Good morning NSW ☀️

Here are the weekend's news headlines:

◆ [Traffic and Highway Patrol Command - NSW Police Force](#) are appealing for information following a truck crash in Sydney's inner west.

◆ A man will face court after an alleged break, enter and steal and police pursuit in

the state's Orana region.

- ◆ Three teenagers will face court over an alleged car theft and fire in the state's central tablelands region.
- ◆ A man has been charged with multiple offences, firearms and drugs seized from a car stopped in the state's Riverina.
- ◆ Detectives have charged a man with alleged child abuse material offences in the state's Central Tablelands region.
- ◆ A man has been charged with 11 outstanding arrest warrants in the states Northern Tablelands.
- ◆ A man is in serious condition following an alleged home invasion in Sydney's south west.
- ◆ A man and a teenager have been charged after an officer was injured during an alleged pursuit in Sydney's north.
- ◆ A man and woman have been charged over their alleged involvement in the death of a man in the state's north.
- ◆ Three people have been charged after an alleged pursuit in the states west .
- ◆ A woman has died when an SUV left the Olympic Highway and hit a tree north-east of Wagga Wagga.

The NSW Police Force has uncovered a large-scale criminal grow operation following information provided to Crime Stoppers NSW.

Acting on the tip-off, police searched the property and discovered 1371 cannabis plants hidden inside.

Estimated street value seized: \$2.7 million.

Check Your Child's Battery Usage — It Tells a Bigger Story

Most parents think they've got their kid's phone locked down. But even with filters and screen-time limits, there's still one powerful tool you might be overlooking — battery usage stats.

Why? Because battery usage doesn't lie. It tells you what apps are draining your child's phone, how long they're on them, and sometimes even which apps they're hiding.

If your child's "school-only phone" somehow shows TikTok using 40% of the battery... well, there's your clue.

What You Can Learn From Battery Usage:

- Which apps your child uses the most
- If apps are being hidden or renamed (some show under unfamiliar names)
- What time of day phone use spikes
- If a supposed "emergency-only" phone is really being used for entertainment
- How quickly they're draining the battery and likely recharging multiple times a day

How to Check Battery Usage on iPhone (Apple):

1. Go to Settings
2. Scroll down and tap Battery
3. You'll see a graph and battery usage by app
4. Tap Last 24 Hours or Last 10 Days to see patterns
5. Tap the clock icon to show screen time per app

How to Check Battery Usage on Android:

1. Go to Settings
2. Tap Battery or Battery and Device Care (varies by brand)
3. Tap Battery Usage
4. View usage by app (some show percentages, others show screen time)
5. Tap each app to view detailed activity

Bonus Tip:

If battery usage doesn't seem to match up with screen time or daily habits, it may be a sign of:

- Secret apps or hidden browsers
- Deleted and re-downloaded apps (to avoid detection)
- Background app activity like VPNs or private servers

Final Thought:

Battery stats are like fingerprints—they leave a trail. And when kids are clever, it takes clever parents to stay one step ahead. Use the data. Start a conversation. Guide with love and boundaries.

We've updated 8 Codes of Practice to better support industry in managing health and safety risks. They are now in effect.

- Work on roofs (commercial and industrial buildings)
- Cutting, drilling and grinding concrete and masonry products
- Worker accommodation
- Work near overhead and underground electric lines
- Transport and delivery of cash and valuable goods
- Sawmilling industry
- Managing blood-borne virus risks in the workplace (hepatitis B, hepatitis C, HIV)
- Safe use and design of bulk storage silos and bins

If you are a person conducting a business or undertaking (PCBU), now is the time to review these updates and ensure your control measures remain effective.

