New laws make it easier to find ethical, accountable dog breeders in NSW:

- Breeders must have an official breeder ID number
- Ads must include the puppy's microchip and breeder ID
- Female dogs can only have up to 5 litters (up to 3 by caesarean) in their lifetime
- Limits on the number of dogs per premises
- Breeders need enough staff to give all dogs proper care.

These changes help protect animals and give everyone confidence when buying a puppy.

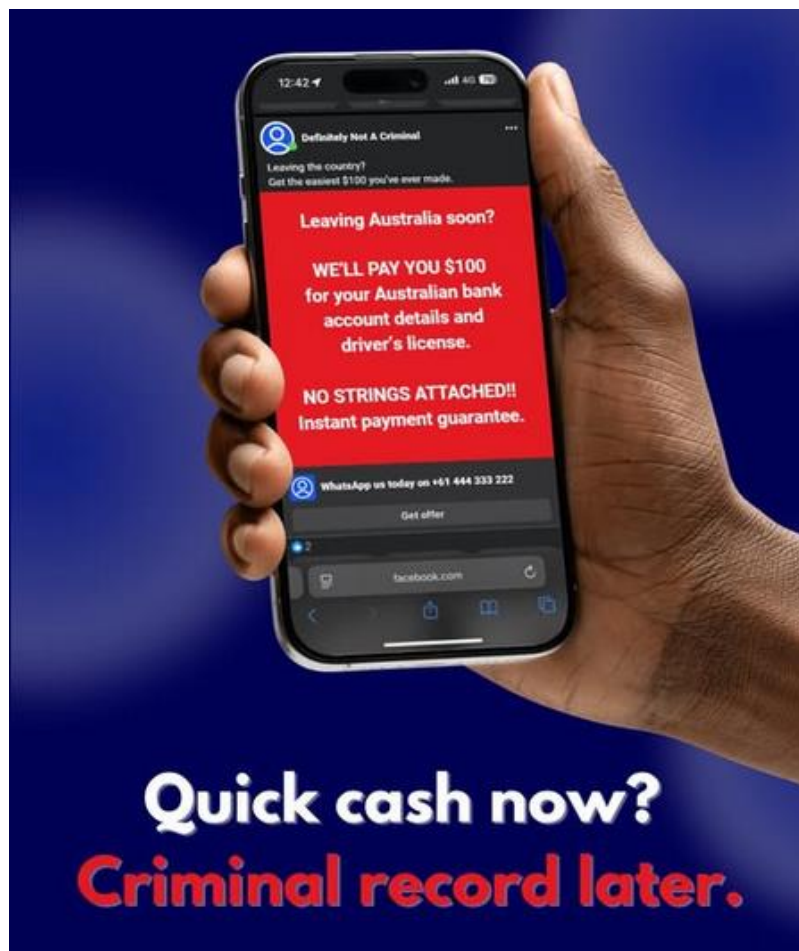
01 December, from Australian Federal Police

The AFP is warning international students not to sell or hand over their accounts or ID documents to anyone – especially strangers who contact them via social media or messaging platforms, or in-person.

Criminal syndicates looking to scam and launder money in Australia are targeting international tertiary students with offers of 'quick cash' and commissions for access to their bank accounts and identity documents. While these offers to buy or rent accounts are presented to students as legal, they're actually anything but. And with criminals using accounts and identities in illicit activities such as money laundering and large-scale scam operations overseas, students could easily find themselves permanently linked to crime networks.

What might look like a harmless favour, or an easy money earner, can result in criminal charges, visa cancellations, and permanent bans from returning to Australia.

