03 March, from Ku-ring-gai command: Traffic Crash in St Ives – Appeal for Witnesses

Police from Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command are appealing for public assistance following a traffic crash that occurred on Mona Vale Road near Killeaton Street, St Ives, about 6am on 26 February 2026. The crash involved a grey Toyota Hilux and a bicycle. As investigations continue, police are urging anyone who may have witnessed the crash—or who was driving in the area at the time and may have dashcam footage—to come forward.

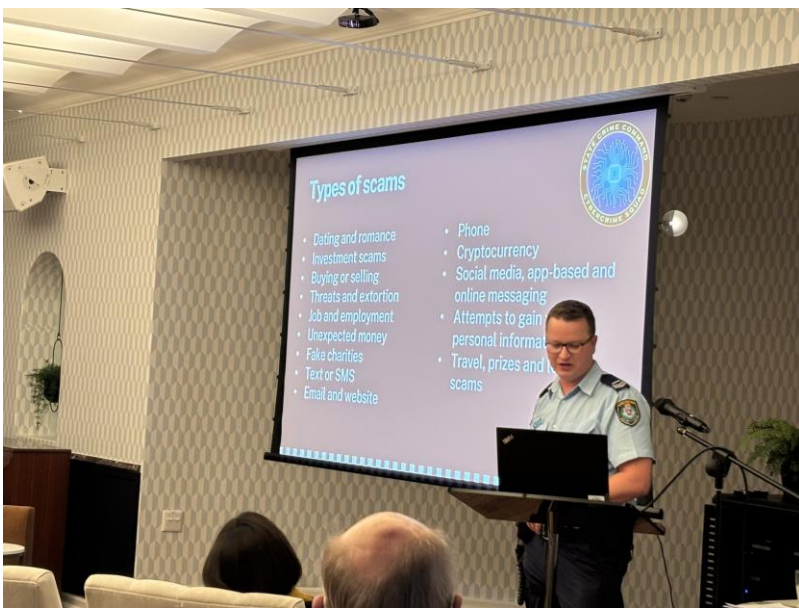
02 March, from Ku-ring-gai command: Stealing in Hornsby

27 February, from Ku-ring-gai command: Police have charged a man following an incident at a Turrumurra service station

About 10.50am Friday 30 January 2026, officers from Kuring-Gai Police Area Command were notified of an incident at a service station on Pacific Highway, Turrumurra. Police were told a man attended the store after refuelling his vehicle and allegedly became aggressive towards a staff member while a transaction was being completed. The man allegedly threatened the worker and attempted to pull open a secured internal door to access behind the

counter. The staff member activated a duress alarm and the man left the location prior to police arriving. Police later attended a Turramurra address and spoke with a 51 year old man. He was questioned by police and issued with a Field Court Attendance Notice for intimidate retail worker. He is due to appear before Hornsby Local Court on a later date.

Law reforms introduced in June 2023 make it an offence to:

- assault, throw a missile at, stalk, harass or intimidate a retail worker in the course of the worker's duty, even if no actual bodily harm is caused to the worker, with a maximum penalty of four years' imprisonment
- assault a retail worker in the course of the worker's duty and cause actual bodily harm to the worker, with a maximum penalty of six years' imprisonment
- wound or cause grievous bodily harm to a retail worker in the course of the worker's duty, being reckless as to causing actual bodily harm to the worker or another person, with a maximum penalty of 11 years' imprisonment.

26 February, from Fairfield City command: Robbery & Serious Crime Squad detectives recover hostage victim in Dural; one in custody

Robbery & Serious Crime Squad detectives have recovered a kidnapping victim and arrested one male following a police operation in Dural today. About 6.15am on Tuesday 24 February 2026, officers attached to Fairfield Police Area Command received a report a 53-year-old man had been taken from outside a tobacconist on Meadows Road in Mt Pritchard. Police were told four unknown males in balaclavas approached the man before assaulting him and forcing him into a Hyundai hatchback. State Crime Command's Robbery & Serious Crime Squad were notified and commenced a covert operation to recover the victim under Strike Force Martinook. About 10.30am today (Thursday 26 February 2026), strike force detectives – with assistance from the Tactical Operations Unit – attended a property in Dural.