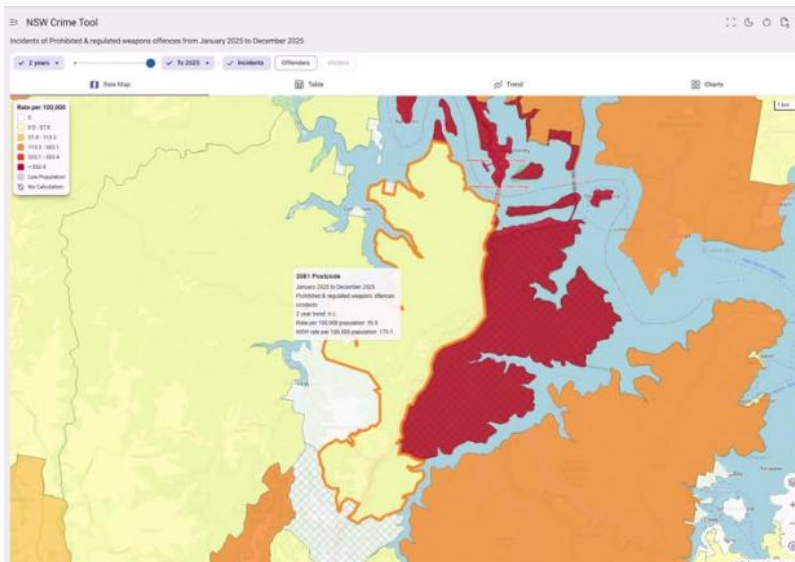

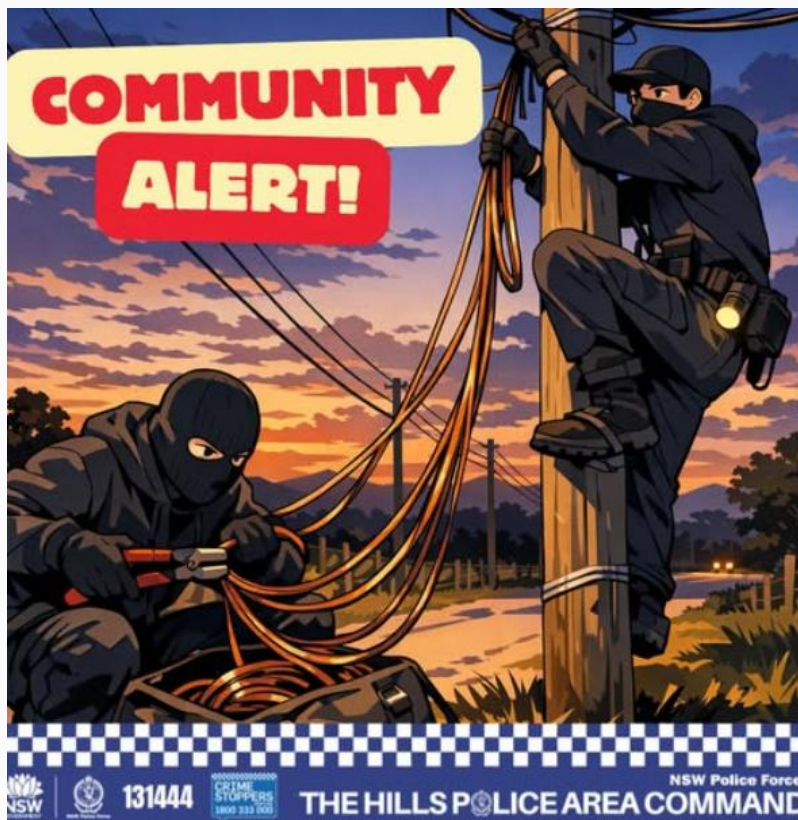

06 June, from The Hills Police Area Command: 🚨 Copper Cable Theft - Kenthurst, Maraylya and Annangrove 🚨



Hills Police are investigating a series of incidents involving the theft of telecommunications cabling in the Kenthurst, Maraylya and Annangrove areas. Offenders are targeting power poles along Pitt Town Road, Cattai Ridge Road and Annangrove Road, where Telstra cables are being cut and stolen. Police believe offenders are removing lengths of up to 300 metres at a time, before stripping the cable to obtain copper. ⚠️

These incidents are occurring along remote roadways and may involve vehicles stopping for short periods in isolated locations.

