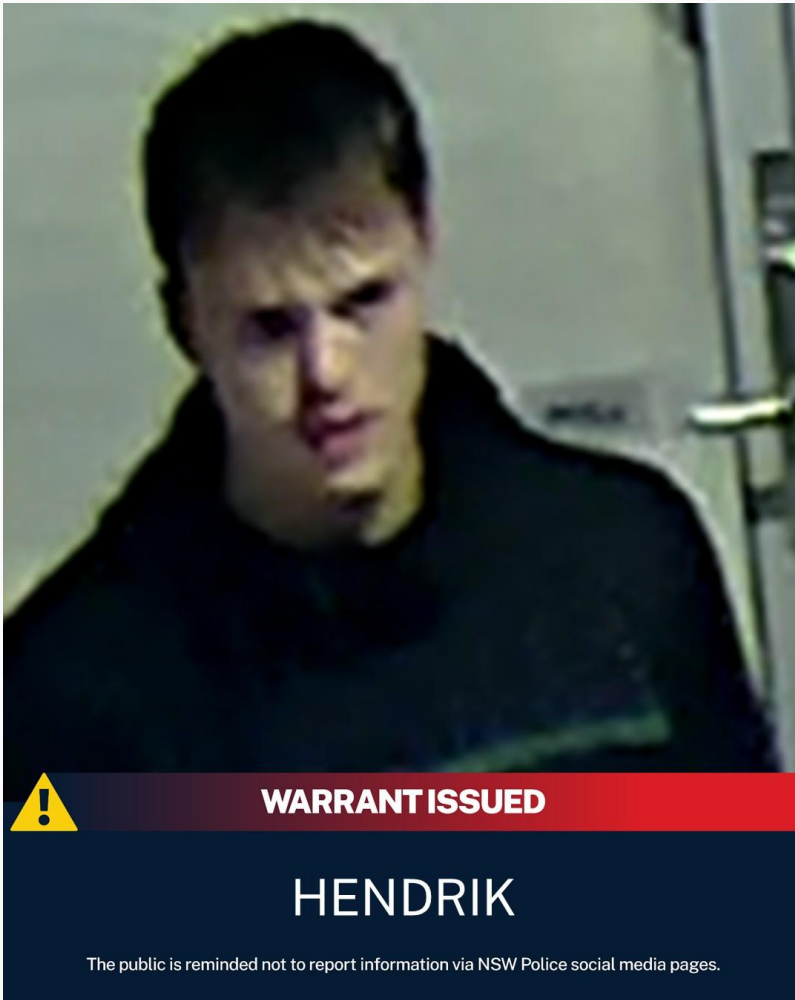


21 April, from Ku-ring-gai command: Thank you to everyone who responded to our recent appeal for information relating to our Missing Person. She has been found safe and well.

18 April, re-posting from NSW Police: Have you seen Hendrik Bekker, also known as Henry?

A warrant has been issued for the 18-year-old's arrest for murder. Henry is known to frequent Artarmon, Roseville, St Leonards, and Castle Hill. Anyone with information into his whereabouts is urged not to approach him, but to call Triple Zero (000) immediately.

15 April from Ku-ring-gai command: A man has been charged after allegedly sexual touching a woman in Sydney's north.

On Tuesday 14 April 2026, officers attached to Police Transport Command, with the assistance from Ku-Ring-Gai Police Area Command, commenced an investigation following reports of a sexual touching in Gordon. Police were told about 4.40pm on the same day, a 39-year-old woman was waiting on the platform at Gordon Railway Station, when an unknown man sexually touched her before leaving the scene. Following inquiries, about 5pm on the same day, police arrested the 53-year-old man on Station Street, Hornsby. The man was taken to Hornsby Police Station where he was charged with sexually touch another person without consent and common assault. He was refused bail to appear at Hornsby Local Court on Wednesday 15 April 2026.

14 April from Kings Cross command: Crime Prevention Tips for Motorbikes & E-bikes.

- 1. Lock the bike to a fixed, immovable object
Using a heavy duty chain or D lock secured to a pole, rail, or ground anchor makes theft significantly harder.
- 2. Use multiple locking methods
Combining a disc lock, chain lock, and handlebar lock increases the time and effort required for theft, making the bike a less attractive target.
- 3. Park in well-lit, high-visibility locations
Choose areas with good lighting, CCTV coverage, or steady foot traffic to reduce opportunities for offenders.
- 4. Remove batteries or display units from e-bikes
Taking the battery or display with you reduces the value of the bike and deters opportunistic theft.
- 5. Consider GPS tracking or smart alarms
Hidden GPS trackers or motion-sensitive alarms help deter theft and can assist in recovery if the bike is stolen.

