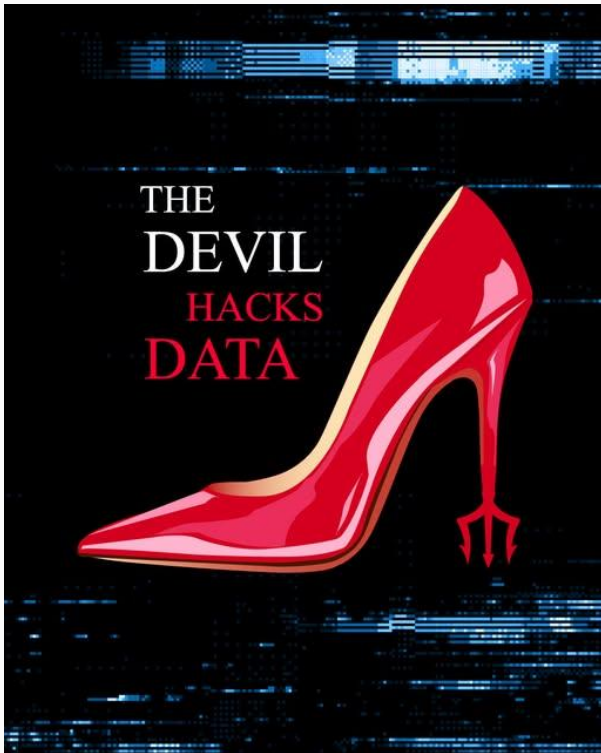

Learner (L) and Provisional (P1/P2) drivers in NSW cannot drive while wearing headphones or earbuds connected to a mobile phone. L and P platers are not permitted to use any mobile phone function while driving — including:

- 📞 Phone calls

This applies even if the phone is hands-free or connected via Bluetooth. ⚠️ Penalties:

- 💰 \$423 fine and 5 demerit points
- 🚫 In a school zone: \$562 fine

- 🧑🏻‍💻 Do not allow someone you don't know to access your computer remotely.

SCAM ALERT!

Chinese Authority Scams:

Scammers impersonate Chinese police, government or military officials, or a courier service to extort money from the victim.

The scammers may tell you:

- Your personal details are known or compromised.
- A parcel addressed to you, containing compromised documents, has been intercepted.
- You have been implicated in a crime and you may be charged or there is arrest warrant for you or your family. They may produce apparent Chinese authority documents including an arrest warrant.
- To go to a website claiming to be a Chinese authority to obtain a phone number.

The scammers will demand money to stop these fake criminal charges. They may also threaten you with the deportation of yourself or your family. This is always a lie.

DO NOT send any money and **HANG** up the call immediately.

DO NOT reveal any **PERSONAL** information.

DO collect as much information/ data about the scammer as possible.

The relationship moves fast and they soon have strong feelings. 

May try to move the chat to another platform. 

There is a need for the relationship to be kept secret. 

Excuses are made to avoid meeting, they may say they are overseas. 

An emergency or a sad story which requires urgent financial help. 

They offer easy money making opportunities. 

PROTECT YOURSELF

Don't accept friend requests from people you don't know.

Never send money to someone you have never met.

Don't keep online relationships a secret.

Don't share personal information or intimate images with someone you don't know.