👁️ Police are urging residents to remain vigilant and report any suspicious activity.

We are particularly seeking information about:

- vehicles stopping or parked along these roadways, especially at night or early morning
- persons seen near power poles or roadside infrastructure
- any unusual activity involving cutting, climbing, or handling cables

If you observe suspicious behaviour, ****do not approach****, and contact police immediately.

📺 Residents and motorists are also asked to review CCTV, dashcam, or farm cameras

covering these areas.

06 June, from First On Scene Media: FOUR ARRESTED AFTER OFFICER INJURED IN NORTH SYDNEY PURSUIT NSW Police

A man and three teenagers have been arrested after an officer was injured during an alleged pursuit in Sydney's north today.

About 4.30am, officers attached to North Shore Police Area Command sighted a vehicle travelling on Military Road, Mosman.

Police attempted to stop the vehicle; however, when it allegedly failed to do so, a pursuit was initiated.

The pursuit continued towards Miller Street, North Sydney, before travelling along Blue Street, where the vehicle is alleged to have briefly stopped.

Police will allege that, as officers approached the stationary vehicle, the driver accelerated, striking an officer before colliding with an unmarked police vehicle and driving away.

The 21-year-old constable sustained head and leg injuries and was taken to hospital in a stable condition.

With assistance from Highway Patrol and the Dog Squad, the vehicle was later located abandoned on Blues Point Road, North Sydney.

A short time later, police arrested a 22-year-old man, a 17-year-old boy, and two 17-year-old girls at Blues Point Road, North Sydney who are assisting with inquiries.

05 June, from Neighbourhood Watch Victoria: Unknown number? Let it ring. 📞

If it's important, they'll leave a message. If it's a scammer, answering just confirms your number is active.

Simple rule: don't pick up, don't call back. If you're unsure, hang up and contact the

organisation directly via their official website.

Unknown Number? Let it Ring.

If it's important, they'll leave a message.

Protect Yourself from Phone Scams:

1. Never call back: Google the number first
2. Hang up on pressure: real organisations never demand you act immediately
3. Go direct: call back using the number on their official website
4. Never share passwords or personal info: no legitimate organisation will ever ask

Did you know there are still ways for your smartphones to be tracked even if it's switched off or airplane mode? They can be tracked in several ways, including:

- 🕵️ Spyware - software that can secretly monitor activity
- 📶 Phone tower triangulation - locating a device based on nearby mobile towers
- 📍 Bluetooth and location tracking - signals that can show your last or current position

These methods can send off "pings" to reveal where the device has been or even where it is currently.

Protecting your privacy matters. Whether you're using a smartphone, social media, email, or internet banking, understanding your settings is one of the strongest ways to safeguard your personal information.

It was a lucky escape early this morning for a family who woke to discover a fire burning in their garage.

Firefighters from the [#RFS](#) and FRNSW arrived quickly, with crews from [Galston](#) and [Arcadia](#) extinguishing the fire, which is believed to have been caused by an electric vehicle charger.

While there were no smoke alarms in the garage, a working smoke alarm in the hallway activated, allowing the family time to safely evacuate and giving firefighters a chance to extinguish the fire before it spread further into the home.

Remember it's important you have multiple smoke alarms installed throughout your

home, particularly in areas where combustible materials may be present.

Cars are increasingly being stolen by criminals using technology to exploit the keyless entry systems found in many modern vehicles. This method, often referred to as a "relay attack," involves using electronic devices to amplify and relay the signal from a car's key fob to unlock and start the vehicle.

Here's how the process generally works:

Two-Person Team: Typically, two thieves work together. One stands near the car with a device that can capture the signal from the key fob, and the other stands closer to the house or wherever the key fob is located with another device to relay the signal.

Signal Amplification: The device near the house picks up the key fob signal and amplifies it, sending it to the accomplice's device near the car.

