Hi everyone,


This morning at 10:52am (08/02/2026) I was driving along Bobbin Head Road when a driver in what appeared to be a silver Honda Accord pulled out in front of me from Bannockburn Road, causing a collision and damaging the front of my black Corolla hatchback.

Instead of stopping, the driver drove off immediately before exchanging details — which is a hit and run.

If anyone was driving in the area around this time and has dashcam footage, especially showing the silver Honda Accord involved, please message me ASAP. Even partial footage (number plate, angle of the car, direction they drove off) would be extremely helpful.

This matter will be reported to police, and any footage will be used as evidence.

Hi all,

looking for a bit of community support for a new pedestrian crossing on Crowley road. Particularly those with kids south of BWR and Crowley rd Round about.

Issue: my girls want to walk to school from south of BWR and crowley roundabout.

Problem: that roundabout/crowley is a bit hectic for crossing safely until they are older

Solution: Install a pedestrian crossing about 20m from the roundabout on Crowley rd to make that connection safe.

Potential questions:

Why 20m back? - So it doesn't affect traffic on BWR.

Why not further back on crowley? - Parking is a bit of nightmare. The suggested area is no parking already.

I've written it in a more formal way with a picture of the potential area. If your onboard could you send an email to hsc@hornsby.nsw.gov.au to get a bit of momentum behind it. Hopefully they can do it next FY.

Dear Hornsby Shire Council,

I am writing to request that Hornsby Shire Council investigate the installation of a pedestrian crossing on Crowley Road, Berowra.

At present, there is no safe location for children and other pedestrians to cross Crowley Road while walking to local schools, sporting ovals, and the shopping area. This particularly affects families in the southern area of Berowra. My children, along with many others, are unable to cross the road independently due to the complexity of navigating the roundabout.

The installation of a designated pedestrian crossing would significantly improve safety and provide a continuous and accessible walking route for the community. It would encourage active transport while reducing the risk of accidents involving pedestrians, especially school-aged children.

A suggested location for the crossing is shown in the attached aerial image of Crowley Road.

I respectfully request that Council investigate suitable options for providing a safe pedestrian crossing on Crowley Road and advise me of the outcome of this investigation.

Wondering if your e-bike is allowed on public transport?

Well, it depends on the type of transport you take to work or school.

E-bikes are allowed onboard NSW trains, light rail and ferries, as long as the motor is under 500 W, cuts out at 25 km/h, and they meet NSW legal standards.

If you ride the bus, leave your bike at home.

E-bikes are allowed onboard and on platforms, as long as the motor is under 500 W, cuts out at 25 km/h, and they meet NSW legal standards.

Buses

Bikes (including e-bikes) are not allowed on any buses because there's not enough space.

Light rail, ferries and regional NSW TrainLink

You can bring compliant e-bikes on light rail, ferries, and regional NSW TrainLink services, just ensure there's space and you're not blocking anything.



School isn't optional, it's the law 

Here's what NSW parents need to know about school attendance and what happens if your kid skips.



7 February, from Hannah's Blue Butterflies Road Safety Awareness Inc: SIGNALLING YOUR INTENTIONS USING YOUR INDICATORS! 



It is regulation you must use your indicators to signal intentions to turn, change lanes, merge, pull out from a kerb, or leave a roundabout.

Signal early. Ideally 100 meters before turning and always cancel the signal afterward.

A 5-second signal is mandatory when pulling out from a stationary position.

Key Rules for Proper Indicating in Australia-

➡ General Turns and Lanes: Indicate for long enough to give sufficient warning before turning, merging, or changing lanes.

➡ Roundabouts:

Turning Left: Indicate left on approach and keep it on until you exit.

➡ Turning Right: Indicate right on approach and indicate left when exiting.

➡ Straight Ahead: Do not indicate on approach. Indicate left, if practicable, when exiting.

➡ Stationary/Parking: Indicate for at least 5 seconds before pulling out from a parked position.

➡ Roundabout Exiting: You must signal left when leaving a roundabout, if it is practical to do so.

➡ Hand Signals: If indicators are not working, you must use hand signals to indicate turning or stopping.

Common Mistakes to Avoid.

➡ Late Signalling: Indicating at the last moment prevents others from reacting safely.

➡ Not Cancelling: Failing to turn off your indicator misleads other drivers.

➡ Ignoring Roundabout Rules: Not indicating when exiting a roundabout is a common error and is legally required.



6 February, from the latest Cyber Sushi eNewsletter: **SIM Swap Scams: When Your Phone Isn't Really Yours**



The Cyber Sushi

**(serving up the cold facts,
with some phish bytes)**

Scammers are increasingly targeting mobile phone users with SIM swap attacks, which can give criminals access to your calls, messages, and even bank accounts.

How it happens

In early October 2025, a couple reported to IDCARE that they lost around \$25,000 after their phone numbers were secretly transferred to a scammer's SIM. Late on a Saturday night, their phones suddenly showed 'Emergency Calls Only', but by then the scammer already had control of calls and verification codes.

Scammers often gather personal details from data breaches or online sources, then call your phone provider pretending to be you. If successful, the scammer can transfer your number to a SIM they control. Unfortunately, this does happen — with enough personal information and a convincing story, scammers can sometimes fool telco staff into believing they are the legitimate account holder.

The following day, the couple realised something was seriously wrong when a routine outing; paying for a haircut, ended with their card being declined. Checking their bank account revealed the full scale of the loss, with only \$136 remaining.

Red flags to watch for

Your phone suddenly shows 'Emergency Calls Only'. This is the clearest warning that your SIM may have been hijacked.