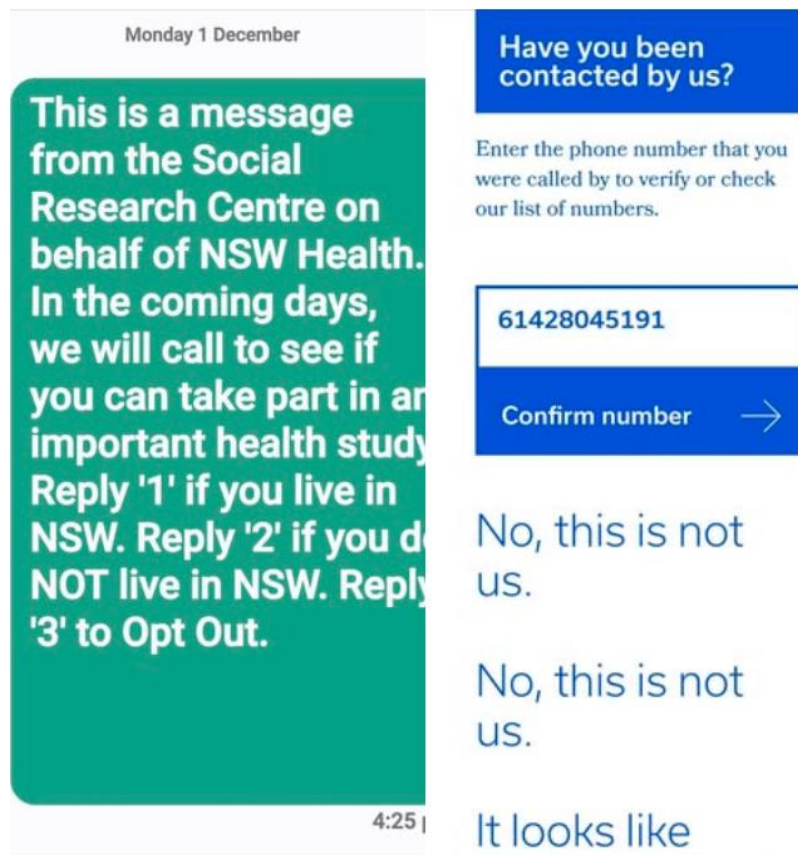
Before leaving Australia, we urge students to close their local bank accounts, secure their digital and personal identity, and never sell or share their details with anyone.

01 December, from eSafety Commissioner



🗨️ Smart features are becoming standard on devices we carry, wear, and use. This includes household appliances, TVs, cars, and wearables like phones and watches.

As adoption grows, so do the opportunities for misuse – especially during relationship breakdowns.

Perpetrators can use connected tech to monitor, track or control a partner or former partner. They exploit location-sharing and geo-location features and things like shared accounts.

Protect yourself by:

📌 reducing the apps and services you use with tracking and alerts

📱 turning off live location and drive scoring

👁️ reviewing what's visible on your phone lockscreen.

💡 Treat location sharing as a choice, not a default. You can turn it on for a short time – such as a trip – and turn it off again later.

⚠️ Your safety is the priority. If you think a former or current partner might be using tech to track you, contact 1800RESPECT national counselling and referrals (1800 737 732).

If you're in immediate danger or worried about someone else's safety, call emergency services on Triple Zero (000).