Unlocking and Starting the Car: The car receives the relayed signal and interprets it as if the key fob is nearby. This allows the thieves to unlock the car and start the engine, driving away without physically possessing the key.

This type of car theft has been reported in various regions, including the UK, but hasn't yet become widespread in places like Victoria, Australia. However, the risk is still present as the technology becomes more common.

How to Avoid Being a Victim

Here are several steps you can take to protect your car from being stolen via a relay attack:

Use a Faraday Pouch: Store your key fob in a Faraday pouch or bag. These pouches are lined with metallic material that blocks the signal, preventing thieves from intercepting it. Make sure you replace your Faraday pouch every 2-3 years as it does degrade with time.

Turn Off Keyless Feature: Some car manufacturers allow you to disable the keyless entry feature. Check your car's manual or contact the manufacturer to see if this is an option.

Steering Wheel Lock: Use a physical steering wheel lock. This adds a layer of security, making it more difficult for thieves to drive away with your car even if they manage to unlock it. Consider one that comes with an alarm as well.

Park Securely: Whenever possible, park your car in a secure area like a locked garage or a gated facility. If you have to park on the street, choose a well-lit and busy area.

Key Fob Sleep Mode: Some key fobs have a sleep mode that prevents them from emitting a signal when not in use. Check your key fob's manual to see if this feature is available and how to activate it.

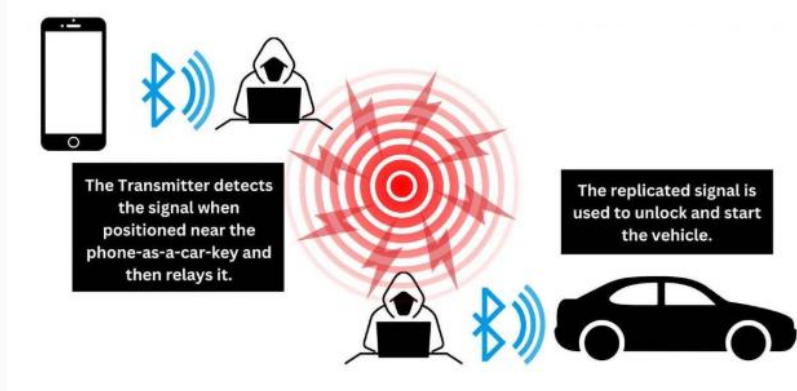
Install an On-Board Diagnostics (OBD) port locking device: The best way to describe OBD is that it is the brain of the car. OBD ports allow car manufacturers, garages, and owners easy access to diagnostic information about their vehicles. Installing an OBD locking device is generally a simple process. However, if your car is still under warranty,

it is advisable to consult with the manufacturer to ensure that adding the device will not impact your warranty coverage.

Regular Software Updates: Ensure your car's software is up to date. Manufacturers often release updates to fix security vulnerabilities.

If you can't, or won't, do the above your best protection is to keep your key fob as far as possible from the car.

By taking these precautions, whilst there is never a guarantee you won't have your car stolen, you can significantly reduce the risk of your car being stolen.

As a direct result, we have had no gas supply throughout the entire day, our dryers have been unable to operate, and we have had to turn away customers who came in needing to do their laundry and drying. It has been an incredibly difficult day for our team and for the loyal customers who rely on us.

The good news is that since 5pm today, our technicians have reinstalled the gas meter and our dryers are back up and running. The self-serve laundromat remains open 24 hours as always.

What makes this even harder is that our new owner Minnie took over HQ Laundry just this month, on the 1st of May. She has come into this business with so much energy, care, and commitment to serving this community, and to be faced with something like this in her very first weeks is genuinely heartbreaking.

Together we can help find the answers we need.