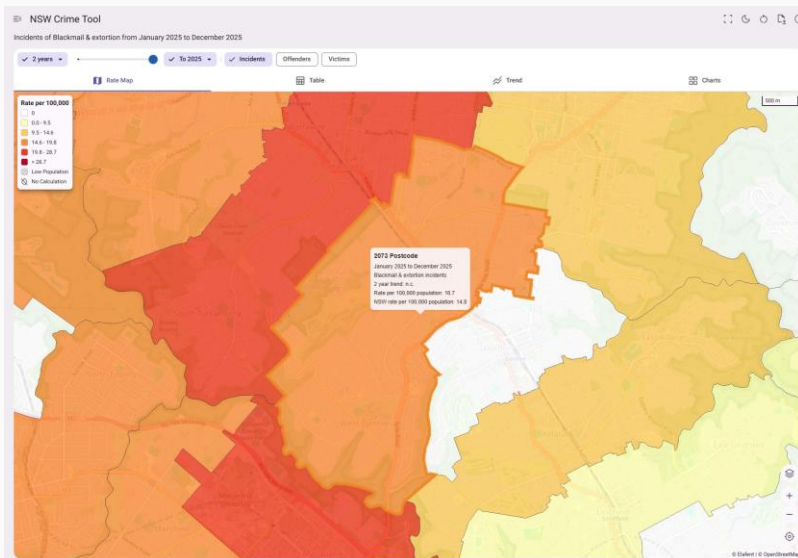

04 May, from Sydney West Road: Driver Beats AI Camera Fine Using Phone Mount Loophole

An Australian driver has had a mobile phone fine overturned after an AI traffic camera incorrectly flagged them, exposing a loophole in how the laws are applied. The driver was issued a \$410 fine after being detected by an AI camera for allegedly using a phone while driving. However, the penalty was later scrapped after it was confirmed the phone was mounted and not being handled, meaning no

offence had occurred. The case highlights a grey area in road rules, where phones can be legally used in certain situations if properly secured, despite AI systems flagging them as violations. The incident has raised fresh concerns about the accuracy of AI enforcement technology and whether some drivers may be wrongly fined under the system.

03 May, from Berowra Waters Rural Fire Brigade: Home fire safety starts with a plan.

For Berowra Waters, river access homes and families living near bushland, every household should know exactly what to do if fire starts inside the home.

Create a home fire escape plan by drawing a simple floor map. Mark two ways out of every room, usually a door and a window. Make sure everyone in your home knows to:

- 🏠 Check smoke alarms are working
- 🚪 Know two safe ways out of every room
- 🪟 Keep doors and windows clear
- 🔑 Know where keys are kept for doors, windows, gates and security screens

- 🖐️ Check doors for heat with the back of your hand before opening
- 📉 Stay low and crawl under smoke
- 🚪 Close doors behind you as you leave
- 📍 Meet at a safe outdoor location, such as a letterbox, driveway, jetty, neighbour's house or clear open area
- 🚫 Get out and stay out

Practise your escape plan at least twice a year, including at night. Include children, older family members, visitors, short-stay guests and pets in your plan. For river residents and bushland homes, access matters. Make sure your house number, jetty, driveway, gate, access track or landing point is clearly marked so emergency services can find you quickly. If you cannot escape, close the door, seal gaps with towels or clothing, call 000 and tell the operator exactly where you are. In a house fire, every second matters. A simple plan, practised regularly, can save lives.

CRYPTO INVESTMENT SCAMS

How to spot a crypto scam

- Low-risk, high-return offers
- Celebrity endorsements (often fake!)
- Urgency and Secrecy: Scammers pressure you to act fast or tell you to hide the "opportunity" from friends, family, or your bank
- Messages on chat apps, dating apps or social media chats that promote investments are almost always scams

Stay Safe

- ✓ Do your research before investing
- ✓ If it sounds too good to be true — it probably is
- ✓ Keep passwords, private keys & seed phrases offline and private
- ✓ Don't click links in anonymous chats or unexpected emails
- ✓ Beware of fake wallet apps

Government agencies and legitimate companies will never ask you to send money via cryptocurrency ATMs.

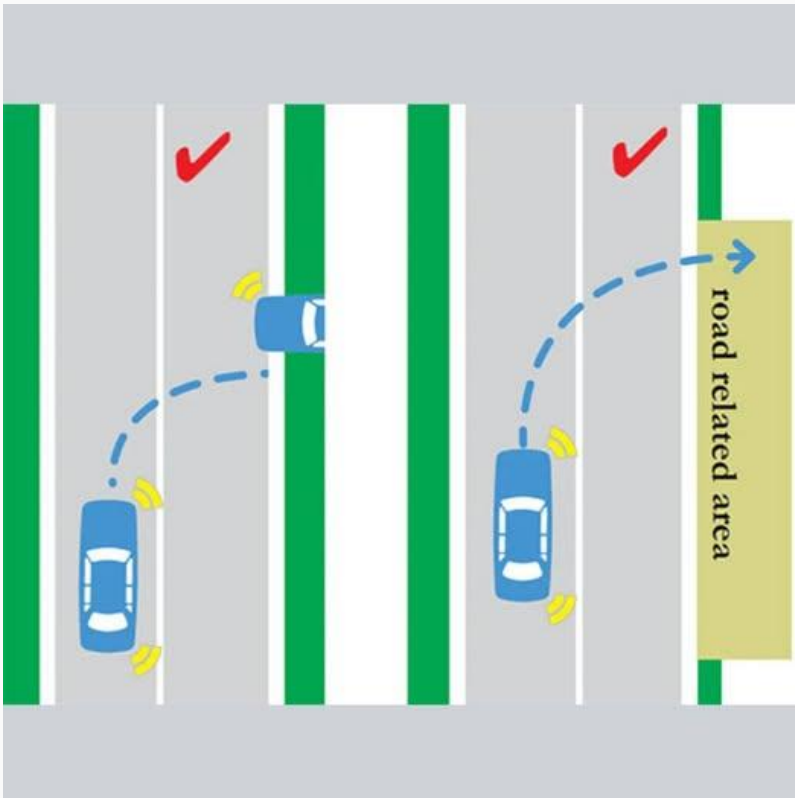
A third man has been charged over an alleged kidnapping where a 53-year-old man had to be saved by a police raid on a Sydney home.