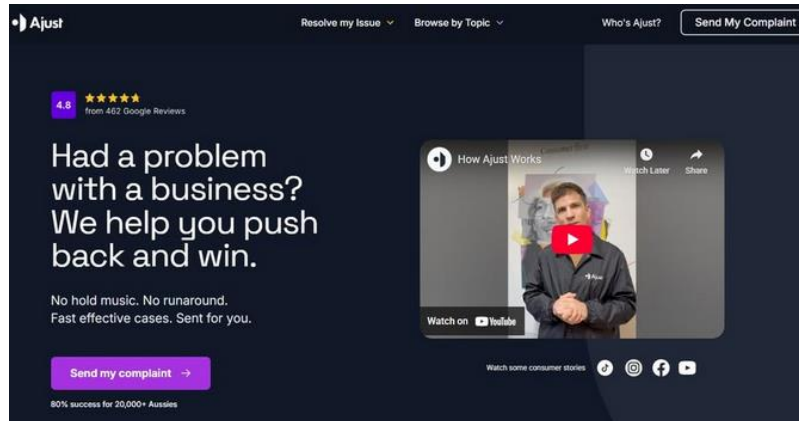

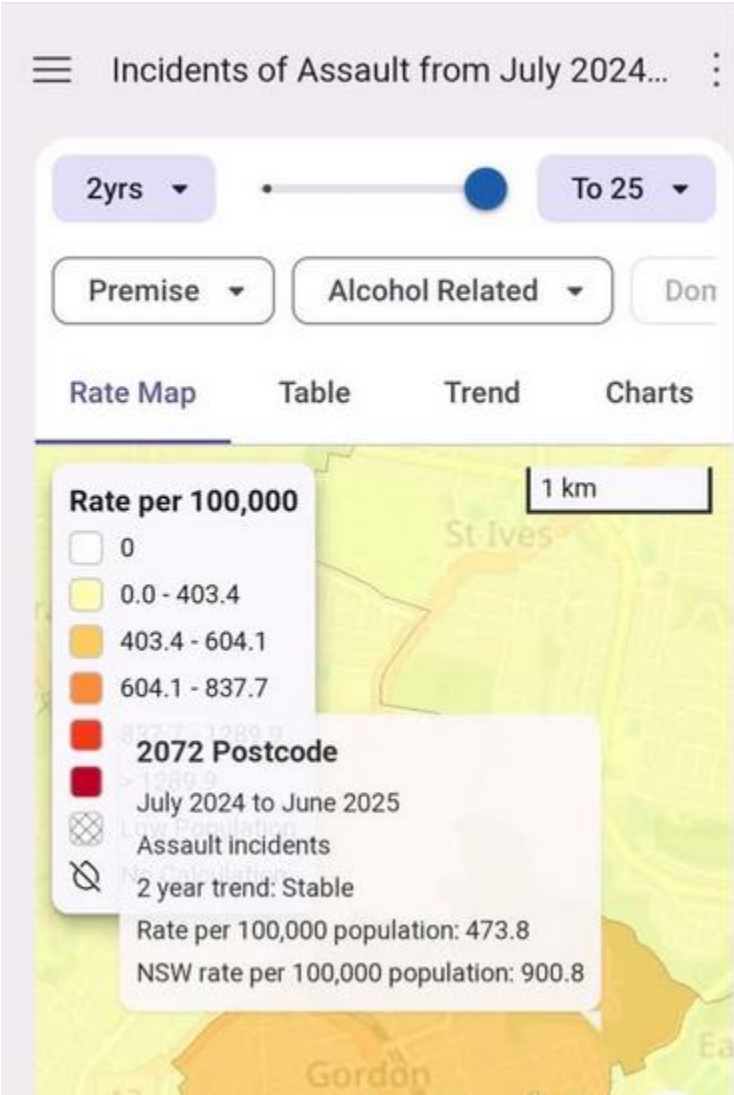

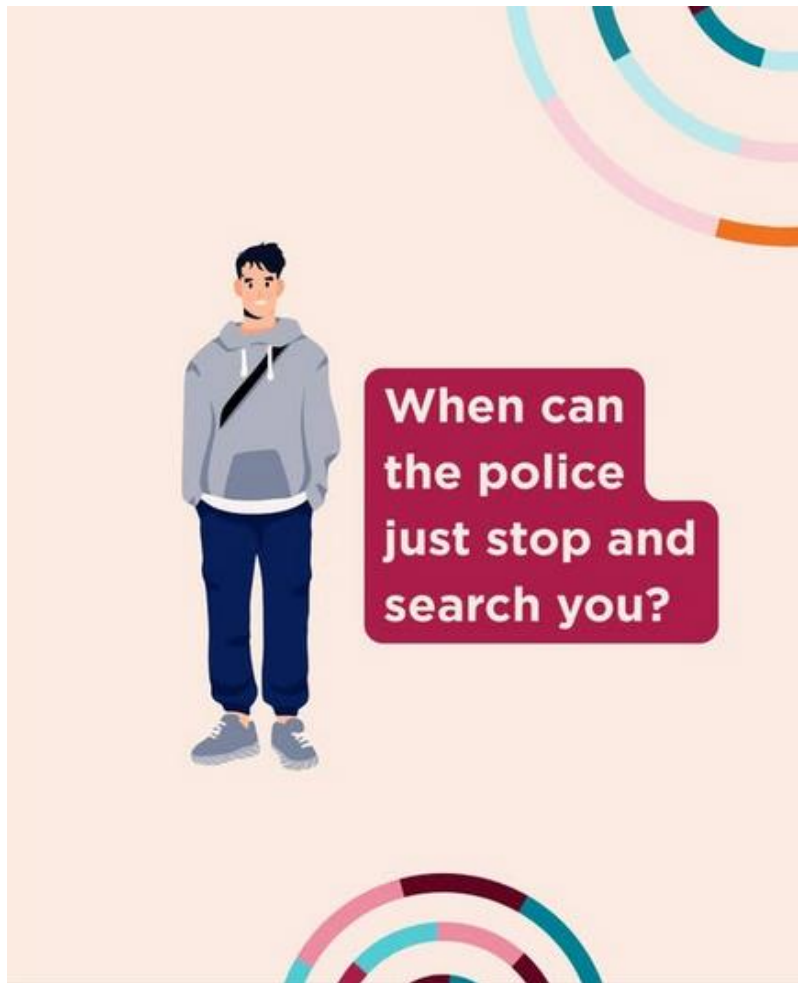

- ◆ you agree to the search.

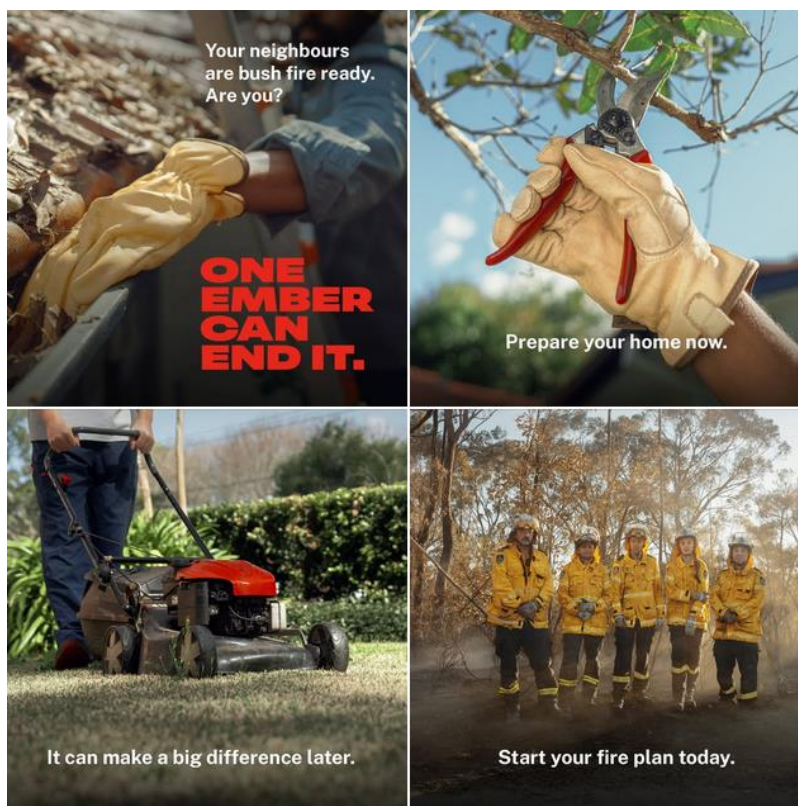

29 November, from NSW Health

Hypersonic music festival, happening on 29 November at Sydney Showground, will offer a free, anonymous drug checking service as part of the 12-month NSW drug checking trial.

Festivalgoers can have substances intended for personal use tested by qualified health staff. They'll get quick results on what is found inside and,

where possible, the potency, to help them make informed decisions. Trained peer workers will then provide advice on reducing risks and can also offer confidential support.

While illicit drugs remain illegal in NSW, this trial aims to reduce risks and harms associated with their use.

