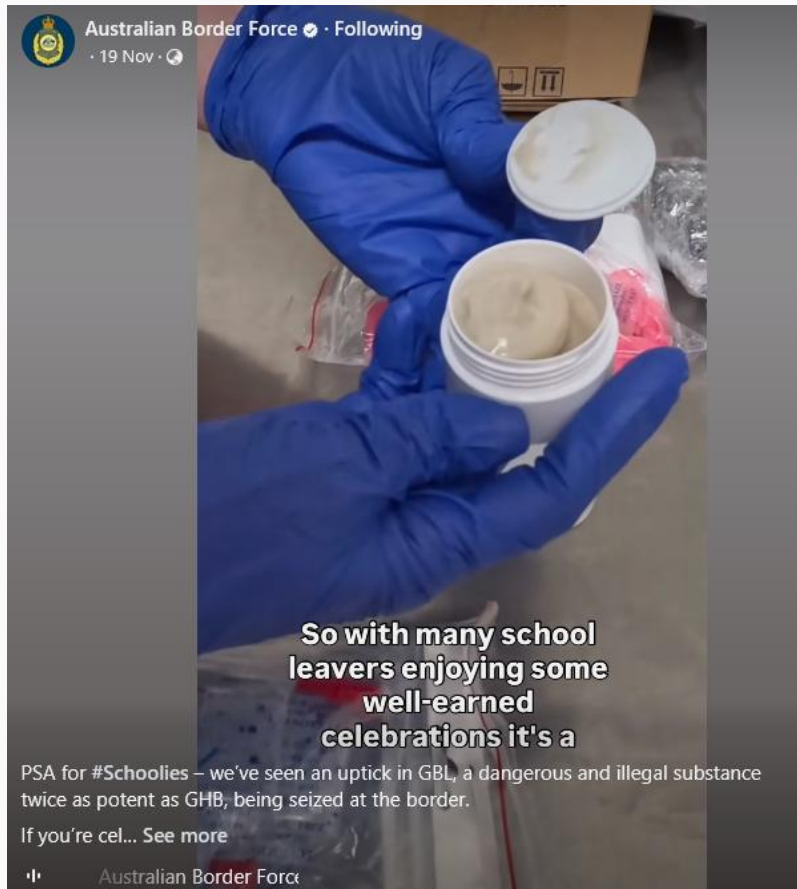
Protect yourself:

- Always check licences and insurance
- Get multiple written quotes
- Never pay full amount upfront
- Use trusted tradies you’ve used before or recommended by a trusted friend or family member
- If in doubt, say NO and report suspicious activity

20 November, from 9 News Sydney: As of the first week of December, the age-check will be required in Australia before expanding globally.

Popular online gaming platform ROBLOX introduces facial age estimation, restricting kids' chat

Controversial online gaming platform ROBLOX has introduced age verification, using facial age estimation to limit access to player-to-player chat to the age group of the user.

Despite not being listed as a social media platform and not required to limit users under the upcoming social media minimum age legislation, ROBLOX has been in talks with Australia's eSafety Commissioner regarding their need to comply with the Online Safety Act which requires services to take meaningful action to prioritise the protection of children.

Roblox has introduced a new process for age estimation which uses a device's camera to perform a scan of a user's face, not dissimilar to what you do to setup face unlock on a smartphone - and using that scan to estimate the user's age.

Don't Let a Lazy Night Cost You a Break-In!

Not all crimes happen in the middle of the night. Many occur early - when offenders find easy access.

Before bed, take a few minutes to secure the things people often forget:

Spare car keys – Not on the hallway table. Hide them.

Garage remotes – Don't leave them in the car. Bring them inside.

Bags near doors – Move them out of sight from windows.

CCTV systems – Make sure cameras are recording and batteries are charged.

Bathroom and laundry windows – Often overlooked, often used to gain entry.

Outdoor tools and ladders – Lock them up, don't make it easier.

Mail and parcels – A full letterbox says, 'nobody's home'.

18 November, from The Hills Police Area Command: Seven charged after copper from water meters and piping stolen - Strike Force Element

In September 2025, North West Metropolitan Region established Strike Force Element to investigate the widespread theft of copper from water meters and copper piping.

Since August 2025, police have received reports for 154 incidents across Sydney's north west including Gordon, Pymble, Waitara, Wahroonga, St Ives, and Epping.

Strike Force investigators commenced inquiries after copper tubing was stolen from a construction site on Mowbray Road, Lane Cove, on Tuesday 12 August 2025.

Following inquiries, search warrants were executed at home in Thornleigh and Werrington on Thursday 9 October 2025.

At Werrington, officers seized cannabis, methamphetamine, a mobile phone and clothing relevant to the investigation.

The occupant a 54-year-old man was arrested and taken to St Marys Police Station where he was charged with aggravated break and enter dwelling in company steal and two counts of possess prohibited drug.

At Thornleigh, officers seized two firearms and a poker machine. The firearms will be forensically examined.

A 43-year-old man was arrested on Friday 10 October 2025 after attending Parramatta Police Station. He was charged with aggravated break and enter dwelling in company steal and be in unauthorised possession of approved gaming machine.

They were both granted conditional bail and are next due to appear at Hornsby Local Court on Wednesday 19 November 2025.

Officers attached to The Hills Proactive Crime Team attended a shopping centre at Box Hill about 7.30am on Thursday 23 October 2025, after reports of copper cabling being stolen.

Police located a car in the carpark and spoke to the occupants, a 33-year-old man and a 32-year-old woman.

The man was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station where he was charged with six counts of larceny, armed with intent commit indictable offence, drive with suspended licence and breach of bail.

He appeared before Parramatta Local Court on Friday 24 October 2025 where he was granted conditional bail to appear at the same court on Thursday 13 November 2025.

Officers attached to Riverstone Police Area Command attended a construction site on Conferta Avenue, Tallawong, after reports of persons trespassing.

Police spoke to a 41-year-old man and a 40-year-old woman nearby and during a search as number of tools were found in their possession. Inquiries revealed a large, heavy spool pf copper wiring had been moved on the site.

They were arrested and taken to Riverstone Police Station where they were both charged with larceny and enter enclosed land not prescribed premises without lawful excuse. She was also charged with possess housebreaking implements and him with breach of bail.

The man appeared at Blacktown Local Court on Thursday 30 August 2025 where he was formally refused bail to appear at the same court on Thursday 15 January 2026.

The woman was granted conditional bail to appear at Blacktown Local Court on Monday 24 November 2025.

As part of ongoing inquiries, strike force investigators stopped a vehicle on Crawford Road, Doonside, about 4.10pm on Friday 7 November 2025, and spoke to the driver, a 40-year-old woman.

During a subsequent search of the vehicle, police seized various tools and implements.

The woman was taken to Blacktown Police Station charged with 45 offences,

19 counts of larceny

13 counts of destroy or damage property, and

13 counts of interfere/damage/destroy/disconnect meter with intent/reckless.

Police will allege the cost of the damage caused as well as the stolen materials to be estimated in excess of \$30,000.

The woman appeared before Parramatta Local Court on Saturday 8 November 2025 where she was granted conditional bail to appear at Hornsby Local Court on Wednesday 19 November 2025.

Investigations under Strike Force Element continue.