At the location, police recovered the 53-year-old man and arrested a 16-year-

old male. The 53-year-old man was assessed by NSW Ambulance paramedics, before being taken to hospital in a stable condition. The 16-year-old was taken to Castle Hill Police Station where inquiries are ongoing. No further information is available at this time. Investigations under Strike Force Martinook continue. 26 February, from The Hills command: Two charged over alleged kidnapping and murder of Chris Baghsarian

Robbery & Serious Crime Squad detectives have charged two men in relation to the alleged kidnapping and murder of 85-year-old Chris Baghsarian. Just after 5am on Friday 13 February 2026, officers from Ryde Police Area Command received a report that an 85-year-old man had been kidnapped from his home in North Ryde. Local police attended before detectives attached to State Crime Command's Robbery & Serious Crime Squad began a coordinated response to recover the man under Strike Force Chobat. Early inquiries established that Chris Baghsarian was not the intended target of the kidnapping and had been taken in a case of mistaken identity. Human remains confirmed as being Mr Baghsarian were located about 8am yesterday (Tuesday 24 February 2026) near a golf club in Pitt Town. Following extensive inquiries, about 6.30am today (Wednesday 25 February 2026), strike force detectives – with assistance from Raptor Squad – executed three search warrants in Kenthurst, Castle Hill and Lake Macquarie. During the warrants, police seized vehicles, electronics, and clothing relevant to their investigation. At the Kenthurst address, police arrested a 29-year-old man. In Castle Hill, police arrested a 24-year-old man. The men were taken to Riverstone Police Station, where they were charged with murder and take/detain in company with intent to ransom occasion actual bodily harm. They were refused bail to appear in Blacktown Local Court today Thursday 26 February 2026).

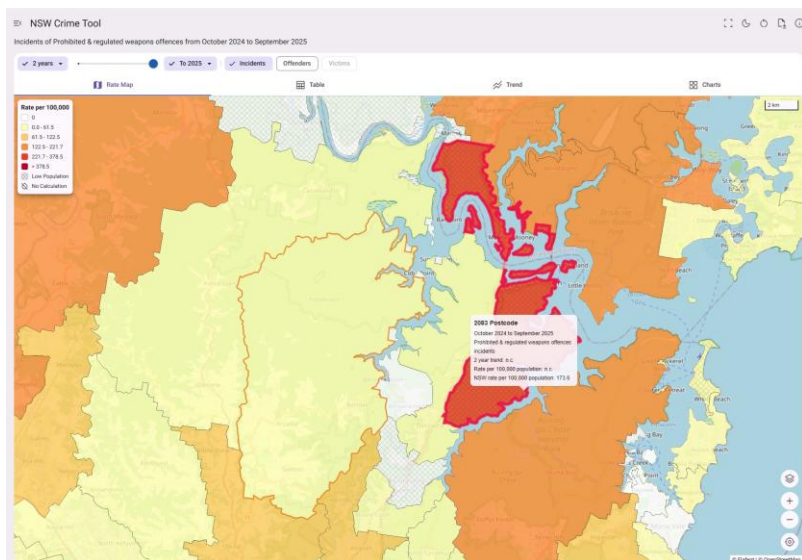

28 February, from Northern Beaches command: On Saturday 28 February 2026, in response to a proposed 'Rideout' by E-bike riders, officers attached to Northern Beaches PAC and Northern Sydney Highway Patrol conducted a high-visibility operation targeting illegal E-Bike riders and reckless riding, focusing mainly on parks, shopping districts and public roads North of Long Reef Golf course through to the suburb of Mona Vale.

Three highway Patrol vehicles, one Highway patrol cycle and two Northern Beaches PAC officers engaged in interactions with people riding e-bikes in the area. As a result of the operation, police interacted with 68 people on e-bikes or

e-scooters, issuing 12 infringement notices and 18 verbal warnings for not wearing a helmet. Of note, an E-scooter rider was stopped in the **Mt Colah** area with the rider arrested for a positive roadside breath test and positive roadside drug, unlicensed (never held) and not helmet. Members of the public provided extremely positive feedback to officers in the field whilst interacting with the e-bike riders. Further proactive Northern Beaches operations under the name 'E-Voltage' will continue.

There was a hit and run at the corner of Pennant Hills Road and Charles Street, Carlingford, this morning (28/2/26) at around 11.45am. The vehicle that rear ended my vehicle (a mineral blue Yaris Cross) was red brown. The driver of that vehicle did not stop and fled the scene.