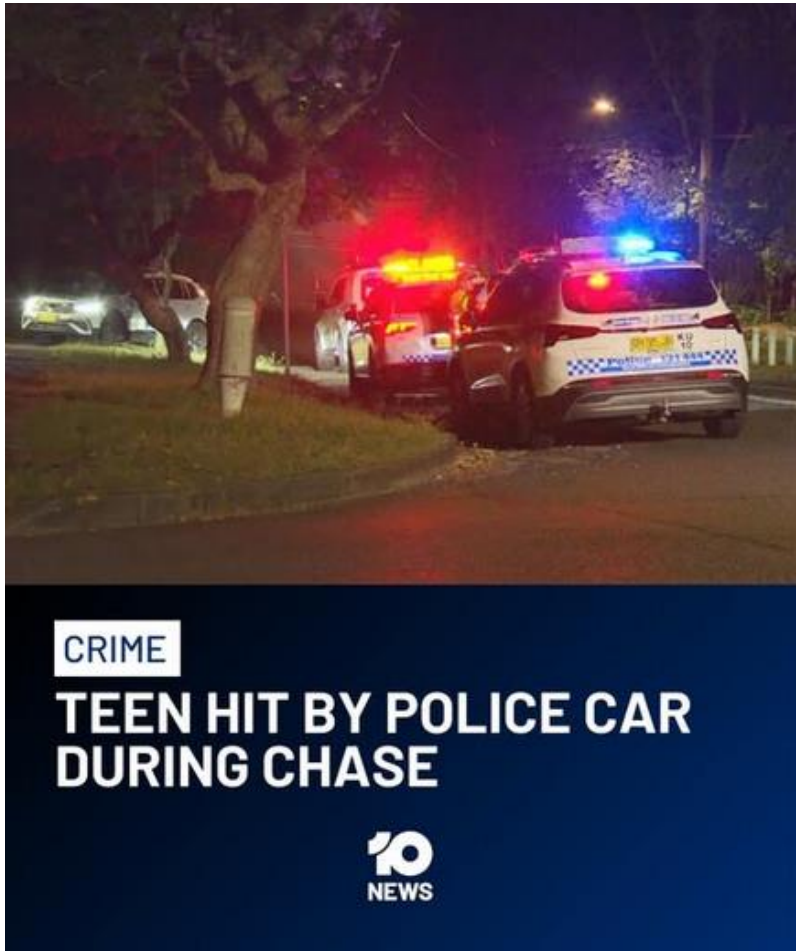

29 November, from 10 News Sydney



A 16-year-old boy has been hit by a police vehicle after allegedly attempting to run from officers in Sydney's north.

Police arrived at the Gordon train station just after midnight, where several boys were chasing another with one allegedly carrying a knife.

Police say they arrested the 16-year-old boy before he ran away.

They then claim the boy collided with an oncoming police car, but do not say why the car was driving on the footpath.

The boy sustained minor injuries and was taken to hospital for assessment.

PSA: Unit blocks with secure parking.

A reminder to be vigilant with your carparks roller doors and other entry points to your garages.

Recently I came home to find the roller door up late at night which didn't seem right.

A review of our CCTV footage revealed someone had moments before put something over the sensor to keep the door open presumably to carry out theft in the carpark through the night.

Trust your gut!

28 November, from NSW Health: NSW Health is warning the community of the risks of illicit drug use after detecting two substances of concern recently.

- The first warning concerns multiple MDMA (ecstasy) tablets and capsules containing a higher dose than usually circulates in tested community samples.
- Ketamine-like substances, or analogues, have also been detected in white powder and crystalline matter.

Both substances were detected by the NSW Government's drug checking trial at last weekend's Strawberry Fields event in Tocumwal, in Southern NSW.

No festival attendees experienced an overdose requiring hospitalisation, and one drug warning was issued to patrons on Friday night for the MDMA tablets.

NSW Health is concerned the substances are still in circulation and drug checking, through the NSW Government's drug checking trial, will be available at the Hypersonic music event taking place at Sydney Showground in western Sydney this Saturday.