NOTE: Phones can show this for other reasons — poor network coverage, temporary outages, airplane mode, or a mis-seated SIM. But if it happens suddenly and unexpectedly, especially while missing verification messages, treat it as urgent.

Our tips

If your phone suddenly shows 'Emergency Calls Only' or you notice missing alerts, treat it as urgent. Call your bank immediately, freeze accounts, and report suspicious activity.

Set up an authenticator app on your device and link it to your bank or other accounts instead of relying solely on SMS codes. Authenticator apps generate codes on your device, which you enter when logging in or performing transactions. Even if someone hijacks your phone number, they cannot intercept these codes. Linking the app to your online banking can replace SMS verification entirely, making your accounts much more secure against SIM swap attacks.

6 February, from ACCC Product Safety

If you own a Sensory game controller toy from Kmart and Target, stop use immediately: they have been recalled. There is a risk of serious injury or death if small parts separate from the toy and are placed in the mouth. Incidents have occurred. Click [here](#).

SCAM ALERT

Hi all, i received a scam letter in the mail today claiming to be from “recoveries corp” trying to get a payment from an NRMA insurance claim acting on behalf of NRMA. The car is in my Mother's name, so there would be no reason to contact me for it. The message was sent from Melbourne law courts' P.O. box....

Second to that, they mispelt my last name, along with a false address, nor was there any inclination as to what the claim was about. If I wasn't careful, I was looking at \$2500+ to pay.

There were many other things written that alluded to a scam (weird ways to pay an insurance claim e.g. paying over phone with credit card details on a number different to the real company's number, signature with no name attached, writing saying they were “unable to contact me”).

Please stay vigilant and make sure that if you know anyone who might be susceptible to these scams, to let them know about it. Thanks everyone.

5 February, from CareFlight

This morning, shortly before 10am, the Mounties Care CareFlight Helicopter was tasked by [#NSWAmbulance](#) to [#Killara](#), after a woman in her 30s became trapped in her vehicle by a fallen tree.

CareFlight's specialist doctor and NSW Ambulance paramedics treated the patient on scene for injuries to her head, neck and back before she was transported via road to Royal North Shore Hospital in a stable condition.



NHW K&H received this note:

Could you please do a shoutout to the two ladies driving directly in front & the gentleman driving directly behind the incident,

for all selflessly assisting at what can only be described as a confronting scene?

They were visibly shaken, but showed only 100% care for the injured driver.

5 February, from NSW Maritime

⚠️ Don't go overboard with the drink. When you're on the water, alcohol affects your judgement, coordination, vision and balance, greatly increasing the risk of having an incident 😱

We work together with [Marine Area Command - NSW Police Force](#) to conduct random breath tests, ensuring everyone is operating safely.

Always stay under the 0.05 alcohol limit.



5 February, from Australian Communications and Media Authority

As part of our crackdown on mobile number fraud, Lycamobile has been penalised \$376,200 for breaching rules designed to protect Australians from scams.

Our investigation found Lycamobile failed to properly verify customer identities when transferring mobile services.

These failures were exploited by scammers on 131 occasions in 2024, leading to consumer losses of at least \$175,000.

In addition to the financial penalty, Lycamobile is also required to strengthen its security systems under independent oversight and report regularly to the ACMA.

All telcos are legally required to verify the identity of customers before transferring mobile numbers. These rules exist to protect you, and we will act when providers don't follow them.



4 February, from Nathan Tilbury, Independent for Hornsby: ACTION ON CURRENT GRAFFITI CRISES

Sadly, as can sometimes be the case during the school holiday period, there is currently an unpleasant spate of graffiti damage occurring across the Hornsby Shire. Particular problem areas that residents have reported to me include Mt Colah,

Berowra and Beecroft/Cheltenham where fences, buildings, vehicles and signage have been targeted.

The best way to deal with graffiti is to remove it as soon as possible, and the removal is the responsibility of the property's owner.

Council has always had a policy of aiming to remove graffiti damage on council assets within 48 hours of it being reported. Graffiti vandalism on council property can be reported via council's website (where images & short videos can be uploaded) or by calling council's graffiti hotline 1800 199 282.

When using Council's website to report graffiti damage there are also direct links to report to other organizations if their assets have been targeted, such as Ausgrid, Australia Post, Service NSW, State Transit and Sydney Water.

You can also report graffiti and other vandalism via the NSW Police Force's Community Portal, where you will receive an email within 48 hours with a NSW Police event number.

My personal preferred option is to report graffiti using the www.vandaltrak.com website. This is an easy-to-use single reporting source that works directly with local councils, businesses, the police and other organizations to combat graffiti vandalism.

When reporting graffiti via VandalTrack photos of the incidents can be uploaded. This is important as these images are collated and stored, ready for when a perpetrator is apprehended and their current and historic "tag" damage can be attributed to them, even if it has long since been removed.

To encourage and support residents to quickly remove graffiti from their own property, Hornsby Council is working towards making available basic graffiti removal kits. The contents of these proposed kits are currently being finalized, and Hornsby Council hopes to launch the initiative shortly.

Authorities are aware of the current graffiti situation and are allocating resources accordingly, with a focus on catching the tagger(s). From previous experience we know the best way to stop a graffiti problem is hold the offender(s) accountable. This will often deter others, including potential offenders, and, often, many of them "grow out" of this pathetic crime.

Finally, I discourage people from putting up images graffiti on Social Media. Sadly, the offenders get a kick out of seeing their handiwork "published". All images that I have used here have been modified to ensure the vandal does not enjoy seeing their work posted.
