## 16 March, from Ku-ring-gai command: Appeal for witnesses following crash – M1 Pacific Motorway, Mount Colah

Police are appealing for witnesses and dashcam footage following a two vehicle crash on the M1 Pacific Motorway at Mount Colah earlier this month. About 8.30am on Sunday 8 March 2026, emergency services were called to the southbound lanes of the M1, near Mount Colah, following reports a burgundy Mitsubishi Mirage and a Scania prime mover had collided. Officers attached to Kuring-Gai Police Area Command commenced inquiries into the circumstances surrounding the incident. As investigations continue, police are urging anyone who witnessed the crash, or who was driving in the area at the time and may have dashcam footage, to come forward.

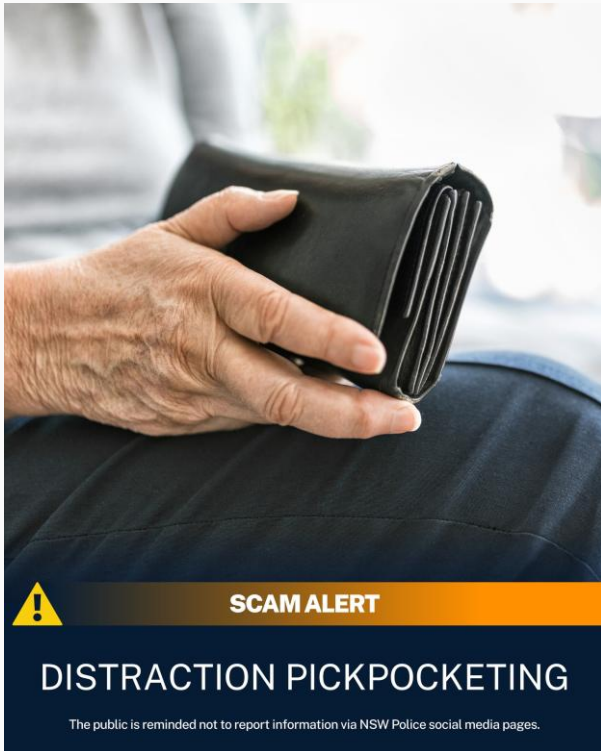

## 13 March, from NSW Police: 🚨 SCAM ALERT 🚨

Police are warning the public about stealing and fraud offences targeting the elderly community. Investigators have been told elderly victims have been approached by unknown people who claim the victim has dropped their wallet or cash. While the victim is distracted, their wallet is taken and their cards are subsequently used fraudulently. As inquiries continue, investigators are urging anyone who may have been a victim of a similar incident to report the matter to their local police station (**Hornsby 9476 9799**) or via **Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000**.

**12 March, from Ku-ring-gai command: Police are appealing for residents to review their CCTV or dash cam footage – following a break and enter in Pymble.**

Police are investigating a break and enter that occurred on Livingstone Avenue, Pymble, between Penrhyn Avenue and Cross Street, between 3:00pm and 4:00pm Wednesday 11 March 2026. Initial inquiries indicate an unknown male, possibly wearing a high visibility shirt, was seen in the area around the time of the incident. As investigations continue, police are urging anyone who lives in, or travelled through Livingstone Avenue between 3.00pm and 4.00pm on Wednesday to check their home CCTV, doorbell camera, or dash cam footage for any suspicious activity, persons, or vehicles.

**17 March, from NSW Fair Trading: Thousands of students across NSW are starting the academic year at university, TAFE and other vocational education providers.**

Before you sign a lease, make sure you understand your rights and

responsibilities as a renter. Moving out of home is a big step. Knowing what to look for can help you avoid problems later. Before signing, remember:

- **Have a written lease agreement**  
Your lease should clearly outline rent, payment frequency, bond requirements and responsibilities. You must receive a signed copy that includes landlord or agent contact details.
- **Understand how rental bonds work**  
A bond cannot be more than four weeks' rent and must be lodged with NSW Fair Trading. Your bond is refundable to you at the end of the tenancy if there is no unpaid rent or damage.
- **Fees and Charges**  
Landlords and agents can only charge certain fees at the start of a tenancy such as a bond, a holding fee and up to two weeks' rent in advance. You cannot be charged for things like a background check or preparing a lease.
- **Know your landlord's responsibilities**  
Rental properties must be safe and liveable, and necessary repairs must be completed.
- **Know the rules around ending a lease**  
Landlords and agents can only issue a termination notice for certain reasons and must follow the correct legal process. Heavy penalties apply to landlords or agents who give a termination notice with a ground that is not genuine.
- **Know the new rules about rent**  
Recent rental reforms mean rent can only increase once per year, renters must be offered rent payment by bank transfer or Centrepay, and agents cannot solicit higher rental offers.
- **Know where to get help**  
If you are unsure about your rights or responsibilities, we can provide information and help resolve rental disputes.

Victoria Police has revealed the cars most likely to be stolen as they issue a warning that a new era of tech-savvy thieves no longer need keys to break in. The number of car thefts in the state has increased over recent years, with the latest Crime Statistics Agency data showing 33,212 were stolen in the

year to September. In some instances, police said the cars were stolen without the owner's keys.

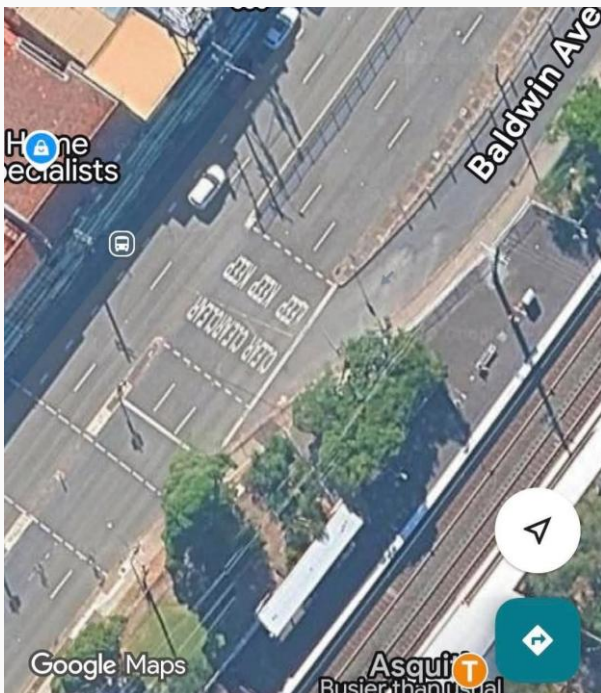

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission has issued a nationwide alert for the scam. Scamwatch has received an uptick of reports about this type of scam, with people reporting losses of \$5,000 on average.

**15 March, from 10 News Sydney: A second man has been charged following the alleged kidnapping of a 53-year-old man from Mt Pritchard last month.**

At around 6:15am on February 24, police received a report that a man had been taken from outside a tobacconist on Meadows Road. It is alleged that four unknown men wearing balaclavas approached the victim, assaulted him, and forced him into a Hyundai hatchback. On February 26, police recovered the man from a property in Dural and arrested a teenager, who remains before the courts. On March 12, a 20-year-old man was arrested in Penrith and charged with taking/detaining in company with intent to ransom, occasioning actual bodily harm, among other offences. He was refused bail to appear in Bankstown Local Court today.

### **15 March, from Hannah's Blue Butterflies Road Safety Awareness: The Failure of Motorists to Respect Safe Following Distances on Public Roads.**

Drivers frequently disregard the safe three-second gap left by others, primarily due to aggressive driving behaviours, traffic congestion, and a misguided perception that such gaps constitute under-utilised road space. This ignorance occurs because motorists often exhibit impatience, seeking to minimize travel time or simply failing to maintain an adequate and safe following distance. Traffic congestion contributes to this issue, as drivers in heavy traffic often fill gaps to merge or transition into faster-moving lanes, thereby reducing the overall safety margin for all road users. Aggressive driving further exacerbates the problem, with impatient drivers occupying these spaces to gain a minimal advantage in terms of car lengths, disregarding the risks associated with tailgating. Moreover, many drivers perceive a 3-second gap (approximately 50-60 meters) as 'wasted' space, failing to recognise its purpose as a safety buffer to facilitate reaction time.