NSW Health Chief Addiction Medicine Specialist, Dr Hester Wilson said it was also concerning it will be hot this weekend, with temperatures expected to be in the 30's.

"High doses of MDMA can cause severe agitation, raised body temperature, seizures or fits, irregular heart rhythm and death," Dr Wilson said.

“These risks are greatly increased if MDMA is used with other stimulants, such as amphetamines or cocaine, or if high amounts are consumed over a short period.

“The amount of MDMA in a tablet or capsule can vary significantly, even within the same batch.”

“Hot environments, such as at music festivals, increase the risk of harm from MDMA. Taking a break from dancing, seeking shade and drinking water are important measures to reduce the risk of overheating.”

There have also been detections of ketamine analogues in white powders and crystalline substance expected to contain ketamine or amphetamine. Ketamine analogues copy ketamine’s chemical makeup but can produce different effects, including stronger dissociation or hallucinations.

Ketamine-like substances, or analogues, can cause seizures and irregular heart rhythm. There is potential for greater harm if the ketamine analogue is taken in combination with depressant drugs, such as alcohol, GHB, benzodiazepines, or opioids, or with stimulants (such as methamphetamine, cocaine or MDMA).

“If you or a friend has taken drugs and feel unwell, you won't get into trouble for seeking medical care. Please seek help immediately by calling Triple Zero (000),” said Dr Wilson.

At music festivals there are experienced onsite medical providers and teams of well-trained peer volunteers from programs such as DanceWize NSW who are ready to support you at many major festivals. Other event staff are also trained to help patrons.