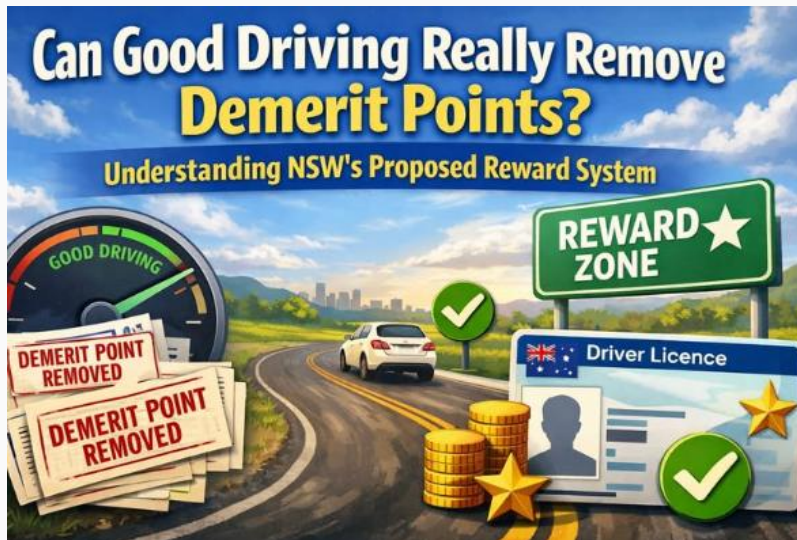

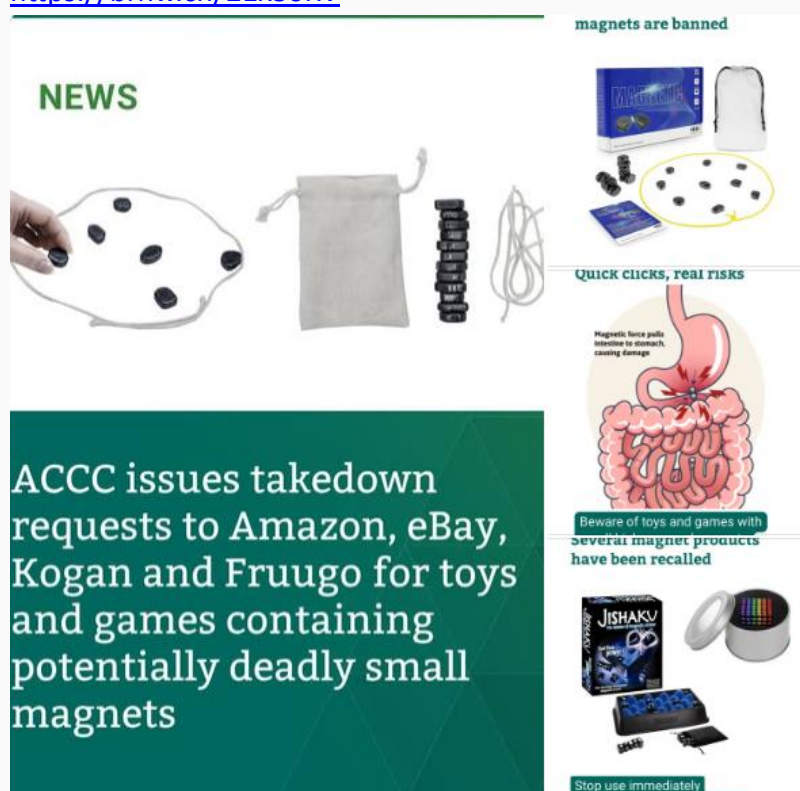

Tips for Planning for AusAlert Testing:

If it is not safe to receive AusAlerts on your devices, keep them turned off or in aeroplane mode until you need them.

Important: you can still receive Critical AusAlerts if your phone is on 'silent' or 'do not disturb'.

In order to stop the Critical Alert siren sounding on a device, you will need to turn your phone off or on aeroplane mode:

one hour before the test: turn off your mobile device or put it in aeroplane mode

during and after the test: keep your device off or in aeroplane mode for 24 hours (if you do need to turn your phone on during this window for an emergency be prepared that the siren may sound).