20 April from Hornsby Shire Council: ALGAL BLOOM ⚠️

A Caution Alert is in place from Bar Island in Berowra Creek to Spencer, due to the detection of potentially toxic algae that may produce shellfish toxins.

👉 Shellfish: recreationally harvested shellfish (e.g. oysters, mussels, clams) from the estuary should not be consumed due to the risk of shellfish poisoning.

👉 There are no other recreational risks associated with the algal bloom.

Water users should use personal discretion before entering the water and be aware that the algal situation can change quickly. If any health effects are experienced from contact with water affected by algal blooms, medical advice should be promptly sought.

We are actively monitoring the situation and will provide further updates as new information becomes available.

to share this information through our network to help raise awareness and educate the community about Chinese Authority scams.

Please share with your friends, neighbours, family and colleagues.

"Also known as Chinese authority scams, this is a highly targeted form of threat scam that disproportionately affects Mandarin speaking communities in Australia. Scammers usually contact people by phone, pretending to be officials from Chinese authorities — such as the embassy, police or other government agencies, and sometimes well-known telecommunications providers. Victims are falsely accused of serious crimes and pressured to make urgent payments to “prove” their innocence, often under threats of arrest, legal action or deportation."

Chinese Authority Scams:
Scammers impersonate Chinese police, government or military officials, or a courier service to extort money from the victim.
The scammers may tell you:
• Your personal details are known or compromised.
• A parcel addressed to you, containing compromised documents, has been intercepted.
• You have been implicated in a crime and you may be charged or there is an arrest warrant for you or your family. They may produce apparent Chinese authority documents including an arrest warrant.
• To go to a website claiming to be a Chinese authority to obtain a phone number.
The scammers will demand money to stop these fake criminal charges. They may also threaten you with the deportation of yourself or your family. This is always a lie.
DO NOT send any money and **HANG UP** the call immediately.
DO NOT reveal any **PERSONAL** information.
DO collect as much information/data about the scammer as possible.
DO report any suspicious scam/behaviour to your local Police or report at www.cyber.gov.au/report-and-recover or Police Assistance Line 131 444.

A goalkeeper for a soccer team has died during a soccer match as families watched on from the sidelines in horror as 30-minutes of CPR failed to revive him.