28 February, from Hannah's Blue Butterflies Road Safety Awareness: We have all been there.

We have been shopping, only to discover when we get to the car ^[OBJ]our large items, exceed the length of your vehicle's boot space. If you lack roof racks or sufficient space in the car, you may wonder what to do. Although there is no nationwide rule prohibiting driving with an open boot, specific regulations must be observed. To comply, ensure your load is securely fastened and does not compromise your ability to see clearly out of the car for safe driving. Overhanging or inadequately secured loads pose a risk to road safety and can result in substantial fines and demerit points. Key requirements and safety considerations include-

- Securing the load properly to prevent shifting or falling.
 - Maintaining ^[OBJ] clear visibility out of the back and sides of the vehicle.
 - Ensuring ^[OBJ] rear license plates and lights remain fully visible to avoid fines.
 - Avoiding prolonged driving with an open hatch to prevent exhaust fumes from entering the cabin.
 - Secure the tailgate firmly to prevent it from swinging open.
-

- Make sure heavy items are not loaded on top of lighter items.
- Most headboards and loading racks aren't strong enough to fully restrain heavy loads.
- Use metal or heavy-duty plastic top corner protector angles to protect cartons.
- High and narrow items such as stacks of smaller cartons usually need more than one restraint.
- Fill spaces and gaps between piles with other items and make sure these are restrained as well.

It is always advisable to check your local rules and regulations.

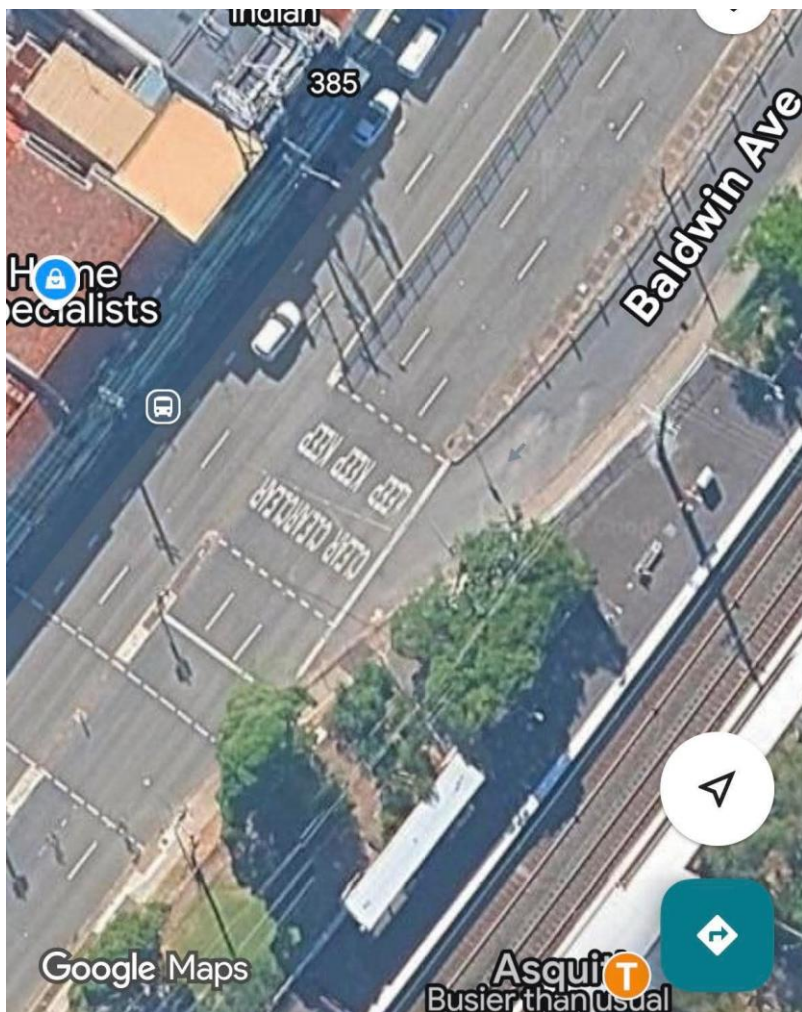
Subject: Safety concern -Pacific Highway merge at Asquith Station

I am writing to report a serious ongoing safety hazard on the southbound Pacific Highway at Asquith, where vehicles merge from the Baldwin Ave bridge near Asquith Station.

There is a design and line-marking fault that allows southbound vehicles to stop in the gap before the KEEP CLEAR marking, blocking the spaces merging vehicles rely on to enter safely. This exposes merging vehicles to moving traffic and has resulted in frequent crashes at this location.

Given the frequency of crashes and the apparent design and line-marking issue, I request that Transport for NSW undertake a formal Road Safety Audit and urgent engineering review of this location, and implement changes to improve safety.