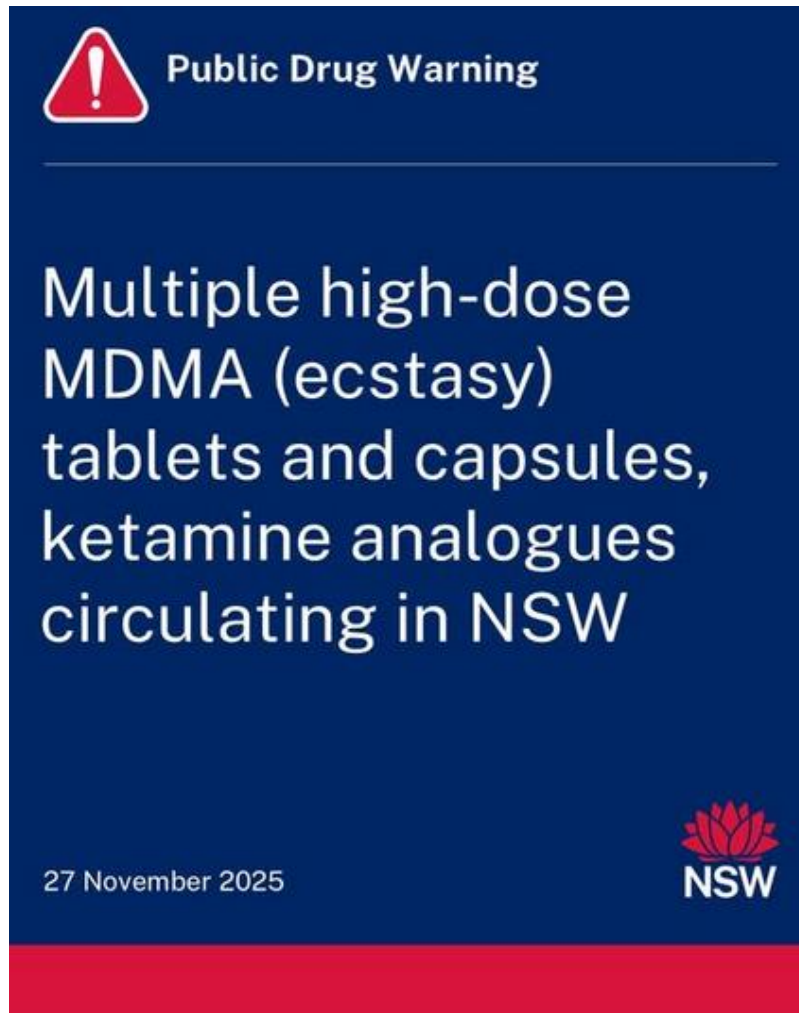

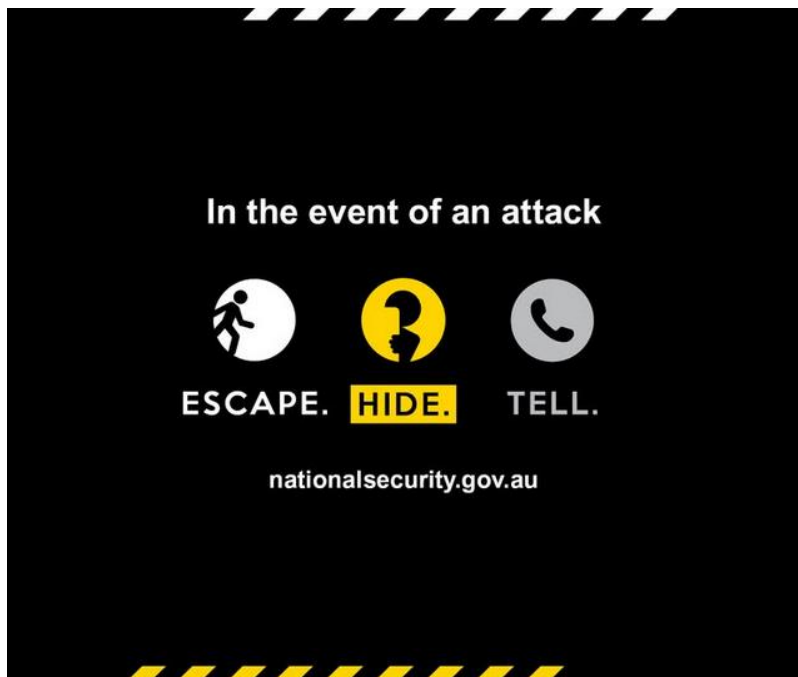

25 November, from NSW RFS Ku-ring-gai Brigade



It was a busy week last week for Ku-ring-gai with crews out almost everyday supporting a number of hazard reductions and training events.

🔥 On Monday - Wednesday we provided crews across all 6 shifts at the St Ives Showground HR, at times with all 4 of our vehicles out and crewed, alongside crews from Ku-ring-gai Council, Hornsby/Ku-ring-gai District and Northern Beaches District.

🔥 On Friday we sent a crew to Castle Hill where they assisted Fire and Rescue NSW with the Drawbridge HR

👷 On Saturday we had our crew day where, along with Mt Kuring-gai Rural Fire Brigade, we removed the remaining lengths of hose and pumps from the St Ives Showground HR. This was a mammoth effort by all involved, carrying a significant amount of heavy gear out of steep terrain

🔪 One of our members also took part in a chainsaw training workshop with our friends at NSW SES Ku-Ring-Gai Unit

🚒 Also on Saturday, while en route to St Ives Showground, Ku-ring-gai 1A was diverted to a MVA on Mona Vale Rd where a car and bus had collided.

Thankfully no-one was injured and our crew stood by to provide fire protection until the vehicle was safely loaded onto a tow truck.

Hazard reductions are a vital tool to reduce the risk and impact of bushfires but its important that you know what you'll do if a bushfire threatens your home.