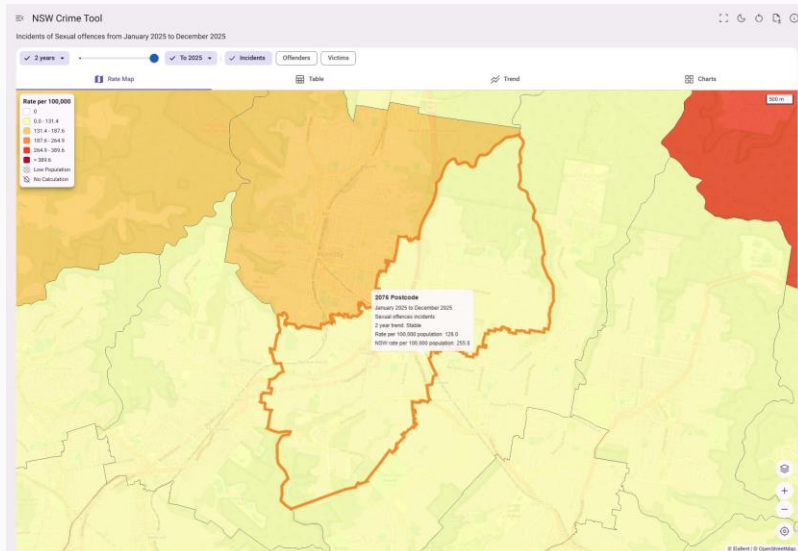

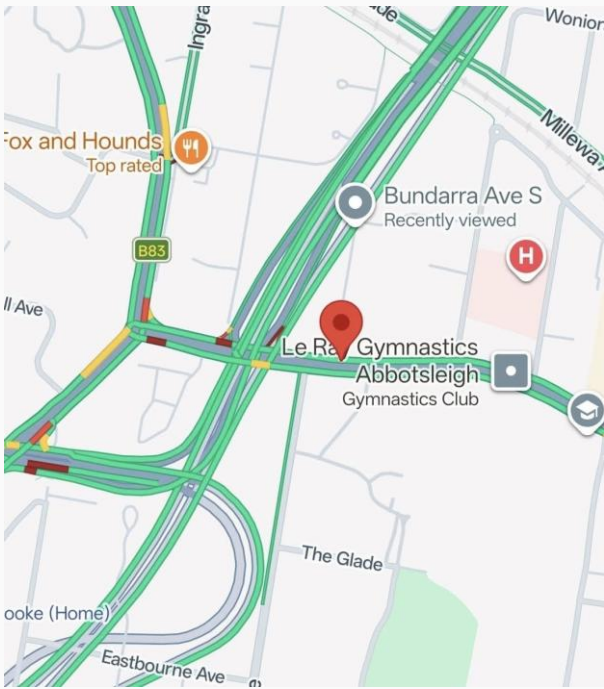

16 April From the Australian Signals Directorate: Review your phone's security features

Most phone companies provide simple security guidance on their website. For example,

Apple's security and privacy advice for iPhones: apple.com/au/privacy/control/ and Google's security tips for Android devices: safety.google/safety/security-tips/. Read through this security guidance every few months, or when you get a new device, to make sure you're protected.

Case study

Marie from WA once lost her mobile phone, which was unlocked and not protected by a PIN or password. Marie kept all of her account passwords in a notes app on her phone, giving the thief easy access to her online accounts. She also had photos on her phone of her driver's licence. While the phone was returned a few hours later, Marie did not realise until the next day that the thief had transferred all of her money to a cryptocurrency website, losing close to \$4000.

- Protect your phone with a PIN, password or biometrics.
- Make sure your phone automatically locks when you are not using it.
- You should not store account passwords, PINs, or identity documents on your phone without additional protection. For example, store them in a password manager that requires a password or facial recognition to grant access.

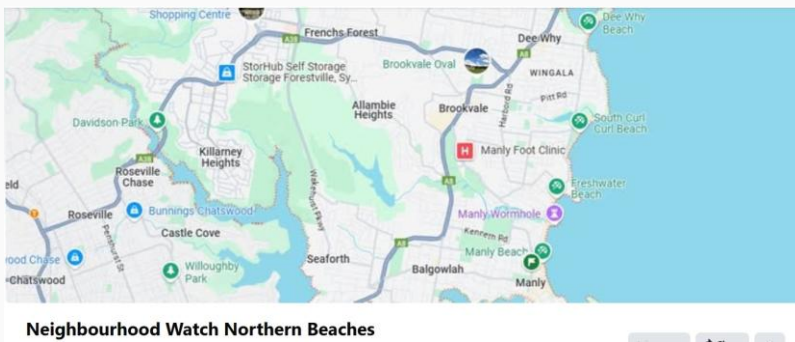

16 April From the recent ScamWatch eNewsletter: Relationship scams

Scams that cause deep emotional and financial harm

Scamwatch is running a campaign to help people spot the signs of a relationship scam.

Relationship scams (also called romance or dating scams) happen when someone pretends to be interested in you so they can take your money. They build trust, then ask for money, gifts, or your personal details. They may also try to get into your bank or online accounts. Some scammers also push fake investments, including cryptocurrency. They may ask you to move the chat to a private messaging app so it's harder to trace.

They might say they live or work overseas. They may avoid meeting in person or on video. They may also invent an emergency (like a hospital bill, travel issue, or legal trouble) to pressure you to send money quickly.

If you think you or someone you know may be in a relationship scam, remember: scammers can be very convincing. They use feelings to control people and may try to cut them off from friends and family. It is never the victim's fault. Help is available.

Who's at risk

Anyone can be targeted. Scammers often go after people who want connection or support online. You may be at higher risk if you:

- - use dating apps or social media to meet new people

- - are newly single, have recently lost someone close, or are going through a big life change
- - feel lonely and want ongoing contact
- - have money set aside to invest (including in cryptocurrency).

What it can look like

These scams feel real. Here are some common examples:

- Romance baiting scams: These can be short. They may start on a dating app and then shift into a fake cryptocurrency or investment scam.
- Long-term romance scams: The scammer builds a close bond over months or years. Then they make up a crisis (like a medical emergency, work problem, or travel issue) to get money from you.

Warning signs to look out for

- They say they love you or want a serious relationship very quickly.
- They ask you to move the chat to another app.
- They won't video call, won't meet in person, or always cancel.
- They ask for money, gift cards, cryptocurrency, or bank transfers. They may also ask for personal details (like ID, passport, or address) or access to your accounts or device.
- They tell you not to talk to anyone else and say you should only trust them.
- They ask for money, gift cards, cryptocurrency, or bank transfers. They may also ask for personal details (like ID, passport, or address) or access to your accounts or device.