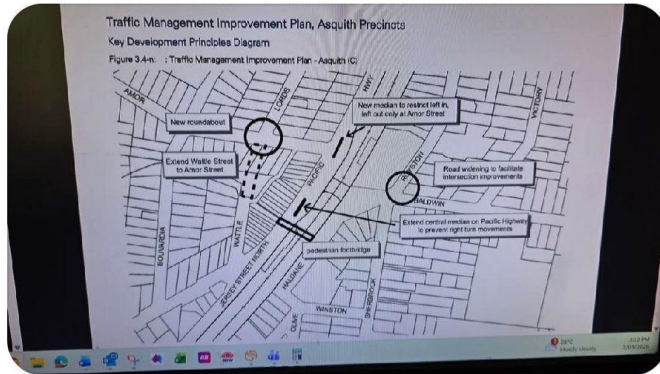
Location: Pacific Highway, Asquith NSW (near Asquith Station railway bridge)

AIDER
ASSISTANCE FOR INFIRM, DISABLED AND ELDERLY RESIDENTS

What is AIDER?
 AIDER is a one-off free service provided to infirm, disabled and elderly residents who live in bush fire prone land, to better prepare their properties for bush fire, in conjunction with the development of a bush fire survival plan.

Who is eligible?
 Those who live in bush fire prone land, and who are infirm, disabled, or elderly.

AIDER services may include:

- › thinning vegetation
- › removing leaves, sticks and fallen branches
- › trimming branches from around and overhanging the home
- › mowing or slashing long grass
- › cleaning gutters.

An assessment of your property will be completed by NSW RFS staff. Assistance can be provided to complete a Bush Fire Survival Plan. All works are completed by NSW RFS Mitigation crews.

A ONE-OFF FREE SERVICE TO REDUCE BUSH FIRE HAZARDS

26 February, from NSW Maritime: Did you know, if you're going 2 nautical miles or more offshore, you need to carry both an EPIRB and a marine radio.

An EPIRB must transmit on 406 MHz and conform with Standard AS/NZS 4280.1.

26 February, from Hornsby/Ku-ring-gai Rural Fire Service: Our volunteers and district staff have been out in the North Turrumurra and Forest Glen areas over the past fortnight week conducting pre-Hazard Reduction street meetings ahead of the upcoming HR burns with our council and agency partners.

These meetings give local residents an opportunity to learn more about the planned hazard reductions, ask questions, and understand what to expect on the day of the burn. Thank you to the community members who took the time to come out and speak with us. Your partnership helps us prepare safely and ensures everyone is informed about how these hazard reductions will support bushfire mitigation in the area. We'll continue to keep the community updated as planning progresses.



26 February, from NHW K&H: From the latest Service NSW eNewsletter: Stronger protections against image-based abuse

A person can now go to prison for up to 3 years if they use AI to make sexually explicit deepfake images or videos of someone.

The same punishment now also applies to anyone who shares – or even threatens to share – those images or videos. Creating or sharing sexually explicit sound recordings of someone without their consent, even if the audio is fake, is a crime now too. These new laws, which expand on existing protections, are designed to stop AI and deepfake technology from being used to embarrass, control and hurt people.

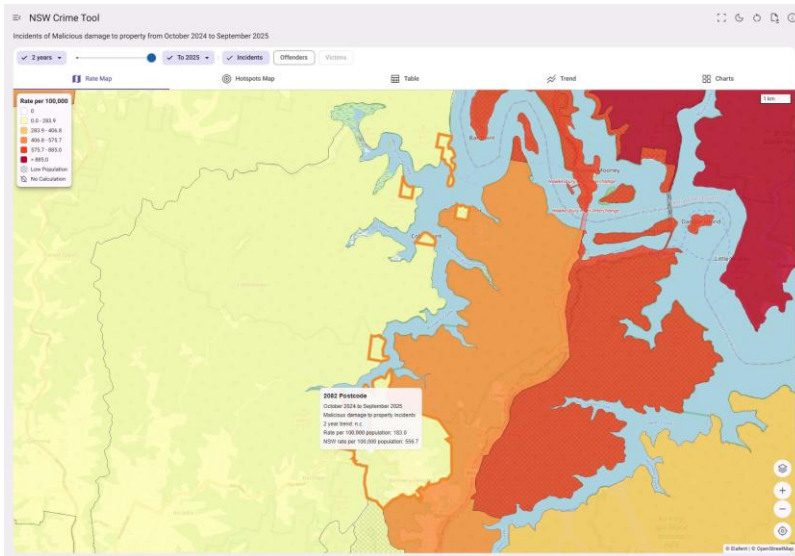