29 April from NSW Road Safety: Can you ever cross unbroken lines on NSW roads, e.g. to enter a driveway? 🤔



ANSWER: Under NSW road rules, you can cross a dividing line to enter or leave a property or road “by the shortest route”. So yes, you can cross double lines to turn into your driveway. Be sure to indicate and only turn when it is safe to do so.

28 April from Nepean command: TRAFFIC TUESDAY:

CAN CYCLISTS RIDE TWO ABREAST?

FINE: Ride bicycle more than 2 abreast on road \$140.

CAN A CYCLIST TAKE UP A WHOLE LANE?

Yes they can. Best practice for drivers is to allow cyclists a full lane. Don't try to squeeze past them. Sometimes they may need the full lane because of rough road edges or gravel. Be prepared to slow down and give them room to ride away from the kerb.

Bicycle riders can ride two abreast (side by side) as long as they're within 1.5m of each other.

CARAVAN PARK CRIME PREVENTION FACT SHEET

Did you know that theft is the most frequently occurring crime in Caravan Parks? A few simple steps can minimise the risk to you!

WHEN YOU ARRIVE AT A PARK...

- Ask the manager about safety and security in the area.
- Get to know your neighbours and who belongs there.
- Secure your outdoor equipment with a chain and lock.
- Secure your vehicles with wheel and hitch clamps.

DO... photograph, video and keep an accurate description of all your vehicles and valuables! (particularly your rego, VIN and serial numbers)

DO... mark your valuables with an identification number such as your driver's licence.

DO... keep all your doors and windows locked, even when you're nearby.

DO... take all your valuables with you when you leave the park or area.

DO... get sensor lights for inside and outside! Fit sensor lights outside, under your front door. Have a sensor lights inside that turns on when it gets dark to give the impression someone is inside.

DO NOT... leave bikes, eskies (particularly with alcohol), surfboards, wet suits, fishing gear or any other recreational equipment unattended outside.

DO NOT... leave equipment in boats or on top of vehicles without locks.

DO NOT... leave washing, shoes or wet swimmers and towels outside overnight.

DO NOT... leave spare keys hidden outside the caravan when going out.

DO NOT... leave things of value on display inside your vehicle or caravan, e.g. GPS, phones, tablets, laptop computers, cameras, handbags/wallets and credit cards.

GOING OUT?

- Leave a light or radio on to try and give the appearance you're inside.
- Make sure you key lock all your doors, windows and roof hatches.
- Turn on your alarm.
- If you can't take your valuables with you, secure them in a safe or ask the Park Office to store your valuables in the office safe for you.

REPORT THE CRIME ON 131 444
If you have become the victim of a theft or crime immediately contact the Police and your Caravan Park Reception office.

GATHER descriptive information on items/vehicles that were stolen, identification numbers and where you last saw the items. When speaking to Police be **HELPFUL** answering all questions as accurately as possible and listen to instructions. There may be **EVIDENCE** present, such as damaged locks, or items that could have fingerprints. Avoid touching the area as best you can until Police arrive.

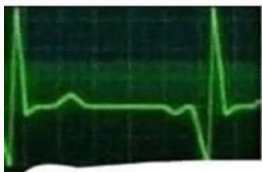

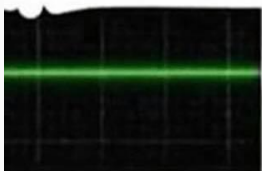