If you think it's a scam

If something feels wrong, pause. Think about what you know about the person and what they are asking for.

- - Never send money or personal information, even if the person promises to repay you.
- - Talk to someone you trust. Tell a friend or family member what's happening. Scammers rely on secrecy.
- - Check who they are by doing a reverse image search on their photos. Look for details that don't match, or a story that keeps changing.

Be careful if the profile looks too perfect.

- - Keep proof. Save messages, screenshots, usernames, phone numbers, bank details, and receipts.

- - Report the profile to the app or platform, then block the person.
- - If you've sent money, contact your bank straight away.

Stay protected

STOP. If someone you met online asks for money, cryptocurrency, gift cards, or help with an "urgent" problem, stop. Don't send money. Don't share passwords, one-time codes, or ID documents.

CHECK. Take your time when you meet new people online. Ask questions. Watch for things that don't add up. Be careful if they won't meet or video call, or if they quickly move the chat off the app. Before you invest, check the business is licensed (search ASIC's professional registers). Also check ASIC's investor alert list on Moneysmart.

PROTECT. If you've shared details or sent money, contact your bank straight away. Change your passwords, turn on multi-factor authentication, and report the scam to Scamwatch. If you feel unsafe, contact local police. Find out more about what to do if you've been scammed.

15 April from the eSafety Commissioner: Tech-based coercive control happens when someone uses tech to monitor, track, intimidate or control another person 🙄📱🖥️

Because digital tools are a part of everyday life, these behaviours can be difficult to recognise and are often minimised or dismissed. This kind of abuse can come from a partner, ex-partner, someone you're dating or a family member.

Spotting tech-based coercive control in domestic & family violence



Gaslighting

- Controlling the settings on smart home devices, so that the aircon, lights or the TV turn on at unexpected times.
- Deleting messages or changing passwords to make them feel paranoid or forgetful.

Surveillance

- Forcing them to share their online location or covertly tracking their location through their accounts or devices.
- Installing cameras or security systems in the home, car or children's toys.

Financial abuse

- Limiting access to money by stopping access to online banking or virtual credit cards.
- Checking online activity to monitor what they're buying.

Privacy abuse

- Changing the passcodes on their partner's devices, so they can't use them without help or permission.
- Accessing health and fitness data to track eating habits, weight, menstrual cycle or location.

15 April from Burwood command: Ready for another road rules quiz?

A lot of people don't know this one.... what do you think?

Can you proceed through a red light to give way to an emergency vehicle with lights and sirens activated?

🚫 Answer: No.

Drivers must stop at a red light, even for emergency vehicles. However, if police

direct you to move to create space, you may carefully edge forward ONLY if safe, and then return once the emergency vehicle has passed.

15 April from Northern Beaches command: It began with a petrol-filled container left last November at the entrance to a Dee Why restaurant.

With it was a scorched greeting card demanding money. Forensics and CCTV traced the container and card to a male who, a few weeks earlier, had been removed from the restaurant for harassing customers and intimidating staff. Now a 41-year old St Ives man is facing multiple charges relating to the offence including intimidate, intend fear physical harm. He's been refused bail pending his next court appearance.

15 April from Crime Stoppers NSW: NSW has new laws on the misuse of AI to harm, shame or control others.

Creating, sharing, or threatening to share digitally generated sexually explicit content without consent is now a crime. This includes digitally altered or AI-generated content, placing someone in a sexual scenario they were never part of. Courts now have the power to order content removed, and serious criminal penalties apply.

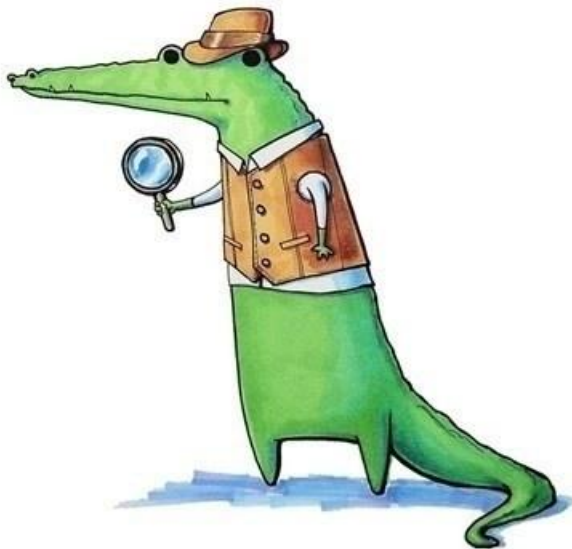