The manner in which drivers respond to traffic flow also plays a role, as gaps

are frequently filled by motorists moving between lanes, disrupting the smooth progression of traffic and precipitating more abrupt braking manoeuvres. Maintaining a 3-second gap is essential for providing sufficient reaction time to sudden stops and preventing rear-end collisions. It is also important to have a longer gap in poor weather conditions or if there is other perceived hazards on the road.

### 14 March, from Councillor Sam Ngai: Wondering about the traffic cones on Eastern Arterial Road?

It's an ageing stormwater pipe underneath the road that's failing and poses a safety risk to drivers. Stormwater and road repairs are underway and at this stage we expect one lane of Eastern Arterial Road to be closed for up to two weeks. Many of our stormwater drains were installed decades ago and as they age, we will see more of this in coming years. That's partly why Council is proposing a special rates variation.

The reality is that from 2015 to 2025, the State Government capped Ku-ring-gai's rates increase to 28% even though construction costs across the State rose up to 55% and our population grew by 7%. Our purchasing power has diminished, we have already focussed on efficiencies and run one of the leanest workforces in Sydney Metro, and no politician has proposed a sustainable and legal source of recurring funds to address this structural annual deficit. Anyone who tells you otherwise does not truly understand the way

restricted funding works in local government, and without a sensible rates increase residents will have to adjust their expectations of infrastructure and service availability going forward.

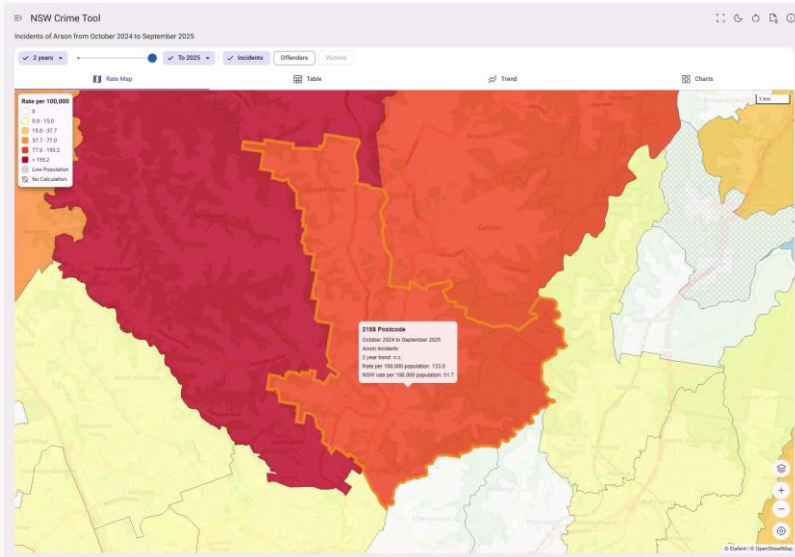

## What you can do

- Park your vehicle in well-lit and highly visible areas whenever possible.
- Wherever possible, use off street parking or secured parking.
- When parking in a garage, ensure both the garage and vehicle are locked and the garage door remotes are secured.
- Avoid marking your keys with your personal or vehicle details such as name, phone number or vehicle registration.
- Consider installing a car alarm or steering wheel lock to help protect your vehicle.
- Use lockable devices to help keep your vehicle secure including lockable fuel caps, wheel nuts, spare tyre covers and roof racks.
- Consider installing a remote engine immobiliser which meets Australian standards.
- Secure your registration plates with anti-theft screws.
- Consider installing a GPS tracker to your vehicle.

## Make good vehicle and key security a habit today.

- Always lock your vehicle, including the boot and sunroof, and remember to fully close all windows.
- Always keep your keys out of sight and never leave vehicle keys lying around on tables, benches, bedside tables or key hooks.
- Remove keys from the ignition and lock your vehicle if your vehicle is parked or unattended, even if it's only for a minute.
- Never hide spare keys on or in the vehicle – thieves know where to look.
- Remove all valuables and personal items when leaving your car unattended, or ensure they are out of sight.
- Always take your vehicle keys with you whenever you are going out, even if you are leaving your vehicle at home.