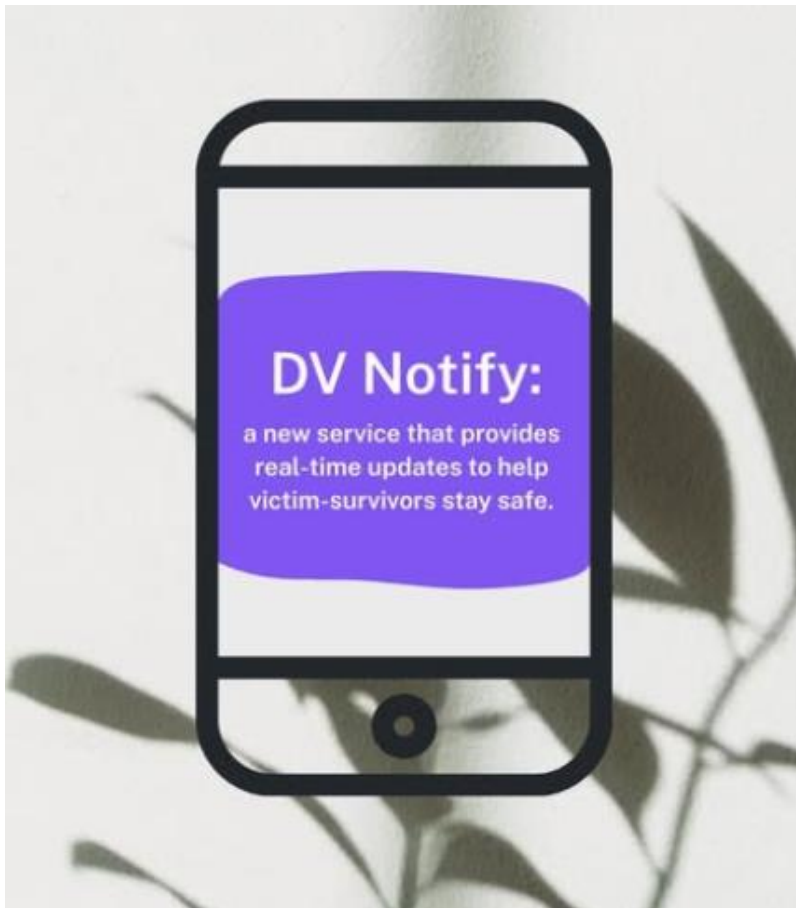

There's a first-of-its-kind digital service to help domestic and family violence victim-survivors stay safe.

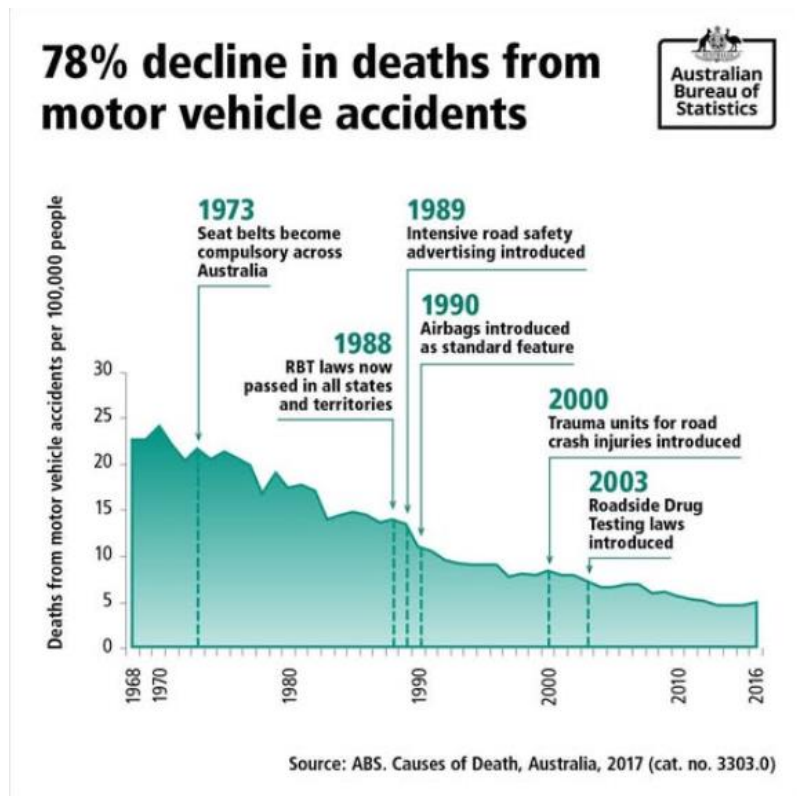
DV Notify sends text or email updates when an alleged perpetrator is released from custody, so victim-survivors know what's happening and where to find support.
